The past year may be characterized as a good average year, there being an increase in the number of lots sold and interments as compared with the year preceding, and your directors, consistent with maintaining the grounds in proper order, endeavored to exercise the strictest economy, and out of the income from the sale of lots and the interest on the mortgage of \$1,000 and the increased salary of the caretaker.

There has been a marked improvement in the appearance of the grounds during the year, due in great measure to the extra care and skill bestowed on the pruning and dressing of trees and shrubs, and removal of weeds and grass, and the increased number of flower beds, and the making very manifest the necessity for the new greenhouse.

The Board desire to express their entire approval of the manner in which the caretaker and the employees under him have discharged their duties.

Dawson and John Green; following directors were appointed: P. Mackenzie, Thomas McCormick, Alex. Johnson, Green, J. M. Denton, Jas. M. Cowan, Wm. Gordon, the vote being unanimous. A vote of thanks was passed to the President and Secretary and the meeting adjourned.

The directors then met, and reappointed Mr. Mackenzie as president, Alex. Johnson as vice-president, and Mr. S. McBride as secretary for the year. Mr. Green was reappointed Treasurer. The Executive Committee, consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, was reappointed, with the addition of Mr. J. M. Denton.

## EAST MIDDLESEX.

Never in the history of the constituency has a more harmonious gathering of East Middlesex Liberals taken place than the convention which assembled in the Forest Hall on Saturday afternoon. The meeting was a most representative one, and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed. It was met that the untiring services in the cause of Liberalism of the late A. J. B. Macdonald, ex-president of the association, should be fittingly remembered, and the feeling and grateful tributes to his memory by Mr. Henderson, the mover, and Mr. Barrman, the seconder of the resolution, were cordially endorsed by the meeting. The resolution approving of the general policy of the Mowat Administration and deprecating the raising of sectarian cries for the purpose of injuring it was also received with great enthusiasm and passed by a sweeping unanimous vote.

But the principal business before the meeting was the selection of a candidate to contest the riding in the Liberal interest at the General Election, which is likely to be held at an early date. One opinion prevailed in regard to the kind of man that it was desirable to choose. The delegates seemed to be unanimous in holding that should be a man who, by virtue of his personal strength and general ability, would be able to command the vote, not only of the members of the convention, but of progressive men generally in the riding. A number of gentlemen were proposed, all leading men in the community, and good men too, any one of whom would have made an excellent run and have done honor to the constituency, but for personal reasons they all withdrew in favor of Mr. Thomas H. Purdon, whose name was placed before the convention by Mr. Scutcherd, of Nissouri, seconded by Mr. Chas. Trebilcock, of London township, whose praises were warmly sounded by these gentlemen, and he became the unanimous choice of the convention, amid loud cheering.

Mr. Purdon is a well-known barrister in this city, and has been twice honored by the profession in being elected Benchers of the Law Society at Osgoode Hall, a position which he now holds. He was born here, his father being one of the pioneers of the county. Well and favorably known to very many in the riding as a straightforward, progressive man and a thoroughgoing Liberal, he enters the contest determined to use every legitimate effort to place East Middlesex where it properly belongs, in the list of constituencies supporting the Mowat Government. He consents to become a candidate on the assurance that he will have the unanimous support of the men who have before now sent a supporter of Mr. Mowat to the Legislature. He believes he will be elected, and that he will be able to be of some use to the constituency, and not a cipher, as Richard Tooley has proved himself to be. Mr. Purdon is already, in a measure, serving East Middlesex as a member of the Hospital Trust, where he has done excellent service in endeavoring to keep the useful and necessary public institution well equipped, while managed on economical principles. In the Legislature Mr. Purdon would no doubt have many other opportunities for advancing the interests of his constituents. The county of Middlesex and the West generally need a Normal School at some central point, and what site can be found more suitable than that pointed out by Mr. Purdon in his speech to the convention—the London Court House Square? So situated, the much-needed Normal School would be of much service to East Middlesex as well as to the Western district generally. What better argument in its favor than the sending to the Legislature of a man of Mr. Purdon's ability and pluck to advocate the erection of the institution at this point in season and out of season? No one honestly believes that Mr. Mowat will be defeated in the coming contest, and no one believes that men of the caliber of Mr. Tooley can possibly have as much influence either with the Government or with the Legislature as men possessing the ability and tact of Mr. Purdon. The firm of Purdon & Purdon, of which Mr. Purdon is a member, has for years been solicitors for the county of Middlesex, and it will be of advantage to the county to have one of its solicitors sitting over its interests while the numerous measures affecting the agricultural community are under discussion. As our readers generally know, municipal law is one of the most important branches of legislation within the jurisdiction of the Ontario Legislature.

