

The King and Queen Snapshotted to Please the Newspapermen.







With the exception of Saturday, there was not a great deal of business transacted during the past week. The wet weather was doubtless the cause of the light offerings of farm produce. Sales as a rule were brisk in every line, with the exception of apples and potatoes. Prices Grain-Oats are selling mostly at \$1 10

per cwt. Barley brings \$1 03 per cwt. Wheat is slow, at 70c per bu. Hay and Straw-The supply of hay i hardly equal to the demand; consequently sales are brisk for everything offered; prices are firm, at \$13 to \$14 per ton, mostly at the higher figure. Straw is

Butter and Eggs-Butter is coming in more freely; the demand is good, at 23c to 24c for crocks, and 24c to 25c for choice pound rolls in basket lots. Eggs are in good demand, at 25c to 30c per dozen, the latter price for strictly fresh-laid.

Potatoes-Most people have laid in their supply for the winter, consequently there is a slow sale for what is being offered at present; prices are easier, at 70c to 75c per bag by the load, and 80c for smaller

Apples-Sales are slow, at \$1 50 to \$2 per barrel for hand-picked; for common stock, 40c to 50c per bu, and 50c to 70c per bag.
