# INCORPORATED SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF HURON

THIRTY-THIRD SESSION.

(Being the Sixteenth under the Synod Act of Incorporation of 1874.)

## FIRST DAY.

The Synod was convened at London, on Tuesday, June 17th, 1890.

Divine Service was held in St. Paul's Cathedral at 10 o'clock a.m.

The Holy Communion was administered to the Clergy and Lay Representatives by the Lord Bishop, assisted by the Very Rev. G. M. Innes, M.A., Dean of Huron; Ven. F. W. Sandys, D.D., Archdeacon of Kent; Ven. J. W. Marsh, M.A., Archdeacon of London; and Revs Canon Hincks, Hill, Smith and Richardson.

The Sermon was preached by the Very Rev. the Dean of Huron, from Eph. iv., 8.

The Synod assembled at 2.30 p. m., in the Chapter House, for business.

The Lord Bishop in the chair.

The appointed prayers were said by Ven. Archdeacon Sandys.

The rolls of the Clergy and Lay Representatives were then called by their respective Secretaries, when 87 Clergymen and 85 Lay Representatives answered to their names.

The ballot papers were, in accordance with the Canon, distributed to the members of the Synod as their names were called.

**Report of Committee on Certificates and Assessments.**

The Committee appointed under section 8 of the Constitution for the examination of the certificates of election of Lay representatives to Synod, beg to report as follows :

1. That certificates have been furnished by 212 congregations for 258 delegates, and 34 congregations have not elected representatives.

2. That a provision of section 3 of the Constitution which requires that Lay representatives " shall be elected annually *during Easter week,*" etc., which this year fell on the 6th to 12th (inclusive) of April, has not been complied with by the following 21 congregations, which held their meetings on dates named opposite their names :

### The Bishop's Address.

His Lordship then delivered his annual address to the Synod  
**REVEREND BROTHERS AND BROTHERS OF THE LAITY:—**

In assembling again after the lapse of another year, our first our paramount duty is, with grateful hearts and chastened spirits, to acknowledge the benevolence and long-suffering of God in having spared us to the present hour, and in having given us throughout the year so many tokens of His love. Let us trust that a deep sense of His goodness may fill all our hearts and that, prompted by gratitude to Him, we shall only have one object in view, namely, the promotion of His glory in the advancement of His Kingdom throughout the length and breadth of the Diocese.

The past year has, for various reasons, been one of great anxiety and trial. The failure of crops, at least in some parts of Canada; the abnormal condition of the weather throughout the past winter; the general stagnation of trade from which the country is at present suffering, all have contributed more or less to check the outflow of money and to reduce the receipts by which our Church and benevolent societies are maintained, and yet, notwithstanding all these depressing circumstances, through God's good hand, our accounts show for the twelve months ending April 30th, 1890, not only no decrease, but a slight increase.

The total contributions for Domestic Missions were \$2,922.95, as against \$2,581.58 in the year ending April 30th, 1889. The totals throughout show that the increase has been as follows:—Mission Fund, \$156.23 in excess of last year; Domestic Missions, \$341.37; Women's Auxiliary, \$621.94; Synod Assessments, \$84.95. Owing to the change made in the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, the receipts of this Fund show a decrease of no less than \$647.30, a shrinkage which, though explicable on the ground that the usual contributions have been carried to another account, yet requires the minute examination and careful attention of Synod. The Fund has always commanded the sympathy and support both of the Clergy and Laity alike, and we trust that nothing will be done by any legislation to impair its usefulness or check the flow of benevolence toward it.

Brantford on the 3rd of October last, was born at Tignmouth, Devonshire, England, on May 26th, 1816. He graduated at Christ Church, Oxford, and was ordained, first Deacon, and subsequently Priest by the Rt. Rev. Richard Bagot, Bishop of Oxford. Apparently his first clerical duty was as a Minor Canon of St. Mary's Cathedral, Oxford. Coming to this country in 1847, his field of labor was Sarnia, where for twenty two years he zealously and faithfully worked. At the expiration of that time, he removed, owing to ill health, first to Mount Pleasant, and subsequently to St. Jude's, Brantford, at which place he resided until the time of his decease.

As one of the early pioneers of the Diocese, he must have endured many of the hardships and trials incident to missionary life, and under his pastoral care were laid the foundations of that strong and active Church organization in Sarnia which is to-day one of the many ornaments of the Diocese.

We have also to record the lamented and unexpected demise of the late Thomas William Magahy, who fell asleep in Jesus on Good Friday last, at the town of St. Mary's, to which he had but recently been appointed. After having passed through Huron College he was admitted to the Diaconate in 1872, and Priested January 4th, 1873. As an earnest and devoted man, Huron College has a reason to be proud that he graduated within her walls, while in his death the Diocese has lost one of her most laborious and successful men. The Synod will, I am sure, seize the present opportunity to extend to his afflicted widow its deep and unaffected sympathy in the heavy bereavement under which she is now bowed down.

#### NEW CHURCHES.

Four new Churches have been opened for Divine Service in the course of the year; while the foundation stone of a fifth has been laid. Two Churches also have within this time been consecrated.

On the 6th of October last I opened for Divine Service the Church of St. Mary's, Warwick. The Church is small but neat, and was consecrated the same day on which it was opened, thus setting a good and wholesome example to many Churches much larger than itself.

On Sunday, the 10th of November last, I opened for Divine Service, Trinity Church, Fordwich, in the Parish of Gorrie in the County of Huron. The zeal and industry exhibited by this congregation is most commendable, while, at the same time, I must not fail to note that it is owing chiefly to the untiring energy and patient love of their present rector, the Rev. T. A. Wright, that this happy result has been brought about.

On the 23rd of February last, I opened for Divine Service "Trinity" Church, Blenheim, in the County of Kent, a large and handsome structure, which reflects credit on all concerned. The Church has been built with a roomy and convenient basement, and is costing the sum of about \$4,000; an amount which, though somewhat large, will no doubt before long be met by the devotion and self-sacrifice of the congregation.

On Sunday, March 23rd, I opened for Divine Service an excellent and commodious Church at Port Albert, in the County of Huron, in the Dungannon Mission. The Rev. Mr. Carrie and his people deserve much praise for their zeal in erecting this structure. The more so, because up to this time the congregation has no doubt been much scattered and beside being few in numbers has had to contend with insufficiency of means.

On Tuesday, the 3rd of this month, I laid the foundation stone of a new Church to be erected, God willing, at Wiarton, in the County of Bruce. This building is to be of stone, and will cost some \$4,000. We will wish the Rev. Mr. Henderson and his congregation all prosperity in the prosecution of their good work.

Besides St. Mary's Church, Warwick, already mentioned, there were two other Churches consecrated; Christ Church, Glanworth, and St. Paul's, Wisbeach.

#### ORDINATIONS.

There have been two ordinations in the course of the year, at which 18 men have been ordained. Of these, 12 were admitted to the Diaconate and 6 to the Priesthood.

The first of these ordinations was held on Sunday, February 2nd, at St. George's Church, London West, when Mr. Thomas Fraser Kingsmill and Mr. William George Reilly were admitted to the Diaconate, and the Reverends H. E. Bray, M. G. Freeman, T. B. Moore, V. F. Rowe were ordained to the Priesthood.

The second ordination was held on the 1st day of this month at St. George's Church, Goderich, when the following gentlemen were admitted to the Diaconate:—

A third has been admitted from the Diocese of Worcester, England; the Rev. W. H. Battersby, M.A., appointed to Delhi, Courtland and Lyndoch.

#### CLERICAL CHANGES.

The Diocese has lost the valuable services of the Rev. Robert Ker, late Rector of St. James' Church, Ingersoll, but now Rector of St. George's Church, St. Catherines, in the Diocese of Niagara. The Diocese has also lost the esteemed services of the highly gifted Principal of Huron College, the Rev. Richard Gooch Fowell. Under God's blessing his administration has been productive of the most beneficial and happy results. Not only has he won the respect, but even the admiration of his students, thus accomplishing at once the most difficult, as well as the most necessary task for him who would be a successful teacher of young men. By his sound and judicious training; by his constant and unfaltering exposition of the truth he has made them pure in doctrine, and as regards scholarship, a credit to the College they represent.

