## Procedure of Registration

On June 22nd every person residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien, of sixteen years or over, must attend one of the registration booths located in his or her district, and there observe the procedure explained below.

### Where to Register

Every person required to register has the privilege of registering at any of the public places provided for that purpose. The location of all such places will be specified in proclamations posted conspicuously.

In Cities and Towns, many of these places will be open for registration purposes prior to Registration day. Where such arrangements are made, the local papers will supply full

Large industrial and business concerns are being asked to provide facilities for registering their employees. Where they do so business will not be interfered with, and employees will suffer no loss of time.

### How to Register

The procedure of registration is simple. The questions upon the registration card can be answered very easily, but they must be answered truthfully and fully.

The card shown in the illustration is a fac-simile of the registration card for females. An advertisement showing the card for males appears in another paper. Study the questions carefully so that you will

be able to answer them promptly when registering. If you have any special qualification, or feel that your services would be more beneficial to the country in some other line of work, say so.

While all are compelled to register on Registration Day, it is not contemplated by the Government to force the sick, feeble and aged to turn out. If such persons will notify the Registrar prior to June 22nd of their inability to attend at a place of registration, an effort will be made to register them at home, provided the request is reasonable and justified.



Whenever there was a discussion upon the correct pronunciation of a Latin word, it invariably ended "we'll refer it to Dr. Quigley." His vast knowledge of church history and the clear and unequivocal manner in which he pronounced his views made him a most welcome visitor among the clergymen, not only among those of the Catholic faith, but with all other denominations. He has been known to sit up for hours at night, and one instance is stated, where he spent practically the entire night in his library, making himself clear on one Greek conjunction, which arose during the perusal of a Biblical passage. Dr. Quigley never married, but occupied a suite of rooms in the Ritchie building on Princess street. His library is considered one of the most valuable in Canada. Many of the books contained therein have ceased to be published, and date back as far as a hundred years. He was an omnivorous reader and a deep student, and delighted in ascertaining the true meaning and the underlying facts of all he read. His, was a student's life from the early years of his boyhood up until his death, and many have expressed grief that he omitted to write these on the many facts he stored in memory.

His early education took place at the college at Chatham, and it was here that he displayed the power of absorbing and retaining knowledge. He studied law at Harvard and dur-

the college at Calcium, and it was here that he displayed the power of absorbing and retaining knowledge. He studied law at Harvard and during his vacation was articled with Justice Duff in St. John.

Dr. Quigley was brought more prominently before the public in the theological discussions, which took place between him and Rev. John Davenport in the columns of the Globe some years ago. His work entitled "Ipsi, Ipsa, Ipsum," won for him distinction from the late Pope Leo, and he visited Rome to receive the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. The church work of the deceased was entitled "Mary the Mother of Christi in Prophecy and its Fulfillment."



### IS INTERESTED IN SHIPBUILDING

Dr. T. H. Macdonald of Mete ghan in the City — Says Twenty-Four Sailing Ves-sels Under Construction in Nova Scotia.

Dr. T. H. Macdonald, of Meteghan, who is interested in shipbuilding at that place, arrived in the city yesterday and registered at the Victoria. When seen last night by a Standard representative, Dr. Macdonald said the revival of wooden shipbuilding had meant asgreat deal to the people along the St. Mary's Bay, and at the present time no less than twenty-four sailing ships ranging in size from 300 to 1,100 tons were under construction within a radius of twenty miles. As an instance of just what this meant Dr. Macdonald pointed out that these twenty-four vessels called for an expenditure of nearly one million dollars for labor and materials alone, and this money would practically all go into the pockets of those residing in that section of the country.

Dr. Macdonald, who has ascolated with him his brother, W. S. Macdanald, is now building his fourth vessel in his yard at Meteghan, and he expects to launch her some time this fall. She is 221 feet over all; 40 foot beam, and 19 foot hold, and will register about 1,100 tons.

The last vessel launched from their yard was the Rebecca L. Macdonald which was loaded at this port and sailed just a few days ago.


