LAUNCH DRIVE TO AVERT COAL SHORTAGE LOOMING AS MENACE TO INDUSTRIES OF DOMINION

Canadian Manufacturers' Association Calls Meeting Monday To Conduct Survey of Conditions and Discuss Possible Remedies-Railways Carrying One-Tenth of Normal Freight Receipts.

TORONTO, Out., July 28.—Although the anthracite coal situation has so far principally occupied public attention by virtue of its intimate interest to every householder, the commercial fuel outlook is now pressing for urgent consideration.

No scarcity of the bituminous product used for manufacturing, has yet been experienced, but, with an announced shortage in receipts for July of 116,000 tons, and with an estimated shortage of 750,000 tons by the end of August, the prospect is far from reassuring.

In order to fairly appreciate the exact situation, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association has called a meeting for Monday afternoon to conduct a survey of conditions, and to discuss possible remedies.

MONTREAL, July 28.-To rid themselves of the burden of supporting their ten-year-old son, a mother and father "framed" the child and had him arrested on a charge which they hoped would land him in a reformatory for at least two years.

This is the story behind the arrest of a youngster on a charge of having stolen five dollars from his father on a complaint laid by his own mother.

The officials of the juvenile court have taken the lad in hand and are keeping him away from his parents in the belief that he may be severely dealt with if he returns home. Action against the parents is being contemplated.

A few days ago the mother visited the court and asked that the boy be taken into custody as he had stolen \$5 from his father. Court officials advised the woman to bring the boy to the court so that they might question him and deal with him according to the degree of his delinquency. 

The Book of Genesis.

PLEADING FOR more frankness and outspoken honesty in teaching the Bible, REV. J. PATERSON SMYTH, late professor of pastoral theology in the University of Dublin, is bringing out a series of five books. In the first he deals with the Book of Genesis, probably the favorite ground for more discussion and controversy than any other section of Scriptures. When a man's mind burns up with the idea of criticism he just naturally turns to Genesis to get his start.

Dr. Smythe does not tear Genesis to pieces-he rather glories in the simple grandeur of a book that dashes off with a master hand in few bold words the history of a million years. In the beginning God created heaven and earth. We are not enlightened as to the tools and processes by which these things were fashioned, or the period occu



Save petals from roses in full bloom, mince them finely, place in an old iron pot (or pan) with enough water to keep them moist. More chopped petals can be added from time to time until a sufficiency is secured. Stir occasionally, and when reduced to a soft pulpy mass they are ready for molding. Take small quantities of the pulp, squeeze well to remove most of the water, roll between finger and thumb, then

string each bead on a hatpin. Dry slowly. When they become quite hard they are then ready for stringing. The beads, after a few days become surprisingly fragrant rich black color, and a fine polish can be given them by rubbing gently with silk. Famous London Physician Hopes Serum Treatment Will Effect Cure.

LONDON, July 29 .- That influenza s predominantly a germ disease, which can possibly be cured by serum treatment, is the conclusion reached by Dr. James McIntosh, of London, after a lengthy study of the great epidemic of 1918-19, made for the medical research council.

The results obtained by Dr. Mc-Intosh, a report of which today was published, are offered very tentatively. Dr. McIntosh is careful to make no positive claims. Indeed.