In many ways besides those which we have stated the electors of East Middlesex will be better served by selecting an intelligent and independent supporter of the Government than if they were to send a much better Tory than the present representative to the Legislature. It is for this

reason that the convention fixed upon Mr. Purdon, and we have no doubt that the candidate will make a splendid run. We believe he will be elected.

We have been told that in past elections the Liberals have lost because they neglected to arrange for the polling of every vote known to be favorable to the candidate. No doubt there is much truth in the explanation. The reproach should not be allowed to hold good in the ensuing contest, as the candidate has been placed in the field in ample time to enable the township committees to arrange for the polling of every vote. Thanks to the Mowat Government, the "one man one vote" principle holds good in Ontario elections, and there is no time and money to be spent in bringing in the outside vote, as only residents in the constituency can go to the polls. Therefore, there is no excuse for any vote being left unpolled on election day. If every Liberal does his share victory may be expected, because it will be deserved.

## A TIMELY PROTEST.

Though talking pretty straight Tory doctrine, as a rule, the Kingston News refuses to follow the section of its party which is doing all that lies in its power to get up a race cry in Canada. It says: "Quebec, as it is created up and its vast mineral and agricultural resources thrown open, will be flooded by English capital, and no Canadian of English race who keeps his eyes open can despair of our language and institutions. But it does not do us any harm to say that it will do all for us without any worry on our part, and if we trust solely to time and the silent impersonal forces already at work, we avoid the precipitation of a host of races. Any race hostility excited only postpones the day when the English race will have to contend with the French race, and the English race should be the least ready to counsel aggressive means of accomplishing the result."

We venture to say that so far as Ontario is concerned the authorities are doing everything in their power to promote the status of the English language among the French-speaking population that exists in one or two sections of the Province, and that they will have much greater success through pursuing a conciliatory policy than if they adopted the extreme course advocated by Mr. Meredith and his associates. We expect the best of results from the bilingual elementary text-books which Hon. Mr. Ross has introduced. They have proved a great success in the French-speaking districts of New Brunswick, and, despite Mr. Meredith's demand that the same course be pursued in Ontario, we believe these excellent books have come to stay until such time as the rising generation become fathers and mothers who, by virtue of their birth, there will be no need for them. The News is right; the incitement to race hostility must be frowned down by all patriots.

THE Toronto Telegram has been an anti-Mowat organ since it was started, but Mr. Mowat has managed to rub along with the majority of the people of the Province at his back. Now the Telegram, after surveying "it does not follow that Mowat is going to go" out of office. That is right; better to show a little foresight as well as hindsight. Prior to last election, the Toronto Tory papers, and indeed the rank and file of the press of that party throughout the Province, insisted right up to election day that "Mowat must go." A good many of them knew better, but they kept repeating the cry, like so many parrots, straight along, in hope no doubt that their prospects might be improved by misleading the unthinking of their readers. The result was that the Liberal leader had a following larger than ever. They are at it again now, but the people are in no mood to be moved by such chestnuts, and the Telegram knows it. Hence, it stands under.

