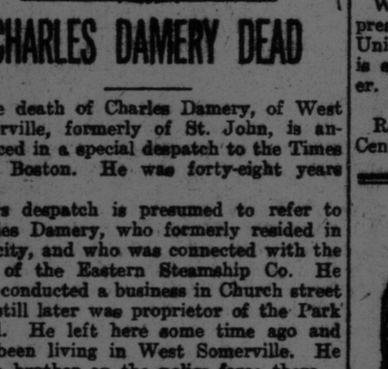

PROSPEROUS YEAR FOR BRITISH BANK

Statement Shows Marked Growth in Business—Forced to Enlarge Premises at Various Points

The balance sheet of the Bank of British North America published elsewhere in these columns, bears testimony to the progress and stability of the various institutions. An examination of the figures will reveal several interesting features, prominent amongst which stand out the substantial appropriations for the Reserve Fund and the Bank's premium account while additions to the various funds for their benefit, and a grant of 3 per cent bonus for the fourth year in succession show that, in the general prosperity, the staff has not been forgotten.

The profits for the year constitute a record in the history of the bank, which is all the more creditable, when it is borne in mind that they represent earnings for eleven months only, consequent on the change in the end of the bank's financial year from December to November. To bring about this good showing, a large and general increase in the business was necessary, and in every department a healthy growth is apparent. To keep pace with this growth, it has become necessary to provide larger premises at a number of important points, and at the present moment, several splendid buildings, in keeping with the solidity of the institution and the dignity of Canadian banking, are in course of erection at Montreal, St. John and Edmonton.

NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTIONS

Emile Patruel was elected mayor of Shediac yesterday by acclamation, and the aldermen were also returned by acclamation. The aldermen voted in Newcastle yesterday were only 245, and only two changes were made in the council, ex-Mayor Bettelheim being replaced by Alderman Miller retired, and Alderman Doyle, defeated. Mayor Morneau was elected by acclamation. In St. John, Mr. John Quinn and H. W. Ferguson were elected councillors in Campbellton yesterday, and at the same time a vote was taken on the matter of the liquor license. One ward voted for license and one against.

POLICEMAN RESIGNS

William R. Lee, of West St. John, who has been a member of the police force for the last sixteen years, has resigned. He has taken a large contract for supplying gravel for the construction of the Atlantic Sugar Refinery plant, and this will take all his time. He has been a very efficient policeman.

TO DEMOLISH REED'S CASTLE

The organization meeting of the Mount Pleasant Heights Realty Company, Ltd., was held here yesterday afternoon. The provisional directors belonging to the real estate and their places were filled by the election of J. M. Queen, G. G. A. Porter, Arthur M. Irvine, who will represent all the Montreal investors, was elected president, Mr. Queen vice-president and Mr. Porter, secretary-treasurer. Pairweather & Porter were appointed selling agents. Tenders will be called for the removal of the Reed's castle building and the work of preparing the property for division into building lots will be commenced immediately.

REFUSE TO CHANGE TARIFF SCHEDULES

Democratic Caucus Votes Down Amendments to Proposed Rates.

Washington, April 15—Democratic representatives from all sections are being besieged in letter and by personal representatives of insurance companies protesting against their inclusion as taxable organizations under the corporation tax provision of the tariff bill now under consideration before the house Democratic caucus. Representative Hull, of Tennessee, author of the income tax feature, said that his desk was piled with mail from insurance companies, protesting that they are not profit-making organizations. The matter may be brought up in caucus, but the Democratic leaders declare that insurance organizations were given careful consideration when the law was framed and that opportunity will not avail.

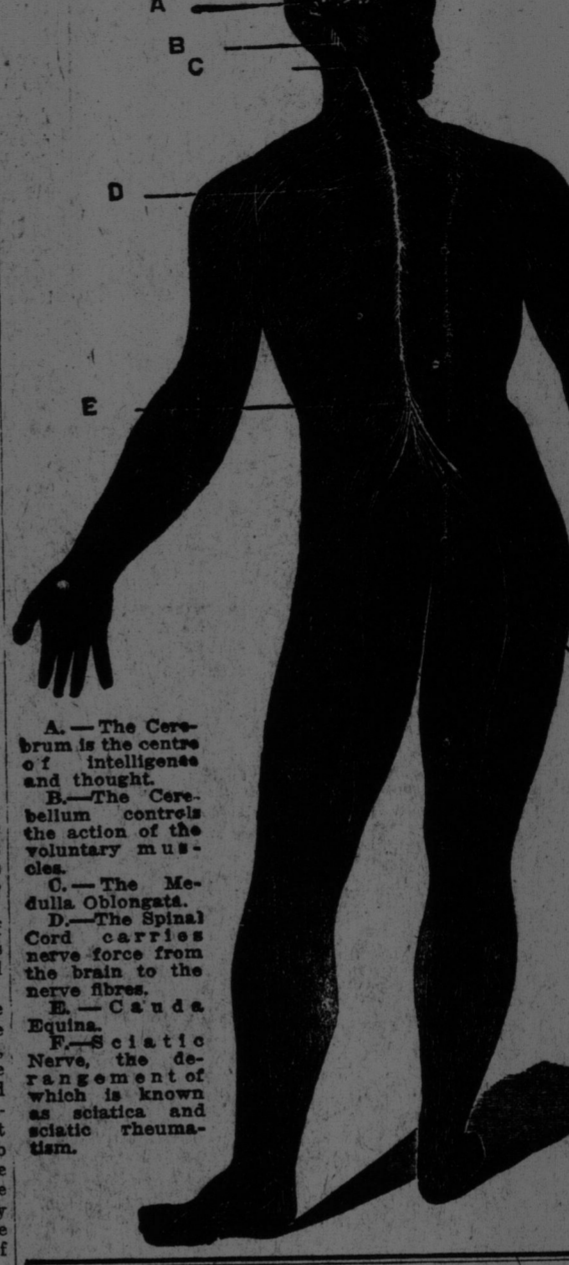
No Changes Made.

No changes were made in the committee's bill as a result of the many discussions, advocates of increased duties on wheat as well as those favoring its free listing being voted down, and members who urged increased duties on citrus fruits, pineapples, cotton yarns and other articles meeting a like fate. Representative Underwood, chairman of the Ways and Means committee who was all yesterday, was able to resume control of the bill this morning. The most stubborn opposition of the day came from Southern members on some of the duties. Representative Webb of North Carolina, proposed to increase the proposed rates on twisted, mottored and otherwise dressed cotton. The committee's rate of duty from five per cent to twenty-five per cent. The Webb amendment would increase these rates, beginning at 10 per cent on the lower grades and running up to thirty per cent on the highest grades. The amendment was voted down by a vote of 19 to 84, the first roll call of the day.

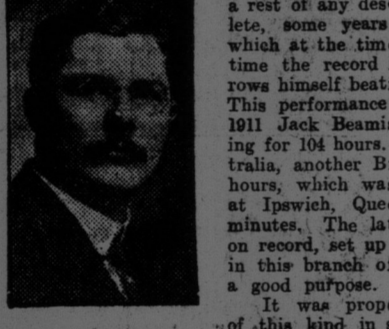

The contract for the reconstruction of the building on the corner of Prince William and Church streets, which was purchased by the Merchants' Bank of Canada, has been awarded to the British American Construction Company. They have already arranged for several contracts but this will be the first on which they will make a start.

The bank will take possession of the building on May 1 and will immediately turn it over to the contractors to allow them to commence work. The company promises to complete the job by November 15 and, if successful, will establish an enviable record for prompt work. They are taking the whole contract, masonry, carpentry, plumbing, heating, lighting and everything else.
