A Message was then received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Beverley R. Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended accordingly, when the Honorable William Black, President of the Legislative Council, said—

*“Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and  
Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to inform you, that he doth not think fit to declare the causes for which he has summoned this General Assembly until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly. It is therefore His Excellency's pleasure, that you, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, do repair to the place where the sittings of the House of Assembly are usually held, and there choose a fit person to be your Speaker; and that you present the person who shall be so chosen to His Excellency, in this House, forthwith, for his approbation.”

And the House being returned—

Mr. Partelow, a Member from the County of Saint John, addressing himself to the Clerk, said—

*“Mr. Wetmore,*

“Having been commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to choose a Speaker, I rise to address you, as Clerk, for the purpose of nominating to that important

important office the Honorable John Wesley Weldon, a Gentleman who had the honor of being unanimously elected thereto during the last House, and the duties of which he discharged with great ability and impartiality.

"I therefore move that he take the Chair."

Mr. Rankin, a Member from the County of Northumberland, then addressed the Clerk, and said—

"In seconding the nomination of Mr. Weldon for the honorable situation of Speaker of the House, it affords me much pleasure to add my testimony to the efficient and disinterested manner in which he filled that Chair during the existence of the last House; I therefore confidently trust that he will be again elected."

The Honorable Mr. Weldon being the only person placed in nomination, was then taken from his seat by Mr. Partelow and Mr. Rankin, and conducted by them to the Chair; and when standing on the step, addressed himself as follows:—

*"Gentlemen,*

"In this expression of your confidence, I return you my sincere thanks.

"In entering upon the discharge of those duties which your kindness and partiality have assigned me, I can only promise you the zealous, and, I trust, the honest devotion of such powers as I possess, to the performance of the duties of the Chair.

"I rely with unreserved confidence upon the kindness, the forbearance and candour of the House; not doubting that in the exercise of those high and generous qualities will be found an efficient remedy for the numerous unintentional errors which my experience admonishes me I shall probably commit.

"Again, accept my thanks with the assurance that I entertain a deep sense of obligation for the honor you have conferred upon me."

Mr. Weldon then took the Chair.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker elect, with the House, went up to the Council Chamber.

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported that he had addressed His Excellency to the effect following:—

*"May it please Your Excellency,*

"The House of Assembly having received Your Excellency's commands, returned to the place where their sittings are usually held, and in the exercise of their undoubted right immediately proceeded to the choice of a Speaker: They have chosen me to fill that important office, and I am presented to Your Excellency for Your Excellency's approbation."

The Honorable Mr. Black, President of the Legislative Council, then spoke as follows:—

*"Mr. Weldon,*

"I am commanded by His Excellency to assure you, that he is fully sensible of your zeal for the public service, and of your sufficiency to execute the duties of the office to which you have been elected by the House of Assembly, and that he doth most readily approve of their choice, and allow and confirm you to be their Speaker."

That he, Mr. Speaker, then further addressed His Excellency in the following words:—

*"May it please Your Excellency,*

"Your Excellency having been pleased to approve of the choice which the Assembly have made in electing me to be their Speaker, it now becomes my duty, on their behalf, and in the name of the Assembly, to claim and demand that they have all their  
ancient

ancient and accustomed rights and privileges, particularly freedom of speech—freedom from arrest—access to Your Excellency whenever the public service may require it—and that the most favorable construction be put upon all their proceedings. On my own behalf, I have to intreat that any error of mine may not be imputed to the House of Assembly.”

To which the President of the Legislative Council replied—

“ *Mr. Speaker,*

“ His Excellency hath the utmost confidence in the loyalty and attachment of this House of Assembly to Her Majesty’s Person and Government, and in the wisdom, temper and prudence which will accompany all their proceedings; and he doth most readily and willingly grant and allow them all their privileges in as full and ample a manner, as they have at any time heretofore been granted and allowed.

“ With respect to yourself, Sir, though His Excellency is sensible that you do not stand in need of such assurance, His Excellency will ever put the most favorable construction on your words and actions.”

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill to increase the Fees of Petit Jurors. Leave granted.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker then further reported, that when in attendance on His Excellency in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, and that he, Mr. Speaker, had, to prevent mistakes, procured a copy thereof, which he read to the House, and is as followeth:—

“ *Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

“ *Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“ **A**S the situation of the Province did not require, after the elections, that I should anticipate the ordinary period for the meeting of the Legislature, I have called you together at this time, with a confident reliance on your disposition to apply yourselves to the business of this first Session in a spirit of unanimity which will attest your zeal for the Public Service.

“ I congratulate you on the abundance of the late Harvest, which has relieved the pressure on the Agricultural Classes occasioned by the failure of the Potato Crop in the preceding year; and while we deeply sympathize with the continued sufferings and privations of so many of our fellow subjects of the United Kingdom, we are bound to acknowledge with thankfulness that the People of this Province have, with few exceptions, been spared from a recurrence of this afflicting visitation.

“ In reflecting on the measures to which it becomes my duty to invite your attention, there are none which impress me with a deeper sense of their importance, than those which have for their object to improve and extend the means of Education for the People. The state of the Parish Schools, and the system under which they have been conducted, was the subject of an elaborate inquiry in 1844, and I need not remind you, that unless timely provision be made for their efficient regulation, training and inspection, there are those who are growing up around us, to whom the loss must soon become wholly irretrievable.

“ From the salutary effects which have elsewhere attended the introduction of an improved system in the management of Prisons, I recommend this subject to your especial notice. The enforcement of discipline, and of effective secondary punishments, under statutory rules, have been found to be conducive, not only to the reformation of offenders, but to the prevention of crime, and essential to the safety of society where the Criminal Laws have been ameliorated.

“ The recent improvements in the Laws of the United Kingdom which provide for the settlement and relief of the Poor, suggest for consideration, how far the Provincial Acts may require in this particular to be amended, to meet the altered circumstances of society. From the large increase in the number of Immigrants annually arriving, especially of the poorer classes, some amendment appears to be also necessary in the regulations applicable to their relief.

“ *Representations*

“Representations having been made to me on behalf of the Indian Population, and of persons residing on their Lands, of the ill consequences of delay in the adjustment of their respective claims, I hope that measures will be taken to facilitate such a settlement of them as will conduce alike to the satisfaction of the claimants, and to the credit and advantage of the Province.

“*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“I have the satisfaction to inform you, that from the prosperous state of Commerce, the Revenue in the past year has been amply sustained.

“I have given directions that the Public Accounts should be laid before you.

“I have also directed to be communicated to you various Returns and Reports relative to the Roads and other Public Works, the execution of which, on a systematic plan, would materially tend to the public advantage.

“An urgent appeal having been made to me on behalf of the Inhabitants of Saint John's, Newfoundland, who had suffered from the destruction of that City by fire, I felt impelled to aid the private contributions which were raised for their relief, by an advance from the Public Funds, which I made in full confidence that I only anticipated your desire for the alleviation of the sufferings of our fellow subjects exposed to so severe a calamity.

“*Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

“*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“Commissioners having been appointed by Her Majesty's Government to investigate and report on the Boundary in dispute between this Province and Canada, I have to regret that their labors have been in some degree retarded, owing to the lamented death of one of the Officers engaged on this service. I have no reason however to anticipate any further delay in the settlement of the question, and in the meantime the Jurisdiction of the Province in the Disputed Territory has been maintained.

“An examination of the Country by the same scientific Officers, with the object of ascertaining the best direction for a Trunk Line of Railway, to connect the Provinces, has been in progress, and will be resumed when the season becomes again favorable, another Officer having been appointed to the Survey.

“In order to effect a rapid communication of intelligence through the Provinces, the establishment of a Line of Electro Magnetic Telegraph, from Halifax to Quebec, has been proposed by the Governor General, in a Despatch which will be laid before you.

“Availing myself of the encouragement held out in the last Session, I have directed the prosecution of some special inquiries in reference to those important undertakings—the Reports, when received, will be communicated to you.

“I congratulate you on the prospects which at this time appear to be opening to the Province. With improved means of intercourse, so fertile a region cannot long remain imperfectly settled and reclaimed; and the time we may hope is approaching when the labors of the early settlers and their descendants, aided by British enterprise and capital, will be applied in developing its vast and varied resources. That undertakings of this nature, conducted in a righteous spirit, will be eminently successful, I can entertain no doubt; and that they may prosper under your auspices, and become the means of diffusing the blessings which have elsewhere followed in their train, must be the aspiration of all who regard the welfare of their Country, and desire to extend and perpetuate the glory of her Institutions.”

On motion of Mr. Street,

*Resolved*, That a standing Committee be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may arise that will in any way affect the Privileges of the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Street, Mr. End, Mr. Fisher, Mr. Ritchie, and Mr. Barberie, do compose the Committee.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk had communicated to him, that he had nominated George Lee, Junior, Esquire, to the office of Clerk

Assistant of the Assembly; and the nomination being approved of by the House, Mr. Lee took his seat at the Clerk's Table.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to whom shall be referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of this Province.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Porter, Mr. R. D. Wilmot, Mr. Read, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Tibbits, Mr. Botsford, and Mr. Wark, do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Taylor,

*Resolved*, That a standing Committee be appointed to examine and report upon the Public Accounts.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Boyd, Mr. Cranney, and Mr. M'Leod, do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Barberie,

*Resolved*, That the Reverend William Quinton Ketchum, A. B., be the Chaplain of this House.

On motion of Mr. Hayward,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed, consisting of a Member from each County, to take into consideration the state of all the Roads of Communication in the Province, and report to the House what sums it may be necessary to grant for the repairing and improving of the Great as well as the Bye Roads.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Hayward, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Fisher, Mr. Tibbits, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. Earle, Mr. Brown, Mr. Steves, Mr. Hanington, Mr. Wark, Mr. Rankin, Mr. End, and Mr. Barberie, do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Wark,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed, consisting of a Member from each County, to whom shall be referred all matters which may be brought before the House relating to the Agricultural Interests of the Province.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wark, Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Miles, Mr. Connell, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. Vail, Mr. Carman, Mr. Read, Mr. Barberie, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Landry, Mr. Steves, and Mr. R. D. Wilmot, do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Tibbits,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to whom may be referred all matters affecting the Lumbering Interests of this Province.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Tibbits, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Porter, Mr. Read, Mr. Hayward, and Mr. Hanington, do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. End,

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to His Speech at the opening of the Session.

*Ordered*, That Mr. End, Mr. M'Leod, and Mr. Carman, be a Committee to prepare the Address.

On motion of Mr. Ritchie,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to examine and report to the House what Laws have expired or are about expiring.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Street, and Mr. L. A. Wilmot, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Street,

*Ordered*, That the House do on Monday next, being the first day of February, go into Committee of the whole in consideration of the Speech from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the Session.

On motion of Mr. Connell,

*Resolved*, That the Journals of this House be daily printed, or so soon as a copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk, and that the Printer do furnish five hundred copies thereof, for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Boyd,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to Light Houses, and to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Boyd, Mr. Cranney, Mr. Partelow, Mr. R. D. Wilmot, and Mr. Taylor, do compose the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Hanington,

*Resolved*, That no Petition be received or Bill brought in after the second day of March next, except by special leave of the House.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Hazen,

*Resolved*, That a standing Committee be appointed, consisting of three Members, to join the Committee of the Honorable Legislative Council, to have the management of the Legislative Library.

*Ordered*, That the Honorable Mr. Hazen, Mr. L. A. Wilmot, and Mr. End, do compose the said Committee; and further

*Ordered*, That the Honorable Mr. Hazen do communicate the same to the Council.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the Education of the Youth of the Province, and to report thereon to this House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Brown, Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Wilson, Mr. Wark, Mr. Street, Mr. S. Earle, and Mr. Steves, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Botsford,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to whom may be referred all Petitions for allowances to Teachers of Schools who have not received any part of the Provincial Grants.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Botsford, Mr. Steves, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. Connell, Mr. Miles, Mr. Cranney, Mr. End, and Mr. Jordan, do compose the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Thomson,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the Fisheries, and report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Thomson, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Hanington, Mr. Read, Mr. M'Leod, and Mr. R. D. Wilmot, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Miles,

*Ordered*, That two hundred copies of His Excellency's Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Hazen,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to revise the former Rules and Regulations for the House of Assembly of this Province, and to make further Rules and Regulations for the government thereof.

*Ordered*, That the Honorable Mr. Hazen, Mr. Baillie, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. End, and Mr. Wilson, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Wark,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to the Finances of the Province, and to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wark, Mr. Brown, and Mr. R. D. Wilmot, be the Committee for that purpose.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

#### Prayers.

Whereas in pursuance of the Address of the House of Assembly, passed during the Session of 1841, Commissioners were appointed by the then Lieutenant Governor of the Province, *inter alia*, to revise and if necessary to make a new Ordinance of Fees in the Supreme Court, and to report the result of their doings to His Excellency, for the purpose of being laid before the Legislative Council and House of Assembly at the then next Session of the Legislature; and whereas such Commissioners were, in pursuance of such Address, appointed, and did attend to that duty, and make such Report to His Excellency on the twenty fifth day of February in the year 1842, which Report was, by Message, laid before the House of Assembly during that Session; and whereas many of the objects embraced in that Report, and especially that of providing a Fund for the payment of Juries, are of great importance to the administration of Justice in this Province; therefore

*Resolved*, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the several objects and measures recommended by the said Commissioners, and to report thereon to this House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Street, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Carman, Mr. Fisher, and Mr. Barberie, be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Tibbits,

*Resolved*, That a Select Committee be appointed, to whom shall be referred all matters relating to the improvement of the Navigation of the River Saint John, and other principal Rivers in the Province.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Tibbits, Mr. Baillie, Mr. Porter, Mr. Carman, Mr. Botsford, Mr. Hayward, and Mr. Barberie, do compose the said Committee.

Mr. Ritchie, by leave, presented a Petition from Margaret Gallagher, praying that a Grant may pass to her for a School taught by her late husband, James Gallagher, a licenced Teacher, in the Parish of Portland, in the County of Saint John, for a period of five and a half months ending on the eighth day of March, 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from Jacob Paul, of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, praying that the Pension due to the late Experience Thompson, deceased, as the Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, may be granted to him; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Thomson, by leave, presented a Petition from Christiana Walker, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Saint George,

George, in the County of Charlotte, for the period of six months ending on the first day of December last; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

On motion of Mr. Wark,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to the Post Office Establishment within the Province, and report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wark, Mr. L. A. Wilmot, and Mr. Woodward, be the Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Charles Perley, Richard English, John Bedell, and thirty one others, of the Parish of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, praying for an amendment of the Act providing for the repair of the Streets and Highways in part of that Parish; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Hanington, by leave, presented a Petition from Peter Stewart, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Botsford, in the County of Westmorland, for a period of three months in the year 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from the Very Reverend James Dunphy, James Quinn, C. C., George Anderson, Thomas Harding, Henry Porter, William O. Smith, John Kerr, Robert Ray, Henry Chubb, and three hundred and thirty three others, inhabitants of the City and County of Saint John, praying that a Grant may pass to enable them to finish a Building erected in the said City for the purposes of a School House and Temperance Hall; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Connell moved for leave to bring in a Bill in addition to and in amendment of an Act, intituled "An Act to provide for the repair of the Streets and Highways in part of the Parish of Woodstock."

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Boyd, by leave, presented a Petition from Rosanna Pulk, Widow of the late Henry Pulk, deceased, praying that the usual Pension may be continued to her; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Charles Perley, John Bedell, and fifty two others, inhabitants of the County of Carleton, praying for an amendment of the Act incorporating the Maduxnikik Boom Company; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Connell moved for leave to bring in a Bill to amend and in addition to the Act to incorporate the Maduxnikik Boom Company.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Earle, by leave, presented a Petition from Angus M'Phee, a licenced Teacher, praying compensation for teaching a School in the Parish of Wickham, in Queens' County, for the period of three months in the year 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Taylor moved for leave to bring in a Bill to repeal an Act, intituled "An Act to lay a Tax on Dogs in certain parts of the Parishes of Fredericton and Saint Andrews."

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Steves, by leave, presented a Petition from Albert Steeves, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Hopewell, in the County of Albert, for a period of six months ending in August 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

The Honorable Mr. Hazen, by leave, presented a Petition from the Reverend John Gibson Macgregor, praying remuneration for teaching a School in the City of Saint John; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. R. D. Wilmot, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas E. Carter, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School at Carleton, in the City of Saint John, for the period of nine months during the past year; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Steves, by leave, presented a Petition from Mary Gunning, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Hillsborough, in the County of Albert, for the period of eighteen months ending in November 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Vail, by leave, presented a Petition from William Lowry, of the New Londonderry Settlement, in Kings' County, praying to be compensated for loss sustained by reason of the Deputy not giving the correct Boundary Line to his allotment; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Gilbert moved the following Resolution:—

Whereas the Honorable Hugh Johnston, one of the Members elect for Queens' County, retains his Seat as a Member of the Legislative Council, whereby a vacancy exists in the Representation for the said County; therefore

*Resolved*, That the Speaker do issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, to cause a Writ to issue for the election of a Member for the said County, to serve in this General Assembly, in the place of the said Honorable Hugh Johnston.

To which Mr. Partelow moved as an amendment—To expunge the whole of the said Resolution, as well as the Preamble thereto, after the word "Whereas," and substitute as follows:—

"It appears that the Honorable Hugh Johnston, a Member of Her Majesty's Legislative Council, has been returned by the High Sheriff as one of the Members to represent Queens' County in this House, and that the said Honorable Gentleman still retains his Seat in the former Branch; and whereas by such Return the said County is not legally represented in this House; therefore

*Resolved*, That the Committee of Privileges be instructed to inquire into and report to this House what steps may be necessary to provide for the vacancy thus occasioned by such return."

The question being taken upon the said proposed amendment, it was carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Wark, by leave, presented a Petition from James Wheton, of Richibucto, in the County of Kent, a licenced Teacher, praying that a Grant may pass in addition to the usual Parish School allowance, by reason of his giving instruction in the higher Branches of Education; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Hanington, by leave, presented a Petition from Jacqus M. DeVarennes, a licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Shediac, in the County of Westmorland, for the period of one year ending on the twenty sixth day of November last; which he read.

*Ordered*,

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Thomson, by leave, presented a Petition from Guy Clinch, of the Parish of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, praying that a Grant may pass to compensate for the services of the late Lucretia Clinch, deceased, a licenced Teacher, for having taught a School in the Parish of Saint Stephen, in the said County, for the period of six months ending on the fourth day of February, 1845; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Hanington, by leave, presented a Petition from Neil Henderson, of Shediac, in the County of Westmorland, setting forth, that when removing with his family and effects from Prince Edward Island to his present residence, he was charged with the Provincial Duty on a Horse which was part of his Farming Stock, and praying that the same may be returned to him; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade to report thereon.

Mr. Fisher, by leave, presented a Petition from William Moore, of the Parish of Dumfries, in the County of York, praying that the Pension due to his late Mother, as the Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, for the year ending in June last, may be granted to him; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Jordan, by leave, presented a Petition from Elizabeth Palmer, Widow of the late Thomas Palmer, deceased, an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, praying that the Pension may be granted to her; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

The Honorable Mr. Hazen, from the Committee appointed to revise the Rules and Regulations for the government of the House, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the powers of the Committee continued and extended, to enable them further to report upon the matters referred for their consideration.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Hazen,

The House went into Committee of the whole in consideration of the revised Rules reported by the Committee.

Mr. Botsford in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Rules for the government of the House, as reported by the Select Committee, under their consideration, had agreed to the same.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted.

