

Chicago, Dec. 27 .- (Compiled by Irwin M. Howe for the Associated Press.)-Boston led the American League again this season in fielding, with .975, maintaining the record established in 1916. A Six-year record of leadership in any single department of play is believed to be unique.

Philadelphia had the greatest number of putouts, 4,200; Chicago the most assists, 2,124; Chicago was also first in double plays, 155; St. Louis had only 7 passed balls, and New York 8; Chicago, Washington, St. Louis and Detroit each turned 1 triple play. This latter feature (four tripe plays in one season) is also unprecedented, and was undoubtedly made possible by the fact that never before was so many men on bases as was the case this year.

One Error for "Stuffy." Prominent among the individual ecords is that of First Baseman Me-Innis of Boston, whose record for the year is .999, he being charged with but one error in 152 games. No other fielding records, either in percentage or accepted chances per game were established, though the scoring was unusually liberal. Indeed, the hitting was so terrific that the averages of all infielders except first basemen is below normal.

For the third straight season, Second Baseman James Dykes of Philadelphia leads in accepted chances per game for men playing his position regularly, being closely pressed for that honor by the veteran Collins of Chicago, who leads in percentage with .975. Dykes's record is 6.17 chances, and Collins's 6.13 game.

With one exception McInnis also led all rivals, accepting chances at first base with 10.86 per game, the leader pase with 10.86 per game, the leader beeing Sheely of Chicago, with 11.40. runner-up was Rice of Washington, first, 119 in 152 games, with George Sisler second with 108 in 138 games.



A left-handed first baseman is always in position to make a throw to any base when a play comes up. Often it is necessary for a right-hander to shift his position before making the throw. The fraction of a second that is lost is often fatal.

When a player catches a ball in his gloved hand, it is often regarded as a grandstand effort. That doesn't go for a first baseman. He, more than any other player on the field, must be an adept at catching balls in his gloved hand. On a great many thrown balls where

On a great many thrown balls where the play is certain to be close, handling of the ball with the gloved hand is the only possible way to win the decision. For that reason any fellow who hopes to make good at first base must be an expert with the gloved hand. That is why I constantly handle thrown balls in practice that way. Some Interesting Dope.

It is also a very good idea for a first baseman to stretch out as far as possible on every throw, without putting himself off his stride. This stretch makes the ball travel a few feet less than if it is received while in an upright position. A few feet often decide the plays at first.






