Irish Affairs. ASSASSINATIONS IN DUBLIN.

London to Paris on Sudday morning.

London, May 7.

Lord Frederick Cavendish and Mr. Thos. Henry Burke, Under-Secretary for Ireland, were assassinated at 7.10 o'clock last evening in Phoenix Park. 
