

GOLDEN RULE LODGE CELEBRATES

Other Oddfellows Joined With Them

Eloquent Sermon by Rev. Gordon Dickie on the Golden Rule

Golden Rule Lodge, No. 46, Independent Order of Oddfellows, celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary yesterday afternoon by attending divine service at the Carleton Presbyterian church.

The Carleton Cornet band played the Oddfellows and from the church. Members from all the city Oddfellows lodges were in attendance, and the parade had an excellent appearance.

The high wind that prevailed yesterday afternoon made the weather rather disagreeable, but still large numbers of spectators watched the procession and the church was filled by a large congregation.

Rev. Gordon Dickie took as the subject of his sermon, The Golden Rule as found in the gospel according to St. Matthew. "Whatever ye would men should do unto you, do ye also unto them."

The golden rule, said Mr. Dickie, did not originate in the teachings of Christ. It contained a very old principle, one that had existed early in the history of the human race.

The founder of the Christian faith did more than urge others to follow his teachings. He put them into practice. His whole life was a series of instances of practice of the golden rule.

The practice of the golden rule was the great basic principle of Oddfellowship. To properly live according to this principle it was necessary to get out of oneself, to consider oneself from an objective and not a subjective point of view.

"Put yourself in your neighbor's place, and in that way test each one of your acts." Of late years, said the preacher, the Gospel and business had been separated. In consequence the golden rule was regarded as good religion, but poor business.

Oddfellows were bound to live up to the golden rule and live up to it in every walk of life. "Your life may not have been marked by any great event, but if you have been conscientious you have been successful. The secret of success is the ability to stick to a thing."

"Friendship and love" were the two great principles that Confucius thought were contained in the golden rule. Had he added truth his maxim would have been complete.

ENGAGEMENTS MUST AFTER EASTER BE WRITTEN

The Document Must be Signed by Both Parties and by the Pastor, Bishop or Two Witnesses—Recent Papal Decree on Marriage Read at Catholic Churches of Diocese Yesterday.

The following circular addressed to the priests of the diocese of St. John was yesterday read in the cathedral and all the Catholic churches of the city and diocese.

Reverend Dear Father: As you are already aware, the recent papal decree "Ne temere," enacts new legislation in regard to marriage, which will go into effect on Easter Sunday of this year.

The decree has been already sent you which should be read and fully explained to the people in order to obviate the serious difficulties and disadvantages that would follow from an invalid marriage.

Special attention is called to the following points of the new legislation: 1. The law binds those who have been baptized in the Catholic church, whether in infancy or later by conversion, even though they should afterwards have fallen away from the church.

The law binds all those persons even when they make engagements or contract marriages with non-Catholics. It must be particularly noted that no matrimonial engagement will henceforth be valid or binding except under the following conditions:

(a) The engagement must be in writing and signed by both parties. (b) It must also be signed by the pastor, or bishop of the place where the contract is made, or else by two witnesses.

(c) If either or both of the contracting parties cannot write, this fact should be stated in the contract, and a third person must also sign the document besides the pastor, bishop, or two witnesses.

Concerning marriages, it is necessary to distinguish between those that are required for the validity of the marriage contract, and those that are required for the lawfulness of the marriage.

1. In order that the marriage contract may be valid and binding, the following conditions must be observed: (a) The marriage must be contracted in the presence of the parish-priest or of a priest who has been appointed for that purpose.

(b) There must be no compulsion or force exercised on the clergyman to induce him to assist the ceremony, and he must also receive the matrimonial consent of both parties.

(c) Besides the clergyman there must be at least two witnesses to the marriage ceremony. Very serious consequences—following from the non-observance of any of the conditions mentioned in this article—will result from the failure to observe them.

2. It is on the conscience of the parties that every provision that marriage within the limits of his parish be licit as well as valid, and in order to discover the first sign of contravention and to apply the proper remedy.

(a) The pastor must be satisfied in his own parish, or in the parish of the bride, that the parties are free from every canonical impediment to marriage, and, if they are strangers, they must have testimonial letters.

"PACKY" McFARLAND DEFEATS JIMMY BRITT

Knockout Blows Came in Sixth Round of One-Sided Fight

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., April 11.—"Packy" McFarland, the Chicago lightweight, today whipped "Jimmy" Britt in the sixth round of a 20-round fight at Colma.

McFarland outclassed Britt from start to finish. Britt did not seem to gauge his blows and displayed much weakness in the clinches and close fighting.

In the first and second rounds McFarland outboxed, outpunched and outgeneralized his opponent. During the third, fourth and fifth rounds McFarland administered a succession of powerful right hand jolts on Britt's jaw.

In the sixth round McFarland struck Britt on the point of the chin and the latter fell like a log. At the count of nine he struggled to his feet, but McFarland, who was the timely clang of the ring and acknowledged defeat.

After the fight Britt said: "I was clearly beaten. This is the last time I ever will box in a prize ring."

REMARKABLE DECREASE IN AMERICAN EXPORTS

General Depression Accountable for a Marked Falling Off During the Last Quarter

The quarterly report from the United States Consul's office shows that during the quarter just ended there has been a very great decrease in exports to the United States. The exports for the three months ending March 31st amounted to only \$280,721 as compared with \$817,906.46 in the corresponding quarter of 1933.

There was a decrease of some \$60,000 in products of American logs; \$70,000 in wood pulp, owing to the closing of the Mitsui mills; last year's million to the value of \$37,000 was shipped and none this year; laths show a falling off of \$800,000; \$40,000; hides, \$23,000 and other items in proportion. General depression is the cause of the falling off.

IN THE COURTS

This morning in the Equity Court before Chief Justice Barker the case of *Partridge vs. Randolph*, which has been before the courts for four years, was further continued. The lawyers in the case are Mr. J. H. Barry, and Mr. Tweedie, of Fredericton, and Dr. A. O. Earle and A. P. Barnhill. The case will be argued to the Supreme Court of Canada this term.

In the case of *Douglas vs. The City*, which arose out of a written contract for the price the city would pay for the plaintiff's land expropriated in connection with the laying of the pipe line, a settlement will be announced next Monday. Mr. Douglas agreed to accept \$300 from the city, but he claimed that he was not in a proper state of mind when he signed the agreement. The city will now pay him \$600. Mr. H. D. Forbes appears for the plaintiff.

COUNTY COURT

In the County Court this morning before Judge Forbes the prisoner McCallaghan, who was sent up for trial by Mr. Justice Masson for stealing a coat and a pair of boots, was allowed to go on suspended sentence of two years in Dorchester. The prisoner, who has a wooden leg, pleaded guilty and stated that he had been drinking prior to the time he committed the theft. He said that he belonged to St. George and would leave the city immediately. The judge gave him twenty-four hours in which to carry out his intention.
