RESTRICTIONS ON Stole a Kiss, COAL SHIPMENTS BE ORDERED Chicago Man Could Not Resist

Board of Railway Commissioners Is Considering Action.

Effect To Conserve Supply.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, July 14,—It is expected here that the board of railway commissioners will tomorrow promulgate orders looking towards the conservation and supplementing of coal supplies for Canada, and Central Canada, in particular. The prohibition of exports from Eastern Canada, excepting to the United States and Newfoundland, is in contemplation. states and Newfoundland, is in contemplation.

The board is also considering the prohibition of the bunkering at any Atlantic port, excepting Sydney, of steamships crossing the Atlantic, with the exception of passenger steamships.

By the above regulations it is anticipated that some 50,000 tons of bituminous coal per month can be brought from Nova Scotia to Montreal and St. Lawrence points. It is also anticipated that large quantities of American coal now used for bunkering at Montreal will be released for domestic and industrial purposes.

The board of railway commissioners was vested with the function of fuel control last session. In the United States the interstate commerce commission has control, and has in addition to prohibiting exports from Atlantic ports to Europe established a strict system of priorities.



PRESENT GOVERNMENT HAS NO MORAL RIGHT TO RETAIN OFFICE

Ottawa July 14 - The Ottawa Citizen says in part The new cabinet is announced, with Mr. Arthur Meighen as prime minister. What mandate has the Government received from the people of Canada? This Government has no mandate. Until it has been indorsed by the electorate in a general election it has no moral right to rule over the Canadian people. 'It is merely trifling with the principle of responsible government to

talk of by-elections. Ten cabinet ministers have gone since Sir Robert Borden formed Union Government for war purposes in 1917. "Canada is now being ruled by a new government, calling itself the Government of the National Liberal and Conservative Party. The people have not been consulted in the matter, any more than the people of Russia were consulted when Messrs. Lenine and Trotzky set up the dictatorship of the proletariat in Moscow. Canada's latest rulers have simply assumed power under the premiership of Mr. Arthur Meighen.

"A statement is due from Mr. Meighen. The people of Canada are entitled to know when they are to be consulted. This statement of the date of the general election should have been made simultaneously with the announcement of the new cabinet. Until the general election is announced Canada is being ruled by caucus dictatorship, which differs only in degree from soviet dictatorship.'

Farmers stated to The Advertiser today that warm, weather for the next week is the thing that can save the hay already cut. Some of it is already turning black, they say.

WHERE THE OFFENCE IS.

New wheat going at \$4 a bushel in Baltimore sounds ominous for the cost of living in the near future. Some tell us that prices are soen going to drop, but every day's news tells another story up to date. Coal, clothes, bread and butter are not dropping. "It is unpleasant," ne said, "or trades union officials to be asking wage increases every few months to keep pace with the cost of living. If the Government would ase a strong hand and smash profiteering, wages will assume an amount of stability."

An American economist, W. Jett Lauck, who has recently made an expose of the whole mater of prices and wages, charges that every shareholder in companies earning excess profits recent years is a profiteer. Mr. Lauck's figes, taken from company reports and from ederal income tax returns, are quite convincing that extortionate prices have not been apprecibly due to wage increase. But his remark on he shareholders lacks precision. He should ay, at most, holders of common stock that as been heavily bonused. They are, of course, ne real shareholders of any concern, though rhaps in many cases they have paid next nothing for their stock, which is largely ater. Preferred shareholders are, as such, no ore than lenders of money to the holders of nmon stock. They receive a fixed rate of dividend," no less, no more, if they are lucky nd, indeed, have all along suffered and connue to suffer from the diminishing value of heir investment, due to the rising cost of livng. They are not profiteers, not plunderers, but e plundered. If Mr. Lauck does not consider se as really shareholders, he is no doubt ight, but as ordinarily people owning preferred ock are regarded as shareholders, his statent that all shareholders in those prosperous npanies are profiteers is misleading.