As an evidence of the ripeness of the scholarship produced within its halls, I may say that at the recent examination for Deacon's orders the papers of some of the Huron men exhibited a knowledge and grasp of their subjects in the highest degree honorable not only to themselves, but also to the Principal and Mr. Williams, under whom they have been trained.

You will be glad to hear that the Rev. Alfred Peache has nominated a successor, who, as far as we can learn, is in every way suited for the post—the Rev. H. G. Millar, of Cambridge.

#### CONFIRMATIONS.

From June 22nd, 1889, to June 5th, 1890, I have held 60 confirmations, at which 1,429 persons have been confirmed; of these 522 were young men and 907 young women. I will only add that the record of these confirmations has been carefully kept; and that clergymen may at any time inspect the lists by applying at the office in London.

And now, passing on to other matters, permit me to mention some subjects of the gravest interest to all. And *first*, I shall draw your attention to the great necessity that exists both on the part of the Clergy and Laity for higher views concerning the sacredness and position of the Christian Ministry.

I refer to the degrading practice, now so often met with, of clergymen going to vacant parishes to preach trial sermons. In the first place, *such a practice utterly does away with that most comforting and blessed thought that God's sure hand alone is guiding us.* If any of you have done all in your power to obtain some coveted parish; if you have bent every energy and strained every nerve, seen every leading churchman in the place, and promised all the impossibilities that the varying minds of an influential congregation may require; then, when all is gained, victory secured, and all competitors outstripped, will the greatest of all difficulties present itself, namely—the difficulty of seeing the good hand of God, and of believing that you have been absolutely passive in the matter of your own advancement. So far from this being the case, you have done all in your power to secure the public vote in your favor, and if the future turn out to be a rather rude awakening, surely your discernment must lead you to see at whose door alone must the blame be laid.

Secondly,—*It is absolutely destructive of all self-respect.* Congregations are most anxious to have your services, and their anxiety generally maintains its force until Monday morning, when you are politely bowed out, as another competitor is to give an exhibition on the following Sunday. After which he, too, as a sort of extinct volcano, will go home a sadder, if not a wiser man. Self-respect, dear friends, must be thrown to the winds, and my advice to you all is: Never consent to go. If, however, you will go, remember that while congregations are no doubt honest in wishing to hear you, and heartily desirous of showing you every courtesy; yet as you have gone to them for criticism, criticism you will most unsparingly receive. goaded and gored, and then, when dead, thrown out beyond the barriers.

Thirdly,—*It is, above all, degrading to the last degree to that Gospel you were sent to preach.* Surely it cannot be right to invite people to hear a competition in preaching, as you would in music or athletics. The Gospel is the message delivered by God to us to be proclaimed in the ears of a dying world, and he is the best and truest man who most faithfully, most accurately delivers his message to all. But for the messenger himself to give a public rehearsal of his powers for the sake of obtaining a more influential position in the Church is to dishonor alike the God who sent him, and the message he was commissioned to proclaim. Far better remain a lifetime in the shadow of deep oblivion, than rush into sunlight, unbidden by the voice of God. In the former, you may lack, as some of our noblest missionaries lack, the music and cheer which numbers and sympathetic friends impart; but then, like them, you have the presence and sunlight of your Lord; while in the latter you may tread a palace of marble only to find sorrow, anxiety, and defeat.

Lastly,—*It ignores the Headship of Christ.* In this age of experience we do well to remember that it is only our Divine Master who can set before us an open door which no man can shut. If we are His, let us believe that He will place us just where He wishes us to be, and if He wishes any of you to occupy high and commanding positions in the Church, be assured that all the congregations and influences of the world cannot keep you out of them. The door which He opens no man can shut.

In conclusion, let me say, I quite admit the desirability of congregations knowing something about the men who may be coming to them, but certainly there are other ways beside trial sermons of finding out their merits or defects. A visit to a clergyman's own parish is at once a safer and more dignified course.

#### DIOCESAN UNIFICATION.

One of the great movements of the day, and one of immense importance for the future influence of our Church, is the proposed consolidation of all the various Dioceses throughout the Dominion of Canada. The object of this movement is:—That the Church being thereby united for all spiritual and temporal purposes may form a single corporate Body with one ecclesiastical head and with one common legislative action.

In order to bring about so desirable and happy a result, which can only be effected by the operation of God, great care and delibera-

tion must of necessity be taken. That such a noble consummation will require the action of time will be admitted by all, and that impediments many and formidable may possibly present themselves can scarcely be denied, but far and wide there is a deep and growing feeling for unity, and therefore as the unity of the body is scriptural, the sooner it is effected the better for the weal and welfare of the Church.

One object sought for by this proposed unification of the Church, is the formation, at no distant date, of one general Synod for the whole Dominion of Canada. Such a Body, while in no way interfering with the inviolable rights and admitted freedom of individual Dioceses will yet be of ultimate importance, inasmuch as it is to be seized with supreme legislative powers for the future government and well-being of the Church. As at present constituted, we have, beyond all our parochial bodies which have their rights and powers, our Diocesan Synods meeting annually, and our Triennial Synod of the Province, which, as regards ourselves, is vested with enlarged if not supreme powers.

The creation therefore of another legislative Body over and above our present Provincial Synod, may not improbably be found a practical impossibility. The reasonable fear might be entertained that we would be over legislated, and in fact have too much machinery for the work to be done.

In the next place, the number of Synods would seriously interfere with good attendance, and by their very multiplicity would become a financial burthen which no Diocese would be willing to bear.

I gather then, that the unification of the Church may involve a resetting of our present system of government, with the possible abolition of our present metropolitical system, and the substitution therefore, of some simpler plan, such as has long been in use in the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States. Be this however as it may, let us pray that God may bring about the unity of our Church and that we may soon see a general Synod of our whole Anglican Body at which representatives from the slopes of the Pacific and the far-off fields of Athabasca and Mackenzie River may grasp hands with men who come from the Atlantic seaboard, or from inland regions watered by our giant lakes.

#### ST. PAUL'S CATHEDRAL.

In 1888 I laid before this Synod the form of agreement by which St. Paul's Church was made at certain times, and for Episcopal and Synodical purposes, the Cathedral of the Diocese. I am happy to state that the present congregation of St. Paul's is now arranging for large and important alterations in their fabric, and contemplate erect-

ing a structure worthy of being the Cathedral Church of the Diocese. In addition to this they purpose, God willing, erecting a large and commodious building to be connected with the Cathedral by a cloister in which there will be ample accommodation for all future gatherings of the Synod, as well as abundant office room for the various officials of the Diocese. As St. Paul's has now a recognized position as the Cathedral Church, and as the Diocese by its development and success of this plan will have new and vastly improved accommodation, I would ask your sympathy, and to a certain degree, your co-operation in the important work which is in contemplation with reference to the Church, and especially would I ask that a committee of this Synod be appointed to consider whether or not anything can be done by the Synod itself without detriment to its funds to further and assist the work. If this be possible, I have no doubt that the venerable building can before long be so altered and improved that it shall be considered worthy to occupy its unique and dignified position as the Cathedral Church of the Diocese.

#### COMMITTEE ON LAY WORK.

Among the various duties of this present session, one, if not the most important, will be the taking of some action with reference to the calm and judicious report which will be laid before you on the best means of promoting lay work and agency in the Diocese.

