Los Angeles, Dec. 5.—James B. Mc. Mamara, confessed murderer, was sentenced to life imprisonment here today by Judge Walter Bordwell.

His brother, John J. McNamara, secretary of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, who confessed to the dynamiting of the Llewellyn iron works, was sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary.

Twenty-one lost their lives in the Times disaster. No one was killed in the Llewellyn iron works affair.

"James B. McNamara, defendant in the case of the People, having heretofore plend guilty to the crime of murder, desire to make this statement, and clock, I placed in Ink Alley, a portion of the Times building, a suitcase cone that the suitcase cone that the works of 80 per cent dynamite, set to explode at 1 o'clock the next morning. It was my intention to injure the building and scare the owners. I did not intend to take the life of anyone. I sincerely regret that those unfortunate men lost their lives.
