Italian War Office Announces Retirement to the Border.

TO EVACUATE PLATEAU

Berlin Claims 30,000 Prisoners and 300 Guns Captured.

Berlin, Oct. 26-(Via London).-The Austro-Germans in their offensive on the Isonzo front have captured more than 30,000 Italians, the war office announced today. More than 300 guns also were taken.

Rome, Oct. 26-Under the Austro-German pressure on the Isonzo front, the Italians have withdrawn their lines to the border in one sector and are preparing for the evacuation of the Bainsizza plateau, the war office announced today.

The text of the statement reads:

"The hostile offensive against our left wing on the Julian front continued Wednesday night and yesterday, conducted by powerful forces. From Montmagniere to the west of Auzza we have withdrawn on our boundary line, in consequence of which we had to provide for the evacuation of the Bainsizza Plateau.

"East of Gorizia and on the Carso the situation in unchanged.

Montreal, Oct. 26 .- A part of the plant Copenhagen. ANOTHER SMASH IN FLANDERS; BRITISH AND FRENCH AGAIN **PUSH INTO KAISER'S LINES**

THE WAR SITUATION

From the heights of the Alsne the German crown prince is being driven back relentlessly toward the fortress of Laon, and perhaps to a general retreat along a line from St. Quentin to the Champagne. His strongholds wrenched from him, 12,000 of his troops prisoners, many thousands slain and wounded, and 120 big guns lost, the predicament of the crown prince is most serious.

General Petain's great smash of Tuesday opened the way for further advances, and Thursday under French pressure the Germans were forced back to the Oise-Alsne Canai, evacuating valuable positions in their retirement. More than 2,000 additional prisoners, and many big guns fell into French hands.

Laon, the fortress at the southern end of the Hindenburg line, is now but eight miles from the French lines, and eight miles from the French lines, and Petain's big gung can smash it at will. East of Chavignon, the centre of the French advance, stretches the Allette River, on the southern bank of which the Germans have been fighting desperately to hold back the French for several months. From the newly-captured positions the French can sweep the German defences with torrents of artiliery fire. Every foot gained by General Petain in the Chavignon sallent weakens the line northward through Lafere to St. Quentin, The French already are on three sides of Lafere and St. Quentin has all but fallen into Allied hands several times since the German retreat of last spring. A retirement from St. Quentin and La Fere to a line running north from Laon, would endanger the entire German positions on the western front, as far north as ypres.

Probably the two most important salients on the western front from the sea to Verdun are those east of Ypres and south-southwest of Laon. Field Marshal Haig is hammering at the one, and General Petain is smashing through the other. A German retirement all along the line might result in surprising eventualities, and there are reports from Germany that such action is not without the realm of possibility.

British Front in Belgiam, Oct. 26—(By the Associated Press).-Field Marshal Haig's forces this morning made two separate attacks on the German positions north and east of Ypres. The first was from a point near Saint Jansbeek, westward through the southern fringe of the Houthulst Ridge, to the region of Nieuwemolen. The other assault was on both sides of the Ypres-Menin highway, along the Gheluvelt Ridge, in the direction of the town of that

EXCELLENT HEADWAY. The British troops, as well as the French, who also attacked on the left, made excellent headway, pushing

forward on a wide front. A group of enemy guns on the high ground southeast of Gheluvelt, constituting one of the main defences, was comparatively quiet. This possibly was due to the British heavy bombardment last night. Many explosions were seen in the region of these batteries during the night.

A GREAT BARRAGE. Again one of the greatest barrages yet seen was employed by the attackers. The preliminary bombardment was made more effective by the recent moving forward of the guns over the marshy ground. A brisk wind had dried the ground wonderfully.

The Germans had been expecting an attack and had made preparations for an assault on Monday, Military observers say the Germans had long feared an attack in this dominating region.

CARRIED A London, Oct. 26.—Shortly before 7 o'clock this morning British forces which began an offensive on the Ypres front were seen entering German pill boxes upon Belleville spur, and shortly afterwards signals showed that the British had carried Poelderhoek Chateau, which had been strongly fortified by the Germans, telegraphs the correspondent of Reuter's, Limited, at British headquar-

VILLAGE, WOOD, FARMS TAKEN.

