European Intelligence.

From papers by the Hibernia.

The Government plan proposed for the relief of the West India colonies has been adopted by the small majority of 15 in a house consisting of upwards of 500 members, and Ministers have been spared the pain of tendering their resignation to Her Majesty at this most inconvenient of all periods for their retirement.

FRANCE.

The terrible events in Paris have been followed by a change of Ministry, of which General Cavaignac, who commanded during the late disturbances, is the head or Premier. The men selected to supersede the members of the late Government are remarkable for ability, though not first class politicians and statesmen; and we may therefore look forward at no distant period to M. Thiers, and men of that stamp, assuming the functions of Government, as already their influence is becoming all powerful in the National Assembly. The loss in killed and wounded during the four days has not amounted to 20,000, although many distinguished men, including the Archbishop of Paris, seven Generals, and several deputies, are among the slain. Military tribunals have been formed for the trial of the insurgents, which crowd the prisons, whose conviction in most instances will be attended with immediate banishment to a penal settlement, and the Marquisas Islands

are to be retained for that purpose. The editor of 'La Presse', M. Gerardin, and several other distinguished men, have been arrested and imprisoned on suspicion of being implicated in this tragical affair, in which the upper and middle classes have suffered so severely. At one of the barricades, defended by the Communists, in number varying from 50 to 400, upwards of 1000 of the national guard fell, while the loss of the Communists consisted of two killed and seven wounded!

Tranquility still prevails in Paris; but the state of that capital, in the absence of all confidence, commerce, and trade, with scattered bands of incendiaries in all directions, adding to the general alarm, is most lamentable. The composition of the new Administration is very grateful to the Thiers party, who have the ear of several of the Government, one of the chief Ministers being the brother-in-law of M. Thiers. So far as the prospect of society in France at present goes the office of Minister is by no means one to be coveted. It is stated the savage hatred between the lowest working and the middle classes is visible in the demeanour of the people in the streets. The latest news announces that the Government had withdrawn the project of law relative to railways, and was likely to abandon it altogether. Several of the insurgents, who had sheltered themselves in the Bois de Boulogne, were yesterday shot.

There is some difficulty in the Old and Young Ireland party fusing their differences in the same crucible, though eventually, from the influence at work, they must amalgamate. The Old Ireland party has so completely lost the influence of the country that Mr. John O'Connell cannot obtain a shilling of rent, and is now in actual treaty for the surrender of Conciliation Hall to the rival and more successful agitators of Confederation, upon their assuming a debt of £900 owing by the moral force Repealers. This matter once adjusted, and Mr. John O'Connell eschews agitation on the Dublin boards, and will restrict his labors for the independence of his country to the floor of St. Stephens and to occasional letters, in imitation of those that formerly appeared from the pen of his late father. Mr. O'Connell assigns as his reason for retiring, that he cannot conquer his scruples, against the physical force doctrines promulgated by Mr. Smith O'Brien, Mr. J. F. Meagher, Mr. Gavan Duffy, and the other leaders of the pike and rifle movement.

While this culpable tomfoolery is going on, the change produced in the public mind, by the expatriation of John Mitchell, has enabled his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to devise measures for ameliorating the condition of the country and providing food for the starving peasantry in the west, whose condition is truly deplorable. His Excellency is making extensive arrangements for the reception of her Majesty and Prince Albert, about the second week in August, the period now fixed for their arrival in Dublin.

Her Majesty and court will occupy the viceregal lodge in the Phoenix Park, where their presence is sure to be hailed with lively demonstrations of joy by the loyal and well-disposed of all parties. The presence of royalty will soften down the pugnacious propensities of the repealers, when they begin to share in the positive advantage to be derived.

ENGLISH MAIL.—From the general tone of our English papers received by the Hibernia, it is evident that an important improvement has taken place in commercial affairs. Confidence, in a great measure is restored—and a greater extent of business was doing than for some time past. The main causes which have contributed to this desirable state of things, are said to be—first “that the half yearly returns of the National Revenue shows somewhat better than had been apprehended, and the second, that order had been restored in France with the prospect of the establishment of a much stronger Government.”

Money continued to be abundant. The price of Flour and Provisions ruled low.

There was an advance in the price of timber of 4d per foot.

In Ireland there appears to be a reaction amongst the Repeal party, matters are settling down into quiet. The proposition to unite the Repeal and Confederate parties is not making much progress.