The Rules, so reported and agreed to, being then read by the Clerk, are as follow:—

### **Rules for the Government of the House of Assembly.**

1. That Prayers be read every day, by the Chaplain of the House, at the first opening thereof.
2. No Member do come into the House, or move from one place to another, with his hat on.
3. While the House is sitting, and any Member is speaking, no Member shall be allowed to speak or whisper so as to interrupt him, unless it be to speak to order.
4. When any Member intends to speak, he must stand up and address the Speaker; if more than one rises, the Speaker shall determine who is up first; and the Member named by him speak.
5. No Member shall stand while another is speaking.
6. When any subject is being debated, if any Member arises to speak to another subject, any Member may, but the Speaker should, call him to order.

7. When any Member, or the Speaker, speaks to order, the question of order must be decided previous to the subject under discussion being proceeded in.

8. When any question is called for, and a division demanded, the Members voting in the affirmative will rise.

9. When a motion is made and seconded, it must be determined by the question, unless it is withdrawn by the mover, or the previous question, or adjournment be moved and carried.

10. That when any motion is put from the Chair, and an amendment be moved thereto, no amendment to such amendment shall be put.

11. When a motion is made and seconded, the Member's name who made the motion must be inserted in the Journal.

12. After a question is propounded, no Member shall speak more than once to the matter, except the mover, who shall be allowed the general reply.

13. When a question is decided by vote, the number of both the affirmative and negative, and also the Members' names shall be inserted in the Journal, if insisted upon by two or more Members.

14. That the Journal of the preceding day be always read before any other business is taken up.

15. The Sergeant at Arms do not permit any person to come within the House while it is sitting, except the officers attending.

16. That all persons who will question any return of any Member or Members to serve in General Assembly, do question the same on or before the fourteenth day (including the day of meeting) after the meeting of the House; and so on or before the fourteenth day (including the day of meeting) or of making such return, after any new return shall be brought in.

17. That the House will not enter into any Scrutiny of Votes polled at any Election of Members to serve in General Assembly, unless a Scrutiny was duly demanded of the Sheriff.

18. That any Member presenting a Petition, shall in his place, acquaint the House of the general purport of the Petition, and ask leave for it to be read, which must be seconded before it is read.

19. That the Speaker shall not take the Chair for the purpose of proceeding with the business of the House, except to receive the Usher of the Black Rod, or Message from the Legislative Council, or to enforce the attendance of Members, unless at least fourteen Members, including the Speaker, be present; but for the purpose aforesaid, any number of Members, including the Speaker, shall be deemed sufficient, after the hour has arrived to which the House may be adjourned.

20. That if any Member obtain leave of the House to act as Attorney or Counsel in any matter pending before the House, he shall not speak or vote as a Member upon such matter.

21. That every Member be heard in his place, touching any charge brought against him, or any matter respecting his election, return, or privilege, or whenever his private interest is affected, but shall withdraw before the House proceed therein.

22. That in case of any offensive matter occurring in debate, the same shall be immediately taken down in writing, and noticed in the House the same day, otherwise it shall not afterwards be considered by the House.

23. That all Orders of the Day which, by reason of any adjournment, shall not have been proceeded on, shall be considered only as postponed till the next day on which the House shall sit.

24. That no Member of the House shall, upon any pretence whatever, either go to the Legislative Council, or answer in writing, or appear by Counsel to answer any accusation there, upon the penalty of being committed to the Sergeant at Arms, or to prison, during the pleasure of the House.

25. That no Bill of a private or local nature shall be received by the House, unless such Bill has been previously read at the Assizes, or Court of Nisi Prius, or at some General Sessions of the Peace for the County or City and County interested in such Bill, in the presence of the Grand Jury, and a certificate be endorsed thereon by the Clerk of the Court, that the same was so read, or unless such Bill has been previously published four times in some of the newspapers published in the County interested in

in such Bill; when no newspaper is published in such County, in some newspaper published in the nearest adjoining County, or in the Royal Gazette.

26. That no money hereafter be appropriated for Bye Roads in any Parish of this Province in any year, unless it shall appear by the Certificate of the Clerk of the Peace for the County in which such Parish is situated, to be filed with the Clerk of this House, that a return has been made in the same year by the Commissioners of Roads of such Parish, that the Statute Labour has been performed by the inhabitants of the Parish for which any money is intended to be granted, or that the delinquents have been prosecuted according to Law.

27. That there be at least two days notice of going into Committee in consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service, and a like notice of going again into Committee after every report of progress or further progress; and that it shall be the duty of the Clerk of the House, immediately, to post up such notice in some conspicuous place in the House for the information of Members.

28. That the Clerk of this House be directed to keep a Book, which shall at all times lay upon the Table of the House, and to which Members shall at all times have access, in which every Member intending to move any Grant in Supply shall enter his intended motion (together with his name and date) in the terms in which he intends moving such Grant, with the amount of the same; and that no Member shall move in Supply any grant of money, unless the motion for the same shall have been entered in the manner aforesaid in such Book for two days before it shall be moved; and that such Grant shall be moved only in the terms in which the motion for the same shall be entered in such Book.

29. That when the House shall be in Committee of Supply, the Chairman of such Committee shall call upon Members who may have entered motions in such Book, in the order in which the motions shall be entered, to move pursuant to such notice: That any other Member may move the Grant in the absence of the Member who may have entered the same: And that in case the Member so entering the same shall not be in his place, and no Member shall move for him, the motion shall be passed over, and the next in order in the Book taken: And that such motion so passed over shall not be made until it shall have been re-entered in the same manner as a new motion.

30. That no motion for a grant of money shall be entered in such Book, nor if it is entered, shall it be taken up by the Chairman of the Committee of Supply, unless the application for such grant of money shall have been referred to the Committee of Supply by Order of the House.

31. That the four foregoing Rules shall not be held to apply to Grants for the Ordinary Services.

32. That all Grants for the Ordinary Services shall be first taken up in Supply and disposed of before the consideration of any Grant for any other service or subject.

33. That this House will not resolve itself into a Committee of the whole for granting Supplies except for the Ordinary Services, until a statement of the Finances of the Province be first made up, exhibiting the probable amount at its disposal.

34. That the appropriations for the Public Service shall be chiefly confined to the sum reported to be at the disposal of the House; such report to be made by a Committee to be appointed within five days after the opening of the Session.

35. When the House adjourns, and no particular day is named for the House to be adjourned to, it shall be considered as adjourned to the next day at 10 o'clock, A. M.

36. That the Rules of Proceedings in the House shall be observed in a Committee of the whole House, so far as they may be applicable; but no Member shall speak twice to any question until every Member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Mr. Brown moved the following Resolution:—

*Resolved*, That this House will make provision for the reporting of the Debates during the present Session, and appropriate a sum not exceeding £—— for that service.

To which Mr. Partelow moved as an amendment—To expunge the whole of the said Resolution, after the word “Resolved,” and substitute as follows:—

“That no Legislative Grant be made during this Session for reporting the Debates of this House.”

And the question being taken upon the said proposed amendment, the House divided as follows:—

**The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.**

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE, the Representatives of Her Majesty's Faithful and Loyal People in this Province, offer our thanks to Your Excellency for the Speech delivered at the opening of the Session; and Your Excellency may rely on our disposition to apply ourselves to business in that spirit of unanimity, which is the best proof of a proper zeal for the public good.

While we deeply sympathise with those of our fellow subjects in the United Kingdom, still labouring under suffering and privation; we feel duly impressed with thankfulness to that Almighty Being who has blessed this favoured Province with a Harvest, in some respects, more than usually abundant.

The House of Assembly, at all times recognizing the Education of the People as an object of paramount importance, has never hesitated, under any aspect of financial affairs, to make liberal provision for its furtherance and support: We are happy to  
adopt

adopt those sentiments, so frequently recorded, by assuring Your Excellency that our most devoted attention shall be given to a subject, inseparably connected with the welfare and true happiness of the public.

Any improved system for the management of Prisons shall have our especial notice ; and we feel it a duty incumbent upon us to support such proposed ameliorations in the Criminal Laws, as may punish and reform the offender, without involving the safety of society.

Our early attention shall be given to the alteration recently made in the Poor Laws of the United Kingdom, with a view to their adoption, so far as applicable, to this Province ; and it will be to us a matter of great satisfaction, if successful in the discovery of any means by which the Immigrants of the poorer classes may be induced to extricate themselves from misery and distress, by accepting that independence which the present state of this Colony secures to temperance, industry and perseverance.

A settlement of the question respecting Indian Reserves is of great importance not only to the Aborigines, but also to those by whom portions of some of the Reserves have been occupied and improved ; and we earnestly hope that such measures may be adopted as will bring this subject to a satisfactory adjustment.

We are gratified to learn that the prosperous state of Commerce has amply sustained the Revenue of the Province for the past year.

To the Public Accounts, as well as to the various Returns and Reports relative to the Roads and other Public Works, when received, we shall give due consideration.

In making the advance in relief of our fellow subjects in Newfoundland, when suffering under the calamity which laid waste their City, Your Excellency justly appreciated the feelings which we trust may ever prevail among the Inhabitants of Her Majesty's North American Colonies : We thank Your Excellency for that confidence which anticipated an act of the Legislature, and we shall cheerfully concur in the measure by making the necessary appropriation.

While we regret that the labours of the Commissioners appointed by Her Majesty's Government to investigate and report upon the Boundary between this Province and Canada, have been retarded by the lamented death of one of the officers engaged on that Service ; it is gratifying to learn that the final adjustment of this important question will not be materially delayed, and that the jurisdiction of New Brunswick, so long undisputed, is still maintained.

The connection of the Provinces by a Line of Railway is a matter of vast importance in a National as well as Colonial point of view ; and we are glad to find that an examination of the Country, with a view to that object, has been in progress, and will be speedily resumed.

The Despatch from the Governor General, relative to the establishment of an Electro Magnetic Communication between Halifax and Quebec, and the Reports on this highly important undertaking, when laid before us, shall have our best attention.

We are highly pleased to receive Your Excellency's congratulations on the prospects which at this time appear to be opening to the Province : Having been always satisfied of the impetus which improved means of intercourse must give to the settlement and cultivation of our Territory, (the facilities and capabilities of which have been but recently ascertained,) the usual modes of Communication by Great and Bye Roads have ever claimed a considerable share of Legislative attention, amply repaid, however, by the consequent rapid improvement in the condition of both early and later settlers ; while experience of the past inspires us with ample reason for continuing our care of these modes of intercourse, we are ready to adopt and encourage, consistently with our limited pecuniary means, those recent improvements in rapid Communication, which, aided by British enterprise and capital, would doubtless tend towards the development of our vast and varied resources : That success may attend these undertakings, and that they may be the means of diffusing settlement, cultivation and civilization over the wilds of our Province, thus extending and perpetuating the glory of British Institutions, is our fervent prayer.

Her Majesty has commanded me to express to you, and through you, to the two Branches of the Legislature of New Brunswick, the gratification which she has experienced in receiving the intelligence of the liberality displayed by the Representatives of the Inhabitants of that Province. The Queen appreciates most highly this mark of approval by Her subjects in New Brunswick, of the policy pursued by Her Ministers in the relations of this Kingdom with Foreign Countries, and relies with confidence on their attachment and well known loyalty towards Her Majesty's Person and Government, on any occasion in which it may be necessary to call forth their energies in the defence of their Country.

**ADVANCES FROM SURPLUS CIVIL LIST.**

*Downing Street, August 25, 1846.*

SIR,—I have received Her Majesty's commands to instruct you to acquaint the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, that in compliance with their Address to Her Majesty, which accompanied your Despatch of the 17th April, No. 25, the Queen has been pleased to order that the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury should refund to the Treasury of the Province the sums which, in obedience to the directions of Lord Stanley, have been issued under your warrant in payment of the expenses of the Commission for settling the Land Titles referred to in the fourth article of the Treaty of Washington. Her Majesty has been pleased to make this order on the ground that these expenses were really contracted on account of the Diplomatic Service of the Empire at large, and because the responsibility for such expenses is admitted to rest exclusively with the Imperial Treasury.

It is proper that I should add, that the records of this office show that it was Lord Stanley's intention to qualify his instructions to you respecting the payments under this head, by an express reservation of the question, whether the liability did justly rest on the Provincial Treasury. This qualification of these instructions was omitted in the Despatch conveying them, from what would seem to have been a mere inadvertence or accident.

You will transmit to me a detailed account of the disbursements made or authorized by you on account of the expenses of this Commission, explanatory of the necessity of every such disbursement, and accompanied by the proper vouchers for each.

I regret that it has not been in my power to advise Her Majesty to accede to the further claim of the House of Assembly, that the Provincial Treasury should be relieved from the payments made or demanded on account of the Disputed Territory Fund. It appears that in the year 1828, in consequence of representations from the Government of the United States, respecting depredations said to have been committed by British subjects on the Disputed Territory, that the then Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick agreed that any Timber which might be brought into the acknowledged Boundaries of the Province should be seized; that such seizures should be prosecuted to condemnation in the Supreme Court of New Brunswick; and that the proceeds of such seizures should be held in trust for the benefit of that party to which an award of right might be eventually made. The Treaty of Washington constituted such an award. By providing for a division of the Disputed Territory between the United States and Great Britain, it ascertained that the proceeds of the Timber cut on that part of the Territory which has been awarded to the United States are due to that Government, subject only to the deduction of such reasonable charges as may have been incurred in the process of condemnation in the Courts, and in levying the Fines. It follows that this is a debt due to the United States by New Brunswick; because the Government of that Province levied and held in trust the proceeds in question, according to the agreement already mentioned. It is not a debt due by Great Britain. Her Majesty's Government in this country exercised no controul, and had no voice in the matter. They took no part either in the process of condemnation or in levying the fines, or in receiving the trust money, or in holding it.

If after having thus formally agreed to receive the fines, and to hold them in trust, the Government of New Brunswick has committed any irregularity in the performance of that duty, and if that irregularity has been productive of any loss, it is a loss which must fall on the Provincial, not on the Imperial, Treasury. The Government and People of the United Kingdom are not bound to make good any deficiencies which may have been occasioned by a want of prudence or of care on the part of the Provincial authorities.

It will therefore be your duty to apply the savings of the Civil List Fund in satisfaction of the demands of the United States (when finally adjusted) in respect of the Disputed Territory Fund. It is indeed suggested that, in directing such an application of that money, Her Majesty's Government would depart from the principles established by Lords Glenelg and Stanley in the passages quoted from their Despatches. I cannot subscribe to this opinion. Their Lordships disclaimed any wish to increase the amount of the funds at the disposal of the Crown for purposes connected with the internal affairs and Government of New Brunswick. They disavowed any desire to augment the savings in question, or to acquire by means of them any authority or influence in the Province which might possibly be derived from such a source. I entirely concur with them in those views, and am  
convinced

convinced (that had the question been presented to them) they would have concurred with me in maintaining that it is not merely the right, but the duty, of Her Majesty's Government, in the failure of all other resources, to apply the fund placed by the Provincial Law at their disposal in liquidation of a debt for which the Province is responsible. It is a duty not merely to the Country to which the debt is owing, but to the Province itself, the public faith of which is thus redeemed and rescued from reproach. It is an appropriation of money directed to no object hostile or foreign to the policy of the local Legislature, and aiming at no increase of the authority or influence of the Crown in the Province. Such an expenditure of such a fund involves indeed rather the abandonment than the accession of the means of any such authority and influence; nor do I believe that it will ultimately be regarded with disfavor by the Legislative Council and Assembly; of course, however, it will rest with those bodies (if they should see fit) to secure the application to some objects of internal improvement or utility of the savings of the Civil List Fund, by granting to the Queen any other adequate means of satisfying the demands to which, as Sovereign of the Province of New Brunswick, Her Majesty is liable from the Government of the United States of America.

The Lords Commissioners of the Treasury have apprised me, that they are prepared to direct payment of such Bills as you may find it necessary to draw upon their Lordships' Board for the purpose of reimbursing to the Local Civil List Fund, the sum of £2,582 7 9 currency, which has been advanced to defray that expenditure, and that you are at liberty to draw from time to time for such sums as may be required for defraying further expenses of the same service.

It will be requisite however, that Accounts properly vouched, should be rendered, of the expenditure of any sums thus drawn for, in order that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, may be satisfied that they have been duly applied in payment of charges necessarily incident to the service in question, and in order that you may be relieved from further responsibility on account of them.

SIR,—The rapid extension on this Continent of the Electro-Magnetic Telegraph, and its general application to purposes of mercantile operations, having rendered it a matter of much importance to the British North American Provinces, that they should possess, equally with the United States, any advantages to be derived from the introduction of this invention, I am directed by the Council of the Board of Trade to pray that you will submit for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor General,

General, whether the establishment of a Line of Magnetic Telegraphs from Halifax, N. S., via Quebec and Montreal, to Toronto, would not be of important usefulness to the British Government, as well as conducive to the mercantile interests of the Provinces in question, and on these grounds deserving encouragement from both the Imperial and Provincial Governments.

Under the existing Post Office arrangements, the earliest European intelligence is brought to Halifax, N. S., and by the suggested line of Telegraph this advantage might be further confined to British interests, rendering the United States dependent on the said line for the intelligence, and thereby obtaining their contribution towards the expenses of the establishment: instead of which, the Telegraphic arrangements formed and forming, will have the effect of making British interests tributary to the United States, receiving the intelligence at second hand, and nearly doubled in cost by the terms exacted by the Patentee of the invention there.

The inquiries made by the Board of Trade lead them to believe that no insuperable difficulty exists to the erection of a line of Telegraph along the main Post Road through the British Provinces; but if Her Majesty's Government should decide on making either a Rail Road or a Military Road between Quebec and Halifax, the Telegraph for that portion of the distance would of course be erected along the line thereof.

The cost of a line of Telegraph in the United States is stated to be about £25 per mile for a single, and about £37 10s. for a double line of wire. It is believed that the work could be done in the British Provinces for less money, but the outlay would probably exceed that which the Provinces might be disposed to undertake on their own resources, for the attainment of an object which may be regarded as scarcely less essential to the furtherance of Metropolitan than of Colonial interests. On this ground, and that Provincial capitalists may hold themselves free to support what appears to be the best Provincial line of Telegraphic communication with the sea coast, the Board of Trade are desirous that no time should be lost in submitting the project for the consideration of both the Home and the several Provincial Governments, with the view of eliciting, previous to the ensuing Session of the Canadian Legislature, the degree of support which each may be disposed to afford to it.

A Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Maduxnikik Boom Company.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct to be laid before this House, Returns embracing the following information, viz :—The number of Cases entered on the Crown and Special Papers of each Term of the Supreme Court, respectively, from Hilary Term, 1844, inclusive, specifying when the Rules Nisi were obtained, when argued, and when decided : The number of Rules for new Trials applied for, specifying those granted and refused, and the time when the Verdicts were respectively given : The number of Causes remaining on the Crown and Special Papers, undisposed of at the end of the present Term, specifying when the Rules were obtained : also, the number of Causes entered for trial at the respective Circuits, since the first day of January, 1844, specifying the number tried at each Circuit Court, and whether any and what adjournments have taken place during the said time, and the causes therefor.

Holderness and Chilton, praying for a return of Export Duty on Timber and Deals shipped on board the Barque "Evening Star," in the month of June last; the said vessel having been wrecked at the entrance of the Harbour of Richibucto, and part of the cargo reshipped on board of another vessel, and the Duty again paid thereon; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade to report thereon.