When governments take in hand the ofiteering concerns and limit their rapacity. will be advisable also to do something to proet the honest investors, the preferred stockolders, who have provided the real whereithal to make the wheels of industry go. They not the enemies but the pillars of the inastrial community. That they have been owing wary of late, however, and that they ruire an increased rate of interest because of reased everything else, is seen in the now lite usual offers of 25, 40, 50 per cent of comn stock along with preferred, 8 per cent widend in place of the old usual 7 and even al "participation" in profits. some instances at rates of 7 and 8 per cent. This may not be for the general good of the public, but one foot of the whole matter is the profiteering of a few. Stop that and wages will end to become more stable and the rise of interest checked. Where the offence really is, let he great axe fall.

King Has Made Good.

The terms of the new policy have already been sent to the Globe by the Associated Press, but Canadians who have watched Mr. King's steady progress as a student of industrial problems and a leader in industrial reform will be gratified to know that, in dealing with this most gigantic problem of capital and labor at the time and place where strikes, murders, civil war and two hundred indictments were the chief features, he has made abundantly good, justified his own decision of last year, brought honor to Canada's department of labor, which he established on ic foundations, and gives promise of even larger services in industry and politics in which Canada will share just as beneficially as the United States.

Mackenzie King will always be a Canadian, makes his headquarters in Ottawa, gives only a part of his time to the Foundation's work outside of Canada, and holds his added study and wider experience for the loyal service of his native country. Certain if this new ex-periment in Colorado achieves what its initial ospect promises, not Canada alone but the whole industrial world will have cause for gratitude that the misfortune of politics in 1911 left Mackenzie King's hand free for a while to tackle a big man's job.

I have here, also, a letter from Mr. J. F. Welrn, president of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company of Denver, Colorado, which gives a statement from the company's point of view; and presents the significance of the work as it has grown with time. I do not wish to read this letter to the House, though if it were not taking up time unduly should feel it a privilege to do so. I should be pleased if it might be permitted to appear on Hansard along with the other communication. There is one point in this letter to which I should like to direct attention. Mr. Welborn shows that as a result of the industrial councils formed that when the United States came into the war, the coal production in the mines of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company exceeded per man per day that of any of the other coal mines in the United States; and he attributes that success to the joint relations of capital and labor under the plan of industrial representation as drawn up.

Letter From Mr. J. F. Welborn. The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company,

Denver, Colorado J. F. Welborn.

December 20, 1919.

My Dear Mr. King .-In the hope that it will be of interest to you and possibly to your friends, I will set forth briefly the work done by our company under new policies inaugurated at your suggestion and operated in accordance with your advice. In doing so I have thought it proper to review

the method of adoption of those policies. You will recall that the coal strike of 1913in Colorado was called off in December, Immediately thereafter, following out your suggestion, we asked employees at each of the coal mines to select one or more of their number to represent them at joint meetings with company officials for the purpose of discussing matters of mutual concern, and of considering means of more effective co-operation in maintaining fair and friendly rela-In response, representatives were chosen by secret ballot, the initial meeting between them and company officials being

held early in January, 1915. Frequent conferences between the different company officials and employees' representatives, both individually and collectively, followed, and at a joint meeting of these representatives and company officials held in October, 1915, the plan of representation of employees and memorandum of agreement between them and the company (of which you made the first draft, and rendered valuable assistance in perfecting) were approved, subject to adoption by the coal mine employees and the board of directors of the company. Both of these actions were taken soon thereafter, the vote of the employees being by secret ballot, and showing a majority of over 84 per cent in favor of the adoption of the plan. pian. The total number voting approximated 75 per cent of the regular working force. It is, perhaps, only fair to say that some of the officials of the company, as well as some of the mine workmen, entertained the feeling that it would be impossible or impracticable to make the principles laid down in the industrial plan effective. 



tee attributed the conditions to the later that the storm sewer bylaw was turned down by the ratepayers at the last election, and that the amended plans for a reduced storm sewer system were turned down by the Legislature. Ald. F. R. Watkinson did not concur in this opinion, maintaining that the fault was in the construction of the sewers.


