UNITED STATES.

The people are greatly excited, and there is a strong possibility of lynching the murderer, if caught, as openly made.

At Cincinnati, Tuesday night, a three-story brick house occupied by J. J. Murphy, his wife and two children, and a servant girl, fell, burying the five persons in the ruins. Mr. Wittaker, an old gentleman 78 years of age, passing along the street at the time, was fatally injured by the falling debris. A cellar had been dug next to the building, which, however, had been constructed unsafe for years. Murphy received only slight bruises. Mrs. Murphy sustained cuts and bruises about the head and breast, a daughter aged five died about fifteen minutes after removal, an elder daughter was badly cut about the head and breast, and the body, and the baby was uninjured. The servant was rescued next morning. She had been held down on the cellar floor by the stove, which fell upon her. Her injuries are not dangerous.

Confirming my Circular recently issued and published in the Press of Saint John, I beg to assure you that, if elected, I will not fail to do what I can for the interests of this City and Province.

I have always favored a Free School system, but sincerely regret that a measure which should have been such as to have been received with almost universal satisfaction and approval has deeply displeased the country, created much ill feeling, and now threatens to embolden the Government of the Province with the Dominion Parliament. I think certain improvements and modifications might be made in the Bill which, while doing no wrong to Protestants, would lead Catholics to accept it without further opposition. But the School Bill in its present shape is a very serious matter, and will be a great snarl to us in our relations with the Empire in the future. All that we can do is to do our best to remedy it, and to see that we do not lose the opportunity to do so.
