The grading from the highest department of the Advanced School has been conducted on the same lines and with the same object in view as actuated the Trustees in the discharge of this duty a year ago. Previous to that, transfers were made before the pupils had been properly prepared to begin the studies of the High School curriculum. To raise slowly the standard of admission to the High School, is the object to be attained. Until this is done the High School will be scarcely anything but in name.



Last year a fair acquaintance with the subjects of standing was required in the case of all pupils applying to the High School, and the grading this year was conducted on the same principle. The number found to be qualified to commence a course in the High School was small—smaller than the number of those who had passed the examination in standard 8. The following are the names of those who have passed:—Richard Davidson, Maggie Russell, Ritchie Park, Raymond Hogan, Bertie Wyse, A. F. Ramsay, John Campbell.

These pupils are requested to return to Mr. Cogswell's Department as soon as possible, as the grade will open to-morrow, Thursday.

In view of the vote of last annual meeting and the small number who are prepared to begin High School work, the Trustees have deemed it best to make this arrangement pending the action of the next annual meeting which will be held in October, as prescribed by recent Assembly.

ASSASSINATIONS IN DUBLIN.

LONDON, May 7. Lord Frederick Cavendish, Under-Secretary for Ireland, was assassinated at 7.10, on Tuesday evening in Phoenix Park. They were strolling in the Park about half a mile from the city gate and a quarter of a mile from the Chief Secretary's Lodge, when a car drove up containing four men, two of whom jumped down from the car and fired at Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, stabbing them both several times in the chest. The victims struggled hard for life, and in the struggle became separated, their bodies being found some paces apart. 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### Storm in England.

NEW YORK HERALD BUREAU, LONDON, May 10.—The Herald's storm forecast of the 27th ult. has been exactly verified. It reads: "A disturbance that is likely to develop energy is crossing south of Latitude 45 degrees, and will arrive on the British coast between the 20th and 30th, attended by cold, backing to north, gales or strong winds." London on Sunday was visited by a gale of wind which gradually increased in force, finally blew a hurricane on a short time about six o'clock in the evening. It prevailed generally over the southern and western parts of England during Saturday evening and night. Widespread damage and serious loss of life are reported. In and about the metropolis the disastrous effects of the storm are still visible. At sea the shipping has been greatly impeded. There were many casualties. At Dover, Swanage, Brighton, Portsmouth, Plymouth, and other places on the coast, the storm was a disaster, and caused great damage and loss of life. There was a heavy sea in the Channel, and several disastrous wrecks are reported. A Danish brig was wrecked near Lundy, and several men were drowned. Some of the channel steamers could not make their port. There were no letters from London to Paris on Sunday morning. It is feared that the accounts of the wrecks and of missing vessels during the next few days will be distressing in the extreme. The *Evening News* says:—"We shall hope to have in a few days some scientific account of this remarkable hurricane, which is as yet unexplained as intense in its character." At Liverpool and other places on the west coast the cold was intense. Snow fell in some localities.

LONDON, May 8.—The Cabinet decided to adjourn the House of Commons to-day, after allusions to the murders had been made by the leader of the Opposition.

The Standard says it believes that the post of Chief Secretary for Ireland will be offered to and accepted by Jos. Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade. It adds that the Standard is not in a position to say whether or not the offer will be accepted.

LONDON, May 8.—Telegrams from the provincial towns in the United Kingdom and Ireland describe the news of the crime as causing consternation and a thrill of horror. It is believed that it will lead to an early dissolution of Parliament.

Earl Spencer was heavily escorted whilst proceeding to the meeting of the Council on Sunday.

The Times says it is imperative necessary that Gladstone should prove to England without an hour's delay that he has length come to understand the true nature of the Irish difficulty. No attempt to explain the murders as an accidental outbreak, or as the last hopeless effort of organized disaffection will avail with those who advocate Force's measures as indispensable for restoring order.

The Standard says Bourke being an Irishman, and a Roman Catholic, one would have thought that those circumstances would have been mentioned in his case.

LONDON, May 8.—The Times says it is now thought that Lord Frederick Cavendish and Bourke were both deliberately selected for assassination. During the procession in Dublin on Saturday, a man engaged three times whether Cavendish was in the procession. The Chief Secretary at last lifted his hat and said his name. The man replied, "Thank you, that will do." Two men on horseback also watched the procession in a suspicious manner.

There were eight gaping wounds in the body of Cavendish and eleven in Bourke's. A special messenger left London for Dublin last night.

Telegrams have been received from all parts of the world which indicate a deep feeling of horror and indignation at the assassinations, and local branches of the League everywhere are unanimous in deploring the act and denouncing the perpetrators.
