The N. B. Railway.

The Ignorance License Law in St. John.

The special committee appointed by the St. John Common Council to consider the question of Ignorance Licenses, with authority to confer with a committee of the County Council and the Council of the City of Portland, have reported, that having in view the importance of securing to the City the lawful revenue to be derived from the licensed sale of liquors within the city, they recommend that the Bill committee be instructed to prepare a Bill to be submitted to the Legislature with petitions from the City and praying that the Legislature will fix the revenue to be taken thereon in that City for municipal purposes.

A Serious Fire.

About half past eight o'clock on Thursday evening last, a fire broke out in the paint and varnish shop of Messrs. Edgecombe & Sons, which is attached to the residence of Mr. Wm. Edgecombe. As Mr. Edgecombe and his family were away from home at the time, the fire had made considerable progress before being noticed. The fire brigade turned out in quick order and in a very few moments had four heavy streams of water playing on the burning building, but the flames had already made too much headway to be instantly stopped and had gradually worked into the roof of Mr. Edgecombe's residence and from thence into the residence of Mr. Joseph E. Colter which is next adjoining that of Mr. Edgecombe. After a determined fight on the part of the firemen the fire was subdued, but not before it had completely gutted Mr. Colter's house and the upper story of Mr. Edgecombe's. Most of the furniture in the two buildings was taken out without having suffered any other damage than that caused by the water and the wreckage unavoidably caused by the hurried removal. The Messrs. Edgecombe had stored over the paint shop a considerable quantity of carriage stock and their loss on that will be heavy. The two houses may be considered as totally lost. Mr. Colter had \$500 insurance on his house and \$300 on the furniture, in the London Lancashire and Commercial Union Insurance Co's respectively. Mr. Edgecombe's house, and furniture were insured for \$1500 in the Quebec and \$2,000 in American Companies.

It is demonstrated beyond question, that our water system for fire purposes is now most efficient and the circumstances must be adverse indeed when the most serious fire cannot be controlled.

Lieut. Col. Mansell very courteously and thoughtfully, turned out a squad of the Infantry School Corps to form a guard over the furniture lying before the burning buildings until it could be conveniently removed by the owners.

Railway Meeting of Citizens.

In response to a notice issued by His Worship Mayor Fenety, quite a number of the leading citizens assembled at the City Hall on Friday evening last, to discuss the Miramichi Valley Railway and other Railway questions.

Mayor Fenety was appointed Chairman, and Mr. C. W. Beckwith Secretary.

The Mayor, in calling the meeting to order said that it was entirely non-political and that if it was of any other character he would not be there. It was called in the interest of Fredericton, as the Railway question was one of vital importance to the city. He then introduced Mr. Edward Jack, who entered very fully into an account of the resources of the country through which the proposed Miramichi Valley Railway was to pass, and gave the meeting some very valuable statistics with regard to the value of the lumber and the quantity available in the northern counties. He also touched upon the railway question and the part that the new railroad would play in relation to the trade with the United States. Mr. Jack's address, which was quite lengthy, was listened to attentively throughout. We regret that for want of space we cannot give it in full. He concluded by moving the following resolutions—

Resolved, That there is but one line of railroad connecting the west-side of the Province with the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and whereas the interests of the farmers, lumbermen and fishermen, of the greater part of New Brunswick, and especially those of the Miramichi Valley, are without doubt the best adapted to satisfy the requirements of the above named five counties; therefore be it

Resolved, That the representative for York in the Dominion Parliament be requested to urge the encouragement of the construction of this route upon the Government of the Dominion; and further

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to proceed to Ottawa to press forward the subject matter of the above resolution, with new and obtaining subsidies from the Dominion Government for said Road.

Mr. James S. Neill in seconding the resolutions, spoke of the necessity of quick and decisive action in the matter as influential parties in St. John were trying to direct the Road from Blackville by way of Grand Lake and Apohaqui to St. John, and thus leave Fredericton out in the cold altogether.

Mr. Geo. F. Gregory, referred to the matter in a short speech in which he said that so far as the Short Line was concerned Sir Charles Tupper was favorable to that and was willing that it should be subsidised, but Sir Leonard Tilley's hands were tied in the matter by the action of the St. John Board of Trade. He spoke of the advantages to be derived from the construction of the Miramichi Valley Road, and advised the people of this section of the Country not to interfere with the disputes as to the course of the road along the Miramichi River.

Forceful speeches were made by Mr. L. W. Johnson, who came from St. John expressly to attend the meeting, Messrs. J. L. Inches and others, in which the greatest unanimity prevailed. Mayor Fenety, Mr. L. W. Johnson and Mr. James S. Neill were appointed a delegation to proceed to Ottawa to urge Fredericton and York's claims upon the Dominion Government.

Legislative Notes.

The Solicitor General was absent from his seat three or four days of last week, attending to criminal business at the St. John Circuit Court.

Last week Messrs. Murchie, Black, and Tweedie, ex-M.P.'s, for Charlotte, Westmorland and Northumberland respectively occupied seats on the floor of the House.
