Garfield assembled all his legal staff and began preparation of the formal order, which it was promised would clear up many points which

were indefinite or conflicting in the statement issued last night, Other departments of the government regarded the fuel order with varying attitudes. The war and navy departments, however, had been consulted and were in accord. While it was felt that some order was necessary to meet the situation, some officials believe the effect might have been obtained by means less drastic in effect on the country's economic fabric. Some confusion was evidenced in the result expected on the government's war programme.

German Sailors At Kiel In Mutiny

Thirty-Eight Officers Are Said To Have Been Killed

Submarine Crews Started it and Some of INCIDENT HAS Cruisers' Men Joined-Number of U-Boats Being Destroyed Stirs up Navy Men

London Jan. 17—A mutiny among submarine crews at the German naval base of Kiel, on January 7, is reported in an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Geneva. Thirty eight officers are said to have been killed.

The Geneva despatch quotes advices received there from Basel giving details concerning the mutiny. It is said to have been begun by submarine crews, and subsequently to have spread to portions of the crews of cruisers stationed at Kiel. It is said that some of the men who joined in the attack on the officers took part in the earlier mutiny at Kiel. It adds: "Although the mutiny was local, it shows that German naval men ere dissatisfied and especially in the sub-





Backers of Defunct League to Get Peace Compact

ORGANIZED BALL TO

Suit Held up Settlement - Baltimore Club Prevented Early Adjustment of Troubles by Demanding Franchise

New York, Jan. 16-The final settle-

ment of the peace compact between the major leagues and the Federal League, which was drawn up early in the spring of 1916, is expected to be effected within a short time. The matter was left in the hands of Presidents John K. Tener and Ban Johnson for adjustment, and at the recent meeting of the National Commission in Cincinnati it was announced that an agreement had been reached whereby the long standing trouble would be ended.

When the Federal League war was When the Federal League war was ended two years ago, the major leagues agreed to reimburse Harry F. Sinclair, who owned the Newark Club; the Wards, who owned the Brooklyn Club, and Edward Gwinner, owner of the Pittsburg Federal League club, in part, for the big investments they had made in the disastrous yenture. The Federal League at the time had taken over more than fifty of the players of the two League at the time had taken over more than fifty of the players of the two major league organizations, and had invaded the minor leagues to such an extent that several of them were on the verge of disbanding. So organized ball decided to buy off the invaders.

The Federal League owners agreed to allow those who had put up most of the financial backing to get the spoils of the settlement. Weeghman of Chicago was allowed to buy out the Cubs, while Phil Ball and Otto Steifel of St. Louis

Ball and Otto Steifel of St. Louis bought the St. Louis Browns. This left Sinclair, the Wards, and Gwinner to be taken care of. After this arrangement was agreed upon, the Baltimore Federal League Club halted the negotiations by bringing a \$900,000 suit, alleging that organized ball was conducted in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. As one of the terms of the peace pact had been that all litigation was to end, legal counsel for organized baseball took the stand that the Federal League had failed to carry out its part of the settlement, so the payments to Sinclair, the Wards, and Gwinner were withheld.

and Gwinner were withheld. Second Suit Is Filed.

After the Baltimore Federal League suit had been under way in the courts for a few days it was withdrawn by the plaintiffs, and once more organized ball was ready to pay over to the invaders the amount agreed upon. Just as this was about to be done, the Baltimore club brought another suit similar to the one which they had voluntarily with-

drawn.

The terms under which organized ball had agreed to settle their obligations have just become known. With the Baltimore club's second suit still pending, it is understood that the Sinclair, Wards, and Gwinner interests have consented major leagues for all or any losses which may result from this second suit of the Baltimore Feds.





"Today," said Captain Cockburn, "the tide has turned and now the scene is a different one. For the last two years it has been a case of the Germans having to stand up to what we are in mind to give them."

Captain Cockburn was a mechanical transport officer. He said that the artillery of the Allies of the western front is a mass of magnificent war mechinery, and to pierce it would be equivalent to breaking through many walls of iron. The significance of it is fully realized by the Germans.

Captain Cockburn said that things on the western front were never so dead as row since the outbreak of the war. It looked as if they were waiting for something to happen. In answer as to a question as to how much longer he thought the war would last, he said "Well, I am not in much of a position to answer that, but my opinion is that before another six months we will see the heaviest fighting that the world has known of and after that the war will soon cease. If the Germans fall to break through our line—which I do not think they can do—Germany will offer such peace terms that the Allies will accept. Captain Cockburn said that the trip across was a very rough one, as the weather for the last few days had been weather for the last few days had been very heavy. The storm of Tuesday night was a terrific one and the captain of the steamer had told him that in all his going to sea he had never been out in such a night.


