THE BIRCHALL CASE.

How the Prisoner Spent the Day Before the Trial.

Woodstock, Sept. 22.—Last night, according to the statements of the jail officials, Birchall was resting quietly, apparently undisturbed by the approaching event. He spent the day much as he has spent other Sundays since his incarceration. In the morning his spiritual adviser, Rev. Rural Dean Wade, attended at the jail, and the usual service was held, the clergyman and the prisoner only taking part. In the afternoon Mrs. Birchall paid her husband a visit, remaining with him as long as the regulations permitted. She shows more clearly than ever the effect of the nervous strain upon her, and gives way more easily to her sorrow. The prisoner returned to his night cell at the usual kour, and went to bed early.

The statement that Neville I. Pickthall whose name has been connected with this case, had disappeared and could not be found was most satisfactorily proven to be an erroneous one by that gentleman appearing in town Saturday, and he is ready to give his testimony when called upon.

A Londoner on the Territories and British Columbia.

Distinguishing Characteristics of the Opening-Up Lands.

Ontario Men the Principal Settlers Nov

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER

Going In.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

As many of my friends wished to hear from me regarding my impressions, etc., of Western Canada, I know of no better means of speaking to them all at once than through "the paper."

Never, perhaps, was the advice of Horaco Greely more ardently followed than at the present time. "Go West" seems to be a favorite maxim with young and old. Hundreds are daily crowding westward by the various lines of communication with the great Northwest and British Columbia. The immigration returns for the first six months of this year show the number of bona fide settlers to Manitoba and the Northwest Territories to be in January, 230; February, 232; March, 2,146; April, 1,868; May, 1,904; June, 1,098, or a total of 7,478. A large proportion of those came as far west as Calgary, and most of them were from Ontario.

The immigration agent at Vancouver informed me that the number of immigrants who landed in that city alone average 1,400 per month. Some who go west are invalid, others tourists or pleasure seekers, but the great majority are in search of homes and fortunes in the Far West. It is needless to say that many will be disappointed, while some may realize their brightest hopes. The Northwest and British Columbia are fields for "rustlers," and those who accumulate wealth are hard workers and men of keen perception and good judgment, combined with prudence and perseverance, without which qualities it is difficult to succeed in any country, under almost any circumstances.

"Dull times" in the East appears to be one of the principal causes of this great west-bound human tide, but the same complaint is to be found among certain classes in these western districts. The country from Winnipeg to the coast is overstocked with speculators, lawyers, doctors, artisans, mechanics, school teachers, merchants, such as a construction of the many who struggle for an existence. To may are looking for "maps," and only few find them. An insane desire to make money without hard work appears to be the ma

tario, but any person who says the cold is not felt there is either a very unfeeling individual or a strict economizer of the truth.

Assiniboia, west of Manitoba, is fast becoming an important territory. Regins, its capital, is the seat of government of the Northwest Territories and the headquarters of the Northwest mounted police, of which there are about 1,000, distributed at various points throughout the Territories. 