Mr. Wark, by leave, presented a Petition from Sylvester H. Wathen, of Richibucto, in the County of Kent, Merchant, praying for a return of Export Duty paid upon a cargo of Deals shipped on board the Barque "Campbells" in the month of July last, in consequence of the said vessel being wrecked in attempting to cross the Bar at the entrance of Richibucto Harbour; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Steves, by leave, presented a Petition from John Powell, a licenced Teacher, praying remuneration for teaching a School in the Parish of Hillsborough, in the County of Albert, for a period of six months ending in June 1846; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Botsford, by leave, presented a Petition from Edward V. Tait, a licenced Teacher, praying remuneration for having taught a School in the Parish of Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, for a period of six months ending in November 1845; which he read.

RAILWAY COMPANY ACTS.

SIR,—Her Majesty's Government have had under their consideration two Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and intituled respectively “ An Act to Incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company,” and “ An Act to facilitate the making of a Railway from the City of Saint John, through Fredericton and Woodstock, to the Grand Falls of the River Saint John, and from thence to the Boundary Line of the Province of Canada, by the New Brunswick Company.”

I transmit for your information copies of a correspondence with the Agents of the Company in this country, which will put you in possession of the views of Her Majesty's Government with respect to these Acts; and as I consider the assurance given by the Agents, that the Directors will apply in the next Session of the Provincial Legislature for an Act embracing the several amendments specified in the Letter from this Office of the 26th ultimo, to be perfectly satisfactory, it is my intention to advise Her Majesty to confirm the Acts in question.

GENTLEMEN,—I am directed by Earl Grey to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 12th instant, in which you request to be informed whether the two Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and intituled respectively “ An Act to incorporate the New Brunswick Railway Company,” and “ An Act to facilitate the making of a Railway from the City of Saint John, through Fredericton and Woodstock, to the Grand Falls of the River Saint John, and from thence to the Boundary Line of the Province of Canada, by the New Brunswick Railway Company,” have been confirmed by Her Majesty in Council.

Upon this subject I am directed to make to you the following observations:—

1st. With respect to the provisions of the Act for incorporating the New Brunswick Company relative to the conveyance of Troops, Her Majesty's Government are of opinion that the proviso that the Company shall not be bound to start trains at other than the ordinary hours, will be found inconvenient, and that arrangements should be made for securing the conveyance of the Troops *at all times*, and with the whole resources of the Company, if necessary, as, in military operations, time must often be a matter of great importance.

2nd. With respect to the power given to the Directors of making bye laws, without any provision being made, as is the case in this country, for their being subject to revision by any higher authority, Her Majesty's Government propose to require the Directors of Provincial Railways to submit their bye laws for the approval of the Governor of the Province.

3d. In the absence of any provision in the Act with respect to the Navigation of Rivers and Canals, Lord Grey proposes to instruct the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick to submit to the Legislature a separate enactment for the purpose of giving the Executive Government a general controul over all works undertaken by Railway Companies which might have a tendency to impede the free navigation of the internal waters of the Province.

4th. I am to direct your attention to the absence in the Act, not only of a maximum table of charges, but of any provision for securing that the charges made should apply equally to all persons. This omission appears to Lord Grey the more objectionable in the present case because the Company is authorized to run Steamboats in connexion with the line, and His Lordship considers it extremely necessary that some provision should be introduced into the Act for preventing the Railway Company from forcing the public to use their Steamboats in preference to other modes of conveyance to or from the

the Railway, by a system of differential charges in favor of passengers by them. I am further directed to add, that upon receiving from you an assurance that the Company will join in recommending to the Provincial Legislature the amendments to which I have adverted, Lord Grey will be prepared to advise Her Majesty to confirm the Acts in question.

### COPY RIGHT ACT.

*Fredericton, 20th July, 1843.*

MY LORD,—A sensation having been produced in the Province by the recent enforcement of the provisions of the Acts of Parliament, (5 & 6 Vict. cap. 45, 47, & 49,) for the protection of Copy Right on Books, I am prompted to explain to Your Lordship the situation in which these Communities are placed by the restrictions which are thus imposed on the introduction of English Books, reprinted in America, and on certain Newspapers through the medium of which they have heretofore obtained circulation, by what is called the privilege of the Deputy Post Master General, who, at his discretion, has dispensed with the Law for imposing on them full letter rates of Postage.

In the Report of the Commissioners of Post Office Inquiry in Canada, it was observed, that no printed matter coming from England, except Stamped Newspapers, could pass through the Post, unless charged by weight at the rates of Letters exceeding an ounce, which, in the case of English Reviews, Magazines, and Pamphlets, acted as a complete prohibition, and that the American reprints of Miscellanies, under the privilege referred to, had obtained an extensive circulation.

The limited means and opportunities of acquiring Books has led, in these Provinces, as well as in the United States, to the publication of a great number of cheap Newspapers, containing, with the usual matter of Advertisements, Correspondence, and extracts from English and American Journals, selections from Books and Miscellanies. These selections, which are, for the most part, taken from the lighter productions of the English and American presses, are generally unexceptionable, and tend to encourage a taste for reading amongst those who have no access to Books, and are cut off from social intercourse of an improving nature.

Some publishers in the United States, taking advantage of the increasing demand for publications of this nature, have undertaken the publication of entire works in consecutive numbers, or in extra sheets; and as examples of the works thus circulated in the Provinces, as well as in the United States, may be mentioned, Allison's History of Europe, Liebeg's Animal and Agricultural Chemistry, Arnold's Lectures on Modern History, Borrow's Bible in Spain, &c.; and it may be remarked, that the papers which are engaged in these republications, and depending on support in these Provinces, have taken no part in the acrimonious discussions which often pervade the political Journals of the United States.

The claim to protection of the English publishers being the ground on which the circulation of these papers has been suddenly arrested by the charge of Letter Postage, and by the seizure of the “Extras,”

the

the public attention has been drawn to the high price of English Books, which has operated so entirely to prevent their circulation in these Provinces.

The encouragement derived in the United Kingdom from the numerous Libraries, Clubs, and Societies, which are supplied with copies of Books as they issue from the Press, and to whom the price of a Book is less an object than the early supply of new works to their numerous subscribers and readers, renders it practicable in most cases for an English publisher to attach such a price to a book which would command any sale in the Colonies, as nearly to remunerate him from this source alone, independently of the demand from individual purchasers, according to the merit or interest of the work.

The increasing demand of a more numerous and less affluent class of readers, has led to some reduction in the price of works, by their publication in less expensive forms: but the price even of these books, enhanced by the charges attending their transmission, exclude them from circulation in the Colonies, especially during the winter months. Hence the restrictions imposed by the Copy Right Acts operate in no manner to the benefit of the English publisher, while by excluding the inhabitants of the British Provinces from the opportunity they have hitherto enjoyed of becoming familiar with the productions of the English Press through the medium of the reprints, chiefly in the Newspaper form, they are led unfavorably to contrast their situation with that of their fellow countrymen in the United States, where such a restriction cannot be enforced.

The protection of Publishers in the United Kingdom is a question altogether distinct from the extension of the Copy Right Acts, by authority of Parliament, to the Colonies, and especially to those having separate Legislatures, who, if it devolved on them to consider of the local application of those Laws, would, in affording a reasonable protection to the English publisher, be disposed to provide also for the interests of the community, whom it cannot be politic to exclude from all access to English Literature, except by an evasion of the exorbitant charges to which they are subjected by Law.

I do not undertake to determine how far their interests may admit of being reconciled by the imposition of such a moderate duty on foreign reprints as would secure to the English publishers a small profit on their works when reprinted in a cheap form, or in the Literary Journals, for circulation in the Colonies; but if from the larger profits derivable from the sale of high priced books in England, the minor advantages from such cheap reprints for the Provinces should not be a consideration to English publishers, the policy would be questionable of altogether prohibiting the circulation of the Journals which are engaged in such republications, by which the public are deprived not only of the works protected by the Copy Right Acts, but of others claiming no such protection.

As the interest of English publishers cannot be injuriously affected, either by a reduction in the price of books in the Colonies, or their circulation through literary Journals amongst a class of readers to whom they would be otherwise unknown, I hope the measure may be abandoned of enforcing by Parliamentary authority a prohibition which, if not evaded through the facilities everywhere presented, would have the effect of excluding English literature from the Provinces.

SIR,—Her Majesty's Government having had under their consideration the representations which have been received from the Governors of some of the British North American Provinces, complaining of the effect in those Colonies of the Imperial Copy Right Law, have decided on proposing measures to Parliament in the ensuing Session, which, if sanctioned by the Legislature, will, they hope, tend to remove the dissatisfaction which has been expressed on this subject, and place the Literature of this country within the reach of the Colonies, on easier terms than it is at present. With this view, relying upon the disposition of the Colonies to protect the authors of this country from the fraudulent appropriation of the fruits of labours upon which they are often entirely dependent, Her Majesty's Government propose to leave to the local Legislatures the duty and responsibility of passing such enactments as they may deem proper for securing both the rights of authors and the interests of the public. Her Majesty's Government will accordingly submit to Parliament a Bill authorizing the Queen in Council to confirm and finally enact any Colonial Law or Ordinance respecting Copy Right, notwithstanding any repugnancy of any such Law or Ordinance to the Copy Right Law of this country, it being provided by the proposed Act of Parliament that no such Law or Ordinance shall be of any force or effect until so confirmed and finally enacted by the Queen in Council; but that from the confirmation and final enactment thereof, the Copy Right Law of this country shall cease to be of any force or effect within the Colony in which any such Colonial Law or Ordinance has been made, in so far as it may be repugnant to or inconsistent with the operation of any such Colonial Law or Ordinance.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch of the 27th March, in which you enclose copies of communications addressed to you by the Legislative Houses of New Brunswick, relative to the amount of Salary which it would be proper to assign to the Offices of Provincial Secretary and Registrar and Clerk of the Executive Council.

My predecessor has already stated, in the most precise terms, that, subject to the maintenance of the faith of the Crown, Her Majesty has no motive for wishing to preserve a scale of expenditure for the Public Officers of New Brunswick, exceeding that which the two Houses of the Legislature may consider sufficient for the due discharge of the public service. Fully concurring in that opinion, I have only to state, that no breach of engagement would be involved in the revision of the Salaries of the present Provincial Secretary and the Clerk of the Executive Council.

Your answer to the House of Assembly should consist of an expression of your readiness to defer to their judgment upon the extent of provision which they have thought fit to recommend for those Offices, and that you will immediately give effect to their wishes, subject, however, to any qualification of their views, which, at the instance of the Legislative Council, or otherwise, they may be induced to adopt.

You will at the same time state, that it should be clearly understood, that Her Majesty's Government will not concur in the alteration, in the reduction or increase of any vote or grant of the Assembly of any allowance which may be so settled; but that any such subsequent alteration can be assented to by yourself, only if made by an Act, the execution of which shall be suspended for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure.

Whereas in and by the seventh Section of an Act made and passed in the thirty first year of the Reign of His Majesty George the Third, intituled " An Act for regulating Marriage and Divorce, and for preventing and punishing Incest, Adultery and Fornication," power is given to the Governor or Commander in Chief to depute, constitute and appoint, by Warrant or Commission under his Hand and Seal, the Chief Justice or either of the Justices of the Supreme Court of Judicature, or the Master of the Rolls, to preside in his place and stead in the Court of the Governor and Council, for hearing and determining matters of Divorce, and to have, hold and exercise all the powers, privileges, authority and jurisdiction of the Governor or Commander in Chief in

in the said Court: And whereas also by the first Section of an Act made and passed in the fourth year of the Reign of His late Majesty William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the further regulation of the formation of the Court of Governor and Council for the determination of all suits and controverises touching and concerning Marriage and Divorce," a similar power of appointment is given to the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being: And whereas it has been represented and is understood that the administration of Justice under those two several Acts is and has been impeded by reason of no such presiding Officer attending in the said Court; thereupon

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to inform this House whether any appointment of Vice President has taken place conformably to the authority given by the said Act or Acts, and when; and if so, that His Excellency will be pleased to acquaint the House who has received the said Commission, and the reasons, if any, why the said Vice President does not attend as presiding Officer in the said Court.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Partelow, and Mr. Hanington, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

MY LORD,—I have received Lord Cathcart's Despatch, No. 149, of the 20th November, enclosing the copy of a Letter from the Board of Trade of Montreal, on the subject of the importance to Imperial and Provincial interests, of establishing an Electric Telegraph through the British Provinces, from Halifax to Toronto, and suggesting the co-operation of the Imperial Government in the execution of the work.

Her Majesty's Government are not insensible to the advantage of establishing the Telegraphic Communication proposed by the Montreal Board of Trade, but before it can be determined that any proposal for making a Grant, in aid of the expense, should be submitted to Parliament, it is necessary that I should be furnished with a full report, both upon the estimated cost of establishing the Telegraph, and also, as to the proportion of that cost which the several Provincial Legislatures would be prepared to contribute, and as to the difficulties which may be anticipated in the execution of the plan, and the probability of effectually surmounting them.

"That in reference to the Petition presented to this House on the fifth instant, the Petitioner, so long ago as 1828, obtained a Grant of two hundred acres of Land in the Parish of Lancaster, in the County of Saint John, having paid for the Survey and Patent; that several years afterwards, being about to convey this Land for the consideration of one hundred and fifty pounds, it was discovered that the title had previously passed from the Crown by virtue of an old Grant, under the Great Seal of Nova Scotia, of which, however, there existed no record in the Crown Land Office of this Province; that the Assignee of the original Grantee is and has been for several years in actual possession, and that the Petitioner has derived no benefit from his said Grant: under these circumstances, your Committee consider it only just to refund the sum originally paid by the Petitioner, to compensate him for the expense of the Survey, and to remunerate him for Interest on his disbursement up to the year 1836, at which time it appears that the land passed from under his control. They therefore recommend that the sum of forty five pounds be granted to him.

"In reference to the Petition presented to the House on the 6th instant, your Committee, on a full investigation of the case, cannot discover the existence of any legal obstacle

obstacle preventing the Petitioner from availing himself of the Grant which is already passed to him, and are of opinion, that no part of the Lands described in the same is included in the Grant to Elnathan Freeborn; they therefore cannot recommend that the prayer of the Petition be complied with.

To Jacob Paul the sum of £7 10s., being the amount of Pension due to the late Experience Thompson, Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War.

To Rosanna Pulk, Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, £10, being the usual Pension granted to the Widows of old Soldiers.

To Sarah Califf, Daughter of the late John Califf, deceased, formerly Surgeon to the Forces in New Brunswick, £10 to aid her in her present destitute circumstances.

To Rose Harquoil, Widow of the late John Harquoil, the sum of £10 to assist her under her present distressed circumstances, occasioned by the ravages of the Small Pox last Summer.

To the Justices of the Peace in the County of Albert the sum of £15 to enable them to pay a Courier for carrying the Mail from the Post Office in Harvey to Salmon River in said County.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £25 towards remunerating the Reverend Andrew Barron, a Missionary at Bathurst, for the spiritual care and instruction of the Indian population of that place and its vicinity.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £200 to assist in rebuilding the Public Wharf in the Port of Shediac.

To Samuel Frye, M. D., the sum of £29 for Medicine furnished by him, by order of the Justices of Charlotte, to persons infected with the Small Pox on board the Brig "Pero," said Brig having arrived at Saint Andrews.

To Sarah Berry, Widow of the late James Berry, who served in the Ordinance Department during the Revolutionary War in America, the sum of £10 to aid her in her present destitute circumstances.

To David Weeks the sum of £10, being Pension due to the late Dorcas Allen, deceased, Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War.

To Messieurs Crane and Allison the sum of £8 8 9 to reimburse them for advances made to sick Indians.

To Jane Hawkins, of the Parish of Pennfield, in the County of Charlotte, Widow of the late William W. Hawkins, an old Soldier of the Revolutionary war, the sum of £10 to relieve her in her destitute circumstances.

To Mercy M'Nichol, of the Parish of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10 to relieve her in her distressed situation.

To the Reverend William M'Donald, Dennis Bradley, and Charles Bradley, Managing Committee of the School in connexion with the Roman Catholic Church in the Parish of Saint Andrews, the sum of £30 to assist them in keeping up that institution.

To Letty Bell, Widow of an old Soldier in the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10 to relieve her in her present indigent circumstances.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask for leave to sit again on Thursday next.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions as passed in the Committee engrossed, and that the House do on Thursday the fourth day of March next, resolve itself into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Wark, by leave, presented a Petition from Peter Merzerall, of Richibucto, in the County of Kent, Commissioner for Indian Reserves for the said County, praying to be compensated for services performed in surveying and inspecting the said Reserves in the year 1845; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee appointed on the first day of February instant, to take into consideration the subject of the Indian Reserves, to report thereon.

Mr. Thomson moved for leave to bring in a Bill to establish the Road leading from Lower Trout Brook Bridge, on the Great Road between Fredericton and Saint Andrews, to the Town of Saint George, as one of the Great Roads of Communication.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Joseph Michaud, of the Parish of Madawaska, in the County of Carleton, setting forth, that in the Winter of 1845 the

Officer of the Customs at Woodstock made seizure of a Horse belonging to the Petitioner, by reason of its having been bred in the United States; that the said Horse was subsequently condemned and sold; and praying relief in the premises, for the reasons set forth in his Petition; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade to report thereon.

Mr. Ritchie, from the Committee appointed on the fifteenth day of February instant to take under consideration the subject of the Message received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, relative to the organization of the Court of Marriage and Divorce, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“ The Committee to whom were referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and the Documents accompanying it, relative to the appointment of the Master of the Rolls as Vice-President of the Court of Marriage and Divorce, having had the matters referred to them under consideration, Report—

“ That the Court for determining questions concerning Marriage and Divorce was established in this Province in the year 1791, by an Act passed in the thirty first year of the Reign of King George the Third, cap. 5, by the fifth section of which, it is, among other matters, enacted—‘ That all causes, suits, controversies, matters and questions touching and concerning Marriage, and contracts of Marriage, and Divorce, as well from the Bond of Matrimony as Divorce, and separation from bed and board, and alimony, shall and may be heard and determined by and before the Governor or Commander in Chief of this Province, and His Majesty's Council; and that the Governor or Commander in Chief, and Council aforesaid, or any five or more of the said Council, together with the Governor or Commander in Chief, as President, he and they are hereby constituted, appointed and established a Court of Judicature, in the matters and premises aforesaid, with full authority, power and jurisdiction in the same.’

“ And by the seventh section of the same Act, after reciting that ‘ the arduous affairs of Government render it impossible for the Governor or Commander in Chief at all times to preside in person in the Court aforesaid,’ it was further enacted—

‘ That it shall and may be lawful for the Governor or Commander in Chief, by Warrant or Commission under his Hand and Seal, to depute, constitute and appoint the Chief Justice, or either of the Justices of the Supreme Court of Judicature, or the Master of the Rolls, to preside in his place and stead in the said Court of the Governor and Council, and to have, hold and exercise all the powers, privileges, authority and jurisdiction, of the Governor or Commander in Chief in the same Court; and that such Deputy or Vice-President shall have, hold and exercise all such powers, privileges, authority and jurisdiction accordingly, as are hereby given and granted to the Governor or Commander in Chief in the same Court, in all the causes, matters, and things therein cognizable by this Act.’