Paris, Oct. 26 .- The village of Draeibank, Papegood Wood and a number of fortified farms were captured by the French in an attack launched this morning on the Flanders front, the war office reports. Hundreds of prisoners were taken.

CROSSED TWO RIVERS. The French forced a crossing of two rivers, wading through water up to their shoulders. On the Aisne front the ground newly won is being consolidated and no important fighting occurred during the night.

The Germans renewed their attacks in the Verdun sector and were again beaten back, suffering large losses.

In Belgium we attacked at 6 o'clock this morning the German positions between Dreigrachten and Draeibank. Our troops crossed the St Jansbeck and the Coverbeck, with the water up to their shoulders, and made important progress, in spite of the difficulty of the ground. The village of Draeibank, Papegoed Wood, and numerous farms organized as points of support, fell into our hands. We took hundreds of prisoners.

Montreal, Oct. 25.—The College of Surgeon Dentists of the province of Quebec at its annual meeting yesterday, voted almost unanimously in favor of abolishing the rule prohibiting newspaper advertising by dentists. Failing the thirty days notice which would be necessary to make the vote immediately effective, the motion must now be passed on by the board of governors. Favorable action by the board is expected.

POTATOES AND PROFITS.

PRICES of potatoes seem none too inclined to shoot downward, in spite of greater production in the towns and cities. Reasons are obvious. Other prices are high. The machinery of food distribution has been developed by profiteers. That was pointed out by this paper in 1911 as a certain result to be expected from a rule by Borden and the Toronto financiers.

The farmers, somewhat isolated and organizing with difficulty, have had little chance against the organized market control. The farmers as a rule make poor profits for the amount of hard labor and intelligence which they devote to their calling. Many an amateur "potatriot" in the towns is learning this year how much it is worth to him in time and money to grow with his ownhands the winter's store of tubers. He dug and hoed, and sprayed for bugs and blight, and in this mean, unusual fall season is experiencing the

HOUSEKEEPING IS A BUSINESS. ECONOMICAL COOKING IS A SCIENCE.

Our Consumers' League

"There is one kind of hygienic sinner very frequently seen who has been missed up to the present in the Consumers' League column," said Mrs. O'R—, the other day. (That doesn't happen to be the lady's name), but she insists up-

the other day. (That doesn't happen to be the lady's name), but she insists upon it for what she calls "limelight purposes.")

"Yes," continued Mrs. O'R—, "when you and your contributors were getting after the street cars and car conductors, the deliverymen who deliver bread with their driving gloves, and the rest of the 'sinners' who are a menace to public health, you entirely overlooked the people who insist upon running all the risks they possibly can. I mean the people who have never outgrown the infant habit of putting things in their mouths. Talk about a street car conductor holding a transfer in his mouth, or moistening his thumb with saliva to detach it from the rest of the pile, I have seen a woman take the transfer from such a conductor and, what do you think? Hold it in her own teeth while she buttons her glove or collects her parcels. You know perfectly well that it is not an uncommon sight to see a woman while she is waiting for a 'pay-as-you-enter car.' common sight to see a woman while she is waiting for a 'nay-as-you-enter car,' tear her ticket from the rest, then hold it in her mouth till she closes her purse again securely. And money! All the women I have seen hold change in their mouths! I am sorry to say it is my own sex. I can't recall seeing a man do such a thing. We hear of infection through money. Just think how infinitely the danger is increased when people are careless enough to make purses of their mouths! Then there is the individual who insists upon cheating lead appeller. mouths! Then, there is the individual who insists upon chewing lead pencils— (the editor had a guilty twinge of conscience at this point)—whether they belong to them or not. "I saw a couple of school girls buy lead pencils on the street one day a year or so ago from a man who had all the marks of tuberquiosis at an advanced stage. One girl immediately poked the pencil in her mouth while she searched for five cents to pay for it.

"But one of the most shocking things and senseless things along this line that I ever witnessed was right at the Western Fair in London."

"An unclean, diseased-looking man was selling toy whistles in the form of bird with a tiny balloon attached. The balloon blew up when the whistle was blown and, by the way, the whistle was like the trill of a bird. A little boy of perhaps four years old, was attracted by the wonderful toy and coaxed his mother, an intelligent-looking, smartly dressed woman, to buy a "birdie" for him. She stopped the vendor and asked the price, announcing she would take one. The vendor drew one from his basket. The little boy tried it, but the bird refused to carol properly, even when mother tried it.

