"The Brains of the Conservative Party"

Offawa, March 14.—As a subject for a historic painting and an object lesson to posterity the scene in the Commons chamber of Canada to-day was appropriate and striking. Imagine D'Alton McCarthy, "the brains of the Conservative party," and the chief counseller of the late Sir John Macdonald, standing before the chiefs of the party and its serried battalions of followers, and denouncing the N. P. as a failure and as being responsible for all the spirit of unrest and all the annexation sentiment abroad in the land. Imagine D'Alton McCarthy, with all the power of a great advocate, pleading the cause of the combines and monopolies, and asking for justice to the farmers by relieving them. combines and monopolies, and asking for justice to the farmers by relieving them of enormous and unnecessary taxation.
D'Alton McCarthy, abandoning preferential trade, abandoning protection, declaring for a revenue tariff, and hoping for a treaty of reciprocity with the United States, was a sight which made the square-toed Conservatives rub their eyes. His arraignment of the N. P. was one of the strongest ever heard in Parliament, not because his arguments were better or different than those of the Opposition for ten years past, but they came with greater force from one who was condemning the policy of his own party —a policy he had himself upheld for fifteen years.

On Mr. Foster's motion to go into com mittee of supply Mr. D'Alton McCarthy rose to move the following amendment:

"Since the introduction of the protective "Since the introduction of the protective system sufficient time has elapsed for the establishment and development of such manufacturing industries as under existing conditions can be-successfully carried on in Canada. Moreover, many manufacturers, sheitered behind the ramparts thus erected, have formed combinations and trusts which prohibit competition and create and maintain monopolies.

prohibit competition and the competition monopolies.

"That the existing tariff, defensible the measure, has proved in only as a protective measure, has proved in many instances oppressive and burdensome to the great mass of the consuming classes, and especially to those engaged in agricul-tural pursuits, is unfair and unequal in its impositions, and has been productive of discontent verging on disloyalty among those who suffer from its injustice.

"That no sufficient reason has been adduced or exists requiring investigation respecting the foregoing facts, which are notorious, nor justifying delay in the passage of remedial legislation, which is importative.

"That in the opinion of this House the tariff ought to be at once amended in respect to the matters herein indicated, and also by the substantial reduction of customs duties in favor of the United Kingdom is when the control of the United customs duties in favor of the United Kingdom in whose market all Canadian products are admitted duty free, and of those nations which, under treaty obligations with Great Britain, would be entitled to the same advantages, graduated, however, so as not unnecessarily to prejudice the business of the country nor to do wrong to those who have imported and paid duties in accordance with its provisions.

"And this House declares its readiness to make a like reduction in favor of such other portions of the Empire, or with such other foreign countries, especially the United States of America, as are willing to reciprocate in matters of trade with Canada on fair equitable terms."

They could not put down combinations by law, but they could compel them to get out from under the shelter of tariff. (Hear, hear.)

The farmers Mr. McCarthy had left to the last as the most important. In his opinion the farmers suffered most from the the last as the most important the tariff. Referring to Mr. Foster's argument that the farmer by using his own wood and wearing homespun escaped taxes, he protested strongly against the idea of treating the farmer as a hewer of wood and drawer of water. (Cheers.) On everything he used the farmer was subjected to enormous taxes. (Hear, hear.) The duty of 35 per cent. on agricultural implements wasn's a revenue duty, it was an enormous tax. Mr. McCarthy took out of his desk petitions not yet laid on the table from 113 associations of Patrons of Industry, signed by 1,712 farmers and electors residing in Manitoba and the Northwest, in favor of tariff reform. These petitions stated that the signers could not advise their friends in the old country to ome to Canada under the existing burdens of the tariff. (Hear, hear.) There was hardly an industry, said Mr. There was hardly an industry, said Mr. McCarthy, fostered by the N. P. with regard to which there was not a monopoly. It was the fashion newadays to refer to the total output of our industries as the result altogether of the N. P. Mr. Foster himself had taken that position. But there were many industries before the N. P. was ever thought of. Still there were more industries in existence and more hands employed. The census told them that the number of hands employed had increased between 1881 and 1891 by 110, 000. He did not believe this to be true, because in 1891 the enumerators were paid for finding out industries at so much a head, and in 1881 they were not; and probably the returns of 1881 were under the mark, and cortainly the returns of 1891 were far over the mark. In fact, in this regard he believed the census of 1891—the last census—was worthless as a statistical record. ("Hear, hear" from the Opposition.) of the tariff. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. McCarthy proceeded to demonstrate to the House the amount of the taxes taken rom the farmer in regard to some articles from the farmer in regard to some articles and put into the pockets of the manfacturer by the taril. The farmers' raw material was taxed. He based his whole argument on the fact that the home article produced in Canada is sold at a price in excess of its value, and the consumer pays 30 per cent. more than the article should cost if there were no tariff or a light tariff on these articles. To show how the home manufacturers agreed together to fix prices and take advantage of the tariff, he read a letter stating that the four manufacturers of barbed wire in Canada inad combined together and entered into a bond to obey the orders of a central board, which fixed prices and allotted the territory and regulated the trade.

