

THE GREAT BOYCOTT OF JAPANESE GOODS NOW SPREADING THROUGH CHINA

Japan Will Lose Millions by This Movement Which Has Been Started in Revenge for the Tatsu Maru Affair

CANTON, Saturday. — From the headquarters of the Self-Government and National Disgrace Societies, here in the capital of China's great southern province, a secret fiat has gone forth that the anti-Japanese boycott, which is rapidly spreading throughout the empire, shall not be reconsidered...

From a Chow comes the report that a Japanese coal ship is unable to unload on account of the refusal of the natives to handle the cargo...

The Bankers and Merchants' Guild here is holding a meeting to discuss the movement characterized as a "revolted boycott."

Our plans are carefully laid to avoid friction with the government. We believe the officials will be unable to find an excuse for interference, even if they do desire, which they do not, being at best sympathetic.

Although legally res judicata, the Tatsu Maru case looms very large and is almost the sole topic of discussion where the Chinese forget their...

Government not likely to interfere. However, nothing short of very serious lawlessness would influence the Pekin government to resort to such extreme action, and for two reasons.

First—Chinese officialdom has been forced from year to year to give greater consideration to public opinion. Second—While compelled officially to deprecate any movement of this nature, there is abundant evidence that the officials sympathize with the spirit inspiring this boycott.

The machinery for making the boycott effective is being set up throughout China self-government societies exist under the central government's encouragement...

handed in clandestinely unloading in Chinese waters arms confessedly designed for lawless Chinese...

"In the existing treaty of commerce and navigation, Japan secures the full right to seize any of her ships engaged in the clandestine trade, Tatsu Maru was detained upon the charge of carrying arms for the purpose of being transported to the mainland."

CHINESE ADMIRAL'S VIEWS. "Any such claim is absolutely worthless," said the Admiral, "The Tatsu Maru's position, as shown by the reckoning on her own chart, was a mile and a half outside of the limits of Macao as recognized by the Chinese government and maritime customs."

"The popular feeling is intense. It is impossible for you to overstate it. While the government has sought to suppress the boycott meetings, sending troops from the north, the officials cannot prevent our quiet, systematic campaign to raise the boycott. The facts relative to the Tatsu Maru are as follows: The people do not know the details of the case."

JAPANESE ARE DEEPLY CONCERNED. The Japanese consular officials and merchants are deeply concerned over the boycott, but put on a bold face, declaring that their most important interest in this province has not been affected.

LEADING FACTS IN THE HISTORY OF THE TATSU MARU BOYCOTT. The organized boycott against Japanese goods had its origin in the indignation caused among the Chinese people, by what they termed China's pusillanimity in acquiescing to the demands of Japan, relative to the seizure of the Japanese steamship Tatsu Maru, off Macao, on the charge that she was engaged in the traffic of running contraband of war for the use of Chinese revolutionists.

AMERICAN LOST HIS LIFE. "In the capture of the Tatsu Maru were present as witnesses, one of them, Captain Knight, an American, losing his life. I am sorry to say, as the report runs, that he was killed by a bullet from a Chinese revolutionary."

CLOTH TAMMS

### REMARKABLE DECREASE IN AMERICAN EXPORTS

#### General Depression Accountable for a Marked Falling Off During the Last Quarter

The quarterly report from the United States Consul's office shows that during the quarter just ended there has been a very great decrease in exports to the United States. The exports for the three months ending March 31st amounted to only \$280,721 as compared with \$817,906.46 in the corresponding quarter of 1933.

There was a decrease of some \$60,000 in products of American logs; \$70,000 in wood pulp, owing to the closing of the Mitsui mills; last year's million to the value of \$37,000 was shipped and none this year; laths show a falling off of \$800,000; \$40,000; hides, \$23,000 and other items in proportion. General depression is the cause of the falling off.

### IN THE COURTS

This morning in the Equity Court before Chief Justice Barker the case of *Partridge vs. Randolph*, which has been before the courts for four years, was further continued. In the case of *Douglas vs. The City*, which arose out of a written contract for the purchase of the city would pay for the plaintiff's land expropriated in connection with the laying of the pipe line, a settlement will be announced next Monday. Mr. Douglas agreed to accept \$300 from the city, but he claimed that he was not in a proper state of mind when he signed the agreement. The city will now pay him \$600. Mr. H. D. Forbes appears for the plaintiff.

### COUNTY COURT

In the County Court this morning before Judge Forbes the prisoner McCallaghan, who was sent up for trial by Mr. Justice Masson for stealing a coat and a pair of boots, was allowed to go on suspended sentence of two years in Dorchester. The prisoner, who has a wooden leg, pleaded guilty and stated that he had been drinking prior to the time he committed the theft. He said that he belonged to St. George and would leave the city immediately. The judge gave him twenty-four hours in which to carry out his intention.
