OTTAWA, Oct. 10.  
The meeting of the Privy Council, yesterday, was for considering the case of Gallien, of New Brunswick, convicted of murder. After a careful examination of the circumstances, it was decided that the case was one in which the law would have to take its course. He will consequently be executed at the time named by the judge. The case of his paramour and accomplice, the wife of the murdered man, was also under consideration. The sentence of death is reserved for future consideration as also is *excise*.

The sentence on T. C. Patterson, of the Toronto "Mail" is a fine of \$200.

LONDON, Oct. 10.  
The East Parish Church of Aberdeen, the finest edifice of its kind in the North of Scotland, was burned.

The French Government will take effective measures to prevent the shipment of contraband of war across the Spanish frontier.

The Archbishop of Cologne has been released after imprisonment of six months.

Duke of Leinster, who has been seriously ill for some time, died last night.

BANGOR, Oct. 12th.  
A private despatch has just been received here stating that the jury in the case of Robbins, the "Annie B." murderer, have brought in a verdict of "Not Guilty" against the accused.

LONDON, Oct. 12.  
Count Von Arnim is to be removed to a sanitary establishment in the suburbs of Berlin, his health being afflicted by his confinement.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.  
The steamer Cambridge, of the Sanford Line between Bangor and Boston, left Rockland at 11 o'clock on Saturday night, and in a thick fog struck on Long Ledge at the mouth of Seal Harbour. She is high and dry in a dangerous position. The passengers and baggage have been landed at Rockland. Several tugs are trying to pull her off.

Brig Achates, of Prince Edward Island, from Picton for Pembroke with coal, went ashore Saturday on Komok Island, near Sears point. She is full of water and will break up.

Twenty-four persons are soon to be tried in Ravenna, Italy, for the commission of thirteen murders in that city between 1865 and 1871, one of the victims being Signor Cappa, the public prosecutor, whose assassination caused so much excitement some years since. The prisoners, whose names are not given, are of which, however, they composed but a small section. They were in the habit of sending threatening anonymous letters and of placing the names of their intended victims. Some of these were assassinated while attempts were made on the lives of others. Suspicion at length fell on the society, and on the arrest of some of its members the murders ceased. Full information was given by Rasta, an officer of the society who was in the secrets of the band, but took no part in their acts.

TRUE.—A contemporary says: A newspaper and a newspaper editor that people don't talk about and sometimes abuse are rather poor concerns. The men and business that an editor sometimes feels it a duty to defend are very often the first to show ingratitude. The editor who expects to receive much charity or gratitude will soon find out his mistake; but he should go ahead and say and do what he conscientiously thinks right without regard to frowns or smiles.

Narrow Gauge Railroads are becoming quite popular in India, and about 1,000 miles of that description of road have been already built. All the railroads in India have been constructed at the cost of the Government, but it was speedily found that operation would have to be suspended, as the roads were sinking money. The narrow gauge experiment was then tried, and proved very successful. Complaints were, of course, made of the evil of a break of gauge, but it has been considered that of the two evils the break of gauge is the least.

THE VICISSITUDES OF MINING.—It is bad enough for miners to be deluged with cold water; but to be drenched with the hot article is rather trying. This is what recently happened to the Gould & Curry people in California. A large body of hot water was struck in the 1,465 foot level of the Consolidated Virginia mine. From this level, a drift extends into the Gould & Curry, with a downward slope, and the water runs into the latter mine. The Gould & Curry pump is a foot in diameter, and it requires its utmost capacity to control the water.

REMARKABLE FALL OF A RESERVOIR.—A reservoir to supply Conshohocken, Pa., was built last fall at a cost of \$72,000, and was an excellent piece of workmanship. Its supply was pumped from the Schuylkill river, and throughout the past year the town of Conshohocken has been plentifully supplied with water. To the gratification of the citizens. Recently the reservoir was discovered to be empty, and the keeper, in making his morning inspection, discovered that a portion of the embankment had dropped straight downward for 25 feet, and resolved itself into an enormous hole, the sides of which are precipitous rock.