The time has forever passed when this, or any other Diocese can afford to allow its vast capacities for lay work lie all unnoticed and unused. Not only in Synod, but beyond its walls, must we maintain the admitted fact that the Church consists of the threefold order of Bishops, Clergy and Laity; and that all have their part, not only in government and legislation, but also in the great outside battle with Satan and the world. Sure I am that our laymen in many instances have piety enough, and learning enough, and time enough to witness for Christ a good and noble confession, if only their sympathies were properly directed towards so great and blessed a work. Speaking on this subject to the Synod of 1885, I made the following remarks, which, as I do not think I can improve upon, I will with your permission, now reproduce:

"To reach the masses, and save the souls of those about to die, our people should be earnestly taught:—

"The great privilege of being individual workers for the cause of Christ, and the welfare of His church,

"Too many of our congregations, whether in the city or country, look upon their respective clergyman, much as the ancient Romans did on the gladiators in the circus. They sit on the benches, and

sometimes clap and cheer; and sometimes shriek out their disapproval, while he fights the lions. If he do well thumbs go up, but if the contrary, down they go, and the unfortunate minister, like the beaten gladiator, must then and there die. Now, what I propose is:—That the congregations should leave the benches and come down and themselves help to fight the lions. In this age, as in every other that has preceded us, we need something more from our people than cheers and hisses, we need the co operation of loyal hearts and true; the spontaneous action of those who in the day of danger will stand shoulder to shoulder with their appointed leaders, and by every effort in their power help to push the battle to the gate. Our Clergy were certainly intended to be spiritual captains to *lead on* their people in the tremendous contest against sin and Satan, but by no means can they occupy all the subordinate positions in the army as well; they cannot be lieutenants and sergeants and corporals and rank and file at one and the same time; they cannot be the whole army in themselves. Now, in too many parishes we have the *officers*, but from one fault and another, no *army* to give battle to the foe. While however saying this, I am confident that throughout the length and breadth of our land we have hundreds and thousands of earnest men and women who only need proper organization and development to make them a tremendous power for good. The Church must be aggressive in the Cause of Christ. 'Like the firefly she only shines when on the wing; but when she rests she darkens.' Motion, therefore must be in her very rest; toil even in her slumbers. To accomplish this, we need, among other requirements, careful and judicious organization: The utilization of all those forces which if left to themselves, mutually negative and destroy, but which, if combined and directed, become through the power of the Holy Spirit a mighty agency for the advancement of the Kingdom of Christ."

#### THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

I cannot commend too highly, or praise too sincerely, the noble spirit displayed and the admirable and ever-increasing work done by the ladies of the Huron Branch of the Women's Auxiliary. Publicly do I wish to thank them all, not only for their own work, but for the blessed stimulus they are to the spiritual life throughout the Diocese at large.

I would affectionately urge upon all the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese the great and permanent advantage of forming in all their parishes a healthy branch of this noble and beneficent institution.

#### SECRETARY-TREASURER.

After a term of seventeen years of active service, the esteemed Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocese, Mr. Edmund Baynes Reed, is about to retire. The kindness and sympathy of his nature, the energy and zeal displayed by him in the discharge of his official duties, together with the ability and tact evinced by him in the management of the many and various funds entrusted to his care will long be remembered by the members of this vast and growing Diocese. Most earnestly do we wish him "every blessing" in his new sphere of duties, and trust that ever over him and his may be outspread the sheltering wings of our covenant-keeping God. Into His loving care we now commit him, publicly assuring him that whatever friends he may meet with on the shores of the Pacific, or amid the mountains of British Columbia, they will not exceed in personal warmth those he has left behind.

You will now be called upon to elect a successor, and I sincerely trust and pray that the God of all wisdom may guide you to a right judgment in this most grave and important matter; and that a man pre-eminently gifted for his office may be found combining in himself the diverse, yet not opposite qualities, of spiritual meetness with intellectual acumen for the many, and sometimes difficult, duties of his office.

And now commending you to the Word of God and the testimony of His grace, I sincerely trust that all the grave and important deliberations of this august body may be guided by the blessed presence of the Holy Spirit to the uplifting of the glory of our Divine Redeemer, and the establishment of His Kingdom among us.

#### Receiving of Report of the Executive Committee.

The Annual Report of the Executive Committee was then submitted, and being distributed in printed form the reading of it was dispensed with. The printed audited accounts had been previously placed in the hands of the members of the Synod.

#### Appointment of Secretary-Treasurer.

In consequence of the receipt by the Bishop of the resignation of Mr. E. Baynes Reed, as Secretary Treasurer of the Synod, which

resignation was accepted by the Executive Committee at its last meeting, the following recommendations relative to the appointment of a successor to that office were then presented from the Executive Committee :

1. That the office staff consist of Secretary-Treasurer at a salary of \$1,200, and an assistant at a salary of \$800 per annum.

2. That the Executive Committee recommend that a committee of five Clergymen and five Laymen be appointed by the Synod to examine all applications for the position of Secretary-Treasurer, and testimonials of applicants, and to recommend to the Synod for consideration such applicants as the Committee regard as eligible.

3. That the election when made be by ballot, and that no candidate shall be declared elected until he shall have received a majority of the votes cast.

4. That in the opinion of the Executive Committee whether the Synod office be managed by either one or two officials it is advisable that the books of the Synod be audited at least quarterly.

The recommendations were read clause by clause.

Clauses 1 and 2 were carried.

Clause 3 was carried with the addition of the following words :

"That during such election (while upon the counting of the ballots no candidate has a proper majority of votes) the name of the candidate having the smallest number of votes at that counting shall be dropped or erased from all future ballots."

Clause 4 was carried.

On motion, the recommendations as amended were adopted.

The Bishop nominated the following committee on clause 3: Very Rev. The Dean, Ven. Archdeacon of London, Revs. W. A. Young, Canon Smith, W. Craig, Messrs. Matthew Wilson, R. Bayly, W. Grey, Chas. Jenkins and Judge Ermatinger.

The Synod adjourned at 5.20 o'clock.

### Report of Committee of Synod on Lay Help.

*To the Bishop, Clergy, and Laity of the Diocese of Huron, in Synod assembled, the following report is most respectfully submitted :*

At the last meeting of the Synod it was moved by Mr. Joseph Lea, seconded by Rev. Dr. Beaumont,

That there be formed an association, called the Church of England Lay Helpers' Association, of which the Bishop shall be President; and that branch associations be formed in every parish or mission, of which the clergyman shall be president.

The objects of this association shall be :—

1. The encouragement and development of practical Christian work among its members.
2. To encourage devotional worship and the congregational rendering of our Church services.
3. To encourage by example and precept regular attendance at the Lord's Table.
4. To assist the clergyman in seeking out, and securing the names of, strangers.
5. The promotion of Sunday School work.
6. The holding of services in places removed from regular church services, where it is possible for five or six persons to meet together.
7. The distribution of tracts in railway cars, and in such places as the members of each branch may deem advisable.
8. To encourage systematic giving by all Christians, and to discourage, by all means possible, all objectionable means of raising money, such as lotteries, games of chance, and any schemes in which giving is not a direct, personal and free-will offering.
9. The visitation of the destitute, and the providing for their spiritual needs.
10. The holding of religious services in poor-houses and prisons.
11. The reading of the daily lessons, with prayer for all members of the association, specially for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on its work.
12. The weekly meeting of the members of each branch for devotional and training purposes.

That the annual meeting of this association be held during the first week in Advent, in such place as shall be determined upon by a majority of its members.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. A. H. Dymond, seconded by Rev. Jno. Gemley, and carried;

"That Mr. Lea's resolution be referred to a committee, to be named by the Bishop and that His Lordship be respectfully requested to act as chairman."

His Lordship was pleased to accept the office of chairman, and to appoint the following as the committee :—Rev. G. C. Mackenzie (Convener), Rev. W. J. Taylor, Rev. Canon Richardson, Rev. T. R. Davis, Rev. C. O'Meara, Rev. W. Johnson, Rev. R. Ker, Rev. D. J. Caswell, Mr. Joseph Lea, Mr. R. S. Gurd, Mr. A. H. Dymond, Judge Woods, Mr. Charles Jenkins and Mr. G. T. Scace.

The committee met on December 2nd, 1889, the Bishop presiding, and all but four members being present.