"Turning to the vendor, the woman said: I think we will take that one you have been blowing. Oh, thank you.' And taking it, she gave it to her sweet clean little boy, who immediately poked the whistle into his mouth to experiment with it. I was shocked, I can tell you, and I was strongly tempted to rush after the careless or ignorant mother and ask her what she was thinking about. But for some reason or another, my common sense failed me, and I didn't do it. It seems to me a very great deal of education is needed along these lines, and that moving pictures might be used to advantage for this purpose, as they are to show the danger of flies and so on

"Even if people are exposed to germ dangers on all sides, they needn't run any more risks than are absolutely necessary. They can at least do their part to protect themselves and the public."

WHAT EVERY WOMAN SHOULD KNOW.

The educational mission, which the moving picture may be made to perform has been adequately demonstrated this week in the infant welfare series en-titled, "Birth," shown to women audiences at the matinee performances all this week at the Patricia Theatre. Every step in the scientific care of a babe from the hour of its birth, is strikingly presented by means of actual pictures taken in a great New York hospital. The proper method of holding a babe to insure for it the maximum of comfort, of bathing, feeding, dressing, are illustrated, and each step explained by the lecturer in charge, who, by the way, is none other than Mrs. H. W. Parsons, widely known through her association with the Women's Institute movement, the National Council of Women the Women's Emergency Corps, in connection with recruiting, etc. Mrs. Parsons' last visit to London was pald several months ago, when she was here in the interests of recruiting in this district, in connection with military headquarters, holding at the time the honorary title of "captain."

Mrs. Stewart had been announced as the lecturer, but owing to inability to come, Mrs. Parsons, an authority on child welfare work, was secured in her

One point emphasized both in the film and lecture is the necessity for ab-olute cleanliness in connection with all operations which concern the baby. This cleanliness must be a cleanliness that is more than looking clean. It must be a scientife fact. Hands must be thoroughly scrubbed before touching the baby's food, and the nail brush used a sterilized one.

Other points emphasized are the necessity for scientific accuracy in the preparation of the infant's food, of absolute regularity in regard to feeding Dressing must be such a deft process that the frail little body may not be exhausted by unnecessary twisting and turning.

Another lesson impressed is the importance of letting the child have all the chance possible to "just grow," quietly and restfully, without being subject to the menace of handling and jostling about by all and sundry. In the pictures, even the mother is warned against kissing the baby, for baby's own best interests. The method of resuscitation employed by a doctor on a tiny infant, after the breath of life had apparently gone, is alone an important feature.

From beginning to end there is not a single sensational feature, as may have been suggested by the title, and the fact that the audiences have been limited to women. The knowledge given is exactly as the advance notices have stated, "What every woman should know about the care of children."

This is an opportunity for learning more about her business of caring for children which no mother of small children can afford to miss, if it is at all posble for her to attend either of the two matinees which still remain this week

Teaching the little people to be particular about their own teeth, hair, and washing themselves properly is one of the later developments in the film. Some week in the near future this whole department will be devoted to telling what is being done in the public schools of London in the way of caring for the eyes teeth and throats of the pupils, boys and girls, still farther advanced in life's journey than the tots which figure in the baby welfare film.

GERMANY "BABY SAVING."

A man who occasionally takes a critical glance at our Consumers' League Department, wanted to know the other day what child welfare had to do with thrift, and so on. "I thought you were out to grapple with the cost of living and conservation problems," he said, "Well," was the reply, "what is more important than conservation of child life, particularly at this time in view of the wastage of war.'

"Search me," he said, with an expression on his face which could be interpreted as plainly as words, "You never know how a woman is going to twist

The subject of child welfare and conservation has been enjoying a few weeks' rest in this department. It has been revived again by the infant welfare film being shown at a local theatre, and also by the announcement that London is to actually have a child welfare exhibition through the co-operation of the Provincial Health Department with the Children's Ald Society. Such an awakening has been taking place in London in regard to the importance of making the city a safer place for babies to be born in than at present, that there is little doubt hearty support will be given by local organizations to the Children's Ald Society in this big project.