“ That in the year 1834, by an Act made and passed in the fourth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled ‘ An Act for the further regulation of the formation of the Court of Governor and Council for the determination of all suits and controversies touching and concerning Marriage and Divorce,’ after setting forth that the separation of the Executive from the Legislative Council, and their division into two distinct bodies, had made it necessary to make ‘ some further provision in respect of the Constitution of the said Court,’ it was enacted—

‘ That from and after the passing of this Act, the Members of the said Court of Governor and Council, in and by the said fifth section of the said hereinbefore in part recited Act mentioned and constituted, shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief of, and His Majesty's Executive Council for, the said Province, for the time being, together with any one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, or the Master of the Rolls of the said Province, to be from time to time for that purpose appointed, as Vice-President of the same Court; which appointment of such Vice-President to be made in manner as directed by the seventh section of the said hereinbefore in part recited Act; and such Vice-President, when so appointed, shall have, hold, and exercise, in the absence of the said Lieutenant Governor, all the powers, privileges, authority and jurisdiction mentioned and declared in and by the

‘ said

‘ said seventh section of the said hereinbefore in part recited Act: And that the  
 ‘ Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief of the said Province for the time  
 ‘ being, shall, and is hereby declared to be President of the said Court; but the said  
 ‘ Vice-President so to be appointed as aforesaid, and any two Members of His Ma-  
 ‘ jesty’s Executive Council for the said Province for the time being, shall and are  
 ‘ hereby declared to be a sufficient number of Members at all times to constitute a  
 ‘ Court for the dispatch and determining of all matters or business brought before the  
 ‘ said Court that may be within the jurisdiction of the same.’

“ And by the second section it was enacted—‘ That the said Court of Governor and  
 ‘ Council, so constituted as in and by this Act is directed, shall have all the powers,  
 ‘ authority, privileges, judicature, and jurisdiction, that are given to the Court of  
 ‘ Governor and Council mentioned and constituted in and by the said hereinbefore  
 ‘ in part recited Act; and that all the provisions of the said hereinbefore in part  
 ‘ recited Act, so far as the same relate to the Court of Governor and Council therein  
 ‘ mentioned, and to all matters within the jurisdiction thereof, shall also extend and  
 ‘ be construed to extend and apply to the Court of Governor and Council in this Act  
 ‘ mentioned and constituted, except so far as the same are hereby altered as to the  
 ‘ constitution of the said Court.’

“ That these Acts now form the constitution of the said Court, and that they do  
 impose a peremptory obligation on the Judges of the Supreme Court and the Master  
 of the Rolls, to discharge the duties of Vice-President of the Court of Marriage and  
 Divorce, when thereunto appointed in the manner directed by the same.

“ That considering the nature and character of the Courts over which the Judges  
 and Master of the Rolls respectively preside, and the duties incident to such situations,  
 as also of those of the Court of Marriage and Divorce, and the duties of its Vice-  
 President; the large amount of business constantly before the Supreme Court imposing  
 such onerous duties on the Judges, and the fact that the Law has appointed the same  
 periods for holding the Supreme Court and Court of Marriage and Divorce, independ-  
 ently of the undoubted right of the Administrator of the Government to appoint any  
 of the Officers mentioned in the Acts, it is the decided opinion of this Committee,  
 that His Excellency, in appointing the Master of the Rolls, exercised the Prerogative  
 of the Crown with sound discretion.

“ That your Committee have, with serious attention, carefully perused the correspon-  
 dence and information furnished by His Excellency, and cannot avoid the conclusion  
 that the Master of the Rolls, having accepted that office with full knowledge of all its  
 legal liabilities and duties, was not warranted in declining to receive the Commission  
 and refusing to discharge the duties of Vice-President of the Court of Marriage and  
 Divorce, so by Law imposed upon him: That for want of a Vice-President, a failure  
 of Justice in such Court has taken place, the presence of that officer being indispen-  
 sable—a difficulty which would have been at once removed by a prompt exercise of  
 the Prerogative; and the Committee regret, that to His Excellency’s forbearance, on  
 this occasion, is to be attributed the present disorganized state of one of the highest  
 legal tribunals of the country.

“ Your Committee recommend that an humble Address be presented to His Excel-  
 lency, praying that effective measures may be forthwith taken for the due organization  
 of the said Court, and that a Bill should be submitted to the House, authorizing a  
 special Term of the same to be holden on the third Tuesday of March next, in order  
 to meet the present emergency.

*Ordered,* That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Nathaniel Green, of South Richmond, in the Parish of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, praying that a Grant may pass to enable him to pay the purchase money to the Crown on one hundred acres of Land upon which he has erected a Grist Mill; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to the Agricultural Interests of the Province, to report thereon.

Mr.

Mr. Gilbert, by leave, presented a Petition from Samuel Mahood, and sixty three others, inhabitants of the Parishes of Hampstead and Petersville, in Queens' County, praying that an additional Grant may pass towards a Courier on the Road from the Nerepis, by way of the Jerusalem Settlement, to William Duren's, and from thence to Gage Town, instead of the present route ; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to the Post Office Establishment in the Province, to report thereon.

Mr. Woodward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

who, being called to the Clerk's Table, were there duly sworn well and truly to try the several matters of the said Petition referred to them, and a true judgment give thereon according to the evidence.

Mr. Wark moved for leave to bring in a Bill to alter the Great Road from Dorchester to Chatham.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed on the fifteenth day of February last, to take under consideration the subject of the Laws for the construction of Railways throughout the Province, reported, that the Committee having the matter again before them, had prepared a Bill, under the Title of—"A Bill to facilitate the making of a Railway from Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, to Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, and Branches thereof;"—which he was directed to submit to the House, and at the same time to request that the powers of the Committee be continued.

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Thomas Watt, Alexander Campbell, and George D. Street, praying to be refunded the sum of seventy eight pounds fifteen shillings, and to be relieved from certain Bonds given to the Crown, upon which proceedings have been taken, and an Extent now in the hands of the Sheriff of Charlotte, have attended to that duty, and beg leave to Report—

"That after examining all witnesses and documentary evidence produced before them, as also, after hearing the Commissioner of Crown Lands, it appears that James Rait, at the time of his death, was largely indebted to the Crown, for which debt he had given Bonds, and that subsequent to his death the Attorney General instituted proceedings for the recovery thereof:—That after the sale of a large amount of Real Estate in the County of Charlotte, by the Sheriff of that County, the sum of three hundred and fifteen pounds, (being the balance then supposed to be due the Crown thereon,) was levied on the Property of the Petitioner, which at the date of said Bonds was owned by the said James Rait, and subsequently sold by him, but continued liable to the said Crown Debt; which said Property, so levied on, was sold under such levy, and purchased for him by Alexander Campbell and G. D. Street, who paid seventy eight pounds fifteen shillings in cash, in part discharge thereof, and gave Bonds for the balance of the said sum of three hundred and fifteen pounds:—That since the giving of the said Bonds, it has been discovered that the balance of the Crown claim, and costs, at the time of the sale of the Property of Thomas Watt, was only two hundred and thirty six pounds five shillings, instead of three hundred and fifteen pounds, the amount settled for. Thomas Watt also claims against the Crown the sum of two hundred

hundred and fifty five pounds, alleged to have been paid to the Crown by James Rait, in his life time, and for which he had received no credit in computing the sum for which the Extent was issued.

“ Your Committee have examined the vouchers offered, and the evidence before them, to establish the claim of two hundred and fifty five pounds, and have referred to the Books in the Crown Land Office, and they are satisfied that the sum of two hundred and fifty five pounds has never been credited to Rait in his account with the Crown.

“ Your Committee are of opinion, that Thomas Watt is entitled to the benefit of the money paid, amounting to seventy eight pounds fifteen shillings, and also to have the Bonds cancelled, inasmuch as the money was paid, and the Bonds given by his Agents to relieve his Property from a Crown claim of two hundred and thirty six pounds five shillings, when at the same time Rait had paid two hundred and fifty five pounds, for which he had not received credit. It appears to your Committee, that as Rait paid two hundred and fifty five pounds into the Crown Land Office, which was not carried to his credit, and the balance of the Extent really due, when Watt's property was sold, was only two hundred and thirty six pounds five shillings, that the difference, amounting to the sum of eighteen pounds fifteen shillings, is justly due to the Trustees of the Creditors of Rait.

“ Your Committee therefore recommend that the sum of eighteen pounds fifteen shillings be appropriated to the Trustees of the Creditors of the late James Rait, and also, that the sum of seventy eight pounds fifteen shillings be granted to the said Alexander Campbell and G. D. Street for the benefit of the said Thomas Watt; and further, that the Bonds taken from them, for the balance of the said sale, be cancelled on payment of the costs, or that an appropriation in Supply be made for that purpose.

*Treasury, Saint John, 21th February, 1847.*

SIR,—In compliance with the directions of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, as contained in your letters of the 18th, 22d, and 23d instant, I have the honor to submit a Schedule of an establishment for collecting and protecting the Revenues, in case of the repeal of the Discriminating Duties at present collected by the Customs, and for disbursing the same by the Provincial Treasurer, with the following observations.

As suggested by His Excellency, I have assumed that the Treasurer is to be stationed at Fredericton, where his duties will be to superintend the collecting and warehousing department throughout the Province, receive and embody the Accounts of all the Deputies into general Returns and Abstracts for the information of the Government, and receive, disburse and account for all Revenues; this I propose to undertake with one efficient Clerk, and an Office Keeper or Messenger, the latter to be capable of doing some plain writing occasionally.

The duties of the Deputy at Saint John, will, under this arrangement, be confined to that Port alone, but as some of his time must be given to a supervision of the out-door offices, &c., I have allotted him a Clerk at a salary of £200. As diligent watchfulness is the only means of checking the attempt to land goods clandestinely, I have estimated for nearly as large an out-door establishment at Saint John as is at present required by the Collector of the Customs; and I do not think that the safety of the Revenue or justice to the legal importer will admit of any further reduction in this branch of the service. His Excellency will perceive that I have made the Out-Bays more expensive than is estimated by the Collectors of the Customs; but agreeably to His Excellency's instructions, I have taken into consideration the extension of the warehousing system throughout the Province causing an increase of upwards of £1000 per annum, which additional expense need not be incurred until the merchants and traders at the several places evince a desire to profit by this facility to trade.

The whole amount of the Schedule now submitted by me for the collection, protection and disbursement of the Revenues, is only £9072 10 0 currency.

The existing expenditure, exclusive of the proposed addition for warehousing at the several Out-Bays, stands thus:—

Thus the present proposed Schedule will leave upwards of £2000 currency towards such portion of Salaries as should be paid by the Province to the Customs Officers that H. M. Government may deem requisite on account of the Registry and Navigation Laws.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to The Resolutions of Appropriation sent up from the Assembly, dated the twenty fifth day of February last.

On motion of Mr. Street,

The House went into Committee of the whole on a Bill to incorporate the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick.

Mr. Miles in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.

*Ordered,* That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee of Trade, submitted a Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, to take into consideration and report upon all matters connected with the Trade of the Province, have had under consideration—

“No. 1. The Petition of Neil Henderson, of Shediac, in the County of Westmorland, praying a return of Duty paid by him on a Horse brought from Prince Edward Island, as part of his stock, when removing to this Province: The Committee recommend that a Grant pass of £2, to reimburse him for said Duty.

“No. 2. The Petition of William Carman, Tide Surveyor at Miramichi, praying an additional allowance for his services in that capacity, by reason of increased duties in his Office: The Committee recommend that an increase of Salary of £15 be granted him.

“No. 3. The Petition of the Reverend Donald M'Phail, praying remission of Duties paid on a Horse under similar circumstances to the case of No. 1: The Committee recommend that £2 be granted to him for said Duty.

“No. 4. The Petition of James Kirk, President of the Marine Insurance Company, John Duncan, President of the Globe Assurance Company, H. P. Sturdie, Agent for Lloyd's, and one hundred and fifteen Ship-Owners, Merchants and others, of Saint John, setting forth the great perils the shipping interests are subject to by reason of no Harbour of Refuge being in existence between Saint John and Passamaquoddy Bay, and praying that Legislative provision be made for the erection of a Breakwater at Dipper Harbour, in the Bay of Fundy, in part to provide for the deficiency: The Committee recommend that £500 be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, from the Light House Fund, to be applied towards this object, if, after a proper survey, it be ascertained that such erection will be attended with beneficial results to the Trade.

“No. 5. The Petition of James R. Tupper, Proprietor of a line of Stages between Fredericton and the Grand Falls, praying a Grant for a return of Duties on Horses imported from Nova Scotia, and Carriages from the United States: The Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“No. 6. The Petition of James Drake, of Fredericton, praying for pecuniary aid to enable him to run a Steamboat between the Grand Falls of the River Saint John and the River Saint Francis; and

“No. 32. The Petition of R. R. "No. 19. The Petition of the Honorable John Robertson, President of the Chamber of Commerce, Saint John, setting forth the heavy burthens now existing on Tonnage, by the tax for supporting Light Houses, and praying relief: The Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

"No. 20. The Petition of John Wilson, praying a Grant of money for the further improvement of Dark Harbour, at Grand Manan: Your Committee recommend an appropriation of £100 towards this object.

"No. 21. The Petition of Alexander Anderson, Tide Waiter at the Port of Bathurst, praying an additional allowance, for reasons as stated in No. 2: The Committee recommend that £7 10s. per annum, be granted him.

“ The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of James Vernon, praying to be compensated for certain damages by him sustained on account of the title of the Crown to certain Lands granted to him having proved defective, Report—

“ That having attended to that duty, they find that a Grant of fifty acres of Land passed under the Great Seal of this Province, in favor of the Petitioner, dated the twenty fourth day of August, 1839 :—That this Grant was made on the Petition of Mr. Vernon, after a Survey at his expense by Mr. Deputy Mahood :—That the Land comprehended in this Grant was only valuable to the Petitioner as connected with a Stream, on the mouth of which his Mills are situated :—That after having obtained his said Grant, the Petitioner made very considerable additions to his dam, buildings and machinery :—That in the year 1842 an action of ejectment was commenced against the Petitioner, to turn him out of possession of the land so granted to him; on which he applied to the then Surveyor General, requesting that some competent person should be sent from the Crown Land Office further to ascertain his lines, and test the correctness of Mr. Mahood's Survey :—That a competent person (Mr. Inches) was accordingly dispatched, and that he, at the expense of the Petitioner, after elaborate survey, as appears by his Report, ascertained the correctness of Mr. Mahood's survey, and also found that it was in strict accordance with ancient blazings, which he states to have been upwards of fifty years old :—That Petitioner thus felt himself safe in defending the said action of ejectment, which came on to be tried at the Saint John adjourned Circuit held in November 1842, when a verdict passed against Petitioner :—That the grounds of this finding were afterwards brought under the consideration of the Supreme Court at Bar ;—and that in Michaelmas Term, 1843, the judgment of the Court was given, sustaining the said verdict, rather because the Crown, by the language used in the description of certain contiguous Grants, had admitted itself to be out of possession of the land granted to Petitioner, than that any previous Grant of these lands had been made. Your Committee are of opinion that the case of the Petitioner is one of great hardship, and that he should be made whole to the amount of the several surveys made at his expense, the purchase money paid in, and the costs incurred. The Accounts have been before your Committee, and they recommend that a grant of one hundred and fifty pounds eight shillings and eight pence be made to him, to be placed to his credit on account of any purchases of land or berths he may hereafter make from the Crown.

Mr. Connell, from the Committee appointed on the second day of February last, to take into consideration a Petition from Thomas E. Perley, and others, proprietors of Lands at the Grand Falls, in the County of Carleton; and to which Committee were referred Petitions from William Lowry and Francis Haydon, on the eighth day of the same month, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Thomas E. Perley, C. A. Hammond, and others, occupiers of Crown Land at the Grand Falls of the River Saint John and its vicinity, praying that measures may be adopted by which they may obtain legal titles to the same, Report—

“That they have attended to that duty, and find that by a Survey of the Land included in the Bend of the River at the Grand Falls in June 1842, it was laid out into a Town Plat; since which time, several persons have taken possession of various portions of the same, and erected Buildings, and otherwise improved the Land so held by them:—That since that period, namely in 1845, a Survey was made of a large Tract of Land for the use of Her Majesty's Ordnance Department, containing 1,571½ acres, of which quantity, 121½ acres are on the western side of the River, and by which the Survey of the Town Plat formerly laid out is entirely destroyed and rendered useless:—That since the Survey of the Military Lands, many persons being unable to obtain Land at the Grand Falls in the usual manner by purchase, (the Government having refused to sell any of the Crown Lands in that neighbourhood,) have taken possession of such spaces as appeared vacant, and have erected Buildings and made other extensive improvements thereon.

“Your Committee are unable to ascertain why the Executive Government have refused to sell the Crown Lands in the vicinity of the Grand Falls, and they are of opinion, that by such refusal, the settlement of that part of the Province has been greatly retarded.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that although the settlers at the Grand Falls have taken illegal possession of the Crown Lands, yet at the present time to submit their improvements to public competition at Auction, would create a state of things which they cannot contemplate without dread. Your Committee therefore recommend, that an humble Address should be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that a Commission may be appointed to investigate and report upon the several claims of the respective parties holding or pretending to hold any Land in that vicinity; and further, that a fresh Survey should be made of the whole of the space eligible for a Town site, and that suitable reservations should be made for the necessary Public Buildings, Places of Worship, Markets, &c. To enable the Executive Government to deal out justice and equity to the several claimants, your Committee are of opinion, that a Bill should be passed by the Legislature, authorizing the Executive Government to dispose of, by private sale, to the respective parties, such portions of the Land on which they may have made improvements, and established to the satisfaction of His Excellency in Council, any claims in equity or justice, and the disposal of which would not militate against the good of the public; for which purpose your Committee have prepared a Bill.

“With regard to the Petition of William Lowry, Senior, your Committee beg to report, that he purchased fifty acres in the Londonderry Association on the 30th January, 1843, for £8 2 6, and gave the usual Bond for payment of the purchase money; he has paid interest in full to January 1846, being now indebted 19s. 6d. for interest, and £8 2 6 principal, 8th February, 1847.

The western half of the Lot was granted to Lowry, the eastern half being reserved. Mr. O'Keleher's survey included part of the Lot which had been granted the previous year, (1841) to Thomas Gregory; and it is upon this part that Lowry has improved.

"Had Mr. O'Keleher made the proper inquiries with regard to the adjoining Grants, before he surveyed, he would not have made such a mistake. The part of the Lot which O'Keleher surveyed for Lowry, which had been previously granted to Gregory, adjoins the eastern or reserved part; there is no collision between the Grants, but as Lowry has improved upon Land which he had reason to believe belonged to him, your Committee recommend that a Grant of £20 be made to him, to enable him to purchase such part of Gregory's Land upon which he has improved.

"In regard to the Petition of Francis Haydon, your Committee beg to report, that in 1841 he applied for and obtained a Survey of sixty acres of Land, part of Lot No. 11, South side of Restigouche, and on paying the purchase money he obtained a Grant of the same. Mr. Hunter's return states, that there were no improvements, but that the Land above was occupied and improved by the Widow of Thomas Ferguson, and that below by John M'Gowan, neither of which persons have obtained Grants: But as it appears that there is no interference whatever with the Land so granted to him, your Committee are unable to ascertain that he has sustained any injury, and cannot therefore recommend further action upon the said Petition.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM SIR WILLIAM COLEBROOKE TO THE RIGHT HON. EARL GRAY, DATED 10TH NOVEMBER, 1846.

MY LORD,—It is with sincere regret that it devolves on me to report to Your Lordship the melancholy death of Captain Pipon, of the Royal Engineers, who, in descending the Restigouche River in a canoe, was, on the 28th ultimo, overset in the Rapids, and although he swam in safety to the shore, he subsequently lost his life in an effort to save that of one of the persons who accompanied him.

Lieutenant Henderson, of the Royal Engineers, who repaired to the spot, brought the remains of his brother Officer to Fredericton for interment, and he is about to proceed to the Grand Falls to conclude the operations for the season in which they had been jointly engaged.