The following resolutions were then agreed to :

1. That this committee recognizes the great importance of developing a system of Lay Help among the male members of the Church of England, and believes that on such a movement, under the blessing and guidance of the Great Head of the Church, the growth and extension of the Church largely depends.
2. That it is desirable to ascertain to what extent in the Diocese of Huron Lay Help is being utilized in connection with the work and service of the Church.
3. That a full discussion of the whole question of Lay Help in the Synod is desirable, and that His Lordship be respectfully requested to arrange for such a discussion at a session of the Synod during its next meeting.
4. That a report, setting forth the necessity for and the means of securing and employing Lay Help and suggesting the establishment of any organization necessary to that end, be drawn

up, and after receiving the approval of the Bishop presented to the Synod, such report to include any information that can be obtained as to present practice in the Diocese in this regard.

5. That a sub-committee, consisting of Rev. G. C. Mackenzie, Rev. W. J. Taylor, Mr. Lea and Mr. Dymond, be appointed to draw up such report and present it, with the Bishop's sanction, to the Synod.

#### REPORT OF SUB-COMMITTEE.

Your committee beg to report as follows :

The subject under deliberation is, as respects Synodical discussion, if not absolutely new, at all events a rare one, and the ground to be covered, or that may be covered by it, is almost unlimited. Some reference in the first place to the limitations your committee have deemed it best to impose on their inquiries; to the nature of the Lay Help which appears most urgently to require development at the present time; and to the principles which should regulate the employment of such help may be in order.

The original resolution, above printed, and referred to the committee, goes into many details and suggests a variety of forms of work, most, if not all, of which will doubtless engage the attention of the Synod, or of an association of Lay Workers, if established. But to enter into a critical examination of all these would, your committee fear, occupy time that, in their opinion, may at this stage be most profitably concentrated on a few of the more urgent. Reasons of a similar nature have also led your committee to consider it inexpedient to deal with branches of Church work chiefly devolving upon the women of the Church, whose counsels, too, it might be only respectful and desirable to invite before trespassing on those fields of usefulness in which they already labor with so much success and devotion.

THAT THE MEN OF THE CHURCH may be stirred up to greater activity; that they may feel that, not in things temporal only but also and pre-eminently in things Spiritual, they have a work to perform; that the faithful clergy may have only to call upon a faithful laity for help in Christ's name and cause, in order to receive it; that the power and influence of the Holy Spirit may be increasingly felt by every man to whom even the one talent for service has been given; this your committee believe to be the crying want of the Church at the present hour.

In an endeavor, with God's help, to attain to this righteous and necessary end, your committee propose as principles of the movement :

1. That all present action shall be strictly in accordance with existing Canonical rules and well established usage.
2. That in all branches of Lay Work and service herein contemplated, the maintenance of the good order of the Church shall be carefully observed.
3. That everything shall be done under clerical supervision and with due submission to Episcopal authority.

Without excluding other work, as it presents itself, we may suggest the following as being more directly in the minds of the committee :

- Reading the Lessons.
- Assisting at or conducting cottage and the like mission services.
- Teaching a Bible or Sunday School Class.
- Visiting the sick and afflicted.
- Seeking out and introducing strangers.
- Conducting Divine service in the temporary absence of the Minister or, under proper authority, in a new or vacant mission.

Your committee have not been forgetful of the useful part played by male members of the Church in connection with the temporalities, with the musical portions of the Church's services, with the duties of the Churchwardens, sidesmen, and other officers. But the committee regard these as already well recognized spheres of action and not immediately before them at the present time.

#### *Circular to Clergy.*

Your committee thought it well in the first place to ascertain the extent of the male Lay Help of the Diocese in the above-mentioned respects, and also to invite the opinions of the clergy both as to the obstacles to the larger supply of such Lay Help and the methods by which an

increase thereof may most effectually be obtained. Your committee accordingly addressed a circular to the several parochial clergy of the Diocese, containing the following questions :

1. Do you receive the assistance of lay Male members in connection with your Church work and Services? If so, to what extent, and in what manner?
2. Do any obstacles exist, in your experience, to your securing such help, and will you say in what shape they are presented?
3. Will you oblige the Sub-Committee with any suggestions generally bearing on the question in hand?

#### Replies to Circular.

To this circular the committee have received ninety-one replies, representing something like three-fourths of the clergy of the Diocese engaged in actual parochial work. They are usually couched in somewhat general terms,—as from the nature of the questions was to be expected,—but are sufficiently explicit for the purposes of the inquiry. And while they disclose great varieties of experience and a sense of many difficulties existing in the way of more extensively utilizing Lay Help, and while much hesitation is shown with regard to the means to be taken in that direction, the committee thankfully recognize the expressed desire of a large majority of the clergy to assist them in their work and in devising plans by which the end in view may, with the Divine Blessing, be attained.

Out of the number above-mentioned it appears that forty-five to fifty have the assistance *in esse* or *in posse* of a Lay Reader or of Lay Readers who help or should help the clergy by reading the lessons and in other ways connected with the conducting of Divine Service. The committee qualify the above statement because in a few instances the Reader seems to be one in name only. In others resort to Lay Help is only had occasionally and in cases of emergency. Probably in about half the forty-five to fifty parishes such Lay Help is a recognized institution and in many of these most usefully and efficiently exercised. As to the licensing of Lay Readers there does not appear to be uniformity. Many are so licensed, while others regarding their services probably as occasional and temporary, have not received direct episcopal approval. In this department of labor the committee find the needs of the Church to be represented by two words: EXTENSION and ORGANIZATION.

Most of the clergy acknowledge the assistance rendered by male members in Bible Class and Sunday School work, but the number of men devoting themselves to this most important service is admitted to fall far short of the Church's needs or what she has a right to expect. Valuable help, too, is rendered, more particularly in urban parishes, by associations of young men in guilds and similar organizations. These societies are specially designed to promote sentiments of brotherly fellowship and good will between church members, to secure the regular attendance of the latter at Divine worship, and the introduction and friendly reception of strangers, and to encourage young men to dedicate themselves to the Church's service as duty calls and opportunities offer.

#### ALLEGED OBSTACLES TO LAY HELP.

The committee will endeavor to epitomize the difficulties and obstacles stated by their correspondents to exist in respect of the more general employment of laymen in connection with Divine service.

1. Want of spirituality, leading to indifference to religious duties, with apathy and indolence, and inconsistency of daily life with Christian profession.
2. That few men are really fitted for such work by reason of lack of definite training and even of general education.
3. Personal conceptions of unfitness combined with diffidence, modesty and a sense of unworthiness.
4. Difficulty of keeping the laity in their proper place and danger or inconvenience from presumptuous intrusiveness. "Some laymen," writes one correspondent, "do not deport themselves wisely."

5. Prejudices of the Anglican laity against any substitute for an ordained ministry.
6. Want of proper effort and frequent or continuous presentation of the subject by the clergy.
7. Want of Diocesan recognition.
8. Engagement of the younger laity in other fields of usefulness.

#### *Alleged Obstacles Considered.*

In reply to the first-mentioned obstacle, it must be felt by everyone that no machinery can be devised by human ingenuity which will supply the place of the quickening influences of God's Holy Spirit. If they be wanting we may look for effectual help in vain. Where they are present all difficulties in the way of any movement that is in accordance with the Divine will can be overcome. The responsibility of a Church or individual resisting their operation is too serious to contemplate. Proposals, however excellent and practical, for organization, recognition, agencies of various kinds, must all be regarded as but subsidiary and supplemental to the grand necessity for a larger outpouring of the Holy Ghost. In the conviction that the buried talent has been the hindrance and stumbling block of the Anglican Church, that the Master has given to every man a work to do "according to his several ability," and that, where the talent is bestowed, He will also bestow the means for its exercise, let us unitedly, in faith and confidence, commit our needs to the great Head of the Church doing our part zealously and earnestly trusting to Him to give His blessing on our efforts in His own good time.

