London, April 19 .- Owners of coal mines throughout the United Kingdom met here today, and it was expected that Prime Minister Lloyd George would submit to the conference suggestions which might lead to a prompt renewal of negotiations with striking miners for the settlement of the wage controversy. A formal conference with the miners' leaders was not expected until Friday, when a general conference of the union's leaders will be held here, but there appeared to be a belief that means might be found to bring the parties to the conflict together without great delay.

Ontario Referendum Workers So Elated Over Result That They Will Next Ask Dominion Government To Prohibit the Manufacture of Liquors for Exportation-Dr. A. S. Grant Predicts That Entire Dominion Will Be "Bone Dry" Within Five Years.

MAJORITY OF 200,000.

Toronto, April 19.—The returns received by the Dominion Alliance up to midday showed a sweeping "dry" victory. Almost every county in the province has given a "yes" majority, and thirteen of the twenty-four cities of the province have voted to prohibit the importations of liquor. The aggregate majorities so far compiled is about 140,000, and, according to Rev. Ben H. Spence, secretary of the alliance, will reach or exceed 200,000 when full returns are in.

Conciliatory Attitude of Lloyd George Creates Distinctly Favorable Impression.

DECLINES TO BE HURRIED

Premier Refuses To Consider Legislation Curtailing the Trade Union Privileges.

LONDON, April 18 .- While the strike of the coal miners still continues there is a distinctly favorable atmosphere to be observed in London regarding a settlement. The prime minister in the House of Commons today was very conciliatory and declined to be hurried by recent happenings into legislation curtailing the privileges of trades unions. Indeed, on this subject Mr. Lloyd George was pronounced in the expression of his belief, declaring: "Nothing would provoke more serious ndustrial trouble than an attack upon the privileges conceded from time to time to the trades unions."

No Pooling of Profits.

The prime minister was firm on the question of a national pool of profits which he asserted was impossible, but he admitted that some of the wage proposals of the mine owners-were inlefensible and ought to be amended. and, in reiterating that the Government agreed with the principle of a national wage settlement, he expressed the hope that a plan would be evolved whereby the miners would have a "real interest" in the prosperity of their industry.

Seventeen Government Vessels Business On Canada's Lakes.

OTTAWA, April 18 .- There was 17 essels in service or under construction for the Government, which are capable of passing through the canals and doing business on Canada's inland waters, J. E. 

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux Proposes Scrutiny of Estimates Before They Are Tabled.

LOST BY PARLIAMENT

Remedy Adoption of Committee As Established in

throughout the Dominion.

Control of expenditure gave rise to considerable debate. Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, who brought it up, proposed that before estimates are tabled, they should be scrutinized by a special committee of the House. After having won, the control of expenditures—Mr. Lemieux argued—Parliament had lost it to the cabinet. The remedy was establishment of a committee, such as had been established by the British House—a committee which had made enormous savings for the mother country.

country.

Economy Needed.

Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, agreed on the necessity for ecenomy, but held that it was difficult to arrive at a definite conclusion regarding the British committee, since that committee had ceased to function. And Sir George Foster pressed the point that, for such a committee as the one proposed really to study the estimates, it would be necessary for it to sit before session. It was doubtful if this was practicable, and members of the committee would thus find themselves in an unknown country.

Mr. Lemieux withdrew his resolution.

The resolutions for a new bridge over the St. Lawrence River at Mont-real and for placing Hansards in post-offices were also withdrawn, after dis-

OTTAWA, April 18.—The House of Commons this morning took up a motion by Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux (Maisonneuve and Gaspe) asking that the estimates of the various Government departments be dealt with by a committee before being laid on the table of the House. committee before being laid on the table of the House.

Mr. Lemieux sald that he did not propose his resolution in a party spirit, his object was to expedite business and save money, thereby reducing the taxation on the Canadian people. The expenditure of Canadia previous to the war was increasing, but during the war it reached enormous proportions. The time had come now to retrench in every possible way. With a population, which, at the next census, would be in the neighborhood of nine millions, Canada had a debt of some three billion dollars.

revenue fund.

The House of Commons, after having won the control of expenditure, ad subsequently lost it to the cabiet. There were very few reductions nade in the votes as presented to Paragraphics. made in the votes as presented to Far-liament, partly because a motion to re-duce an estimate was regarded as a vote of want of confidence. Further, the discussion of grievances took so much time that millions of dollars were voted in a friendly way at the end of

voted in a friendly way at the end of the session.