Through this melancholy accident the important service intrusted to Captain Pipon, will, I apprehend, be delayed, a circumstance greatly to be regretted.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM SIR W. M. G. COLEBROOKE TO THE RIGHT HON. EARL GREY, DATED FREDERICTON, N. B., NOVEMBER 27TH, 1846.

MY LORD,—Referring to my Despatches, Nos. 100 and 102, of the 10th and 13th instant, I have the honor to report to Your Lordship, that Lieutenant Henderson, of the Royal Engineers, returned to Fredericton with Mr. Grant, of the Surveyor General's Department, on the 25th instant, from the Upper Saint John.

I understand that the exploration of the Line for a Trunk Railway has still to be completed to the Saint Lawrence, but Lieutenant Henderson will be guided by his instructions whether to prosecute it during the winter.

I have received from Messieurs Bourdillon and Sons, Solicitors for a proposed Halifax and Quebec Land Railway and Colonization Society which appears to be forming in London, a prospectus of their plan for raising a fund through the subscriptions of the working classes.

The subject will require much and serious consideration, and I will take an early opportunity of communicating to Your Lordship my opinion on this project.

MY LORD,—I have the honor to transmit the copy of a Letter which I have received from Earl Cathcart, with a Report from the Board of Trade at Montreal, recommending the establishment of an Electric Telegraph from Halifax to Toronto, and having brought the subject under the consideration of the Executive Council, they have advised that the proposal should be recommended to the support of the Provincial Legislature, which will be appointed to meet for the dispatch of business on the 29th January next.

In connexion with this subject, and with reference to the project in contemplation for establishing a line of Railway through the British Provinces, I also enclose copy of some observations which have been addressed to me by Mr. Wilkinson of the Surveyor General's Department, whose intelligent papers on the subject of Railways on this Continent were forwarded to Mr. Gladstone.

When the Surveyors, now engaged in exploring the country, may have decided upon the most eligible direction for the Railway from the Atlantic to Quebec, it may be found practicable, by openings through the forests, to establish an Electric Telegraph along the whole line, and to connect it with one to Montreal and Toronto.

In connexion with this subject, and with reference to the prospectus which was transmitted to me by Messieurs Bourdillon and Sons, of London, and enclosed with my Despatch, No. 106, dated the 27th November last, in which it is proposed to invite subscriptions from the working classes with a view to raise a capital for the construction of the Railway, and the formation of Settlements on the contiguous lands, I am led to observe, that such a proposal is deserving of attention, and is generally regarded favorably in this Province; but if the plan should be carried out, it will be desirable to guard the working classes from forming expectations of being able to realize a profit from investment of capital in the settlement of Wilderness Lands; neither do I conceive that it would be prudent to encourage them to invest their savings in a line of Railway through these Provinces without a public guarantee of a minimum rate of profit (say three per cent. per annum) on the capital so invested, in consideration of the general advantages to be derived from such a work.

With this guarantee, which would probably be merely nominal, and with the prospects of employment for skilled and unskilled laborers, added to the possession of land adjacent to the Railway Stations, the settlement of the country may be simultaneously promoted.

It would be premature to enter further into the consideration of this subject at the present time, or till the Officers who are engaged in exploring the country have made their reports; and I have been prompted only to make these observations to Your Lordship on the prospectus in question in order to guard against any misconception of the principles on which the working classes might be safely invited to co-operate in so vast an undertaking; and as I am disposed to concur with Mr. Wilkinson, that when the line has been traced out, the advantage attending a progressive execution of the work might lead to an early commencement of it by means of a capital thus raised.

2d. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the Reports of the Board of Health for the Counties of Northumberland and Gloucester, with the Accounts accompanying them, should be referred by the House to the Committee of Supply.

3d. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the Communication from the Auditor General, relative to the increased duties of his Office, and the inadequacy of the allowance for Clerkship, together with the Documents accompanying it, should be referred by the House to a Select Committee to report thereon.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions reported by the Committee adopted by the House, and leave to sit again granted.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Mr. Taylor, Chairman of the Committee to try the matters of the Petition of Andrew Rainsford Wetmore, Esquire, and others, of the County of Sunbury, complaining of the undue election and return of George Hayward and Thomas Odber Miles, Esquires, as Members for that County, communicated to the House, that they had closed the investigation,

investigation, and submitted their Report, which he read, and then handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“ The Select Committee appointed to take into consideration the Petition of A. R. Wetmore, Esquire, and others, against the return of George Hayward and Thomas O. The Committee further report, that the allegations in the said Petition against the Sheriff of Sunbury, have not been sustained by the Petitioners, but that the conduct of the said Sheriff during the said Election was characterized by prudence and impartiality ; and the Committee further report, that the said Petition was not frivolous or vexatious.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the matters referred to them again under their consideration, had passed a number of Resolutions ; and he having read the same, handed them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were again read, and are as follow :—

*Resolved,* That there be granted

To Joseph Read, Supervisor of the Great Road from Bathurst towards Tracadie, the sum of £10 for exploring and reporting on a proper site for a Bridge over the South Branch of Caraquet River, in the County of Gloucester, pursuant to an Address of the House of Assembly to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for that purpose.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £— to pay for the carrying over to Dalhousie one hundred stand of Arms for the use of the Militia in Restigouche.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, it was decided in the negative.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £50 to improve the Public Wharf at the foot of Regent Street, in the City of Fredericton.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £500 for the purpose of encouraging the erection of Oat Mills in proper situations throughout the Province ; no greater sum than twenty five pounds to be appropriated to the owner of any one Mill and Kiln ; the said Bounty not to be paid until it shall be certified to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, by the Court of General Sessions of the Peace of the County within which such Oat Mill and Kiln may be situate, for which such Bounty is claimed, that the same have been established at a convenient place for the accommodation of the inhabitants of the County, and are actually in operation, and in every respect properly fitted for the manufacture of Oat Meal ; provided that no Mill or Kiln which may have received any previous Bounty, by virtue of any Law or Resolution heretofore made, shall be entitled to the Bounty given by this Resolution.

To Ruth Baird, the Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, the sum of £5, being the amount of half year's Pension ending in January 1844, which by mistake she never received.

To Isaac Budd, Son of Elizabeth Budd, deceased, formerly the Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, the sum of £7 10s., being the amount of Pension due to his Mother at her decease.

To Thomas Turner the sum of £— to reimburse him in part for monies expended by him in the support of sick and distressed Emigrants.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, it was decided in the negative.

To Timothy Kehoe the sum of £30 to remunerate him for attending to the Draw of the Oromocto Bridge for the years 1841 and 1843.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, it was decided in the negative.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask for leave to sit again to-morrow.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions as passed in the Committee engrossed, and that the House do to-morrow resolve itself into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Without making any amendments thereto.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to

The Bill to establish the Road leading from the lower Landing at the Grand Falls, known as the new Portage Road, in the County of Carleton, to the American Boundary, (to include the Ferry Landing,) as one of the Great Roads of Communication in the Province,

Without making any amendment thereto.

And that the Council had also agreed to

The Bill for erecting the Parish of Harvey, in the County of Albert, into three separate Parishes,

With amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of the Assembly.

The amendments made by the Legislative Council were then severally read a first time, and are as follow :—

At A in Section I. expunge the words "and also all that other part of the said Parish of Harvey which lies to the west of the line running from the Bay Shore, and commencing at the south west angle of the Lot number eleven, granted to one Thomas Kinne, north by the magnet until it strikes the line above described as the southern boundary of the said Parish of Elgin, be and the same is hereby erected and constituted a separate Parish, to be called the Parish of Kincardine."

At B in Section II. expunge the word "Kincardine."

At C in the Preamble, expunge the word "three," and insert the word "two."

At D in the Title, expunge the word "three," and insert the word "two."

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

A Bill in addition to and further to extend the provisions of an Act to encourage the establishment of Banks for Savings in the Province.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Ritchie take the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee of Trade, submitted a second Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee of Trade, in further investigating the several matters referred to them, have had under their consideration the following Petitions, viz:—

“No. 30. The Petition of Henry Fisher and others, of the County of York, praying that an additional allowance may be made N. Wheeler, Preventive Officer in that County, to enable him to adopt more effective measures to check Illicit Trade: The Committee recommend that the sum of £20 additional be placed at the disposal of His Excellency to remunerate this Officer for his services.

“No. 31. The Petition of Amos Dickinson, of Wakefield, County of Carleton, praying a remission of Duties paid on six hundred and fifty tons Timber in 1843, by reason of the said Timber having become subject to an Export Duty at the place of shipment, under a subsequent Act of Assembly: The prayer of this Petition your Committee cannot recommend.

“No. 33. The Petition of Hugh M'Monagle, of the Parish of Sussex Vale, Kings' County, praying to be reimbursed Duties on two Entire Horses, of a superior description, imported from New York: The Committee recommend that £4 be granted him.

“No. 34. The Petition of Samuel Abbot and others, of the County of Charlotte, praying for the abolition of the Imperial Duty on Wheat Flour imported into this Province: As this matter is more especially for the consideration of the whole House in Committee of Ways and Means, your Committee think it unnecessary to express an opinion on the subject.

“No. 35. The Petition of Andrew Barberie, President of the Restigouche Agricultural Society, praying a remission of Duties paid on six Ayrshire Cattle, and sundry Agricultural Implements imported for the use of that Society: The Committee recommend that £11 13 1 be granted him.

“No. 36. The Petition of Roderick M'Kenzie, of Newcastle, County of Northumberland, praying Legislative protection on the manufacture of Rakes, Scythe Sneaths, and Forks: This, like No. 34, is a subject for the consideration of the Committee of Ways and Means.

“No. 37. The Petition of John Wright, President of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, praying a return of Duties paid on two Entire Horses, imported in 1846 from the United States: The Committee recommend that £4 be granted him.

“No. 38. The Petition of Charles C. Stewart, of Saint John, praying a remission of Duties paid on British Sheathing Copper, imported from the United States for his Ships “James Stewart” and “Athol,” employed in prosecuting the Whale Fishery: As Copper for this purpose had been previously ordered from England and shipped in a Ship called the “Hibernia,” which Vessel was wrecked on her voyage to Saint John, and Mr. Stewart was thereupon compelled to replace it by an importation from the United States, the Committee recommend that £76 6 9 be granted him.

“No. 39. The Petition of Jane Brown, of Hampton, Kings' County, praying reimbursement of Duties paid on an Iron House imported from Liverpool for construction in New Brunswick, which House was destroyed by fire previously to its being erected: The Committee recommend that £16 13 4 be granted her.

“No. 40.

“ No. 40. The Petition of Joseph Michaud, of Madawaska, in the County of Carleton, praying relief by reason of a seizure of a Horse under peculiar circumstances: It clearly appears that the Petitioner has become subject to much loss by this seizure, and they recommend his claim to the favourable consideration of the House on further information being afforded.

“ No. 41. The Petition of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, praying a Grant for the purpose of placing Buoys on the Reefs at the entrance of the Harbour, and to extend the Breakwater at Sand Point: The Committee recommend that the sum of £200 be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, towards the first object prayed for;—the Grant for the Breakwater your Committee cannot at present recommend.

“ No. 42. The Petition from the same Corporation, praying remission of Duties paid on Fire Hose imported from the United States for the use of the Fire Department: The Committee recommend that £15 19 5 be granted them.

“ No. 43. The Petition of John Kinnear, of Saint John, praying a Grant to reimburse him for Duties over-paid on Oil imported from the United States: As the Certificate from the Province Treasurer clearly shows that £7 10s. has been so over-paid, the Committee recommend a Grant for that amount.

“ No. 44. The Petition of William Mackay, of Saint John, praying Legislative encouragement in aid of his Steam Establishment for the manufacture of Clap Boards, Shingles, &c. for exportation: The Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“ No. 45. The Petition of the Honorable William Crane and others, of Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, praying that measures may be adopted to establish a Port of Entry and Free Port at that place: As the whole question of the Custom House Establishment must necessarily come before the House, the Committee entertain no doubt that the claims of the Petitioners will receive the proper consideration.

“ No. 46. The Petition of Robert Watson, Deputy Treasurer at Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, praying reimbursement of expenses incurred in proceedings had against John Marks, for refusing to execute a Bond to the Crown under the Act of 7 Vict. c. 18: The Committee recommend that £6 6 6 be granted him.

“ No. 47. The Petition of Henry E. Dibblee, Sub-Collector and Deputy Treasurer at Woodstock, praying a Grant to reimburse him for Office Rent: As this subject has been under consideration of the House for many previous Sessions, and not been entertained, your Committee cannot discover any good reasons for departing from the decision of former Houses.

“ No. 48. The Petition of George Rogers and others, of the County of Albert, praying that measures may be taken to establish a Port of Entry and Free Port in that County: On this Petition your Committee have but to reiterate the expressions contained in Report No. 45.

“ No. 49. The Petition of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, praying a Grant towards constructing approaches to the Breakwater in that City: As it appears that the communication with the Breakwater is entirely cut off in consequence of its being taken for Military purposes, the Committee recommend that the sum of £500 be appropriated;—the amount not to be drawn until it be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council that a similar amount has been raised by subscription or otherwise, and is applicable towards this object.

“ No. 50. The Petition of Joseph F. Allison and others, praying that the Export Duties on Lumber cut upon private property may be repealed: Your Committee regret that relief cannot be afforded the Petitioners without materially affecting in other respects the Export Duty Act now in operation.

“ No. 51. Is the Petition of Barzillai Ansley, of Saint John, praying reimbursement of Duties paid on a quantity of Wheat imported into that place on the second March, 1846: The Committee having considered particularly the allegations of this Petition, and the Affidavit and Certificate attached to it, are of opinion that a Grant of £15 18s. should be granted him.

“ No. 52. The Petition of Flewelling and Reading, of Saint John, praying reimbursement of Duty paid on a barrel of Rum destroyed by accident in the Bonded Warehouse at that place: The Committee do not recommend the prayer of this Petition.

"No. 53. The Petition of Thomas Sime, Junior, praying a Grant for Return Duties paid on Corn Broom Brush for the manufacture of Brooms, imported from the United States: The Committee recommend that a Grant of £5 5 2 pass in favor of the Petitioner.

"No. 54. The Petition of the Honorable Charles Simonds, and others, of Saint John and Portland, praying Legislative aid towards erecting Ferry Landings for the Public accommodation at Indian Town, in Portland, and the opposite side, in the event of the Portland and Lancaster Steam Ferry Company becoming a Law: The Committee recommend £100 to be applied towards this object.

"No. 55. The Petition of William H. Scovil, of Saint John, setting forth that he had purchased in Great Britain a new and substantial built Iron Steamer, constructed on the latest and most approved principle, and praying encouragement towards keeping up and maintaining a weekly communication between Shediac, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou, by means of said vessel: The Committee recommend that the sum of £250 annually, for three years, be placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, towards this object, to be paid at the expiration of each year, for the said three successive years, on the requisite certificate being produced, that a Boat answering the description alleged in the said Petition, has run once a week during open water, between the aforesaid places, (unavoidable accidents excepted) for the accomodation of passengers and conveyance of freight.

"No. 56. The Petition of James Whitney, of Saint John, praying a return of Duties paid by him on Steam Boat Machinery imported from the United States in the year 1836: The Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

"No. 57. The Petition of Robert Jardine, in behalf of himself and others, Commissioners for establishing 'a Sailors Home' in the City of Saint John, setting forth that individual subscriptions had been made to the extent of £2000 towards such Institution, and praying further Legislative aid: The Committee recommend an additional appropriation of £1000 from the Marine Hospital Fund, to be applied towards this humane and benevolent object.

"No. 58. The Petition of Kendall and Nash, and others, of Fredericton, praying that the Duty on Rum, the produce of British Plantations, may be reduced: This being a subject for consideration in Committee of Ways and Means, your Committee express no opinion on the subject.

"No. 59. The Petition of Otis Small, of Saint John, praying reimbursement of Duties paid on Bricks imported in 1841, from the United States, for the erection of the new Custom House: This matter having been adjudicated upon unfavourably to the prayer of the Petitioner by former Houses, your Committee can discover no reason to disturb such adjudication.

"No. 60. The Petition of the President and Officers of the Ladies' Total Abstinence Society in Saint John, praying that the importation of Alcohol or intoxicating Liquors into this Province may be prohibited, or that Legislative measures may be taken to prevent the consumption thereof to the extent now existing: Your Committee recommend this subject to the consideration of the whole House in Committee of Ways and Means.

"No. 61. The Petition of William Connell and others, praying Legislative aid to encourage the running of a line of Steam Boats between Fredericton and the Grand Falls: The Committee are of opinion, with reference to this application, that the interests of the Petitioners would be better secured by some removal of the obstructions now existing in the navigation of the River between those points.

"No. 62. The Petition of Robert B. Cutler, of Buctouche, in the County of Kent, praying return of Export Duty paid on a cargo of Timber and Deals shipped in the Brig 'Mary Ann,' which vessel was anchored subsequently in the Harbour, and the cargo relanded: The Committee recommend that £17 16s. be granted him.

"No. 63. The Petition of Charles N. Smith and others, Commissioners of Buoys and Beacons at Buctouche, praying a Grant to assist them in erecting new Buoys and Beacons in that Harbour: The Committee recommend an appropriation of £40 towards this object.

"No. 64. The Petition of Thomas M. Deblois and others, Commissioners of Buoys and Beacons at Bathurst, in the County of Gloucester, praying a Grant to enable them to pay a balance due to them in that capacity: The Committee recommend that a Grant of £76 be made them.

"No. 65.

“ No. 65. The Petition of John Doran, Tidewaiter, at Shippegan, in the County of Gloucester, praying an additional Grant by reason of increased duties of his office : The Committee recommend an increased Grant of £15 to him.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed on the twenty third day of February last, to take into consideration the subject of the Laws now in force relating to Marriages, reported—That they had under their consideration a Petition from the Presbytery of New Brunswick, and the Reverend Robert Irvine and others, presented on the twenty sixth day of the same month, praying for an Act of Incorporation, and had prepared a Bill for that purpose, which he was directed to submit to the House, and to request that the powers of the Committee be continued.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the Committee continued to enable them to report further upon the matters referred for their consideration.

The Bill, as reported by the Committee, under the Title of—“ A Bill to provide for the Incorporation of certain Presbyterian Churches in this Province,” was then handed in, and read a first time.

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct to be laid before this House, a particular statement, shewing the number of Prosecutions instituted at Saint John during the past year, under the direction of the Emigrant Agent, against Owners and Masters of Vessels, for breaches of the Imperial Act relating to Passengers and Emigrants, specifying the name or names of the Owner or Owners, Master or Masters, and the names of the Vessels, respectively, against which such suits were brought,—the several Fines imposed and recovered,—and the cases, if any, where the party or parties proceeded against escaped conviction ;—The said Return also to shew the name or names of the Magistrate or Magistrates, or other Tribunal, before whom or which such cases were tried and brought to issue.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Tibbits, and Mr. Ritchie, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

The House went into Committee of the whole on a Bill to incorporate the Fredericton Gas Light Company.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made amendments thereto, and then agreed to the said Bill.  
*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted and the Bill engrossed as amended.

On motion of Mr. Partelow.

That the House proceed to the Order of the Day of the eighth day of March instant. and which was adjourned over to this day by operation of the Twenty third Rule of the House, to go into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service—

The Order of the Day being read, the House according thereto resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Botsford in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions as passed in the Committee engrossed, and that the House do to-morrow resolve itself into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Without making any amendments thereto.