The obstacles founded on actual or presumed unfitness are likely to diminish in proportion to the attempts honestly and persistently made to discover and enlist those who, however different, are more or less qualified. In a country which affords a fair education to the poorest and humblest; in a Church which presents Scriptural truth in so systematic and intelligible a form as does the Church of England; which puts, too, into the hands of her members an order of service in connection with every office, and in a day when every Sunday School teacher possesses guides and helps furnished in the most accessible form by the ablest writers of the age, such obstacles should speedily vanish. Is it to be believed for one moment that the Church of England, with everything in her favor, should be unable to do, through her laity, what is done with immense advantage by Presbyterians, Methodists, or Baptists?

The probability that laymen might presume on the privileges granted them appears to the committee in view of difficulties already noticed, to assume very insignificant proportions. With a clergyman properly qualified to fill, and careful to maintain his position as head of the parish, any such embarrassing incidents as are hinted at should be easily avoided.

Obstacles arising from the prejudices of the laity against the services of unordained persons apply, of course, only to the latter taking part in Divine service. Apart from objections purely personal in individual cases, such prejudices must be met and overcome by an education begotten of experience and a just and proper presentation of the Church's mind and necessities.

This brings the committee to the further suggestions that there has been no Diocesan recognition of the importance of encouraging Lay Help, and that the clergy have failed to bring the subject continuously and prominently before their people.

The immediate removal of the first of these last-named impediments is in the hands of the Synod. The second rests with the clergy individually. The need for such help, the duty of providing such help, and the limitations to such help, require to be explained frequently and intelligently. Then, as fitting occasion offers, let it be directly asked for and availed of, if only at first tentatively and in cases of emergency. Your committee are in possession of evidence of the most satisfactory results from just such methods as they have indicated. But continued judicious appeals by the clergyman have been the first condition to success.

The last obstacle mentioned is the engagement more particularly of young laymen in fields of usefulness outside the Church. This does not appear to be urged in more than one or two instances. Is it quite clear that young men so well disposed for work have been afforded sufficient opportunities for the exercise for good of their special gifts *within* the Church? Or could they only find elsewhere just such openings as their bent of mind demanded?

#### *SUGGESTIONS BY CLERGY.*

Your committee will now endeavor to summarize the suggestions kindly and liberally tendered in response to question No. 3. They may be classified as follows:

##### **I. As to Episcopal or Synodical action:**

- (1) An authoritative expression by the Synod in favor of Lay Help.
- (2) A circular or pastoral by the Bishop in the last mentioned sense.
- (3) The appointment by the Bishop of a day of intercessory prayer.
- (4) The appointment of Lay Readers to be made by the Bishop publicly and orally, and accompanied by a simple form of religious service.

  - (9) Sending laymen as delegates to missionary meetings.
4. Extra Synodical action :
  - (1) Formation of a Diocesan association for all branches of Church work.
  - (2) A Diocesan male Lay Workers' association with parochial branches and the Bishop as President.

To the foregoing may be added such suggestions as :—that there should be at least one Lay Reader in every parish ; that, to avoid local difficulties, Lay Readers should exchange parishes ; that Lay Assistants should be appointed at small salaries ; that the larger cities and towns should help the rural and smaller parishes with a supply of Lay Readers, and that the perpetual diaconate should be increased.

#### *Information from Ultra-Diocesan Sources.*

Before discussing the merits of any of the valuable counsels above detailed, your committee propose to give the Synod the benefit of some further information, chiefly from ultra-Diocesan sources, on this most important subject.

#### *Lay Help in Quebec Diocese.*

The committee under this head first call attention to a pamphlet entitled "The place of Laymen in the Spiritual Work of the Church" containing the report of a committee of the Deanery Board of the district of St Francis, Diocese of Quebec, appointed "to consider the modes in which lay members of the Church may most expediently make use and proof of those gifts of the Holy Spirit, which in their 'differences' and 'diversities,' are 'given to every man to profit withal.' both for the invigorating of their Spiritual life and for the development of that common religious life in which, as Christians, we are all knit together in one communion and fellowship."

The resolution appointing the committee reads as follows :—"Resolved,—That, by our Lord's constitution of His Church, it is a brotherhood, the active co-operation of every member of which, laity as much as clergy, is essential to its healthy progress ; that the abstention of the great body of our laity from any such active interest is the greatest of the evils from which the Church is suffering ; that this Board earnestly calls the attention of their fellow churchmen to this crying evil, and moves them to pray that our Lord would show us the way out of it ; and that a committee be appointed, etc."

The work of the St. Francis' committee has been thoroughly done. The report examines and presents the teachings of the Holy Scriptures on the matter at issue; cites the testimony of history on the work of laymen in the Church; and describes the growth of the movement in recent times, referring notably to the Lay Helpers' Association for the Diocese of London (England), formed by the late Bishop Jackson in 1868, and ever since a most potent agency for good in the metropolis of the Empire. The formation of a Lay Helpers' Association in the St. Francis district was the result of the report.

*From Rev. Dr. Langtry, Toronto Diocese.*

From Toronto the committee have received some very valuable suggestions, founded on personal experience, from the Rev. Dr. Langtry, of St. Luke's Church, and well known as the Prolocutor of the Provincial Synod. Dr. Langtry states that his attention was called by a layman to the absence of churches and church organization in a large district lying outside the limits of Toronto. The picture of spiritual destitution thus presented induced Dr. Langtry to appeal earnestly for help to the men of his own congregation, of whom eighteen at once came forward and placed themselves at their Rector's disposal. The Bishop of the Diocese entered cordially into the views of Dr. Langtry and agreed to attend in person and appoint the new Lay Readers at a special service suited to the occasion. Dr. Langtry says, "I told the Bishop that I was persuaded there was no use sending men to read sermons in such mission work as we were contemplating. And I asked him whether he would not allow the men just to tell the people what they themselves believed and knew. He readily consented and my forecast was abundantly verified." Dr. Langtry goes on to point out that,—while they might undertake other duties efficiently,—the men who were unable to deliver original addresses failed in mission work. Others, he states, who possess the gift of utterance have qualities in that particular which equal those of a large proportion of the clergy of the Diocese. Dr. Langtry's experiment has, in that sense, and in other directions been, on the whole, a success, lack of the organization and clerical assistance and oversight necessary to the full carrying out of his original intentions having been the chief drawback. As was to be expected some of the original volunteers have given up the work, others have left the parish, but a good work has nevertheless been done and is still in progress. Six services in addition to those of the parish church every Sunday, three Sunday schools, and two Bible classes, afford encouraging evidence of Church life and activity. Dr. Langtry, however, suggests that a period of probation should precede the licensing of a Lay Reader; that where several laymen are associated in mission work they should exchange stations frequently, and that a clerical missionary should regularly attend each station in turn to administer the ordinances of the Church.

#### *Diocese of Huron.*

In the Diocese of Huron the founding and building up of several promising missions in connection with parish churches has been due largely to the zealous action of laymen encouraged and assisted by the clergyman of the parish and could not have been attempted or carried on in the absence of Lay Help.

#### *Diocese of Montreal.*

In the Diocese of Montreal a Diocesan Lay Helpers' Association was established in January, 1880. The committee are indebted to Mr. J. W. Marling, the Secretary, for sending them, at the instance of the Very Rev. Dean Carmichael, a copy of the Constitution and the first issued report of the association. The former is very simple in its provisions, and may form a convenient model for the Constitution, with certain modifications, of a similar organization in our own Diocese. It is as follows:

### LAY HELPERS' ASSOCIATION OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL CONSTITUTION.

1. The Association shall be called "THE LAY HELPERS' ASSOCIATION FOR THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL," and shall have its headquarters in the City of Montreal.
2. The objects of the Association shall be: *First*, uniting together in one body all Lay members of the Church of England engaged in any active form of Church work in the Diocese; *Second*, the development of Lay Help and the enlistment of helpers in Christian works in connection with the Church in the Diocese of Montreal.
3. All Laymen within the Diocese, being communicants, actually engaged with the sanction of the Clergyman of the Parish or Mission, in the work of the Church, shall be eligible to join the Association.
4. All Laymen possessing the qualifications referred to in Section 3 may be enrolled as members of the Association upon production to the Secretary of a

5. A register of the names and addresses of the members shall be kept, showing what description of work each member is engaged in, or is prepared to undertake.