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Taking up the question of the measure cluding the towns of Barrie, Orillia and Collingwood, within his personal knowledge, said. Mr. McCarthy, this district had fewer manufacturing industries than it had ten years ago. That district and these towns hadn't, he knew, derived the slightest benefit from the N. P.

with the Imperial Federation scheme of preferential duties between England and France, Mr. McCarthy said he voted for that last year when Mr. McNeil's resolution was passed, but he had not at the time thought that any great good would come of it. They should not wait for the contigency that Great Britain might some day subscribe to that policy, but at once declare in favor of rewarding Great Britain for admitting out goods free by admitting British goods on reduced duties. The spirit of tariff reform was spreading all over. Practically the people of the United States had adopted free trade.

Mr. McCarthy continued: "When our tariff has been lowered to a revenue basis there will be enough left for us to come down a peg lower still in return for prefer ential trade with England, should it eve ential trade with England, should it ever come about. If we were guaranteed \$1 a bushel for our wheat in England, I am prepared to admit in return every British product free. Speaking of the recent effort in the British Parliament to permanently schedule Canadian cattle in England, Mr. McCarthy asked why should England not schedule our cattle? That effort was inspired by the growth of protectionist ideas caused by the fact that the condition of the British farmers to-day was worse than those of any other part of the world. (Conservative cheers.)

Turning to the plea for delay in tariff Turning to the plea for delay in taring reform put forward by the Government Mr. McCarthy declared that he was very much dissatisfied with the promises of the Government. He read from recent speeches of members of the Government to show that while Mr. Ouimet in Soulanges told the people that the N. P. had been a success and would be continued, Sir John Thompson in Toronto had promised to lop the mouldering branch away. In this latter sense they had tinkered at the tariff nearly every year. Then they asked the people to wait and see what was done at Washington, and asked their supporters in caucus to wait and see what was done at Washington. He condemned this policy of waiting on Washington. He did not believe in any event that the Government intended to abandon the policy of protection, and he was opposed to the continuance of that policy. That was the line of cleavage. He expressed confidence in President Cleveland, and looked forward to the time when we could secure reciprocal trade with the United States.

Dealing with his proposition to reduce at once the duties on British goods it would, said Mr. McCarthy, involve a loss at first sight of \$3,000,000 in revenue, but increased importation at reduced rates would recompense for that loss. In concluding shortly after 9 o'clock (after speaking for three and a half hours), Mr. McCarthy referred to his past course on the fiscal question by quoting a speech he made in 1877—his first speech in Parliament—to show that he never pretended to be a protectionist although he had supported the establishment of the N. P. in 1878. He dwelt for a moment on the unequal distrition of wealth—the few rich and the many proor—and called on them to condemn a system under which this was made possible. Mr. McCarthy was loudly cheered on resuming his seat.

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To the surprise of everybody, Mr. Hodgins, the Conservative member for Hodgins, the Conservative member for the Conservative hive of Carleton county, which lies almost in the shadows thrown by the Parliament buildings at Ottawa, seconded the resolution. Mr. Geo. Taylor, the Conservative whip, at once left his seat and approached Mr. Hodgins and began to argue with him. The attention of Mr. McCarthy was drawn to this attempt to seduce his seconder, and he smiled, while the House cheered and laughed so that Mr. Taylor, thus detected, left Mr. Hodgins alone.

PRESEYTERY OF LONDON.

A Vacancy in the Pulpit of London East.

What the Various Churches Within the Bounds Raised Last Year-Other Important Business.

The Presbytery of London met in the First Presbyterian Church, city, on Tuesday afternoon, Rev. J. Currie, of Belmont, moderator, presiding. The Presbytery opened with public worship. Minntes of previous meetings were read and the cierk instructed to insert a reference made from Kintyre session at the January meeting. As thus amended the minutes were sustained. Mr. Ball, of Vanneck, was appointed moderator for the next six months. Messrs. J. A. Murray, Munro, McIntyre, Wilson, Kelso, Ball, Clark, Henderson (ministers), and D. McKay, G. Stevenson, J. Scott, G. W. Armstrong, Neil McArthur, Robert Scott, F. Cheesbrough, J. McVicar (elders), were appointed commissioners to the General Assembly.