And that the Council had also agreed to—

The Bill to continue the several Acts to provide for the greater safety of Passengers on board Steam Boats: and

The Bill further to amend and extend the provisions of an Act, intituled "An Act to incorporate the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Company ;"

With amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of the Assembly.

The amendments made by the Legislative Council to—The Bill further to amend and extend the provisions of an Act, intituled "An Act to incorporate the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Company,"—were severally read a first time, and are as follow :—

At A in Section IX. insert the words "or extensions."

At B in Section XV. insert the words "or extensions."

At C in Section XVII. insert the words "or extension."

At D in Section XIX. expunge the remainder of the Section.

At E in Section XX. insert the words "or extensions."

At F insert a new Section, as follows :—

" XXI. And be it enacted, That no Bye Laws, Orders, Rules and Regulations made under and by virtue of the power and authority of the hereinbefore recited Act shall be of any force or effect until one calendar month after a true copy of such Bye Laws, Orders, Rules or Regulations, certified under the hand of the President of the said Company, shall have been laid before the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government in this Province for the time being, for his approval or disapproval, unless the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government shall before such period signify his approbation of the same."

The amendments made by the Legislative Council to—The Bill to continue the several Acts to provide for the greater safety of Passengers on board Steam Boats,—were severally read a first time, and are as follow :—

At A add the following Sections :—

" II. And be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of May next ensuing, every Steam Boat or Vessel propelled by Steam, carrying Passengers to or from any Port or place within this Province, shall be provided with a good, safe and convenient gangway to the wharf at which she may be lying, such gangway to be not less than two feet wide, with a good hand-rail, or ridge-rope, on one side thereof, suitable for the landing and embarking of Passengers to and from such Steam Boat or Vessel as aforesaid, at all times of the Tide ; such Landing or Gangway to be separate and distinct from that used for landing or loading Coals or Cargo ; and for the greater security of Passengers it shall be incumbent upon the Master and Owner of such Vessel or Boat to have a good light placed at each end of such gangway for one hour at least, before leaving the wharf, and continued until her departure ; and one hour after arrival at the wharf or place of landing and embarking Passengers after dark, that is from sunset to sunrise.

" III. Be it further enacted, That from and after the first day of May next ensuing the passing of this Act, it shall be the duty of the Master and Owner, or person in charge of any such Steam Boat or Vessel plying in the Waters of New Brunswick and in the Bay of Fundy, in addition to any lights which may be required under and by virtue of the eighth section of the first hereinbefore recited Act, to carry at the mast head of such Steam Boat or Vessel, at night, during the time she is under way, and not lower than the top of the funnel, a good, clear and distinct Signal Light, and when within four miles of her port of destination, to place or cause to be placed under the end of the bowsprit of such Vessel, a good, clear and distinct light, which light shall be so kept until alongside of the wharf.

" IV. And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, to appoint three Commissioners, resident within the County of Charlotte, for the Harbours and Inland Waters of the said County, in lieu of the three Commissioners mentioned in the said first recited Act, so far as the said Commissioners' powers are thereby extended to the Harbours and Inland Waters of the said County of Charlotte, with the like powers and authorities to the said Commissioners so to be appointed, as are given to other Commissioners mentioned in the seventh section of the said first recited Act.

" V. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Commissioners duly appointed, as provided in and by the first recited Act, hereby renewed and continued,

and also by this Act, to examine from time to time the several and respective Steam Boats and Vessels plying to or from the respective places for which such Commissioners are appointed, to see that the several provisions of this Act, and the Acts hereby renewed and continued, are complied with, and to make Reports from time to time to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, as to the efficiency of such Steam Boats or Vessels, and their equipment or otherwise, as the case may be."

At B in the Title, insert the words "and amend."

The following Resolution was then moved:—

*Resolved*, That it is the opinion of this Committee, That in enacting a Revenue Bill, by which the Trade of the Province will be regulated, the principle of protection to home industry, irrespective of Revenue, should be recognized, by levying Duties on those productions and manufactures of Foreign Countries which the people of this Province are capable of producing and manufacturing themselves, making a just discrimination between raw materials and manufactured articles. and, as a general rule, admitting raw materials Duty free.

*Resolved*, That a Select Committee be appointed to prepare and report a Bill for raising a Revenue, and that they be instructed to introduce the same, re-enacting the present Revenue Law, to expire on the first day of April, 1848, agreeably to the Resolution just passed in Committee of Ways and Means; and that the same Committee be also instructed to prepare and bring in a Bill embracing the objects contained in the Resolution also just passed, relating to Inter-Colonial Trade; and that the same Committee be further instructed to prepare a Bill for abolishing the Parliamentary Duties, agreeably to the Resolution also passed in Committee of Ways and Means.

*Ordered*, That the Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, and to whom were referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of the Province, be the Committee to take into consideration the several objects embraced in the foregoing Resolution, to report thereon.

On motion of Mr. M'Leod,

Whereas a Bill has passed this House, granting certain pecuniary and other privileges to the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Company, which more than fully carries out the intentions and requirements of the Resolution passed by this House on the fourth day of April, 1846, for the encouragement of a Railway from the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy to Woodstock; therefore

Whereas an appropriation was made by the Legislature in 1845, in manner and form following:—"To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £580 to enable him to relieve John Kerr, one of the Sureties of the late Deputy Treasurer Campbell, of so much that he is liable for as such Surety, on his Bond to the Crown; the said relief not to be extended until the remaining balance of £169 12 2 due from the said Kerr for such liability be first paid into the Provincial Treasury, and that he also pay all costs which may have accrued, arising out of proceedings taken against him to secure the Crown:" And whereas it appears by the Province Treasurer's Accounts now before the House, that a Warrant has been issued for the said sum of £580, which has been received by the said John Kerr, but no credit appears in the Treasurer's Account for that sum as having been received, on account of such liability, nor any part thereof, the Treasurer crediting only the balance, £169 12 2, stipulated in the said Grant, as required to be paid over before such relief could be extended: And whereas it was the intention and meaning of the said appropriation, and is so clearly expressed that it was made solely to relieve the said John Kerr for so much of his liability, and not for the purpose of being drawn by him and otherwise applied; and consequently, in the opinion of this House, some irregularity has arisen, either in the issuing of the

“such relief be afforded, it shall be made to appear clear and satisfactory to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council, that such purchases were made *bona fide* for Mill purposes, and for no other purpose or intent whatsoever.”

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM EARL GREY TO THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR SIR WILLIAM COLEBROOKE, DATED DOWNING STREET, 28TH JULY, 1846.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch No. 52, of the 12th June, in further reference to the resignation by Mr. Perley of the Office of Emigrant Agent at Saint John, New Brunswick.

\* \* \* \* \*

I think you should avail yourself of the first opportunity to represent to the House of Assembly, that Mr. Perley has strong claims on their favourable consideration ; that it is highly conducive to the interests of the Province, that the important duties imposed on the Agent for Emigration, should be discharged by an Officer as efficient as Mr. Perley has hitherto proved himself to be, and that very serious evils may be entailed on the Province by its refusal to make adequate provision for an Office of so much responsibility and labour.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of twenty five pounds to remunerate the Reverend John Sweeny, Roman Catholic Missionary, of Chatham, Miramichi, for spiritual aid and assistance rendered to that portion of the Micmac Indians residing at Burnt Church and Tabusintac, in the County of Northumberland, for the year 1846:

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of twenty five pounds to remunerate the Reverend Michael Egan, Roman Catholic Missionary, of Nelson, Miramichi, for spiritual aid and assistance rendered to that portion of the Micmac Indians residing on the South West and North West Branches of the River Miramichi for the year 1846:

To William E. Perley, of Blissville, in the County of Sunbury, the sum of eight pounds to reimburse him for expenses incurred in the survey of two Lots of Land, under the order of the Surveyor General, the sale of such Land being stayed by order of the Government:

To James Ketchum and Alexander Goodfellow, Esquires, Commissioners for building a Bridge over the River Arestcock, the sum of one hundred and seventy pounds five shillings and six pence to reimburse a balance due on their expenditure:

To James Vernon, of Saint John, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds eight shillings and eight pence to compensate him for certain damages by him sustained on account of the title of the Crown to certain Lands granted to him having proved defective, agreeably to the Report of the Select Committee:

To Neil Henderson, of Shediac, the sum of two pounds to reimburse him for Duties paid on a Horse brought with him from Prince Edward Island:

To

To the Reverend Donald M'Phail, of Buctouche, in the County of Kent, the sum of two pounds to reimburse him for Duties on a Horse brought from Prince Edward Island :

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of five hundred pounds to be applied towards the erection of a Breakwater at Dipper Harbour, in the Bay of Fundy ; the same to be applied and expended if, after a proper survey, it be certified to His Excellency that such erection will be attended with beneficial results to the Trade ; the same to be taken from the Light House Fund :

To the Right Reverend William Dollard, Roman Catholic Bishop, in New Brunswick, the sum of nineteen pounds three shillings and six pence to refund Duties paid on articles imported for the use of poor and destitute Churches in this Province :

To the Reverend Matthew Smith the sum of two pounds to reimburse him for Duties paid on a Horse imported from Prince Edward Island ;

In which Resolutions the Legislative Council do not concur.

On motion of Mr. Street,

Whereas a difference of opinion exists as to the present site of the Lazaretto for the reception and confinement of the persons in the north eastern section of the Province, afflicted, or supposed to be afflicted, with the disease called the Leprosy, being the proper one, and also as to the best mode of affording relief to the unfortunate persons thus afflicted, and as to the real nature of the disease, and especially as to its infectious character : And whereas it is most desirable that this House should possess the most accurate information upon the above subjects, and as to all other matters connected with this loathsome disease ; therefore

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to appoint two or more, (not exceeding three,) fit and proper persons to proceed to the diseased Districts in the Counties of Northumberland and Gloucester, and also to the Lazaretto established on Sheldrake Island, for the purpose of examining into all the subjects mentioned in the above recital, and also into all other matters connected with the disease in question, and especially as to the present site of the Lazaretto, and as to the best and least expensive mode of affording the necessary assistance and relief to the persons afflicted with the said disease, with a due regard to their comfort, and the security of the public ; and to make report of the result of their inquiries to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to be laid before this House at the next Session of the Legislature.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Street, Mr. Jordan, and Mr. Vail, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

The Honorable Mr. Baillie, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the House—

Return made up at the Office of the Surveyor General, shewing Lands that have been granted to Churches in New Brunswick, and for the benefit of Schools, since the year 1837.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, to take into consideration all matters affecting the Lumbering Interests of the Province, reported, that the Committee having the matters before them, had prepared two Bills severally under the Title of—

A Bill to regulate the Survey and Exportation of Lumber : and

A Bill to regulate the driving of Timber and Logs down the several small Rivers and Streams in this Province ;

Which he was directed to submit to the House, and to request that the Committee be continued, in order that they may be enabled to consider further upon the subject referred to them.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the powers of the Committee continued for the purpose of making further report upon the matters referred for their consideration.

The Bills, as reported by the Committee, being then handed in, were severally read a first time.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of twenty five pounds towards remunerating a Missionary stationed at Woodstock to give spiritual aid and attendance to the Tobique and other Indians in that neighbourhood:

To Joseph Gaynor, Robert Chestnut, and Thomas Pickard, Trustees of the Wesleyan Chapel in Fredericton, the sum of twelve pounds seventeen shillings and seven pence, being return of Duties paid on an Organ and Bell imported for the use of the said Chapel:

To the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry of the Parish of Saint George, the sum of five pounds to reimburse them the amount of Duty paid on a Bell imported from Boston in 1841 for the use of the Parish Church;

In which Resolutions the Legislative Council do not concur.

On motion of Mr. Street,

*Ordered*, That Mr. Porter be added to the Committee appointed on the twenty seventh day of February last, to take into consideration a Petition from the Honorable John Robertson, praying to be secured in his rights to a Mill Reserve at Salmon River, in the place of Mr. Street, who is excused from serving on the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Partelow.

That the House proceed to the Order of the Day of the thirteenth day of March instant, to go into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service—

The Order of the Day being read, the House according thereto resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Botsford in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the matters referred to them again under their consideration, had passed a number of Resolutions; and he having read the same, handed them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were again read, and are as follow:—

*Resolved*, That there be granted

To Mary M'Leod, of the Parish of Alnwick, in the County of Northumberland, Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10 to relieve her in her destitute circumstances.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £20 as an additional allowance to N. Wheeler, Preventive Officer in the County of York, for his services in that capacity.

To Hugh M'Monagle, of Kings' County, the sum of £4 to reimburse him Duties paid on two entire Horses of a superior description imported from the United States.

To Andrew Barberie, President of the Restigouche Agricultural Society, the sum of £11 13 1, being a remission of Duties paid on six Ayrshire Cattle, and sundry Agricultural Implements imported for the use of that Society.

To John Wright, President of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, the sum of £4 to reimburse Duties paid on two entire Horses imported in 1846 from the United States.

To Charles C. Stewart, of Saint John, the sum of £76 6 9 as a remission of Duties paid on British Sheathing Copper imported under unavoidable circumstances from the United States for his Ships "James Stewart" and "Athol," employed in prosecuting the Whale Fishery.

To Jane Brown, of Hampton, Kings' County, the sum of £16 13 4, being a reimbursement of Duties paid on an Iron House imported from Liverpool, for construction in New Brunswick, which House was destroyed by fire previously to its being erected.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £200 to be applied in placing Buoys on the Reefs at the entrance of the Harbour of Saint John; the same to be taken from the Light House Fund.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the sum of £15 19 5, being a remission of Duties paid on Leathern Hose imported from the United States for the use of the Fire Department.

To John Kinnear, of Saint John, the sum of £7 10s. to reimburse Duties over-paid on Oil imported from the United States.

To Robert Watson, Deputy Treasurer at Saint Stephen, the sum of £6 6'6 to reimburse him expenses incurred in proceedings had against John Marks for refusing to execute a Bond to the Crown under the Act of 7 Vic. cap. 18.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the sum of £500 towards constructing approaches to the Breakwater in that City, in consequence of the former Road being taken by the Government for Military purposes; the same not to be drawn from the Treasury until it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council, that a similar amount has been raised by subscription, or otherwise, and is applicable towards this object; agreeably to the Report of the Committee of Trade.

To Barzillai Ansley, of Saint John, the sum of £15 18s. to reimburse Duties paid on a quantity of Wheat imported in March 1846.

To Thomas Sime, Junior, the sum of £5 5 2 to reimburse Duties paid on Corn Broom Brush for the manufacture of Brooms, imported from the United States.

To the Honorable Charles Simonds the sum of £100 for the benefit of the contemplated Portland and Lancaster Steam Ferry Company; to be applied towards erecting Ferry Landings for public accommodation at Indian Town, in Portland, and on the opposite side, in the Parish of Lancaster.

To Robert B. Cutler, of Buctouche, in the County of Kent, the sum of £17 16s. to reimburse Export Duties paid on a cargo of Timber and Deals shipped in the Brig "Mary Ann," which Vessel was subsequently wrecked in the Harbour, and the cargo relanded.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £250 annually, for three successive years, for the purpose of encouraging the running a new and substantial Iron Steamer, constructed on the latest and most approved principle, between Shediac, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou; the same to be paid to William H. Scovil, the proprietor, at the expiration of each and every year for the three successive years as aforesaid, on satisfactory certificates being produced to His Excellency in Council, that a Boat answering the above description has run once a week, during open water, between the aforesaid places, (unavoidable accidents excepted,) for the accommodation of Passengers and conveyance of Freight.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £1000, in aid of individual subscription, towards establishing a Sailors' Home in the City of Saint John; the same to be taken from the Marine Hospital Fund; it appearing that upwards of £2000 have already been subscribed at Saint John towards this humane and benevolent object.

To the Commissioners of Buoys and Beacons at Buctouche, in the County of Kent, the sum of £40 to be applied in erecting new Buoys and Beacons in that River.

To the Commissioners of Buoys and Beacons at Bathurst, in the County of Gloucester, the sum of £76, being a balance over-expended by them.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £15, being an additional Grant for the services of John Doran, Tide Waiter at Shippegan, in the County of Gloucester, by reason of increased duties in his office the present year.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £60 for the purpose of erecting a Tablet in Christ Church,

Church, Fredericton, to the memory of Captain Pipon, late of the Corps of Royal Engineers, who unfortunately lost his life while engaged in duties connected with the best interests of this Province.

To Joseph Michaud, of Madawaska, in the County of Carleton, the sum of £25 as relief by reason of a seizure of a Horse under peculiar circumstances.

To Ann M'Donald, Widow of the late Surgeon M'Donald, of the Jersey Volunteers, the sum of £10 to assist her in her present destitute condition.

To Elizabeth Whitehead, Widow of the late James Whitehead, a meritorious old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, the sum of £10 to assist her in her present destitute condition.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, the sum of £— towards improving the Ferry Landings in the Harbour of Saint John, in connection with the Great Roads of Communication from Saint John to Saint Andrews, and Fredericton.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, the Committee divided, and it was decided in the negative.

To Elizabeth Mays, a licenced Teacher, the sum of £10 to compensate her for teaching a School in the Parish of Greenwich, in Kings' County, for six months ending first December, 1846.

To George Woods the sum of £25, being an allowance for a quantity of Land owned by him, included in the Grant to the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Land Company, agreeably to the Report of the Select Committee, 11th April, 1843.

To the Trustees of the Sackville Academy, at Westmorland, the sum of £200, in aid of individual subscription, towards the enlargement of the accommodations at the said Academy.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £30 to aid the inhabitants of the County of Westmorland in employing a Courier to carry the Mails from Cape Tormentine to the Post Office in Sackville, in that County.

To Magdalen Schurman, Widow of the late Philip Schurman, the sum of £20 to relieve her in her present indigent and distressed circumstances, as the Relict of a staunch old Loyalist, who served his country faithfully in the Revolutionary War in America, as per certificate of his discharge dated in New York in June 1783, accompanying her Petition.

To Lieutenant Colonel Whannell, of Her Majesty's Thirty third Regiment, the sum of £95 0 4, being a remission of Duties paid on Wines, &c., used at the Mess of that Regiment the past year.

To Commissioners to be appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £100 for the purpose of extending the Public Wharf at Saint Stephen.

To Elizabeth Ferris, the Widow of an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War in America, the sum of £20, being the amount of Pension due her for the years 1842 and 1843; the same not having been drawn from the Treasury.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask for leave to sit again on Monday next.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions as passed in the Committee engrossed, and that the House do on Monday next, the twenty second day of March instant, resolve itself into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. Carman moved for leave to bring in a Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland to sell certain Lands.

The Order of the House, limiting the time for bringing in Bills, as also the twenty fifth Rule of the House, which requires Bills of a local nature to be read in the presence of the Grand Jury, being in this instance dispensed with, leave was granted; and

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

Mr. Boyd moved for leave to bring in a Bill to repeal the Imperial Duty on Wheat Flour imported into this Province, for a limited period.

And

And upon the question, that the Order of the House, limiting the time for bringing in Bills, be in this instance dispensed with, and that leave be granted to introduce the Bill, the House divided—

YEAS 10.

NAYS 19.

Whereupon it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Ritchie,

The House went into Committee of the whole on the Bill sent down from the Legislative Council, intituled "An Act relating to Bills of Exchange."

Mr. Cranney in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, the following Resolution was moved:—

*Resolved*, That the further consideration of this Bill be postponed for three months.

