



TOMATO CATSUP AND ITS ADULTERATIONS

Dept. of Agriculture.

Of 49 Samples Only Eight Were Pure-Preservatives and Dyes Used in Others.

Bulletin No. 129 recently issued from the laboratory of the Inland Revenue Department contains the result of series of tests of tomato catsup select-ed from retail establishments in differ-ent parts of Canada. Chief Analyst McFarlane says in his report.

chief Analyst McFarlane says in his report:

I have inclined to the opinion that those samples, in the manufacture of which a dye has been used, are 'adulterated according to the Act.' This judgment would not be based upon the injurious nature of the dye, but because its use is prohibited by the Adulteration Act which provides that 'food shall be deemed to be adulterated within the meaning of this Act, if it is so coloured or coated or polished or powdered that damage is concealed, or if it is made to appear better or of greater value than it really is.' According to information obtained from manufacturers, the use of a dye is unnecessary when the catsup is made from fresh tomatoes. It is when the fruit is 'out of season' and the pulp has to be kept in stock for a considerable time that the colour suffers and the use of a dye becomes necessary. In such cases it might be reasonably inferred that they have been coloured to conceal damage, or that the dye has been used to make the article appear of greater value than it really is, and consequently that the word 'adulterated' should be applied. Nevertheless, not being willing to take the responsibility of making such inferences, I have inserted the remark, 'adulteration doubtful.' Twenty-three out of the forty-nine samples were found to be dyed and consequently 'adulterated.'

dulterated.' ne of the samples referred to are Some of the samples referred to are not only dyed but contain preservatives. In nineteen other samples which contained no foreign colouring matter, small quantities of preservatives were also found. Granting that the latter as used are not injurious to health, it can of course be maintained that they are required for the production of the catsup 'in a state fit for consumption.' But even in that case the law requires that they should be 'distinctly labelled as a mixture.' Since this has not been done, except in one case, I have stated the opinion in the tabulated statement that eighteen of the samples referred to are 'adulterated,' giving the reason. The remaining seven samples in which foreign colouring matter and preservatives were not found, together with the one above mentioned, I have characterized as unadulterated. The classification therefore stands as follows:

Americans on the adjustment to party showed declines of two to seven points, but there was little business transacted on local account. By noon Americans had recovered to one point above par with a little bear covering and possibly some American buying. British securities were depressed, while foreigners were dull on Continental advances. The failure of two stockbrokers, not connected with any special market, was announced on the Stock Exchange, but they were not operators of much importance. The bankers here say they know of no serious trouble impending.

NEW YORK, March 14.—The local stock market opened unsettled and irregular, despite the buoyancy of the London market where Reading showed an advantage of over three points. First prices varied a point or two either way from yesterday's close.

TAKING DRASTIC ACTION AGAINST UNIVERSITIES

Russian Government Determined to Put an End to the Development of Revolution-

ary Ideas in These Institutions.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 14. —The government has resolved to take drastic steps against the universities and other institutions of high learning in order to put an end to the revolutionary activity that prevails within the walls of these establishments. Prince Andrew Gagarin, director of the polytechnic institute in St. Petersburg, in which institution a number of bombs and arms were found on March 3 by the police, has been dishonorably discharged. ATTENTION CALLED TO ALLEGED CHARGE

OF MR. GIRARD M.P.P.

Mr. Broceur Denied There Was Any Truth in the Statement at all— Hudson Bay Papers.

OTTAWA, March 13.—Both in the Senate and the Commons today the attention of the government was called to the fact that Mr. Girard, member of the Quebec house from Rouville, stated that he had been told by Hon. Mr. Bradeur that G. C. Dessaules would be put into the senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Sir Wm. Hingston, that he (Mr. Brodeur) had the resignation of Mr. Dessaules in his pocket to take effect immediately before the next general election, that he would then resign and Mr. Brodeur would take the senate seat and the senate leadership.

In the commons Mr. Brodeur denied that there was any truth in the statements and doubted if Mr. Girard had made them, as the press dispatches indicated.

made them, as the press dispatches indicated.

Senator Landry called the attention of the senate to the dispatch. It seemed from the dispatch Hon. Mr. Scott was soon to yield the leadership of the upper house and he would inquire the foundation for the report and what notice the covernment proposed to take of it.

Hon. Mr. Scott said that the statement showed its absurdity on its face. Mr. Dessaules had been appointed in the ordinary way by recommendation of his excellency.

Senator Landry—Will the government take any notice of the report?

Hon. Mr. Scott—It certainly will not. Sir MacKenzie Bowell said: When I read the article I could not help congratulating myself on the fact that history repeats itself. It is quite evident that my honorable friend has some traitors in his camp, and it is an old saying that misery loves company. Under such circumstances I can, from the bottom of my heart, sympathize with my honorable friend. The only difference between the event to which difference between the event to which I have referred and the present occa-sion is that the honorable gentleman was forearmed and I was not. He can was forearmed and I was not. He exist in the senate until the next general election, when his place will be usurped by one of his colleagues. Sir MacKenzie said that the interview alleged

election, when his place will be usurped by one of his colleagues. Sir MacKenzie said that the interview alleged a bargain over a senate seat, and if what was stated were true the sooner the country knew it the better.

Sir Richard Cartwright said that if Sir MacKenzie Bowell or Senator Landry were willing to rise in his place and say that he believed these charges to be true and that he would undertake to prove them, the house would be bound to make an investigation. Until such declaration is made he would recommend that no attention be paid to the matter by the house.

Senator Lougheed continued the debate on Senator Ferguson's motion for Hudson Bay papers. He said Sir Wilfrid Laurier had practically committed the government to the development of the Hudson Bay route. Manitoba, Ontario and Saskatchewan were after the port of Churchill. Senator Lougheed thought none of the three should get it. Churchill should be a national port, owned and administered by the Dominion. The government should give free running rights to any railroad which desired to haul freight over it. He was confident that four transcontinental railway systems would make use of it. Docks and wharves and all port equipment should be built at Churchill by the Dominion and administered by a commission which would not only represent the federal governments. If the federal government were not willing to bear the whole cost of equipping Churchill he knew that public sentiment was such in the west that the provincial governments would bear a share of the cost. There had been a land grant to aid building a railroad to Hudson Bay. The grant had lapsed. The government should not renew to a railroad company, but would do better to turn these lands which he estimated at five million acres, over to commission, which could realize not less than the sendellers an acre for them, thus pro-The government should not leave to turn these lands which he estimated at five million acres, over to commission, which could realize not less than five dollars an acre for them, thus providing a fund of \$25,000,000. Senator Lougheed said eight million dollars would build the road to Churchill, equipments with rolling stock not being necessary. Another eight millions or a third of the fund should suffice to equip Churchill. This would leave about eight millions in the hards of the commissioners, which could be well used to bonus compared by this route. The eight million dollars should produce three hundred thousand dollars a year. This would enable a bonus of a cent or a cent and a half a bushel to be paid for all grain carried out of Churchill. He corgratulated the government upon having decided to develop the routs.

The bill to establish the Intercolonial and Pria c Edward Island Railway employes' provident fund was given a third reading.

In the commons an amendment to the post office act was introduced transferring some powers from the superintendents of mail service to post office inspectors and allowing postatofficials on business to travel free on lines subsidized by the government.

The assurance was timely, as a portion of the German press had begun to revive old stories of the king's hostility to Germany, and to suggest that the visit to Paris had some deep anti-German motive. An official hint had the effect of putting an end to these journalistic hostilities.