The growing crops are promising an abundant yield.

POTATOE DISEASE.—In some few places we are informed the potatoe crop has been slightly attacked with the blight—but we are happy to learn not to any extent.

We beg leave to direct attention to an able article in our columns to day from our esteemed correspondent “F. S. A.” upon “Internal Improvements.”

STEAMERS.—The travelling public have now the satisfaction of having two Steamers plying between St John and Boston viz., the *Senator* and *Admiral* which leave these places alternately three times a week touching at Eastport. The Steamer *Mail of Erin* also continues to run once a week to Portland, where she connects with the Railway to Boston. The *Commodore* runs twice a week to Digby, Annapolis and Windsor. The “*Herald*” to Halifax touching at Yarmouth, Liverpool &c. Steamers also run every morning and evening between St. John and Fredericton. Mr. Whitney intends putting a Steamer on the route to Sackville.

The Steamer *Nequasset* runs regularly between Eastport St. Andrews & Calais and returns every day.

The person apprehended at Calais last week and brought here on suspicion of being Bowes, the murderer of Mr. Goff at St. John, was examined on Friday last before Jacob Allan Esq. Police Magistrate, who was present with one of the city constables from St. John to identify Bowes—but the prisoner was not the man and was therefore acquitted.

from the royal visit, as the Sovereign is to be accompanied by a long train of the English nobility, the yacht clubs, and the naval squadron under the command of Sir C. Napier. Her Majesty and the Prince are to proceed to the south, to visit the far-famed lakes of Kilmaree, to do justice to the varied and picturesque scenery of which would require a sojourn of at least a week. There are several noble and stately mansions in the vicinity which will be doubtless placed at the command of the royal party.

The grain markets are dull, with a tendency downwards.

Chair of Clinical Surgery.—We understand that Professor Syme has been allowed to withdraw his resignation of the chair of Clinical Surgery in our University, and that he will return to Edinburgh next month, and resume his professional duties next session.

Knox Monument.—The Rev. Mr. Jaffray states, that the funds placed at the disposal of the Committee on the Knox Monument in Edinburgh, amounting to about £3000, have enabled them to secure all the property at Knox's corner, in the Canongate, which is required for their purposes, including the ancient domicile of this Reformer.

Sudden Death.—A meeting of the Free Presbytery of Dalkeith, with the elders and members of the Free Church, Musselburgh, was held on Tuesday forenoon, relative to the appointment of the Rev. G. R. Glass to visit America. Dr. Brown, one of the elders, suddenly expired, after reading a speech against the appointment. Disease of the heart, with which he has long been affected, is said to have been the cause. As he was a very zealous, active, and benevolent member of the church, his loss will be deeply felt by the congregation.

The news from Italy is comprised in a narrow compass. The Upper and Lower Chambers at Rome have voted for the continuance of the war; and the celebrated Gen. Pepe has published an order of the day dated the 18th, announcing that the Venetian Government, with the consent of Lombardy and the Pope, has placed him at the head of all the troops there assembled from all parts of Italy, to wage war against the Austrians, and recommending discipline as the most necessary element to insure victory. No recent hostile movement had taken place of late between the contending armies.

A letter from Hamburg of the 29th ult. states, that it was reported peace had been concluded between the Danes and the German Confederation.

Mr. Coxwell, an English aeronaut, has made a perilous ascent at Brussels. He had the alternative of allowing the gas to escape from the balloon after it had been inflated for his first voyage or of ascending during a fierce gale; he chose the latter, and with a friend was hurried fifty-five miles in twenty minutes. The descent was safely made, though with difficulty.

FIRE.—The building occupied by W. R. Snow, as a Printing Office, and N. R. Burnham and Geo. F. Wadsworth, as Dry Goods Stores, in Calais, was discovered to be on fire about 2 o'clock on Saturday morning, 15th inst. The fire bells were rung, and the engine was soon on the spot. Every effort was made to save the building, but it was unavailing. The building was entirely consumed, together with the whole contents of the Printing Office, and Mr. Burnham's Stock of Goods. Mr. Wadsworth lost, comparatively, little by the flames, but his goods were greatly damaged by the smoke, and water from the engine. The fire broke out in the store occupied by Mr. Burnham. Mr. Snow lost everything he possessed in his business line, having no insurance. The others were fully insured. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.—[Comm. Gazette.]