Mr. D. K. McKenzie, of St. Thomas, stated that Knox Church, in that city, had increased the stipend of their minister to \$2,000. The Presbytery of London met in the

stated that Knox Church, in that city, had increased the silpend of their minister to \$2,000.

Rev. W. M. Roger, of London East, laid his resignation of that charge before the Presbytery, and in so doing briefly reviewed his work in connection therewith. The debt of \$3,000 had been reduced to \$750, and there had been a large growth in the membership. The financial weakness of the congregation, however, had led him to take this step. In connection with this resignation the report of the committee appointed to visit London East was read. Six hundred dollars was raised last year for stipend, but the session and board of managers did not encourage the committee to hope for an increase. The committee recommended: 1. That in case of a vacancy occurring, \$200 should be asked from the augmentation fund. 2. In case of settlement, \$300 be asked for from the fund. It was moved that the resignation of Mr. Roger be received, and the congregation cited to appear before this Presbytery in their interests at the next meeting of Presbytery that may be held. Carried. It was resolved that the amount of aid from the augmentation fund to London East for the expiring six months be applied for, viz. \$100; and that for the ensuing six months, at the rate of \$200, be applied for in case of vacancy, and \$300 in case of settlement.

It was resolved that for Aylmer, application be made for \$100 for the expiring six months, and \$150 for the ensuing year.

1. That a better method of distributing blank forms be adopted, so that all blanks for the year should be sent together. This was dropped. 2. That the subject of Sabbath observance shall occupy a prominent place in the programmes of young people's societies, in the work of the Sabbath school and in the pulpit. Carried. 3. That the people be instructed to spend Saturday in such a way as to make it as much as possible preparatory to the Sabbath. Carried.

Mr. Armstrong gave notice of motion that in future deputations from Presbytery should have their expenses paid out of the Presbytery fund.



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

NEW IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS. In view of the fact that cholera may prevail in Europe this year, the United States Government has issued more stringent regulations regarding the admission of immigrants. No vessel bringing immigrants from ports where contagions or infectious diseases prevail will be admitted to entry unless the United States consular officer at the port of departure certifies that the immigrants have been detained at the port of embarkation at least five days under medical observation, in specially designated barracks or houses set apart for their exclusive use, and that their clothing, baggage and personal effects have been disinfected before being placed on board. These rebefore being placed on board. These else strictions will also be applied to vessels bringing immigrants from non-infected ports, but who come from infected localities. A vessel captain must be prepared to give to the commissioner of immigration full particulars regarding every immigrant whether or not he has paid his own passage, or has been aided by society, almshouse, or Government in any country; whether he is a polygamist; whether he is under contract, express or im plied, to work for anyone. These lists nust be read to and signed by the immi-

EVOLUTION. D'Alton McCarthy's arraignment of protection in the Dominion House of Commons is one of the strongest indictments that has yet been brought against the class law by which this Dominion has been ruled for the past fourteen years. Not because Mr. Mc-Carthy has said anything that has not been said again and again from the Liberal side of the House. We must bear in mind the position of the member for North Simcoe. For many years he was the right hand man of Sir John Macdonald. He was the president of the Conservative Association of Ontario, and while he remained in that position his leader pointed to him as "the brains of the Conservative party." He now says that he can no longer follow the lead of the men who are prepared to sacrifice the interests of the many that the few may profit, and in his speech he gives ample grounds for the new departure.

The policy of "protection" was doomed before D'Alton McCarthy came out from among those who, for party reasons, indorse it. Degrees in Dentistry.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

Since my return from Philadelphia I have been asked so many times regarding the law relating to the conferring of degrees and licenses in the profession of dentistry that I deem the subject of sufficient interest to write this short explanatory note. There are two degrees in dentistry in Canada, the first L. D. S., Licentiate of Dental Surgery, is conferred by the board of directors of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons. No one can engage in the practice of the profession without this degree. For many years it was the only degree obtainable in Canada. Some seven or eight years ago the R. C. of D. S. affiliated with Toronto University, and since that time all those who possess the title of L. D. S. can beexamined at the examinations held by the Toronto University for degrees in medicine, law and dentistry, and if successful, they have the additional degree of D. D. S., Doctor of Dental Surgery conferred. Respecting the United States the degree D. S. is conferred by reputable colleges after examination consequent upon attendance at a term of lectures extending over three years, each term consisting of not less than five months. Thus it is that you read of young men both in Canada and the United States passing their primary, junior or senior examination, as the case may be. In all reputable colleges a degree from another college is equivalent to attendance at two terms of lectures; hence as I possessed the degree of L. D. S., I was allowed to come up for examination at the Philadelphia Dental College after five months' attendance at lectures and clinics. It would be impossible to procure an abatement of any of this time. This is the law. 