Tax stamps have been established in Switzerland, to enable the poorer classes to pay their taxes in small instalments, and to get out a lump sum. The taxpayer can buy weekly for a few cents a stamp, and so gradually clear off his debt to the Government. Canadians pay their taxes to the Dominion Government in daily instalments, through duties imposed on almost everything they eat, drink, wear or require as tools of trade. But they are not as lucky as the people of Switzerland. The Government gives them no stamps to show them, just how much they pay. If they did the Tory leaders at Ottawa would be defeated by an overwhelming majority at next election. The people would have their eyes opened to the incidence of taxation. At present the tax system presses most heavily on those least able to bear taxes, and the people are asked to believe that the higher the tax the better off they are. A mouth of the Swiss system would give conclusive evidence to the contrary.

STANLEY is not to be welcomed by a grand parade of the London City Council, though a big attempt was made to have the civic reception take that form. It was opposed chiefly by John Burns, the labor leader, who thought that the explorer should not have more honors heaped on him than British military heroes. Lord Napier of Magdala, it seems, had no street reception after Magdala, neither had Gen. Roberts after Cabul, nor Lord Wolseley after Tel-el-Kebir, while the only reception the Duke of Wellington had on his way home from Waterloo was from two footpads on Blackbath, who stopped his carriage and appropriated his valuables.

HITHERTO there has been no paper money in England of less value than 25. For less than gold and silver have been the currency. Now it is proposed to follow the system prevalent in Scotland and authorize the issue of 21 notes, "redeemable for 20s. per 100, but not for gold sovereigns." Silver has had a boom in the British markets as a consequence of the proposed change, which, as it is a Government measure, will go through.

WE LEARN from a weather expert that the cold waves which first made their appearance in the British Northwest Territory and the northern sections of Montana, Dakota and Minnesota, and generally move southward through the lake region, have this far this winter been forced northward, mostly north of Lake Superior, by

storm centers (warm waves) from the southeast—hence the warm weather here thus far. Another explanation is offered by the Buffalo Express, which traces the high temperature this winter to a new crop of female novelists which has sprung up. One view may be nearly as correct as the other.

THE Napanea Express has been purchased by John Pollard and Ephraim McLaughlin, of Tiverton, Bruce county. They promise to make things hum in the old town.

This men's department of D. L. Moody's new Evangelical Institute at Chicago has just been opened most successfully. The institute will aim to train missionaries to get at the unreach masses in city and country. The idea, as announced, is "to turn out aggressive men to go into gambling dens and saloons, to lay their lives alongside the abandoned, and so to save. Accommodations have been provided for 100 students. The training is to be largely through contact with the masses. The cost of the building was \$125,000, and was met chiefly by well-known Chicago business men. In addition to the regular corps of instructors, the plan is to have present a continuous succession of prominent Bible teachers from centers in this country and Europe. Fifty men were started last week in the course of instruction. They are from widely scattered States, from Canada, and quite a percentage from across the Atlantic.

The London Ironmonger in its regular petroleum market report says: "The brands offering on the market have been limited, and the hitherto favorite American brand has been the subject of many complaints on account of color and burning properties. Russian oil, on the other hand, continues to grow in favor and meets with increased demand. There are now several importers of oil, and reports from the Russian regions show the production to be rapidly increasing, the daily production of crude being rather over 55,000 barrels, as compared with about 12,000 barrels in 1892; while American daily averages are 27,500 barrels, compared with 22,000 barrels in 1892." If further evidence is wanted the following is contributed by London Industries: "The following table gives the shipments of petroleum oil to this country in barrels during the last six years:

The large increase in the import of Russian petroleum during the past year seems to be due in a great measure to the employment of tank steamers, while the American trade was carried on by barrel shipments.

NEW PUBLICATIONS.  
"BROOKS SHACKLES" is the title of a handsome volume just issued by Wm. Briggs, Toronto, and sold in two bindings at 50 cents and 75 cents. It is an interesting volume of slave life reminiscences, after the model of Uncle Tom's Cabin, and will well repay reading. The author is "Glenely."

NOTWITHSTANDING the pressure of public cares and the burden of 80 years (which, however, do not seem to sit heavily on his shoulders), Mr. Gladstone has found an opportunity to examine and commend Harper's Young People. In his article in the current issue of the North American Review Mr. Gladstone says of the Young People: "It far surpasses all that the enterprise and skill of our publishers have been able to produce."