And upon the question, it was carried in the affirmative.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the further consideration of the said Bill accordingly postponed for three months.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, and to whom was referred the state of all the Roads of Communication in the Province, with directions to report what sums will be required for the repairing and improving thereof, and to which Committee were also referred various Petitions, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee have also had under their consideration the following Petitions referred to them:—

"No. 1. The Petition of H. M. G. Garden, praying a Grant for a valuable plan of reference of Bye Roads in the County of Carleton: As this service has been performed by other parties in different Counties, your Committee are of opinion that if any Grant should pass, it should be provided for from the Bye Road Grants.

"No. 2. The Petition of Andrew M'Gowan, praying a Grant for a Bridge which he erected in 1841, under the direction of the then Supervisor: This claim your Committee have not been able to ascertain the correctness of; but if it should appear hereafter to be so, it must be provided for from the Grant for the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock.

"No. 3. Petition of Alexander Rait, of the County of Gloucester, praying an allowance for extra work on a Road and approaches in that County: This your Committee do not recommend.

"No. 4. Petition of Darby Gillan, for remuneration for services performed in removing Windfalls on the Nerepis Road: Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

Petition of Michael Hegan, praying to be reimbursed for making a Road in the Enniskillen Settlement: It clearly appears that work to the extent of £6 4s. has been performed faithfully, which your Committee recommend to be provided for equally out of the Bye Road Grants for Sunbury and Queens', where the Road lies.

"No. 7. Petition of Benjamin Milliken, of Saint George, County of Charlotte, praying a Grant to remunerate him for repairs on Digdeguash Bridge: Your Committee recommend him to the Supervisor on that Road to determine his case.

"No. 8. Petition of William Colwell, of Queens' County, praying compensation for damages by reason of part of his Farm being taken for part of the Great Road leading to the Finger Board: Your Committee recommend this matter to the consideration of the Supervisor on that Road.

"No. 9. Petition of John Wheaton and others, of the County of Kent, praying for a Grant towards a Bridge over the Richibucto River: The prayer of this Petition your Committee have already sustained by recommending an appropriation.

Petition of Isaac Haviland, and others, praying a Grant, in aid of individual subscription, towards building a Bridge over the Nerepis River: Your Committee have not sufficient information before them to recommend an appropriation for this object, but they would suggest the propriety of measures being taken to effect a full and efficient exploration during the recess.

"No. 12. Petition of Joseph Baxter, and others, praying a Grant for a Bridge across the Kennebecasis, near Sidney Baxter's: Your Committee have recommended an appropriation for this service.

"No. 13. Petition of Ebenezer Smith, and others, praying a Grant for a Bridge near John Smith's, in Kings' County: This Petition has been favourably reported upon by your Committee in recommending a Grant.

"No. 14. Petition of P. M'Glinn, of Dumfries, York County, praying compensation for damages sustained by an alteration in the Great Road leading from Fredericton to Woodstock: Your Committee refer this matter to the consideration of the Supervisor on that Road.

"No. 15. Petition of Wm. M'Leod, and others, praying that the Road on the West side of the Long Reach may be re-established as one of the Great Roads: The prayer of this Petition can only be complied with by introducing a Bill into the House.

"No. 16. Petition of Justus S. Wetmore, and others, praying an alteration in the Great Road leading from Bellisle to Saint John: This can only be done by an Act of the Legislature.

"No. 17. Petition of Thomas Davis, of Charlotte County, praying to be reimbursed for building a Bridge carried away by the Ice Freshet: Your Committee have recommended a Grant for this purpose.

"No. 18. Petition of L. R. Coombes, and others, praying that a Bridge may be erected over the Arestook River: This object has received the attention of your Committee by recommending a Grant.

"No. 19. Petition of George Gunnison and Joseph Platt, praying a Grant for a balance due them for repairs on a Bridge over Magaguadavic: Your Committee recommend that an appropriation be made out of the Bye Road Monies for the County of Charlotte for this service.

"No. 20. Petition of Vincent White, and others, with a similar prayer to No. 16: The same remarks will apply to the prayer of this Petition.

"No. 21. Petition of H. W. Baldwin, and others, of Gloucester, praying a Grant towards opening and exploring a more direct Line of Road to Caraquet and Pokenouché: The Committee recommend an exploration of this contemplated route.

"No. 22. Petition of Peter M'Lelan, and others, of Albert County, praying a Grant to open a Road between that County and Saint John: Your Committee have recommended an appropriation for this object.

"No. 23. Petition of Wm. Napier, and others, praying a Grant for the balance due on the Contract for Bathurst Bridge: The remarks in No. 5 apply to this case.

"No. 24. Petition of Samuel Smith, and others, praying that the contemplated Bridge over the Keswick may be erected on the old site, and not on that recommended by the Supervisor: Your Committee cannot determine this question, but submit it to the consideration of the House.

"No. 25.

“ No. 25. Petition of David Brown, praying compensation for losses sustained in erecting approaches to the Oromocto Bridge: Your Committee express no opinion on the subject for the want of information, and submit it also to the House for consideration.

“ The amount recommended for the Bridge over the Richibucto River is £1,400 below the estimate for that work; £600 it appears have been raised by individual subscription; and your Committee recommend that an additional Grant not exceeding £800, be made, to complete the Bridge, payable in 1848; not however to be drawn until it has been satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council that the said sum of £600 so subscribed has been paid to the Contractor towards the erection of the said Bridge.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed on the sixteenth day of February last, to take into consideration a Petition from the Justices of the Peace of the County of Carleton, relative to expenses entailed upon the County by reason of the destruction of the Gaol by fire, and to which Committee were also referred various Petitions in reference to the site for the Public Buildings, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom were referred several Petitions from the County of Carleton, relative to the insecurity of the present Gaol, the erection of the Record Office, and the site of the Public Buildings, have had the following under their consideration, and beg leave to offer the following Report:—

“No. 1. Is the Petition of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Carleton, setting forth the loss of the Gaol by fire, and their having erected a temporary one at a cost of £200, on the credit of the County;—that four Prisoners are confined therein, charged with very grave offences; and from the insecurity of the said temporary building, the County is put to a monthly expense of £12, in the employment of a proper Guard to prevent their escape;—that the Circuit Court does not sit until September next; and praying relief.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that an humble Address should be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency, so soon as practicable, will direct a Special Court of Oyer and Terminer to assemble at Carleton, for the trial of the said Prisoners, and for the delivery of the Gaol.

“No. 2. Petition of John Dibblee, J. P., Charles Perley, J. P., and others, praying that the contemplated Register Office may be erected at Maduxnikik Creek, instead of the place where the present Public Buildings have been erected, and that Commissioners be appointed to consider and report upon the propriety of the site of the Shire Town being altered, so that all the Public Buildings may be removed to the said Creek.

“Nos. 3 to 10 inclusive are eight Petitions from L. R. Coombes, J. P., and various other Justices of the Peace and inhabitants of the said County, praying that the contemplated Building may be erected at the Shire Town, as by Law established, and that no action be had on the Petition to the contrary from J. Dibblee and others.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that a new Gaol and Record Office should be forthwith built in the County of Carleton; and that, as it is already defined by Law where said Buildings should be erected, the Magistrates should proceed to make said erections.

The Loans authorized to be made to poor Settlers through the Justices of the Peace in Counties, to be returned in labor upon the Roads, have in some Counties been taken up; the principle is not inapplicable to the condition of the people in the remote settlements where the greatest distress has prevailed, and when, having no access to markets, could not look forward to being able to repay such advances in money.

EXTRACT OF DESPATCH NO. 31, OF NOVEMBER 12, 1846, FROM EARL GREY TO SIR WILLIAM COLEBROOKE.

I have advised Her Majesty to leave to its operation the Act No. 1699, which provides for making Loans to poor Settlers, for the purchase of Potato Seed. But I must remark, that the proposed mode of obtaining the repayment of these Loans by labor on the Roads is a bad one. All experience shews that labor in payment of a debt is always inefficient; the Settlers should repay by instalments in money. If it be necessary to enable them to do so, they might be given employment on the Roads at fair wages, which, if possible, should be paid by the piece.

MY LORD,—I do myself the honor to enclose copy of a Letter from the Emigrant Agent at Saint John, with his annual Report, and quarterly and annual Returns, made up by anticipation to the 31st instant, in order to admit of their transmission by the present Mail.

In reference to Mr. Perley's observations upon the advantage of settling Lands on credit, to be repaid in work on Roads, by which the Wilderness would be opened and the settlement of the Country accelerated, it may be proper to remark, that the adoption of such a plan for opening the Wilderness has not been contemplated, beyond the privilege proposed to be accorded to the Settlers of liquidating the sums due for Land purchased by them at the public Sales, by means of Certificates from the Commissioners and Supervisors of Roads of the sums due to them for work actually and effectively performed, either for wages or on contract by the piece. Such contracts are often taken for the purpose of earning the means of paying for Land; and the appropriations for the whole Province are necessarily limited to such sums as can be so applied from the Commercial Revenue, and have no reference to the amount required to meet the growing demand for settlement Lands, especially in seasons when Emigrants arrive in great numbers, who would be willing to settle them on such conditions. The Forests of New Brunswick being more dense than those of Upper Canada, the Settlements, for many years, were limited, for the most part, to the margins of the numerous Rivers and Streams which intersect the Province, and the cultivation of the rich alluvial bottoms, left dry after the Spring floods or freshets. Where Roads have been made through the Forests, Settlements have been formed along them; and in cases where Settlers have entered the Wilderness, before communications had thus been

opened, they have been exposed to great hardships and privations, tending sometimes to the abandonment of their locations. The attempts of Capitalists to effect such settlements by means of hired labour, have not heretofore been successful, although contracts to work by the piece are taken on reasonable terms; the Lands so reclaimed affording for a long time only a subsistence to actual Settlers, and making no return upon the Capital so expended, from the difficulty in finding a market for produce. Such markets in the interior of the country, and remote from the Rivers and Seaports, must for some time depend on the demands of the Lumberers, of whom large parties are annually employed in the Forests in cutting Timber for Ship building and for exportation, and who require the produce of the neighbouring Farms for their Horses and Cattle.

The advance of funds for the construction of Roads and Bridges, on security of the Lands traversed by them, will not obtain till permanent markets may be established, which would enable Settlers to depend on realizing the means of defraying the incidental charges which such advances would occasion, and the ruder and more simple method of opening Roads and settling the Forest Lands, as practiced in the United States, will for some time be alone available.

SIR,—I have had the honor to receive your Despatch of the 29th December, No. 120, enclosing the Letter and Annual Report of the Agent for Emigration. The information thus afforded to me is satisfactory, so far as regards the effectual enforcement of the Passengers Act, and the absence of abuse, or of any difficulty in providing for the Emigrants who have remained in the Province. I regret however to observe that the settlement of the fine Province of New Brunswick is proceeding so slowly, and I am of opinion that the attention of the Legislature might with great advantage be directed to a consideration of the means which it may be in their power to adopt, with a view of promoting the more rapid advance of the Colony in population and wealth, and the developement of its great natural resources. Her Majesty's Government will be most anxious to co-operate, so far as they have the power to do so, in any well devised measures which may be suggested for this purpose. I concur with you however in considering that it would not be expedient to allow Land to be sold to Settlers upon credit, to be repaid in work on Roads.

You will express to Mr. Perley, my approbation of the zeal and ability which he has displayed in the execution of his important office.

The amendments made by the Legislative Council to this Bill, were then severally read a first time, and are as follow:—

At A in Section IV. expunge the remainder of the Section, and insert the following words:—“ In the first instance be responsible for the debts and engagements of the said Company; and that no creditors, or person or persons having any demand against the said Company, for or on account of any dealings with the said Company, shall have recourse against the separate property of any shareholder on account thereof, except in case of deficiency or where the Joint Stock of the said Company shall fall short of or not be equal to the payment of any debt, due or demand against the same; that then and in such case the goods and chattels, lands and tenements, of each shareholder shall and may be levied upon and seized respectively to satisfy such debt or demand, to the extent of double the amount of the share or shares, or interest of such shareholder in the Joint Stock of the said Company, but no more; and that such double amount, or so much as may be necessary to satisfy such debt, due or demand, shall and may be levied and seized by process of execution, in the same suit in which such debt, due or demand may be recovered against the said Company.”

At B in Section VII. insert the words “ and also in the Royal Gazette.”

Mr. Carman, from the Committee appointed on the twenty ninth day of January last, to take into consideration the subject of the improvement of the Navigation of the principal Rivers in the Province, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“ The Select Committee to whom all matters were referred relating to the improvement of the Navigation of the River Saint John, and other principal Rivers in this Province, beg leave to submit the following Report—

“ No. 1. Is the Petition of William Molloy, of Saltash, in the Parish of Beresford, in the County of Gloucester, praying remuneration for certain expenditures incurred in erecting a Dam near the Falls of Nigadou River: Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“ No. 2. Is the Petition of Crookshank and Otty, and others, inhabitants of the Parish of Johnston, in Queens' County, praying for the use of the Dredging Machine in the removal of a Bar which obstructs the Navigation of the Washademoak River: The Committee refer this Petition to the consideration of the House.

“ No. 3. Is the Petition of John Barberie, Esquire, and others, inhabitants of the Village of Hampton and its vicinity, in Kings' County, praying that a Grant may pass, in aid of individual subscription, towards the building of a Public Wharf at Hampton Ferry: Your Committee recommend that there be granted in Supply the sum of twenty five pounds, to be drawn from the Treasury when it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency that a like sum has been subscribed and paid.

“ No. 4. Is the Petition of William Greaves, Junior, of the Parish of Saint Mary's, in the County of York, praying aid to enable him to complete a Public Wharf at the Ferry Landing opposite to Fredericton, on the Great Road to Miramichi: Your Committee recommend that the sum of twenty pounds be granted for this purpose.

“ No. 5.

“No. 5. Is the Petition of Bill Chappel, and others, inhabitants of the County of Westmorland, praying that a Grant may pass, in aid of individual subscription, towards erecting a Breakwater at Bay de Verte, in that County: Your Committee recommend that the sum of two hundred and fifty pounds be granted in the same manner as recommended in No. 3.

“No. 6. Is the Petition of William E. Perley, of Blissville, in the County of Sunbury, praying to be reimbursed a sum expended in clearing out the Stream on the South Branch of the Oromocto to the Lake: Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“No. 7. Is the Petition of Leonard R. Coombes, Esquire, and others, residents at Madawaska and the Grand Falls, in the County of Carleton, praying that a Grant may pass to improve the Navigation of the River above the Falls, so as to enable the Steamer to run during the dry Season: Your Committee recommend that the sum of five hundred pounds be appropriated in Supply for this purpose.

“No. 8. Is the Petition of George W. Hobin, Esquire, and others, inhabitants of the Parish of Canning, and of Queens' County generally, praying pecuniary aid towards the erection of a Public Wharf at Currie's Landing, in the said Parish of Canning: Your Committee recommend that the sum of fifty pounds be granted in the same manner as recommended in No. 3.

“No. 9. Is the Petition of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland, in Session assembled, praying that a Grant may pass for building approaches on both sides of the River Miramichi, for the convenience of a Ferry Landing to connect the Great Road of Communication from Richibucto to Bathurst: and

“No. 10. Is the Petition of James Johnston, and others, on behalf of the Chatham Steam Ferry Company, with a like prayer: By these Petitions it appears that the General Sessions of the Peace for the County of Northumberland have passed an order, pledging to any person, or Joint Stock Company, who shall place an efficient Steam Ferry Boat to ply between the Town of Chatham and the opposite side of the River, an exclusive right for four years; that a Company has been formed, and five hundred pounds subscribed, and twenty per centum of the Stock paid in, and active steps taken to have the Boat in operation so soon after the opening of the Navigation as possible; your Committee therefore recommend that the sum of two hundred pounds be granted, agreeably to the prayer of the said Petitions.

“No. 11. Is the Petition of James Titus, and others, Mill-Owners and Lumberers resident in Kings' County, praying that a Grant may pass for the removal of obstructions in Hammond River, in said County: Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“No. 12. Is the Petition of Hugh Montgomery, Esquire, and others, inhabitants of the County of Restigouche, praying that a Grant may pass to assist them in building a Public Slip or Landing at Dalhousie, in said County: Your Committee recommend that the sum of two hundred pounds be granted in the same manner as recommended in No. 3.

“No. 13. Is the Petition of James Brewster, Esquire, and others, inhabitants of the Parishes of Harvey and Hopewell, in the County of Albert, praying a Grant may pass for the purpose of obtaining a scientific Survey of Shepody River, in said County: Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“No. 14. Is the Petition of Joseph F. Allison, and others, inhabitants of the Parish of Sackville, in the County of Westmorland, praying a Grant may pass, in aid of individual subscription, towards enlarging the Public Wharf at Dixon's Landing, in that Parish: Your Committee recommend that the sum of fifty pounds be granted in the same manner as recommended in No. 3.

“No. 15. Is the Petition of J. F. W. Winslow, and others, of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, praying aid to enable them to erect a Wharf at the Public Landing at the Creek Village (so called) in the said Parish: Your Committee recommend

that the sum of one hundred pounds be granted in the same manner as recommended in No. 3.

“Your Committee recommend that the sum of one thousand five hundred pounds be granted towards improving the Navigation of the River Saint John, between Fredericton and the Grand Falls.

“The Select Committee to whom were referred the several Petitions praying to be reimbursed expenses incurred in support of sick and distressed Emigrant Poor during the year 1846, having had before them the following Petitions, beg leave to Report—

“No. 1. The Petition of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Kent, for expenses incurred by them in support and relief of sick and distressed Emigrants, amounting to £66 11 9; £14 7 6 of which was expended in relief of thirteen Emigrants,—£9 15s. in assisting them to proceed,—£3 19s. for Medicine and Medical aid,—the balance in Food, Clothing, &c.; £52 4s. was expended in relief of thirty Emigrants taken from a wrecked Vessel, in very destitute circumstances, some of whom were diseased,—£19 of which was expended in assisting them to proceed to Quebec, the place of their destination, the balance in Food and Clothing: the Emigrants arrived within the year: the Account is fully stated and certified by the Sessions: The Committee recommend £66 11 7 to be paid.

“No. 2. The Petition of John Orr, of the Parish of Saint Patrick, County of Charlotte, for expense incurred by him in support of one sick and destitute Emigrant, amounting to £9 6s.; fourteen weeks Board, at 7s. 6d., the balance for Clothing, Medical aid, &c.: This Account is certified by one of the Overseers of the Poor: your Committee recommend that £9 6s. be paid.

“No. 3. The Petition of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £40 11 11, including a charge for £22 11s. for Medical aid and Medicine to nine sick Emigrants; the balance was expended in Board, Clothing, &c.—Board charged at 5s. per week; other charges not extravagant: The Committee recommend the amount to be paid.

“No. 4. The Petition of James M'Allister, a distressed Emigrant, for aid in his destitute circumstances: It appears the Petitioner was injured while assisting at blasting Rocks at the Grand Falls; he is certified as being very industrious and of steady habits; but your Committee being of opinion that he should be assisted by the Overseers of the Poor from the Parochial Funds, cannot recommend his Petition to the favourable consideration of the House.

“No. 5. The Petition of Dugald Stewart, Emigrant Agent at Dalhousie, in the County of Restigouche, for amount of £3 10s. expended by him in 1844, in assisting a destitute Emigrant and family: It appears the advance was made immediately upon the arrival of the Emigrant, and is properly chargeable upon the Fund: The Committee recommend the same to be paid.

