The corporation of the capital city had offered to acquire and hand over to the University an estate of 640 acres near the city, with other concessions making the contribution \$150,000. Until the last few weeks it appeared that the claims of Regina would be found the stronger. It is now charged that the selection was managed by the Government and gives effect to an understanding reached in the late election campaign.

The Governers, one of whom is Dr. W. C. 