RICHARD HODGSON, LL.D., the secretary of the American Society for Psychical Research, has a paper in the Arena (Boston) for February on Ghosts of the Living and the Dead. It is a very well written, interesting, and possesses a positive scientific value. Edgar Fawcett contributes a remarkable poem to the February Arena. In the New York Times, a notice is written in a most charming style, and represents two citizens of the great city of Manhattan, once New York, conversing of the long vanished ages, when poverty and crime nestled health the shadows of numerous warring churches, when prison and cathedral rose on a common street.

THE OAR.

Advice from Australia says the funeral of Henry Searle, the deceased champion oarsman, took place at Sydney, Dec. 14.

The ceremony was witnessed by 170,000 people. The mayor and aldermen and a deputation of members of Parliament formed part of the procession, which was the longest of its kind ever seen in Sydney.

The remains were interred at MacLean. There is a movement on foot to erect a monument to Searle's memory.

BASEBALL.

THE TORONTO CLUB.

Toronto, Jan. 21.—The Toronto Baseball Association lost \$3,000 on last season's business. At last night's annual meeting, President McConnell occupied the chair.

Messrs. McConnell, W. Macpherson, Peter Ryan, L. J. Cosgrave and A. W. Smith were elected directors. Mr. McConnell was re-elected president, and Mr. A. W. Smith, vice-president. Mr. Augustine Fox has retired from the board, but no secretary has yet been appointed. In putting the motion for a vote of thanks to last year's officers, Inspector Stark said he would consider, as a janitor, that the Toronto club could not maintain its baseball association, which was, with the exception only of the Industrial Exhibition, the best advertisement this city had for the outside world.

PROBS.

Probably there will be more baseball wrecks the coming season than there ever known before in any one year of the game, owing to the present disorganized condition of affairs. It will take a year to settle matters. After that baseball will be more prosperous than ever before, for the troubled sea will be settled, and therefore baseball will boom. In view of that fact, and that baseball is spreading over all the civilized world, clashing Europe and Australia in its grip, I think the day will come when we will have an international championship baseball series to be played once every three or four years for the championship of the world, just as America and England have been in the habit of sailing yachts against each other for the championship cup (Sporting Life).

FLY.

Lefty Marr was purchased Monday from the Columbus Baseball Club for \$2,000 and signed to play third base for the Cincinnati club. He was one of the best men in the Columbus team.

Edward Clayton, an amateur player of New York, was badly hurt by being hit with a pitched ball last summer. Since then his mind has been unsettled, and he is now confined in the Harlem Hospital in that city.

The observant reader cannot have failed to note that every new man signed nowadays by the National League, American Association and even the Players' League is a "hard batter, fine fielder and splendid base-runner." The wonder is that these wonderful players should have remained in obscurity so long, and that the League should have paid heavy salaries so long to the recognized "stars," with talent so abundant right along as it has proven to be since the pinch came. We fear, though, that a change will come over the spirit of the dreams of the magnates when the actual test upon the diamond comes.—[Sporting Life]

Cupidity is the chief characteristic of the National League. It desires to possess everything of value in the baseball world. Its motto is: "Control or crush." Just now it has on hand a big order to crush, and if the truth be known its crushing machine is badly out of fix. The American public in its sports demands methods free from the slightest suspicion of taint. How, then, must the magnate appear when he seeks to drive a rival to the wall by bribing players to break oaths and sign contracts for services already secured to another; and how will the public regard the players so bought? The National League's hand-right is becoming sadder than its fore-sight. After the damage had been done last fall it promptly repealed the classification law and raised the percentage to visiting clubs. Had this legislation been accomplished a year earlier it is doubtful if the Players' League would ever have seen the light of day. At the end of next season, perhaps, it will realize its mistake. Its very aggressiveness has solidified the

FOOTBALL.

