

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 3—Ministers of Indianapolis took a hand in the deamster's strike, when they submitted a proposition at the union meeting late today. The ministers proposed to obtain a statement of facts from the union, and also one from the employers. These statements the ministers said they would have published so that the citizens would know the acuse of the trouble. In this way they hoped to bring the team owners and teamsters together. The teamsters, at their meeting, did little more than appoint a committee to confer with the ministers.

Dominion's Buildings at Panama Fair will Cover 65,000 Acres - Biggest Showing Attempted.

Special to The Standard.

Ottawa, Dec. 3.—The Canadian exhibit at the Panama Pacific Exposition is now on its way from Ghent, Belgium, part of it going around the Horn and the rest across the Isthmus by the Tehanturpee Railway to its destination at San Francisco. Exhibit Commissioner Hutchinson, who is here conferring with the Minister of Agriculture, will leave shortly for San Francisco to superintend the construction of the Canadian building. It will cover an area of 65,000 square feet and will house the most extensive exhibit ever made by Canada at a World's Fair.

The primary object, of course, is to stimplate immigration to Canada by rdvertising particularly its wheat fields and other resources. The exhibit will comprise grain, lumber, minerals, fish, fruit and agricultural produce. It will be wholly under Dominion supervision, the provinces not making separate displays as had been done in some instances previously. Particular attention will be paid to transportation and the railways will be assigned much space in the Canadian building.