6. Each member on becoming such shall sign an agreement to return the Certificate of Membership given if required by the Bishop. No member of this Association shall do work in any Parish or Mission without the sanction of the Rector or Incumbent.

7. No member of this Association may act as a Lay Reader without the license of the Bishop.

8. The Officers of the Association (with the exception of the Bishop of the Diocese, who shall always be *ex-officio* Patron, and Hon. President) shall be Laymen of the Church of England, communicants, and be a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and a Committee of Management of 12 Members, of whom five shall form a quorum. The Officers of the Society above-named shall be *ex-officio* members of all Committees. A correspondent may also be named for each rural Deanery.

9. The regular meetings of the Committee shall be held on the first Tuesday of each month. Special meetings may also be convened by the Secretary—when necessary—at the call of the Bishop; or of the President in his absence, of the Vice-President, or upon the requisition of ten members of the Association. No other business to be discussed at Special Meetings excepting that specified in the notice calling the meeting. The Annual Business Meeting shall be held on the Tuesday in Synod week, at which the Officers of the ensuing year shall be elected. The members shall be invited to meet together at a celebration of the Holy Communion on All Saints Day, and a special Evening Service with Sermon shall be held on the Feast of the Epiphany.

10. The Constitution may be altered at any Annual Business Meeting by a vote of two-thirds majority of those present at such meeting, provided that notice of any proposed alteration, signed by the mover and seconder thereof, be forwarded to the Secretary at least two months prior to such meeting; such alteration not to come into force until sanctioned by the Bishop.

MONTREAL, January, 1889.

The original membership, in January, 1887, was twenty-six, increased to fifty in June following, thirty-eight of whom had signed the roll. The work reported as already or prospectively in hand at the date last mentioned, included making collections to build a Mission Church in the suburb of St. Jean Baptiste, holding Sunday services to build a Mission Church in the suburb of St. Jean Baptiste, holding Sunday services at the Home for Friendless Women, assisting the Chaplain at services in the Jails, undertaking a Prison-gate Mission, Mission work at Maisonneuve, at Mount Royal Vale, and elsewhere. As provided by the Constitution all the officers are laymen, including the President, the Bishop of the Diocese being Honorary President and Patron. The Bishop, by a circular to the clergy and by presiding at the annual meeting, has publicly given his sanction to the movement.

#### Lay Help in English Dioceses.

The Church of England Year Book (1889) supplies us with a most interesting and suggestive account of the progress of the Lay Help movement in the Mother Country. The editor of the Year Book says: "The encouragement and organization of Lay Help is one of the most interesting indications of the activity of modern Church life. As year by year points out some new fields of labor, and shows some better way of adapting the ministries of the Church to the wants of the people, the practical help of well-trained and earnest-minded laymen becomes increasingly important and valuable." A statistical table shows that, in twenty-eight dioceses there are 1,344 Lay Readers or Lay Evangelists acting under direct Episcopal license and authority. Reports are also made in more or less detail from the Dioceses of Bangor, Bath and Wells, Chester, Durham, Exeter, Hereford, Liverpool, Llandaff, London, Manchester, Ripon, and St. David's. The committee have thought it well to give a very brief epitome of each of the foregoing, calling attention at the same time to the evidence the above list affords that by no particular party or school in the Church is this great work monopolized.

**Bangor.**—Lay Workers' Association. Objects: (1) To encourage Laymen and women to take a definite share in Church work, and to enforce on them the duty of assisting in the advancement of true religion; (2) Obtain gratuitous help for the Clergy on their invitation, and under their direction, in carrying on various branches of Church work, and to relieve them in the secular part of parochial work; (3) Unite all the members in hearty and systematic co-operation and in sympathy one for the other. The membership consists of: (1) Lay Readers duly licensed for special work such as rendering aid to the Clergy in all ministrations not strictly requiring the aid of one in Holy Orders, or reading prayers and Holy Scripture and explaining the same in School and Mission Rooms, or in such other unconsecrated places as the Bishop's commission shall define; (2) Lay Helpers, who, being Laymen and Women, engage to do some specified Church work voluntarily, or undertake offices for promoting the interests of religion in the Church of England.

**Bath and Wells.**—A similar Association to the foregoing. All Church Workers may be members. Associates and members number nearly 2,000 in 100 parishes. Small grants made to a limited number of Lay Readers to enable them to take a few weeks' study at Oxford or Cambridge.

**Chester.**—Of the same character as above, but apparently confined to male helpers.

**Durham.**—Principal feature of Lay Helpers' Association the training and employment of Laymen in Evangelistic work. It is the custom to hold an annual service for the licensing of Laymen in the Cathedral. The members are divided into two sections, Evangelists and Assistant Evangelists; the former are chosen from communicants who have already acquired experience and fitness for their work, the latter being those who are under special training, and who are called upon to undergo a probation of twelve months at least and pass a definite examination before they receive the official commission of the Bishop. The licenses are ruri-decanal in their scope.

**Exeter.**—Lay Readers' Association. Consists of Parochial Readers licensed to the parish only, and General Readers, who may, with the consent of the incumbent, work in any parish in the Diocese.

**Hereford.**—Lay Helpers' Association. Six hundred enrolled members admitted on recommendation of Clergyman. Includes both sexes.

**Liverpool.**—Diocesan Lay Helpers' Association. Members apparently of both sexes—564 Lay Helpers and 68 Lay Readers, the latter subject to examination before license.

**Llandaff.**—Association of Lay Helpers. Similar to last mentioned; 950 members.

**London.**—Lay Helpers' Association. Enrolled membership 5,500. The editor says: "To this Association is in a great measure due the development of the scheme for the training of Lay Readers from every Diocese in England and Scotland by a course of instruction and residence for from two to four weeks within the walls of Keble College, Oxford, or Selwyn College, Cambridge, during the long vacation. From forty to fifty Readers annually avail themselves of this privilege."

**Manchester.**—Lay Helpers' Association. Has 78 branches in 14 Rural Deaneries, and a membership of 1,305. Courses of lectures on such subjects as St. Paul's Epistles, Church History, the Prayer Book and Christian evidences assist the members in preparation for their work.

**Ripon.**—Diocesan Lay Helpers' Association. Holding Mission services represents a large part of the work done. Branch Associations in six Rural Deaneries and over 130 licensed Readers. Licenses granted upon examination of candidates.

**St. David's.**—Association of Lay Helpers. This Association is described as having resulted from the report of a committee of the Diocesan Conference, and its object is to unite communicant members of the Church in definite work for the Church under the superintendence of the Bishop and clergy of the Diocese,

such as to (1) undertake instruction classes for men, or Bible classes for young men; (2) teach in the schools; (3) sing in the choir; (4) conduct or assist at children's services in schools or mission rooms; (5) conduct cottage lectures or services in mission rooms; (6) help to bring people to attend the services; (7) read to the sick, and to make themselves generally useful in rendering the Church efficient, and in carrying the Gospel of Christ, by means of the Church, to every man's door.

Thus in a most conservative spirit, but with equally characteristic boldness and energy, is the Mother Church calling her laity to the front and sending them to fight under her banner in Christ's name.

#### *Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States.*

The Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States has its Brotherhood of Lay Readers, the objects of which are briefly described as follows:

To aid in the extension of Christ's Church in the United States of America.

To assist the Clergy of the Church by doing duty as Lay Readers.

To encourage loyalty to the Church and reverence for sacred things.

To publish from time to time such information as may be of assistance to the Brotherhood in the discharge of their duties.