All lovers of Rugby football, says the London Daily News, will be glad to hear that there is the prospect of a speedy termination to the unfortunate dispute which has existed between England, on one hand, and Scotland, Ireland and Wales on the other, for nearly three years. The offer of arbitration made by the Rugby Union has been accepted by the International Board, formed of representatives of the other three unions, and, although the English authorities have not yet had time to reply, it is reasonable to hope that, with the general principle accepted, differences of detail will be easily settled.

THE TURF.

The Dwyer Bros. in fourteen years have won \$1,246,065 on the turf—not by betting, but in paries.

An order has been issued to foreclose the mortgage held against the International Fair Association of Buffalo, and its affairs will be wound up. A strong effort was made to increase the amount of bonds in order to clear off the indebtedness, but it proved a failure. Should the grounds be bought up for building purposes the Grand Circuit would develop them on the line above indicated. When the nonpareil trotter does appear he will present a distinguished ancestry of producers and performers, and, more than all, he will represent brains. He may come from Kentucky, from the great West, from California or from Maine; but wherever he comes from his breeder and his trainer will be firm believers in breeding, feeding and speeding as indispensable elements in the production of that "roof and crown" of the animal kingdom, the American trotting horse.—[New York Sportsman.]

THE RING.

The California Athletic Club has postponed the fight between Jack Dempsey and Bill McCarthy, of Australia, to Feb. 18, Dempsey being unwell.

Special Agent Payne has arrived at Purvis, Miss., with Muldoon, Cleary and Donovan, arrested for complicity in the Sullivan-Kilrain fight. The prisoners were taken to Richburg, where they will give bail for their appearance at the next term of the court.

The great and only John L. Sullivan has telegraphed President Fulda, of the California Athletic Club, that he will not arrange for another fight with the Mississippi matter is settled, and then he won't meet Jackson for less than \$25,000. This, he says, is final.

The disgraceful fracas between Mitchell and Lord Viscount Maudesville at the Trocadero, London, England, is still the main topic of discussion in the sporting circles. Maudesville gave his version of the affair.

"I gave Mitchell no provocation whatever for the assault," he said. "I had just left the Pelican club after the Smith-Slavin committee, and was accompanied by Mr. Baird. We went into the Trocadero about 11 o'clock, and we were there joined by Charley Mitchell, who approached us in a friendly manner, shook our hands warmly and made some social remarks.

"Shortly, a gentleman in the front row of stalls began flourishing Jim Smith's colors. At first Mitchell took no notice of the demonstration until the gentleman threw the colors over his shoulder.

"This seemed to infuriate Mitchell, and he suddenly turned on Baird, shouting at the top of his voice: 'You done this for me, and I'll give you a good pinch in the eye for it.'"

"Accompanying his threat with a gesture as though he was about to strike, I pushed him back and said: 'Don't be a scoundrel, Charley; keep quiet.' Matters quieted down then, and I thought it had blown over, when just at the conclusion of the performance, as Baird and I started for the car, Baird a little in advance, we entered the room I received a frightful blow under my right ear, so severe that I fell to the ground senseless. When I recovered there was a crowd standing about me and Baird was lifting me to my feet. He told me Mitchell had struck me and then jumped into a cab and escaped.

Mitchell was seen later in the day, and while he declined to be interviewed he volunteered the remark, 'Maudesville provoked me deliberately, and I will thrash him again if he continues his annoyance.'—[Buffalo Times.]

BILLIARDS.

Sexton has withdrawn from the coming billiard tournament in New York on account of failing health. His action was entirely unexpected to the outside billiard players, but it did not surprise the professional players or his intimates. George Slonek, the star of the tourneys, had, in fact, privately predicted it over a month ago. LONDON WEST.

The new Council will meet to-night. Reeve Lacey, who has been confined to his house the last few days, is rapidly convalescing, and expects to be at the Council meeting to-night.

Mr. W. Moore has an attack of the grippe. The regular services at the Methodist Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Wm. McDonough, are being well attended.

There is considerable talk of petitioning the city council to call a public meeting to discuss amalgamation.

SHUT IN BY SNOW.