The remedy for this situation, as Mr. Lemieux saw it, was to be found in a committee similar to one established in the British House of Commons, first in 1912, and later in 1917 and 1918. The committee had as its function the analysis and scrutiny of expenditures, and under the chairmanship of Sir Herbert Samuel it had meant enormous savings for the country. So successful had been its work and so urgent was the need for it that Sir Herbert Samuel had regarded it as a patriotic duty to urge its continuance to deal with expenditures after the war.

ance to deal with expenditures after the war.

Economy and Efficiency.

Briefly, the appointment of such a standing committee by the Government at the earliest possible period of each session would make for economy and efficiency. It would prevent any possibility of fraud and waste, and nothing involving expenditure of public money should be considered by the House unless previously scrutinized by that estimates committee. The House would know also, through that committee, the financial consequences of any legislation introduced in the House. It had often happened that a sum of five or ten thousand dollars for a public building or wharf had been passed without much discussion. The following year, however, saw that the item had gone to fifty or sixty thousand dollars. The estimates committee would be the official informer of the House. It would be the watchdog of the treasury, and after a while the Government itself would be grateful to the committee for the protection it gave to the exchequer.

F. L. Davis (Neepawa) supported

F. L. Davis (Neepawa) supported the resolution, claiming that during the last three sessions he had on every possible occasion advocated the establishment of such a committee. In view of abnormal conditions the present seemed a most opportune moment for its creation.

He remarked that it was difficult to tell from the estimates just what the total cost of a single department of the Government amounted to. He closed by suggesting that the proposal should be referred to a special committee of the House.

Most Important Question.

Dr. Michael Clark (Red Deer) described the question raised by Mr. Lemieux as one of the most important ever brought before Parliament. Lavish expenditure by governments was, in his view, one of the greatest contributing causes to the maintenance of high cost of living. It was also one of the main causes leading to the extension of unemployment. The finance minister was very likely looking for some method of raising revenue which would not arouse public protest—he was seeking for some means of plucking the goose without making it squeal. Dr. Clark expressed the hope that in his search he would not be too successful, because that would raise his revenue by righteous methods without regard as to whether they were squealing or not.

Passing to the discussion of the method proposed, Mr. Lemieux remarked that last year the British Government had cut its expenditures by \$2,000,000,000. He had no doubt that the work of the committee cited by Mr. Lemieux had had a great deal to do in making this reduction.





Dr. Belclerc of Paris Perfects protect the heart and lungs, while spec-Idea, But Too Late To Save Himself.

INFROIT'S FATE FEARED

Martyr Finds Lead-Lined Gloves and Metallic Plastrons Are Effective.

PARIS, April 18 .- "It is no longer ecessary to fear the handling of radium MELBOURNE, Ajril 18.—A few weeks ago the missionary committee of the Epworth League of the Methodist Church here suggested that each member earn 25 cents or more for the missionary fund, and that they tell in poetry how the money was arned. John Neal of Battersea, an engineer, was pierced from the left shoulder to the right knee by a steel rod half an inch thick. The accident is considered to be the most unique in the history of medicine here, as the bar had passed right across the man's body, missing all the vital organs and all bones and pro-

ecting through the knee. jecting through the knee.

The surgeons found, however, that they could not extract the bar, so they sent for the plumber, Charles Venables, and in consultation explained the difficulty to him.

After the necessary preliminaries he screwed the stock to the bar, got it into action and grad-ually drew out the long bar while stu-dents and nurses with a big class of interested students in the theatre of the

ing job because the bar had turned after entering the body.

as that of other meats; that is to say. the character of the protein is well suited to the requirements of nutrition. There is an eye disease known as xerophthalmia, sore eyes (conjunctivitis), with great dryness of the eyeball and lack of the normal lustre, which is cured by the liberal use of such foods as fresh liver of chicken, pig, beef, or other animal in the diet.

Young animals do not grow normally or remain healthy if restricted to such meat as beef. They must have vitamins, and there is no better way to supply vitamins than in the form of all liver, kidney, sweetbreads and the like. Glandular tissues, and the fat in and about the glands, are rich in vitamins; whereas the muscle tissues or flesh of the same animal are poor in vitamins. The marrow of bone is of the greatest value for the young growing animal. Children are animals. Any child old enough to have teeth is old enough to gnaw on a bone and suck therefrom the sweet marrow.

Cod liver oil (the fat expressed from the liver of the cod) contains vitamins, which is one reason why it is often good medicine.