#### *The Great Need of the Church.*

There are, therefore, it will be seen, abundant precedents for a vigorous movement in this large Diocese, a missionary Diocese as it truly is in so many aspects. There are populous and wide fields to be occupied, and which must be occupied or lost. The deficiency in the supply of clerical laborers is an ever-present cause of regret and of injury to the Church's interests. There are not many parishes in which means can be found to engage additional clerical assistance. Yet there are few parishes in which the Incumbent is not overworked, even if, by great activity, he can overtake the work. It may be doubted if there is one parish in which some Lay Help, if not already afforded, would not be a relief. Your committee could not regard the Church in Huron as coming up to her standard of duty if no remedy were applied to this state of things. That remedy will be found in the willing response to an appeal to the laity to undertake that honorable service which becomes those pledged by their baptismal vows to be faithful soldiers and servants of the Lord Jesus Christ. Then and only then can the Church claim to be what her Article declare her to be, "a congregation of faithful men."

#### *Provincial and Diocesan Canons.*

Your committee will now make some suggestions as to the means by which an effort in the needful direction may be attempted.

In the first place it is well to notice that the Canons of this Synod appear to be somewhat contradictory in regard to Lay Help in connection with Divine service. If read literally, Canon VIII. absolutely forbids anything of the kind. But that this is not intended is clear from Canon IX. on the appointment of Lay Readers, which immediately follows. Canon VIII. reads: "No minister, or other person, shall be permitted to officiate *permanently* or *occasionally*, except he shall have been Episcopally and Canonically ordained." Canon IX., on Lay Readers, provides as follows: "Lay Readers may be appointed by the Bishop, on the recommendation of any clergyman who may require assistance in his parish or mission, or who, from illness, may be unable to perform all his duties; and in case of a vacant or new mission on the recommendation of the Archdeacon or Rural Dean." The Canon (VI.) of the Provincial Synod on Ministering in Parishes also contains the following clause: "This Canon shall not apply to the students of any Theological College, so as to prevent them from reading the Lessons in the College Chapel, or to laymen occasionally officiating when there is a necessity for it." The committee are of opinion that the Diocesan Canon IX. read in connection with the Provincial Canon last quoted, and construed in a fair and liberal spirit is sufficient for all present purposes. The Provincial Canon expressly forbids any person from performing the duties of Lay Reader except he shall hold the Bishop's license. But this will hardly be held to apply stringently to cases of emergency, or to a layman undergoing a probationary trial before being licensed.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

Your committee, in conclusion, respectfully recommend, for adoption by the Synod, the following resolutions :

1. That this Synod is deeply impressed with the conviction that the more general participation of the Laity in the spiritual work of the Church is demanded alike by her needs and the duty of her members to her Supreme Head.

2. That it is expedient that, in every parish, where practicable, youths and young men be associated together in guilds, brotherhoods or other societies, and that such definite work be assigned to them by the clergyman or vestry as they may from time to time be suitably required to perform.

3. That it is desirable that in every parish, where practicable, one or more persons be appointed and licensed by the Bishop as Lay Readers under Canon IX. to assist the Clergyman in the discharge of his duties, subject in all particulars to his direction ; that such appointments be, when convenient, made orally by the Bishop and accompanied by an appropriate service, and that the licenses of Lay Readers be ruri decanal in their scope in order to supply the wants of vacant parishes or such as have no Lay Readers.

4. That parochial congregational meetings of all members of the Church are a most useful means of quickening Church life, of promoting fellowship and good will, and of encouraging a spirit of Christian activity.

5. That annual conventions of Church workers from the several parishes constituting a rural deanery, or more than one deanery, held in connection with ruri-decanal meetings, for the discussion of such subjects as may bear upon the work of the Church and further its best interests are particularly recommended.

6. That an association be formed of the male Lay Workers of the Diocese for the purpose of mutual correspondence and co-operation, to meet annually at such place or places as may hereafter be determined upon ; that the Bishop be President *ex officio*, and that his Lordship be requested to call a meeting of the male Lay Workers of the Diocese in the fall of the present year, for the organization of such association and the adoption of a constitution.

7. That the Bishop be respectfully requested to issue a pastoral expressive of his views and those of the Synod in respect of the subject matter of this report ; inviting the active co-operation of the clergy and laity in furthering the object thereof ; and giving such advice in regard to the selection and appointment of Lay Readers as his Lordship may see fit.

8. That a committee to be named by the Bishop be appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the meeting of Lay Workers as above provided.

It will depend on the spirit in which the clergy and laity unitedly take the work in hand whether it shall be blessed of God or not. That it may receive His gracious sanction and favor must be the constant prayer of all who love the Church and who would faithfully labor to extend the Kingdom of Her Divine Lord.

## Annual Report.

The Executive Committee herewith submit their Annual Report :—

A review of the past year's work shows a slight increase in the total Free-will contributions of the Diocese, and gives evidence of continued zeal and earnestness in promoting the best interests of the Church.

## DIOCESAN MISSIONS.

The Committee are pleased to be able to report that notwithstanding the increased expenditure, the Clergy Maintenance and Missions Fund closes the year with a balance to its credit of \$974.52.

The Quarterly collections show an increase of \$226.37 over those of the preceding year.

The Home Mission field is now very nearly covered, and with the recent large ordination there are left but few vacancies to be supplied. The interests of the Diocese, however, demand that a vigilant oversight should be exercised of the various Parishes and Missions, and that subdivision and extension should be provided in all necessary cases.

The work can only be accomplished by the liberal help and support of all the members of the Church, and the Committee would earnestly appeal to both the clergy and laity to increase their efforts, if possible, to augment the resources of the Maintenance and Missions Fund.

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The interest in these branches of our Church work continues to be warmly felt throughout the Diocese, and the appeals for the various objects which have this year presented themselves have met with a hearty response.

The Woman's Auxiliary shows an increase of \$621.94 over the preceding year.

The Committee met at the earliest opportunity after its appointment, when it was decided to prepare and send the following circular to the Clergy and Sunday School Superintendents of the Diocese.

CHAPTER HOUSE, LONDON, December 10th, 1889.

*To the Clergy and S. S. Workers of the Diocese of Huron:*

The Diocesan S. S. Committee desire to bring specially to your notice the action of the Synod in relation to the Sunday School work of the Diocese, as printed on page 35, Synod Journal.

The Committee are endeavoring to apply the appropriation for a Depository in such a manner as will place it on a satisfactory and permanent basis. A stock of books has been ordered, and with them Catalogues of the publications of the S. P. C. K. & R. T. S. These will be sent on application to the Clergy, enabling them to order for their own use any of the books named, and also to aid the Committee in selecting suitable library and prize books. These orders will be sent to England at certain specified times, and as a rule will be ready for delivery within five or six weeks thereafter.

The Ruri-Decanal Conventions recommended can only be successful through the hearty co-operation of the Clergy, Superintendents and Teachers, involving considerable self-denial, labor and expense, but which will, it is to be hoped, in the near future yield rich results in greater zeal and efficiency in our Sunday Schools.

It ought to be a settled principle that each Sunday School in the Deanery should send one or more delegates to the convention, and on their return a report of its proceedings should be made to the congregations, so as to deepen their interest in this important work.

The Rural Dean or Secretary is respectfully requested to send a condensed report of such convention to the Sunday School Committee, to be embodied in its annual report to the Synod, and also to state what congregations (if any) have no Sunday School, and how assistance could be given in organizing new, and strengthening weak schools.

The Committee would emphasize the advantages of Sunday School Anniversaries, and more frequent public catechetical services, not only for the instruction imparted, but as tending to enlist the aid and sympathy of the congregations and foster the spirit of oneness, which should pervade all departments of Church work.

The duty and privilege of attendance in the House of God should be taught by precept and example, and the services of the Sunday School so conducted as to train the scholars to join reverently and intelligently in the public worship of the Church.

The difficulty of keeping up Teachers' Meetings in some localities is fully recognized; but their importance in promoting unity of action and teaching is so great, that every effort should be made to have one in connection with each Sunday School.

