CANADA'S RAILWAYS.

The annual report of the minister of railways for the year ended June 30th, 1896, which has been presented to parliament, shows that the number of miles of completed railway was 16,387, an increase during the year of 296 miles, besides 2,106 miles of siding.

The intercolonial railway system of 1,142 miles in operation, earned \$2,957,840, and the working expenses aggregated \$9,012,827, the loss on the year's operations being \$55,187.

The programme of the Pan-Anglican conference has been published, containing a list of important topics and the selected speakers. Archbishop Machray, the Primate of all Canada, is the only Canadian prelate among the selected speakers.

MILES OUT OF THE WAY.

Many curious mistakes occur in the post office, but one which came to the notice of a mail clerk on the train between Boston and Portland last week was out of the ordinary.

The contract for building the new chimney for the Windsor, N. S., Electric Light Station has been given to George McArthur, who was the lowest tenderer. The chimney is for the Windsor Electric Light and Power Co., and is to be the highest in Nova Scotia.

CONFERENCE HELD

Between Foreign Admirals of the Fleet and Consuls.

Turkish Troops Disappointed Because Greeks Did Not Attack Them.

Action of Powers Again Up in British Commons—Circular to the Ambassadors.

Athens, April 7.—The identical notes of warning delivered yesterday by the representatives of the powers to M. Skouzes, the Greek minister of foreign affairs, have had very little appreciable effect.

Canea, Crete, April 7.—The insurgents of the vicinity of Kisanio, at the western end of the island, have written to the foreign admirals notifying the latter that they are projecting an attack upon the fort at Kisanio.

There were conflicts in various parts of the island yesterday. In every instance the insurgents were the aggressors. They have captured several cannon at Kisanio.

Rear Admiral R. H. Harris of the British fleet, was shot at by a Moslem irregular while crossing a field near Suda. The bullet ploughed the grass at his feet. This is his second escape.

Canea, April 8.—The admirals of the foreign fleets and the consuls held a meeting this morning at Suda. The question discussed was whether the consuls should renew parleying with the insurgent leaders. It was decided not to do so.

A detachment of six hundred additional Russian troops and an additional detachment of seven hundred British troops have arrived here.

London, April 8.—Answering a question in the house of commons today relative to the state of the evacuation of the troops at Salonika...

Rome, April 8.—Considerable uproar attended an interpellation of the government by Signor Imbriani, the socialist leader in the chamber of deputies today, who referred to the "offensive policy" of leading Italy to commit inconceivable acts of violence against Greece and to trample upon the laws of nations.

Continuing, Signor Imbriani asserted that Italy was playing the role of a president of the Dreditch and he eulogized the conduct of Greece. In so doing, the socialist deputy vigorously attacked the acts of Italy and the concert of the powers, for which he was frequently called to order by the president of the chamber, and was loudly cheered.

Constantinople, April 8.—An extraordinary council of ministers of the empire was held at the palace today. It is understood that as a result of it the Turkish government will reinforce the troops at Salonika with thirty-two battalions of Redifs from Anatolia, making a total of 33,000.

Canea, Crete, April 8.—The Turkish gendarmes have entered the house of the Greek consul at Halope and seized several rifles and ammunition which had been left there by the villagers.

Athens, April 8.—The Italian sailors were able to save the cathedral at Candia from the fire which broke out there yesterday and which destroyed the residence of the bishop. It is estimated that the damage done by the conflagration will reach \$30,000.

THE BRITISH COMMONS.

No Justification for Crown Forces Opposing Greece and Cretons.

Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt's Speech and A. J. Balfour's Reply.

London, April 6.—In the house of commons today the government leader, A. J. Balfour, first lord of the treasury, in replying to the question put yesterday by Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the opposition leader, as to whether the government would give a day to discuss his (Sir William's) motion for an address to her majesty, praying that the forces of the crown be not employed against Greece or Crete, said that as there was no word in the motion expressly condemning anything the government had done or announced its intention of doing, he was forced to come to the conclusion that Sir William Harcourt's subject was not to raise a direct issue, and that it would be in the interest of public business to give the day suggested. (Loud cheers from the conservatives.)

Sir William Harcourt then said that Mr. Balfour appeared to have entirely misunderstood the intention of the motion. While he, the speaker, could not describe the motion as a vote of censure, he explained that there has been such a thing as a vote of want of confidence in the government anticipated as likely to be what it would do. The motion, he continued, asks the crown not to allow its forces to be employed against the Cretons, and it carried it would be a restraint upon the government's action, if it proposes to so employ the forces of the crown. Further, it was the duty of the opposition to record its view of the present situation, so far as the information given by the government is concerned. He said that there is no justification for the employment of the crown forces against Greece and the Cretons, and we challenge the government's policy on that point. (Loud opposition cheers.)

Continuing, the leader said it is necessary to do this immediately, because after the Easter recess we may find the country embarked in war with Greece without any declaration having been given to parliament of the objects of the hostility. From this point of view this is a motion of want of confidence. (Loud cheers.)

Mr. Balfour pointed out that the terms of the motion were studiously ambiguous. Continuing, he said: "We have stated explicitly to the house and by our action have shown that we are prepared to do this, and the crown to resist certain action of the insurgents of Crete, and we have announced the objects for which we are prepared to blockade Greece, as the honorable member (Sir William Harcourt) did upon a previous occasion. (Cheers.) The honorable member needs only to modify his resolution so as to condemn one or the other of these acts, the first of which we are actually doing at the present moment, or the second, which we have announced our intention of doing in certain contingencies, and a direct issue will be raised by the parties in the house. Unless the honorable member is prepared to show modify his motion there is no other course open than the one I have adopted." (Cheers.)

London, April 13.—In the house of commons today Sir Richard Webster, the attorney general, moved the second reading of the law of evidence bill, enabling juries to give evidence in criminal cases to testify in their own behalf. The bill passed its second reading.

INSURGENTS DEFEATED. Two More Alleged Victories for the Spanish Troops. Havana, April 8.—The Gerona battalion while reconnoitering in the vicinity of Encarnudada, province of Pinar del Rio, captured the insurgent force commanded by Duasol. The enemy left eleven men killed on the field, and the troops captured eight prisoners and a quantity of arms and ammunition.

While the Aragon battalion was reconnoitering at the north of the railroad between San Cristobal and San Juan river they encountered a body of insurgents who had descended the hills for vegetables. According to the official account the Spaniards "pursued them into the thicket, killing seven and making seven prisoners." The latter will be tried on the charge of raiding the plantation.

Washington, April 8.—Advices received by the Spanish minister here state that General Ruiz Rivera, who is lying wounded near Havana, is not in a serious condition, and that his wounds are not likely to prove fatal. Inquiry as to the status of the prisoner resulted today in a statement by the minister to the effect that at no time has the Spanish government or General Weyler had an idea of shooting Rivera.

DIVORCE IN LONDON. London, April 8.—Col. Frederick Arthur Wellesley, formerly of the Coldstream guards, obtained a decree of divorce today in the district division of the high court of justice with costs against his wife Kate Vaughan, the well known actress, on the ground of adultery with an actor named Lorimer.