By the way, the efficient German hasn't been overlooking the importance of child welfare during the present war. Former Ambassador Gerrard tells that there have been between 7,000 and 8,000 social workers doing infant welfare and other forms of public health work in Berlin Germany, alone. Even if they kill babes of other nations they are particular about saving their own future citizens. Commenting upon this a distinguished American physician says: "We cannot be less vigilant than the enemy in protecting the reservoirs of national

Do you suppose London will be awakened to the stage where it will have public welfare nurse associated with the health department next year? Or will London instead erect monuments to sewers and do humorous things like that which leave no surplus for "fads" such as infant welfare and milk depots?

WHAT'S THE USE?

One of the things which many of the housewives, who are readers of this page are trying to find out is the sense of the new regulation in regard to buying cereals. The first announcement caused quite a panic in a number of small families, which probably do not use twenty pounds of cornmeal, oatmeal or a special brand of prepared breakfast food in a year. When a retail grocer interprets the new regulation as applying to the retailer and not to the consumer, the question again is. "Then what's the sense, if people buy in quantities to meet their needs as formerly, won't they be paying for wrappings just the same

A leading Dundas street grocer shakes his head over the puzzle. "It is going to put the manufacturers of prepared food out of business," he says, adding, "unless they are to be specially licensed to sell in packages as usual. In that case the public will have to pay more for the product in order to cover the extra cost of production. It will be like an extra war stamp (which doesn't seem to help the cost of living very far).

"Perhaps it is," continues the same grocer, "that a blow is being aimed at ready-cooked foods, and this is the beginning of a movement to get back to cereals that people cook for themselves. I think you call this 'stone-ageing' in your column. The cost of fuel is an item to be seriously considered these days, and more than this, the supply of fuel.

"I don't see where much saving is going to be effected, either in food or money. The prepared foods depend largely for their condition and palatableness upon the manner in which they are put up and kept. It wouldn't improve the quality of flaked cereal foods to handle them over and over again."

Riven Jane Wiggins, who has a tendency to be orthodox when it comes to backing up authority, is asking the question, "What is the good of it anyway".



Should You Be Exempt?

Every facility is afforded those who have reasonable ground for applying for exemption under the Military Service Act. Each man's case will be considered by a local, civil board, sitting in the locality where he lives, and will be decided as is desirable in the national interest. The idea behind the Military Service Act is to call up first only those whose absence from civilian occupations will cause least disturbance to the country's economic and social life. One hundred thousand reinforcements-no more-are to be raised under the Act.

Cases of Exemption

Over 1,250 civic tribunals have been organized throughout Canada, known as Exemption Tribunals. These boards are comprised of 2 members, one appointed by the county judge and one by a joint committee of Parliament. It will be seen that these tribunals are non-military and independent. The members are men closely acquainted with conditions in the places where they sit and will be able to give each case sympathetic attention.

National Interest Will Govern Exemptions

Consideration will be given to applications for exemption received from men engaged in the production or manufacture of commodities necessary to the conduct of the war and the support of those at home and cases in which real hardship would be caused by the withdrawal. Not all men who register these claims will be exempted, but such claims will receive careful consideration. National interest must govern.

Promptness is Essential


Prompt application for exemption is strongly urged upon all who, being included in the first class, believe they deserve exemption. But first visit a Medical Board and find out if any further action is required. Unless the Medical examination places you in Category A., you will have no immediate obligation for service.

Dr. J. W. Robertson, Hanna's Chief Adviser, Voices Opinion.

CALGARY, Oct. 25 .- Dr. J. W. Robrtson, chief adviser to Food Controller Hanna, speaking in the Central Methodist Church last night, predicted that dist Church last night, predicted that before next spring the consumption of beef would be prohibited. 

The Germans had found it impossible to get the weapons away over the marshes adjoining the Aisne Canal, over which most of the bridges had been destroyed, making the retreat of artillery impracticable.

Hundreds of machine guns were captured by the French, and many of them were turned on the fleeing Germans, who had left plenty of amunition behind. It is reported that 150 cannon have fallen into French hands, but the number is uncertainty applies to the condition of the battlefield and its width.
