DEVOTIONAL.

BARRINGTON, September 17th, 1864.

At 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, the Social Conference was

convened. Meeting opened in the usual order.

Introductory remarks by Elder Knowles. This meeting was very interesting, because of the good part taken by the ministering, as well as many of the lay brethren and sisters. It was evident from what was said, that all desired to see the revival of the work of God.

At 7 o'clock in the evening a large congregation assembled. Elder Parsons, from New Brunswick, preached. The word was heard with marked attention, and great solemnity prevailed.

On Sunday morning, at half-past 10 o'clock, preaching at the Barrington Island Meeting-house, by Elder Downey, from New Brunswick: at the same hour, at Bear Point, by Elder Parsons. At 3 o'clock, at Island Meeting-house, Elder Noble preached; after which a communion season was enjoyed. This was a refreshing season to the dear people of the Lord. At 7 o'clock in the evening, Elder Parsons preached to a large congregation.

On Monday, at 2 o'clock, Reporting Meeting was convened. At
this meeting much interest was manifested that the wants of the
Churches should be met, and that the Lord of the harvest would

send forth faithful laborers into his vineyard.

On Monday evening Elder Parsons preached again, as he expected to leave on Tuesday. Elder Downey remained, and preached on Tuesday evening. The interest which had been awakened at the commencement of these meetings increased, insomuch that many were converted and baptised, to the great joy and encouragement of the Church.

MISSIONARY.

On account of the Revival interest enjoyed, we did not have our Missionary Meeting on Tuesday evening, as we thought of doing; but before the religious services took up a collection, and solicited subscriptions, that we might replenish our fund. So there are some funds on hand, and quite an amount subscribed that we may send help among the churches. Several of our good brethren were ready to show by their liberality, the deep interest they feel in our prosperity as a denomination:

APPENDIX.

Whereas, a Committee has been appointed by the Quarterly Meeting of the F. W. Baptists, to confer with this Conference in reference to unity of action; and whereas one of the members of that Committee is an excluded member from this Conference: Therefore Resolved, That while we are disposed to confer with them, we cannot do so consistently, unless that person be excluded from that committee.

Your Committee appointed to report on disaffected members, beg leave to submit the following:—We think that the members of Churches ought to submit to the action of General Conference, and not recognize as preachers these whom the Conference has excluded from their communion, yet because it is so easy for people to conscientiously differ, on these things, we recommend that Churches use great care and prudence, and strive to keep united, and use every proper means to win back to their fellowship any who shall have wandered from what we here recommend.

Your Committee on Home and Foreign Missions submit the following: We find nothing has been done during the last year in the Home Mission work. Your Committee are deeply impressed that never in the history of our denomination was it more necessary for this Conference to turn its attention to this important sphere of Christian labor than at

the present time.
Your Committee are also deeply impressed with the importance of us as a denomination identifying ourselves with the Foreign Mission enterprise. True, we cannot do much: our numbers are small, and our means limited; yet if we can do no more, we can at least exhibit our sympathy for and co-operation with those noble devoted servants of God, who with faith and practice identical with our own, have unfurled the Gospel banner amid the darkness and superstition of our own India.

We would therefore recommend our brethren to co-operate with and contribute to the funds of the New Brunswick Free Christian Baptist Auxiliary Foreign Mission Society, which co-operates with our Free will Baptist brethren who have already established a Mission in Orissa. And we furthermore recommend that contributions be solicited in this Conference to aid in sending the Gospel to those benighted heathen who claim, with us, the protection of England's flag, and acknowledge the authority of the same Sovereign.

As far as your Committee have been able to learn from the Statistics of the Churches, the number of their Scholars in connection with them at present, is about twelve hundred. Some may perhaps think this a large number—but your Committee are of opinion, that should we as Elders, and Church members, make all that earnest effort we should in the establishment of Schools where they do not exist, as well as adding to the numbers of those already established, our record for the current year may double that of the past.

We therefore cannot be too earnest, in urging upon parents the importance of using their parental authority in bringing their children to the Sabbath School, that in their youthful days they may be indoctrinated with the principles of our holy Christianity, and receive that instruction that will develop their loyalty to the interests of our denomination.

And in the acknowledged dearth of spiritual laborers in the vineyard of God, would especially recommend that prayer be made to Almighty God, that from the members of our Sabbath Schools, he would raise up and qualify such as would be efficient standard bearers in his cause, in bearing the glad tidings of salvation to the destitute portions of our Province.