Terrible Storm in the Northwest—Railroads Blocked—Serious Loss of Life.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 21.—For some days there has been a heavy snow blockade on the Union Pacific trunk and branch lines between Huntington and Portland. There have been no through trains for nearly a week. Bitter cold and wind have prevailed most of the time, accompanied by heavy winds and blinding snow storms. Five or six trains both east and west bound are blocked in between the Dalles and Baker City.

The same state of affairs have prevailed over the Southern Pacific and in the northern part of California. Trains are blocked in between the Dalles and Baker City.

No through trains have arrived at Portland from San Francisco or left here for that point in nearly a week. No trains are expected to run here before the middle of the week. Heavy storms east and south have prostrated the wires.

PACIFIC, W. T., Jan. 21.—At least ten human beings and thousands of cattle and sheep perished in the blizzard which began with the year and raged over Washington for a week. On the Colville reservation cattle are dying by hundreds from starvation and thirst. The ground is covered with over two feet of snow on the level, and in some places it is as high as ten feet.

The keeper of the stage station twelve miles from Alma started to walk to town last week, and Sunday his body was found on the prairie only a mile from his home frozen stiff.

The mail carrier at Wild Goose Creek perished on the same day, and eight cattle were known to have lost their lives in the storm. Cattlemen estimate that they will lose one-half of their herds this season.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Local Elections—The Government Sustained 24 to 17.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 21.—The elections today resulted in the return of the Local Government by a narrow majority. In St. John city and county the Opposition carried the day, electing six men and defeating Provincial Secretary McLellan, and electing Messrs. Atkinson, Burchell, Robinson, Westmoreland, Hanning, Stevens and Powell—one Independent—McLellan.

Kent county returns McInerney and Le Blanc (Government).

Carleton county—Atkinson (Opposition), Ketchum (Government).

York county—Baird, Wilson, Bellamy and Anderson—all Government.

Sunbury county—Harrison (Government), Perly (Independent), likely, but one parish to hear from.

Victoria—Porter (Opposition) elected.

The friends of the Government claim they will have a good working majority in the new House.

DANIEL MACFIE.

Death of a Prominent and Respected Resident.

The death occurred suddenly at the family residence, "Ardven," London South, last night, of Mr. Daniel Macfie, well known throughout Ontario. He was in his parlor about 10 o'clock with his grand-children, when he suddenly became faint, and expired within half an hour, before assistance could be secured. He had been complaining slightly for some time, but was believed to be in fairly good health. The following particulars of his life, as printed in Goodspeed's History of Middlesex, will be of interest: "Mr. Macfie was one of London's representative citizens whose ancestry was entirely due to his own perseverance. He was born on the Island of Bute, Fifth of Clyde, West of Scotland, Oct. 10, 1819, the son of Daniel and Isabel Macfie. The former was a cooper by trade and devoted himself to that calling. Daniel, the eighth child and sixth son of the family, of ten children, was reared in his native place, and in early life commenced working in a cotton factory. Upon attaining his eighteenth year he went to Glasgow and entered a hosiery warehouse, where he remained for three years, but learning of an advance advertisement of Peter Buchanan &amp; Co., of that city, for a competent person to go to Canada in the capacity of a sales agent, he was appointed to that position and subsequently entered into an arrangement for three years, whereby his expenses to Canada and salary were given him, and he arrived in Toronto when he had the choice of three positions—one in Toronto, one in Kingston and one in St. Thomas. Isaac Buchanan was then elected a member of the first parliament of the united provinces of Quebec and Ontario, and Peter Buchanan was his brother. Upon reaching Toronto he presented himself to Isaac Buchanan, who was advised by him to enter the business of John McKay, of St. Thomas. In going thence he passed through London for the first time in 1841. When his three years' engagement expired he returned to London, where he had remained ever since, and proved of no little benefit to the interests of the community.

The sales of English wheat for the week were 73,025 quarters at 35s 20 per quarter against 62,650 quarters at the same price for the corresponding week last year.

The trade in English flour has been much below the average, the bakers being poor. Foreign flour and wheat were firm during most of the last week, but weakened on Friday. Australia is increasing her shipments.