APPOINTMENT.—Among the changes at Ottawa, is the superannuation of M. Bouchette the Commissioner of Customs, whose place is to be filled by James Johnson, Esq., who since confederation has occupied the position of Deputy Minister of Customs.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY'S ANNUAL EXHIBITION.  
If there were any who doubted the agricultural capabilities of this County, their doubts were dispelled on Friday last, when the Fair and Cattle Show were held at the Society's Hall and Grounds, at Bay Side. Notwithstanding the clouds denoted rain, a large number of farmers and visitors attended the exhibition, which was, without exception, the best ever held by the Society. The large display of splendid vegetables, roots, grains, domestic manufactures and improved breeds of cattle, was highly creditable to the County.

At an early hour Mr. Magee, the Secretary-Treasurer of the Society, was at the desk in the Hall receiving entries and delivering marked tickets for the various articles exhibited. Rain commenced to fall, and there was a general stampede for the Hall and the adjoining farm houses, and for about an hour the people amused themselves in various ways until the weather cleared up.

On the ground floor of the hall were exhibited some very fine potatoes, parsnips, carrots, beets, squashes, grain and butter. On the upper floor were native fruits, honey, domestic manufactures and works of art. Noticeable among them, was a large glass case containing some elegant hats and bonnets in velvet and silk, made in the latest fashionable styles, of the richest material, the handiwork of Mrs. John S. Magee. There were also numerous other articles among which we may mention the handsome suits of Mrs. Joseph Linton, the log cabin quilt by Miss Emma De Wolfe, the fancy quilts by Miss Pettigrove and others.

The dinner provided by the good dames of Bay Side, at the "White Hall," was abundant and excellent, and we may add enjoyed by numbers. Time would fail to enumerate all the attractions at the Fair, suffice it to say, that it was highly creditable to the Society, farmers and all concerned. DAY OF THANKSGIVING.—Thursday 22nd inst., has been proclaimed a Public Holiday, to be observed as a Day of Thanksgiving, for the abundant harvest.

A MUSICAL CONVENTION is to be opened at Woodstock, on Thursday next, 20th inst. under the direction of Mr. G. Holland Snow. The Convention will be in session for two days, and will finish by a grand vocal and instrumental concert on Wednesday evening.

THE PLOUGHING MATCH of the Charlotte County Agricultural Society was held on the Almshouse Farm, on the 7th inst. Six entered in the first class, one in the second, and three in the third. The ploughing commenced at eleven o'clock and was finished at two. The judges—Archibald McFarlane, John Dol-

Mr. Thomas Finlay, keeper of the Almshouse, entertained the committee, judges and ploughmen, providing for them a splendid dinner, the cooking of which was creditable to Mrs. Mugford, the matron.

After dinner the ploughmen returned to the field, and ploughed the remainder not included in the competition. The Secretary paid the prizes after the judges reported. Robert Stevenson, Esq., president of the Society, and a number of other spectators were present.

### A Steamboat without Paddles or Screws.

What next? why we shall have "conches that trot by themselves." Two ingenious machinists in the United States have built a marine engine, worked by compressed air, and invented by a Dr. Chase, which drives an aero-boat at the rate of four miles an hour. It is said

"Its simplicity and economy of parts, it is urged, are just what is wanted on the Erie and other canals; it does away with skilled engineers, can be managed by the captain or deck hands, and we see no reason why it will not take the place of the costly and cumbersome engines now in use."

The engines now in use on the Erie canal are screw propellers, driven by steam; and Dr. Chase claims for his invention, compared with the most economical steam engines, a saving of \$2000 in the first cost, and \$1400 per annum in operation. The propellers too are constantly becoming entangled in the eel grass and other obstructions of the canal; the wash which they create damages the embankments; and the grit in the water roughens the shafts so that they have to be frequently taken out and polished. The air propeller is open to none of these objections. The experiments on the Erie canal last year were satisfactory, so far as they went, though the boat which was used was old and almost unserviceable. This summer the Aero-Stream Power Company purchased the "Hunter," built originally for a canal boat on the Cumberland and Oxford canal, and since refitted as a steam tug. The "Hunter" was fitted for her new service by bevelling the bottom, so as to make a flat, inclined surface of about 30 feet at the stern and 10 feet at the bow. The whole length of the craft is 55 feet. The machinery for compressing the air by steam pressure is amidships, and the compressed air escapes underneath the inclined surfaces described and is prevented from expanding laterally by wooden flanges on the side of the vessel. As it expands, it acts like a wedge between the water and the bottom of the boat, driving the vessel forward or backward, as the case may be. The shape of the vessel may be compared to a common baggage truck at a railway station, pivoted upon the middle, and moved by power applied at either end. This was the queer craft which made her trial trip Thursday.

