Stocks are accumulating, and unless ahipments are greatly reduced there will be little chance of prices improving. Latterly there have been fewer cargoes pressing on the market, and the late auction sales show a slight, improvement in prices. The future course of the market will al-together depend upon the quantity coming forward for the remainder of the season. 
