The only basis for the story seems to be a report that when Count Hoyos brought the news of his fate to the Emperor his Majesty exclaimed: "My son—my daughter!" The story causes much gossip.

French Fishermen in Newfoundland.

PARIS, Jan. 21.-In the Chamber of Deputies to-day M. Flourens questioned the Government regarding the rights of the Government regarding the rights of French fishermen in Newfoundland. He contended the rights of France were violated by the pretence of the Newfoundland authorities to interpret the treaty of Utrecht in a way to exclude French fishermen from privileges they were entitled to. M. Spuller, Minister of Foreign Affairs, said France had by treaty a limited sovereignty on certain parts of the Newfoundland coast for certain purposes. But the arrangements between England and France did not accord with the views of the Newfoundfoundland Parliament, and the case was more difficult and delicate than formerly. He said negotiations are pending, but are complicated by private claims. The Minister denied the English Government had authorized an officer to notify French fishermen they could not take lobsters this season. Dollars that Are Not Dollars. Dollars that are Not Dollars.

New York, Jan. 21.—Wall street financiers claim to have discovered that a band of Mexicans calling themselves a "private bank" have been coining United tates silver dollars and issning them to States silver dollars and issuing them to Mexicans, who give them in return for goods purchased on this side of the line. The profit in this scheme can be readily seen when it is known that the United States silver dollar of the present only contains 72 cents' worth of the precious metal. This alleged bank takes 72 cents' worth of bullion, and with a start of the precious metal. bullion, and with a stamp, the exact counterpart of those used at the United States mints, stamp out the dollar. There is nothing counterfeit about the dollar, and it is therefore difficult to detect it. It is asserted that at least 5,000,000 illegal dollars have been foisted upon the citizens of the United States by the keen-witted Mexicans.

The Ruri-decanal Chapter of Middlesez Meet and Spend the Morning in

The January meeting of the Ruri-decanal chapter of Middlesex was opened in Christ Church this morning with divine service at 11 o'clock, conducted by Rev. R. Hicks, of this city, and Rev. W. M. Shore, of Ail Craig. Among those present were Rev. A. G. Smith, of Munoey; Rev. S. R. Ashbury, of Delaware; Rev. Canon Smith; Mr. W. Rob inson, Synod delegate. Rev. Canon Richard son preached an appropriate sermon from the text, Matthew, xiii., 31-32: "The kingdom of heaven is like to a grain of mustard seed which a man took and sowed in his field, which indeed is the least of all seeds; but when it is grown it is the greatest among herbs, and becometh a tree so that the birds of the air come and lodge in the branches thereof." The speaker showed the comparison between the kingdom of heaven and the mustard seed, and stated that that kingdom but meant the visible church of Christ on earth. He reviewed the growth of the Anglican Church from its organization, and dweit upon the darkness of the middle ages, which but forshadowed the brightness of the glorious revival that followed close upon it. The effects of that revival were being felt at the present day. The church of to-day was more active than ever before, and had within the reign of the present Queen erected over 600 churches in England. It had missions in every part of the known world, and its membership was estimated at the present time to be upwards of 70,000,000. He urged his listeners to remain faithful to the Church of England and not be carried away with the hollow forms of one denomination or the noisy services of another, which relied more on display than anything else.

EAST MIDDLESEX

Never in the history of the constituence a more harmonious gathering of East Middlesex Liberals taken place than the convention which assembled in the Foresters' Hall on Saturday afternoon. The eting was a most representative one, and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed. It was meet that the untiring services in the cause of Liberalism of the late A. J. B. A number of gentlemen were proposed, all leading men in the community, and good men too, any one of whom would have made an excellent run and have done honor to the constituency, but for personal reasons they all withdrew in favor of Mr. Thos. H. Purdom, whose name was placed before the convention by Mr. Scatcherd, of Nissouri, seconded by Mr. Chas. Trebilcock, of London township, whose praises were warmly sounded by these gentlemen, and he became the unanimous choice of the convention, amid loud cheering.

Mr. Purdom is a well-known barrister in

this city, and has been twice honored by the profession in being elected Bencher of the Law Society at Osgoode Hall, a position which he now holds. He was born here, his father being one of the pioneers of the county. Well and favorably known to very many in the riding as a straightforward, progressive man and a thoroughgoing Liberal, he en-ters the contest determined to use every legitimate effort to place East Middlesex where it properly belongs, in the list of constituencies supporting the Mowat Government. He consents to become a candidate on the assurance that he will have the unanimous support of the men who have before now sent a supporter of Mr. Mowat to the Legislature. SHUT IN BY SNOW. Terrific Storms in the Northwest-Rail-roads Blockaded-Serious Loss of Life.

roads Blockaded—Serious Loss of Life.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 21.—For some days there has been a heavy snow blockade on the Union Pacific trunk and branch lines between Huntington and Portland. There have been no through trains for nearly a week. Bitter cold weather has prevailed most of the time, accompanied by heavy winds and blinding snow storms. Five or six trains both east and west bound are blockaded somewhere between the Dalles and Baker City.

The same state of affairs have prevailed over the Southern Pacific and in the northern part of California. Trains are blocked in the Suskyon Mountains, so that communication has been entirely cut off.

No through trains have arrived at Portland from San Francisco or left here for that point in nearly a week. No trains are expected to run here before the middle of the week. Heavy storms east and south have prostrated the wires.

Tacoma, W. T., Jan. 21.—At least ten human beings and thousands of cattle and sheep perished in the blizzard which began with the year and raged over Washington for a week. On the Colville reservation cattle are dying by hundreds from starvation and thirst. The ground is covered with over two feet of snow on the level, and in some places it is drifted mountain high.

The keeper of the stage station twelve miles from Alma started to walk to town last week, and Sunday his body was found on the prairie only a mile from his home frozen stiff.

The mail carrier at Wild Goose Creek perished on the same day, and eight cattlemen are known to have lost their lives in the storm. Cattlemen estimate that they will lose one-half of their herds this season.