The practical question to be determined Thursday was the degree of speed which could be reached with the aero steamboat. The Legislature of New York has offered a premium of \$100,000 for a mechanical power which shall take the place of horses on the Erie canal and propel the boats at the rate of three miles an hour. The "Hunter" left her wharf under a pressure of about 50 lbs. of steam, and with this pressure made early a trifling over four miles an hour. Dr. Chase says that, on previous trials, she has made the distance of seven-eighths of a mile, at the Ferry, under a higher pressure, in six minutes, at the rate of eight miles and a half an hour. He thinks the rate of three miles an hour can be maintained with a pressure of 15 pounds of steam.

Among the recently patented novelties is a method of mending cracked church bells, so as perfectly to restore their tone. It is done by introducing a furnace within the bell, to warm up and fuse the edges of the crack, at the same time pouring in new metal enough to fill out the crack, the sides of the bell being covered with plates to prevent escape of molten metal.

INDIA TEA EXPORTS.—The Bengal Chamber of Commerce remark, in their latest report, that the growth of the tea industry of India has been almost unexampled in the history of its trade. The value of tea exported from Calcutta has increased from \$1,150,000 in 1863 to \$8,500,000 in 1873. The economic effects of the industry have not yet, however, been fully examined.

Of the four Marshalls now on the French army list, one came from the Polytechnic School, two from the School of St. Cyr, and one rose from the ranks. Of the 314 Generals now in active service, 18 Generals of Division and 32 Brigadiers have risen from the ranks.

According to the "Freeman's Journal," Gen. Sherman is not a Catholic, but when he courted Miss Ewing he was required, before Father Ryder could marry them, to promise as an officer and a gentleman that he would never interfere with his wife in the practice of her religion, and that her children should be brought up Catholics. The Journal adds that the pomp and fuss attending Miss Sherman's wedding belong to something besides religion.

FIRE AT FOREST CITY.—Mr. W. Foster, W. O. Keeper at North Lako writes:—A serious fire took place at Forest City about 12 o'clock on the night of the 6th inst., by which the house, barn and sheds, belonging to Mr.

Davidson Patterson were consumed. Mr. Patterson lost all his hay and grain, besides three cows, all being in the barn at the time of the accident.—Lid.

The death of a school boy at St. Mary's School in the Marylebone district of London was caused the other day by one of the teachers striking him on the head with his fist. The teacher first struck the boy with a cane, and after some time with his fist, knocking his head against the wall. The boy who was only ten years of age, was soon taken very ill, and died on the following day.

Miss Bridget Donnelly, a young lady clerk in Mr. McClellan's store, who few weeks ago went to Boston on a visit, was stricken down with fever while there, and after much suffering died on Friday. The remains reached this city on Saturday evening.—Fredericton paper.

"In the Provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia and  
New Brunswick no person shall, during the  
months of July and August, fish for, catch, kill,  
buy, sell or have in possession any soft-shelled  
lobsters or female lobsters with eggs attached, nor  
shall lobsters of a less size than nine inches in  
length, measuring from head to tail, exclusive of  
claws or feeler, be at any time fished for, caught,  
killed, bought, sold or had in possession, but when  
caught by accident in nets or other fishing appar-  
atus lawfully used for other fish, lobsters with eggs  
attached, soft-shelled and young lobsters of a less  
size than nine inches shall be liberated alive, at  
the risk and cost of the owner of the net or ap-  
paratus, or by the occupier of the fishery, on whom  
in every case shall devolve the proof of such actual  
liberation.