In order to cultivate in the scholars habits of self-denial and systematic giving, an offertory should be made at every Session, and some definite portion of the amount devoted to Missionary purposes, advancing always towards the true ideal, that the Sunday School, as part of the Church, should be supported by the congregation, and the entire Sunday School offertory given to Church objects, domestic or foreign.

In concluding this report, the Sunday School Committee would take the liberty of urging upon all Teachers and Officers the value and importance of Sunday School work.

The progress made during the past few years affords good ground for encouragement, and is eminently calculated to inspire us with zeal and courage for the future.

It is plainly evident that the future growth and influence of the Church will be largely dependent on the ability, zeal and devotion of the scholars now receiving religious instruction in our Sunday Schools. They will soon constitute the chief human instrumentality which the Almighty will employ to advance his Kingdom and save His people. And hence, we cannot but feel impressed with our responsibility, and the wisdom of making every possible effort to qualify them, mentally, morally and spiritually, for the work that lies before them. They should have the love of Christ, the principles of the Christian Faith and the teachings of our most Holy Church deeply and firmly implanted in their young minds.

The effort to achieve such happy results involves faith, labor and prayer; without these we have no shadow of right to expect God's favor and blessing. With them we can be assured that the Sunday School will successfully fulfil its mission of assisting the Home in training the children of our Church for God.

DEAR SIR,—The Sunday School Committee of the Diocese desire to notify you that a supply of Prayer Books and also of Books suitable for prizes and Sunday School Libraries has been received from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge and from the Religious Tract Society, and will be ready for sale on and after the 26th March next.

The Sunday School Committee will endeavor to keep up and increase the stock as the needs of the Diocese require, and in the meantime send to each Clergyman catalogues of the publications of the above societies from which you can order, through the Committee, books, either for your own personal use or for your Sunday School.

These special orders will be sent to England periodically, and delivery may be expected in from eight to ten weeks thereafter.

The Sunday School Committee would earnestly ask you to send to the Secretary, Mr. James Woods, Galt, at your earliest convenience any suggestions of a practical nature which would be likely in your opinion to assist them in advancing the spiritual and material interests of the Sunday Schools. They know that without the sympathy of the clergy and church workers of the diocese, their labors will expend itself in reports, which however well they may read, will be abortive unless their recommendations are tested by practical use.

The Committee have endeavored to complete the statistical report of last year without including any schools not then in existence.

There were at that time in the Diocese 267 congregations, of these 12 have been closed, leaving 255 to be accounted for. The Committee would remark that as far as they know none of the lapsed congregations supported a Sunday School. Probably had their energies been turned in that direction the result would have been different.

The Rural Deaneries of Brant and Waterloo report a Sunday School to every congregation. Norfolk, Huron, Oxford, Kent, Bruce and Essex are fully reported, but have each fewer schools than congregations. One report is wanting from Lambton, four from Perth, and five each from Middlesex and Grey, making only 18 congregations not heard from. against 103 last year.

In the above 153 schools report \$7,658.30 expended on themselves, while 49 schools have contributed to Missionary and kindred objects \$1,439.59. The Libraries are owned by 146 schools, Huron being the only county in which every Sunday School has a library. The largest school is that of Christ's Church, Chatham, which numbers 57 officers and teachers, and 550 scholars. There are on the other hand 8 schools in the Diocese, with from 10 to 20 scholars each. In this connection the Committee would urge the necessity of having a Church Sunday School, however small, in connection with every congregation, believing that whatever a small school may lack in inspiration which numbers give, it has capabilities of doing better and more enduring work than many of the larger and apparently more favored schools.

As far as the Committee can find, Oxford, Middlesex and Grey were the only counties which held Ruri-Decanal Conventions as recommended last year, and notwithstanding unfavorable weather and other hindrances, were very successful. Several topics in the line of S. S. work were discussed. An address was given by Rev. J. D. Caswell at the Oxford Convention, explaining his system of teaching the Catechism by symbol. This system was highly approved of and recommended to the notice of the S. S. Committee.

The Committee would earnestly press upon all Superintendents and S. S. Teachers the great importance of making the Church Catechism the basis of doctrinal instruction in all Church of England Sunday Schools, with careful attention to its natural divisions of the Covenant, the Creed, the Commandments, Prayer, and the Sacraments.

The Committee recommend that the Bishop be requested to call a Diocesan S.S. Convention in some central place during the fall, that the needs of our Sunday Schools may be considered and the best means devised, whereby they may be raised to the highest possible standard of efficiency.

The assessment of each parish, when made, shall continue unchanged for a period of five years, the first of such periods to date from June 30th, 1890; provided that if there be a change of incumbency, or that after one year from assessment it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the Maintenance and Mission Committee, that the financial ability of any parish has been, since such assessment, seriously impaired, it shall be in the power of said Committee to re-open the matter of assessment, and to re-assess the parish for the unexpired portion of such period.

7. That within one month after the assessment has been made, the Secretary-Treasurer shall notify the incumbent and Churchwardens of each parish assessed of such assessment. All appeals against assessments shall be signed by the Churchwardens and forwarded to the Secretary-Treasurer not later than one month from the date of such notice. All appeals shall be considered by the Maintenance and Mission Committee and if not allowed by them, shall be submitted, with their report, to the Executive Committee at the meeting next ensuing.

8. Add to end of clause.—It shall be the duty of the Clergyman to make a report to the Maintenance and Mission Committee not later than 10th July, in each year, according to the following form.

3. From the Committee on Temperance of the General Assembly of Presbyterian Church.

*To the Members of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron:*

DEAR BRETHREN,—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, at its meeting in Toronto in June, 1889, instructed its Committee on Temperance to take steps to secure the co-operation of other Churches in Canada in petitioning the Dominion Parliament to give the country, at the earliest possible date, a law prohibiting the importation, manufacture, and sale of intoxicating liquors.

In obedience to this instruction, correspondence was begun in October, 1889, and considerable progress was being made, when it was found, that on account of necessary delays and difficulties in the way of completing the organization far enough to insure success, there would not be sufficient time to carry out the work for the Parliament of 1890.

The co-operation of the Committee on Temperance of the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada having been secured, it was agreed that the two Committees issue this joint letter to other Churches in the Dominion.

We therefore beg leave to present to your Reverend Court the following proposals, which we earnestly press upon your careful and favorable consideration.

1. That your Reverend Court adopt a resolution favoring the legal Prohibition of the liquor traffic, in form somewhat like the following:

*Whereas*, The traffic in intoxicating liquors is a recognized evil, producing a large proportion of the poverty, suffering, disorder and crime in our Dominion, and unnecessarily adding much to the taxes of our people; and *Whereas*, We believe that a law enacted by the Dominion Parliament prohibiting the importation, manufacture and sale of all alcoholic liquors, except for use in mechanical, medicinal, and sacramental purposes, and containing ample provisions for its strict enforcement by the proper authorities, will greatly diminish these and other evils, and largely increase the prosperity, and promote the health, peace and morals of our country.

*It is therefore resolved*, That in the opinion of this Synod it is now the duty of the Dominion Parliament to enact such a prohibitory law.

2. That a form of petition to the Dominion Parliament, asking for the enactment of such a prohibitory law be agreed upon by the Committees on Temperance of the different churches, and that each Committee attend to the work, and bear the expense of circulating such petitions among its own people.

3. That such petition be signed by members and adherents of the Churches, who are not less than sixteen years of age.

4. That the arranging and carrying out of all necessary details be entrusted to a joint committee to be composed of one member of the Committee of each Church co-operating in this movement.

In view of the fact that in 1889 the Dominion Parliament declared that it will give the country a prohibitory law when the people are ready for it, we believe the Christian people of the land should not let this opportunity pass without letting their voices be heard. We, therefore, earnestly hope that you will do all in your power to aid in presenting to Parliament at its session of 1891, such a petition so largely signed that it cannot fail to command the favorable attention of our rulers.
