

New Fire Insurance Tariff.
The tariff of minimum rates of premium, for fire insurance in New Brunswick, has just been issued. It is printed in neat pamphlet form by Messrs. Chubb & Co., and makes a book of over one hundred pages. The rates were arranged and adopted by the agents of the different fire insurance companies in pursuance of instructions received from their respective head offices. A general classification of ordinary risks has been made, and the rates on a portion of them have been slightly advanced. "Manufacturing risks" and "dangerous localities" have been specially tarified at a considerable increase, but no very radical change has been made in the general business. This course was rendered necessary in consequence of the heavy loss sustained by insurance companies generally in the great fires which have visited the United States and Canada of late years. The Liverpool and London and Globe shareholders held a meeting at Liverpool on the 26th ult., and expressed considerable dissatisfaction at not receiving any dividend for the past two years, as the profits were absorbed in the Chicago and Boston fires.

Governor-General's Speech.

OTTAWA, March 6.
At three o'clock this afternoon the Governor-General opened Parliament. The crowd in attendance was large, and the ceremonies were imposing. The following is the Speech:

Hon. Gentlemen of Senate,
Gentlemen of the House of Commons.

In addressing for the first time the Parliament of Canada, I desire to express the satisfaction I feel in resorting to your advice and assistance, as well as my deep sense of my own good fortune in being permitted to associate myself with you in your labors and aspirations for the welfare of the Dominion.

I rejoice to think that my assumption of office should have taken place at a period when the prospects of the country appear so full of promise, when peace and unity prevail amongst neighboring nations, and when so many indications are afforded of success with which Canada herself is consolidating her political unity and developing her material resources.

In accordance with the decision of Parliament and to carry into effect the legislation of last session I have caused a charter to be issued to a body of Canadian Capitalists for the construction of a Pacific Railway. The company now formed has given assurances that this great work will be vigorously prosecuted and a favorable start of the money market in England affords every hope that satisfactory arrangements may be made for the required capital.

Parliament was formally opened yesterday afternoon, Speaker Cockburn being re-elected without opposition. The ceremonial was preserved for today, and the gathering will be large and brilliant.

Tobin of Halifax will move the reply to the Address, and Palmer, of St. John, will second it. The Opposition have been in caucus. The Quebec members desired a change of leader, and Blake was chosen.

It was decided to nominate Dorion as Speaker, but after a brisk canvass, he was withdrawn. The Opposition will test the party strength on the passage of the Address, respecting the Pacific Railway. The Governor's Speech makes no reference to better Terms for New Brunswick. Our members are working matters quietly, and will succeed.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
FREDERICTON, March 6.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Coram introduced a bill increasing the water and sewerage assessment of Carleton, Saint John; Mr. Beckwith, a bill to legalize the Fredericton assessments for 1873, and a bill relating to the survey and exportation of lumber.

The Attorney General, in reply to questions, stated that no change in the school act had been determined on, but that some changes in the details, not the principle of the act, were in contemplation; and that the question of filling the vacancies in the Legislative Council was under consideration.

The Attorney General's bill vesting the appointment of Notaries Public in the Government, and Mr. Crawford's bill enabling the Justices of King's to sell certain lands in Kingston, were agreed to in Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Ryan presented the petition of Wallace and others praying for the repeal of the school law. Mr. Crawford introduced a bill relating to the estates of deceased persons.

Mr. Gough presented the petition of the South Boom Company of Miramichi praying an extension of privileges and an increase of capital. He wished the same to be referred to a committee.

The Speaker thought the petition should be accompanied by the bill. Mr. Donald, chairman of the committee to whom was referred the bill relating to damages, &c., reported favorably.

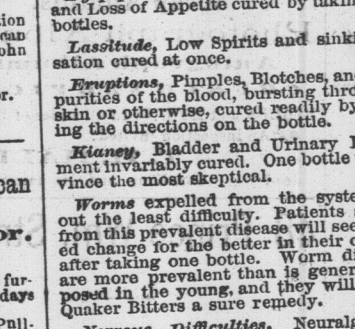
