Ultimatum to Turkey.

London, May 4. - The British ambassador at Constantinople, Sir Nicholas R. O'Connor, yesterday presented a note to Turkey demanding the prompt withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Egyptian territory. The note is practically an ultimatum, and constitutes Great Britain's last word on the encroachment of Turkey on the Sinaitic peninsula. The French and Russian ambassadors at Constantinople are supporting the British contentions. Should the ultimatum fail to have the desired effect, the British Mediterranean fleet will take the measure so often employed by the powers in recent years, as the result of disputes with the Sultan, and a naval demonstration, it is anticipated, will quickly bring about the evacuation of the



PHAROAH'S HARD HEART

Paris, May 3.—A chemical analysis made by Profs. Lortet, Hugounenq and Renaut at the instance of the directors of the Louvre Museum, which recently acquired four ancient blue enamel vases hermetically sealed said to contain the remains of the Egyptian King Rameses II., has led to the discovery that one of the vases contains the real heart of the Egyptian soversign the Pharoah of the persecution

of the Jews. In the other three vases were found bandages containing filaments supposed to be the remains of the viscera of the dead monarch, but the fourth contained a bony, oblong object, which a chemical examination made out as the heart of the ancient Egyptian king.

After 3,000 years it is only natural that the organ should have become ossified, according to the professors.

It is now in the shape of a medallion five inches by three in size, and pieces detached from it with a razor showed that it contained the same fibrous substance that composes the human

The king's tongue, somewhat similar in composition, is still to be observed in the mummy preserved in the Egyptian museum at Cairo, so no doubt can be entertained as to the identity of the organ just discovered. Rameses II. died in B. C. 1258.