“No. 6. The Petition of the Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland, for £52 5 7, incurred by them: It is stated that the expense was incurred in consequence of some Emigrants being infected with Small Pox, which rendered necessary their being placed in the Lazaretto at Chatham, which was done by order of the Sessions, a Committee of whom regulated the expenditure: there is a detailed Account of necessaries furnished, amounting to £18 7 7; £10 5 6 for Medical aid, and the balance appears to have been paid in cash to certain parties for services not distinctly specified: there is also a charge of £2 12 2 for interest on advances: this Account is duly certified as being audited and allowed by the Sessions: it appears that the person relieved arrived from Quebec; and should the House be of opinion that the expenses incurred in support of destitute persons from the adjoining Colonies are properly chargeable on the Emigrant Fund, your Committee would recommend it to be paid.

“No. 7. The Petition of Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £29 8 9: This Account is fully stated; £15 was advanced to destitute Emigrants to enable them to proceed to their friends, the balance for Clothing and other necessaries, including 30s. for Medical aid: the parties relieved had arrived from Quebec, and these applicants have the same claim as No. 6.

“No. 8.

" No. 8. The Petition of John Mock, by John Robertson, his Attorney, praying to be reimbursed expenses amounting to £58 14 7, to which he was made subject in June last, by reason of being obliged to land sick and distressed Emigrants on Partridge Island: This is a case of some hardship; but your Committee are of opinion, that the circumstances do not warrant the expense being refunded by the Province.

" No. 9. The Petition of William M'Donagh, owner of the Brigantine " Danube," for expenses incurred by him, amounting to £21 19 7, by reason of sick and distressed Emigrants being landed on Partridge Island from that Vessel: The circumstances are entirely similar to No. 8; the Committee cannot recommend this application.

" No. 10. The Petition of the Commissioners of the Alms House of the City and County of Saint John, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £17 5s. in providing Seed Potatoes for the Black Refugees: Such expenditure not being chargeable on the Emigrant Fund, your Committee would refer the application to the consideration of the House.

" No. 11. The Petition of the Commissioners of the Alms House and Work House of the County of York, for expenses incurred by them in relief of destitute Emigrants, amounting to £35 10 6, including £5 to the Keeper for his attendance: The Account is particularly stated: the rate of Board is 6s. per week: a list of the persons relieved accompanies the Account, and the period in which it was afforded: the Account is sworn to by the Keeper: the Committee recommend this amount to be paid.

" No. 12. The Petition of the Commissioners of the Alms House and Work House in the City of Saint John, for expenses incurred by them amounting to £460 17 10: The Account is particularly made up, with a list of the names, ages, places of nativity, time of arrival within the Province, and circumstances of disability of the Poor relieved; the rate of Board is charged at 3s. 6d. per week; other charges appear reasonable: the Account is duly attested: the Committee recommend the amount to be paid.

" In concluding the Report, your Committee strongly recommend that in future all Accounts of similar expenses incurred should be accompanied by a statement shewing the time the parties relieved arrived within the Province, in addition to the information afforded by the foregoing Accounts; and that none should be chargeable on the Emigrant Fund except those who have arrived within the year.

“The Petitioner, Elisha A. Cunliffe, complains that in the year 1840 he was appointed a Commissioner of Highways in the Parish of Woodstock, County of Carleton, with Frederick Morehouse, Esquire:—That as such Commissioner of Highways, Petitioner, with his associate, laid out a Road extending across Land owned by Charles Perley, and others, on which Road a Grant of £20 was made by the Legislature, and expended on said Road:—The Petitioner, with his associate, and Frederick B. Dibblee and E. L. Raymond, were prosecuted at Law by Charles Perley:—That damages were obtained against Petitioner and associate, as also F. B. Dibblee and E. L. Raymond:—That in 1842 the Legislature granted relief to said F. B. Dibblee and E. L. Raymond, and it appears no application was at that time made by Petitioner.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that the case of Petitioner is of the same nature as Messieurs Dibblee and Raymond's, and that he is entitled to relief, and therefore recommend that the sum of £30 9 5 be granted in Supply to said Elisha A. Cunliffe.

**INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.**

*Downing Street, 8th February, 1847.*

SIR,—I have lately had occasion to address a Despatch to the Governors and Lieutenant Governors of the West Indian Colonies, on the subject of the establishment of Industrial Day and Normal Schools. This communication originated in the desire which I felt to promote to the utmost of my means, the extension of Education among the Colored Races, being well convinced that by such means the welfare of the labouring population, and indeed of the whole community would be largely increased. For this purpose I addressed a Letter to the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council on Education in November last, stating my views upon the subject, and their Lordships in consequence caused a statement to be prepared for my information, explaining the points which it was material to keep in view in establishing Industrial and other Schools. On perusing that statement, it has appeared to me

that so many of the suggestions therein made, are applicable to, and might be beneficial to all the communities in the British Colonies, that I have determined not to restrict the information thus submitted to me, to those Colonies only where Slavery existed, but to communicate it to the whole of the British Colonies.

In the hope then that the suggestions offered on this subject by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council on Education, may be found susceptible of adoption, and prove of service in the Colony under your Government, I transmit to you several copies of their Paper, and beg that you will circulate them among the Members of the Legislature, the Bishop of the Diocese, and Ministers of the Gospel, and other influential persons to whom you may think it desirable to send them.

Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, to take into consideration all matters relating to the Agricultural Interests of the Province, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee on Agriculture report that they have attended to the business referred to them, and beg leave to submit the following Report:—

“No. 1. Is the Petition of John Lewis, Henry Steves, and three hundred others, inhabitants of the County of Albert, praying a Legislative Bounty for Grain grown on new Land: After full consideration on this subject, the Committee do not think it advisable at present to recommend a compliance with the prayer of this Petition.

“No. 2. Is the Petition of Lewis C. Getchell, of Wakefield, in the County of Carleton, praying the usual allowance for the erection of an Oat Mill: The Committee refer the Petitioner to the Sessions of the County of Carleton.

“No. 3. Is the Petition of John Harris, Nurseryman, Seedsman, and Florist, of the City of Saint John, praying Legislative aid to assist him in perfecting an extensive Horticultural Establishment in this Province: The Committee cannot recommend Legislative aid to the extent sought for, but in consideration of the large expenditures, and the great exertions made by the Petitioner for the advancement of Horticulture, the Committee recommend that a small grant of twenty five pounds be made to the Petitioner.

“ No. 4. Is the Petition of William Edgar, praying pecuniary aid for having erected a large number of Oat and Grist Mills within the Province upon a new and improved principle : The Committee cannot recommend compliance with the prayer of this Petition.

“ No. 5. Is the Petition of Nathaniel Green, of South Richmond, County of Carleton, praying a grant of money to pay for one hundred acres Crown Land, on which he has erected a Mill : The Committee recommend that the sum of twelve pounds be granted for the purpose prayed for.

“ No. 6. Is the Petition of Bernard Duffy, and forty eight others, new settlers in the Parish of Harvey, County of Albert, praying Legislative aid towards erecting an Oat and Grist Mill. This is a peculiar case ; the Petitioners form a very thriving settlement, but are obliged to carry their grain a distance of twenty miles to Mill : The Committee therefore recommend that in addition to the Oat Mill Bounty, to which the Petitioners will be entitled so soon as the Oat Mill is built, there should be granted the further sum of twenty pounds, to be paid to the Petitioners whenever it is satisfactorily certified to His Excellency that the Oat Mill and Grist Mill are built and in operation.

“ No. 7. Is the Petition of Edward Seely, of the Parish of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, praying that Legislative aid may be afforded in part, to assist him in liquidating the heavy expenses incurred by him in erecting a Flour and Oat Mill in said Parish for the accommodation of the public : The Committee cannot recommend compliance with the prayer of this Petition, but refer the Petitioner to the Sessions for the Oat Mill Bounty.

“ The Committee are of opinion that further Legislative encouragement should be held out for the introduction of an improved breed of Horses, and they recommend that the following sums be granted in Supply, as Premiums for this purpose, and placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, or Administrator of the Government for the time being :—

“ The sum of two hundred pounds to be paid for the best thorough bred Stallion, not under sixteen hands high, and not less than four nor more than six years of age :

“ The sum of one hundred and fifty pounds for the second best Stallion of the same description and size :

“ The sum of two hundred pounds for the best Stallion of the Irish Hunter breed, not under sixteen hands high, nor less than four nor more than six years of age :

“ The sum of one hundred and fifty pounds for the second best Stallion of the same description and size.

“ The above Horses to be imported from England or Ireland during the current year ; and before either of the premiums be paid, it should be certified to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by competent judges to be appointed by His Excellency for that purpose, that the Horse is in every respect of the character, age and description required, and that the owner or importer thereof, is justly entitled to the Premium.

“ The Committee recommend that the Grants in aid of Agricultural Societies be continued, and increased to one hundred pounds, instead of seventy five pounds.

Mr. Brown, from the Committee on Education, submitted a Report ; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“ The Committee appointed on the twenty eighth day of January last, to take into consideration all matters connected with the Education of the Youth of the Province, have, since the Bill was reported to provide for the support and improvement of the Parish Schools, directed their attention to the state of the Grammar Schools, and from information received from the several Returns, beg leave to submit the following Report thereon:—

#### KINGS' COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ The Daily Register shews an average daily attendance of nineteen Scholars, four of them under ten years of age ; and twenty six on the list. There were 26 in Reading, 26 Writing, 26 in Arithmetic, 21 in English Grammar, 21 in Geography, 17 in English Composition, 12 in Ancient and Modern History, 10 Use of the Globes, 10 in Latin, 2 in Greek, 8 in Mathematics, and 8 in Book-keeping. This School is taught by Charles Lee, A. B., a single man, twenty one years of age, and a Member of the Church of England. The Report and Returns are all in strict accordance with the Act of Assembly, shewing the School to be in a prosperous condition.

#### CARLETON COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ The Daily Register shows that thirty five Pupils have been on the list ; nine of them under ten years of age. The branches taught are Spelling, Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, English Grammar, Geography, History, Astronomy, Mathematics, Latin, Greek, English Composition, and Elocution. The School is taught by Michael H. Kiely, a single man, thirty years of age, and a Member of the Church of England. There is no Return shewing the average number in daily attendance, and the several branches of Education taught to each Scholar. The Report, though not in accordance with the Provincial Act, shews that the School is in a prosperous state.

#### SUNBURY COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ The Register shews thirty five Scholars on the list ; fifteen of whom were under ten years of age ; with an average number of twenty two in daily attendance. There were 22 in English Grammar, 25 in Geography, 12 in History, 8 in Latin, 5 in Mathematics, 4 in English Composition, 28 in Arithmetic, 23 in Reading, 12 Use of the Globes, 35 Writing, and 9 in Natural Philosophy. This School is taught by Samuel N. Bently, a single man, twenty four years of age, and a Member of the Baptist Church. The Report and Returns are in accordance with the Act of Assembly, and the School appears to be in a prosperous condition.

#### GLOUCESTER COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ From a very minute Daily Register, it appears that there were thirty nine Scholars on the list ; eleven of whom were under ten years of age ; and an average number of twenty in daily attendance. There were 38 in Reading, 38 Writing, 24 in English Grammar, 30 in History and Natural Philosophy, 30 in Arithmetic, 27 in Geography, 4 in Algebra, 1 in Navigation, 18 in French, 4 in Latin, 4 in Greek. The School is taught by J. Smith, a married man, thirty one years of age, and a Presbyterian. The Report and Returns are in accordance with the terms of the Act of Assembly, and shew the School to be in a prosperous state.

#### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ The Daily Register shews thirty three pupils on the list ; five of them under ten years of age. The School is taught by James Millar, a married man, forty one years of age, and a Member of the Church of Scotland. There is a Return shewing the several branches of Education taught to each Scholar, which with the Daily Register and Report, furnishes all the information by Law required. This School appears to be in a very satisfactory condition.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

“ There is a Return which shews thirty seven Scholars on the list ; three of whom are under ten years of age ; and an average number of twenty six in daily attendance. The School is taught by D. S. Morrison, a married man, thirty two years of age, and a Presbyterian. From the Report, and from Petitions and other Documents which have been referred to this Committee, the School appears to be in a prosperous condition. There is no copy of Daily Register, nor Return shewing the branches of Education taught to each Scholar.

“ Your Committee have seen no Report or Return from the Grammar School in Saint John.

“ From the Returns and other Documents which they have examined, the Committee are gratified to find that the Grammar Schools are improving rapidly under the operation of the Act of last Session. The semi-annual Inspections, and the Reports and Returns required by that Act, all tend to awaken a spirit of energy and emulation ; and the annual publication of a portion of the knowledge thus obtained, will not only have a tendency to turn the attention of the public mind to the great advantages to be derived from those Schools when properly supported and conducted, but will also have a salutary operation on the Schools.

“ The Committee have also had under their consideration the following Petitions referred to them :—

“ No. 1. The Petition of James Wilson, a licenced Teacher, setting forth that he has prepared a Treatise on Algebra adapted to the use of the Parish Schools, and praying for additional allowance for having taught the higher branches of Education in his Academy at the Bend of Peticodiac, in the Parish of Moncton, County of Westmorland. Mr. Wilson appears to be a very talented and successful Teacher, and your Committee regret that they cannot at present recommend the prayer of his Petition, in consequence of representations made to them by one of the Parish Trustees.

“ No. 2. The Petition of F. H. LeFrance, Roman Catholic Missionary at Tracadie, in the County of Gloucester, praying aid towards the liquidation of a debt contracted in the erection of a public School House in that place, and also for a sum of money towards the support of a School therein : Your Committee submit this case to the consideration of the House.

“ No. 3. The Petition of the President and Directors of the Charlotte County Grammar School, praying for aid towards paying the salary of an Usher or Assistant Teacher in that Institution.

“ No. 4. The Petition of James Paterson, Usher of the Charlotte County Grammar School, with a like prayer.

“ No. 9. The Petition of Reverend R. B. Wiggins, Reverend Michael Pickles, and eighty two others, Magistrates and principal Inhabitants of the Town of Saint Andrews, with a similar prayer : The Committee recommend a grant of £20 for this service.

“ No. 5. The Petition of William Hanington, James Long, and ten others, inhabitants of Cocagne, in the County of Kent, praying for a grant of money in aid of individual subscription for the support of an Academy : The Committee recommend that upon compliance with the conditions prescribed by the Grammar School Act, the sum of £50 be granted, the same to be drawn when the School shall have been in operation one year.

“ No. 6. The Petition of the Reverend James Neales, Cochran Craig, and Lorenzo Drake, Trustees of Schools for the Parish of Grand Manan, praying a Legislative Grant for the support of a superior School in that Parish : Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition, because no such School appears to be in operation.

“ No. 7. The Petition of Dugald Stewart, Esquire, and fifteen others, inhabitants of Dalhousie, in the County of Restigouche, praying for a sum of money to assist them in the erection of a suitable building for a public Grammar School in that place : Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“ No 8.

" No. 8. The Petition of Rufus Pipes, of the Parish of Harvey, in the County of Albert, licenced Teacher, praying for additional remuneration by reason of his giving instruction in the higher branches of Education : Your Committee recommend the sum of £10 for this service.

" No. 10. The Petition of Thomas N. Woodman, praying to be remunerated for teaching a Grammar School in the County of Albert, for one year : Your Committee recommend the usual allowance for Grammar Schools.

" No. 11. The Petition of C. R. Hatheway, William Ker, William Maclean, and forty five others, inhabitants of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, praying aid towards building a School House in that place : Your Committee submit this case to the consideration of the House.

" No. 12. The Petition of John Macpherson, praying a sum of money in aid of individual subscription to educate a deaf and dumb Boy in the Tay Creek Settlement, in the County of York : Your Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £500 towards improving the Navigation of the River Saint John above the Grand Falls.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £50, in aid of individual subscription, towards the erection of a Public Wharf at Currie's Landing, in the Parish of Canning, in Queens' County; the same not to be drawn from the Treasury until it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council, that a similar amount has been subscribed, and *bona fide* paid towards this object, agreeably to the Report of the Navigation Committee.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £200, in aid of individual subscription, towards building a Public Slip or Landing at Dalhousie, in the County of Restigouche; the same not to be drawn from the Treasury until it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council, that a similar amount has been raised by subscription, and *bona fide* paid towards this object, agreeably to the Report of the Navigation Committee.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £50, in aid of individual subscription, towards enlarging the Public Wharf at Dixon's Landing, in the Parish of Sackville, in the County of Westmorland; the same not to be drawn from the Treasury until it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council that a similar sum has been raised by subscription, and *bona fide* paid towards this object, agreeably to the Report of the Committee on Navigation.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £100, in aid of individual subscription, towards erecting a Public Wharf at the Public Landing at the Creek Village, (so called) within the Parish of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton; the same not to be drawn from the Treasury until it shall be satisfactorily certified to His Excellency in Council, that a similar amount has been raised by subscription, and *bona fide* paid towards this object, agreeably to the Report of the Committee on Navigation.

"The Petition of Michael Campbell, Courier between Chatham and Pokemouche, praying for an additional Grant for his services during the present year; for which we recommend the sum of £40.

"The Petition of Thomas Drinan, praying compensation for ferrying the Mails across the Miramichi River:

"The Petition of John Dixon, and

"The Petition of John Rennie, both of a like prayer:

"The Petition of Henry Getley, of a like prayer, for ferrying the Mail across the Nepisiquit River:

"We are of opinion that these services should not be provided for from the Provincial Fund.

"The Petition of James R. Tupper, Courier between Fredericton and Woodstock, praying compensation for losses sustained in consequence of the Bridges on this Road being carried away last spring: Being satisfied that he used great exertions and incurred considerable expense in keeping up the communication, we recommend that a Grant of £75 should be made him.

"The Petition of William Weeks and others, praying for a Grant to encourage the running of a Packet between Bay Verte and Prince Edward Island; for which we recommend that £20 should be appropriated.

"The Petition of Leonard R. Coombes and others, praying for a Grant to pay a Courier between Madawaska and Saint Francis; for which we recommend £40.

"The Petition of James Brown and others, praying for a Grant to pay a Courier between Saint John and Tynemouth Creek; for which we recommend £25.

"The Petition of James Chappell, praying for a Grant to enable him to run a Packet between Bay Verte and Prince Edward Island: As a Grant has been recommended for William Weeks for a similar service, we cannot recommend that the prayer of this Petition should be complied with.

"The Petition of Ezraiah Wetmore, praying for an increased allowance for carrying the Mail between Saint John and Kingston: As the Petitioner is on the Post Office Establishment, we are of opinion that if an increase to his salary is necessary, it should be paid from the funds of that Department.

"The Petition of Bill Chappell and others, praying for a Grant to pay a Courier between Sackville and Cape Tormentine: The sum of £30 has been already granted for this service.

"The

“ The Petition of Rufus Cole and others, praying for aid to enable them to pay a Courier between Sackville and the North Joggins ; for which we recommend a Grant of £10.

“ The Petition of Patrick Hays, praying for aid to enable him to run a daily Stage between Dalhousie and Campbellton :

“ The Petition of William H. Williams, praying for aid to enable him to run a daily Stage between Saint John and Saint Andrews :

“ The Petition of N. D. Vail, praying for aid to enable him to run a Stage between Saint John and Fredericton :

“ As we cannot recommend that Grants for Stage Coaches should be revived, we are of opinion that the prayers of the three foregoing Petitions ought not to be complied with.

“ The Petition of Samuel Foster and others, praying for aid to establish a Post communication between Saint John and the Parish of Upham : We recommend a Grant of £20 for this service ; but we are of opinion that the line should not commence at Saint John, but at Hampton Post Office.

“ The Petition of Samuel Mahood and others, praying for a Grant to provide for the additional expense of transmitting the Mail from Nerepis to Gagetown, through the Jerusalem Settlement, instead of by the present route : As this arrangement would obviate the necessity of the Mail from Gagetown to Golding's during the winter months, we recommend that the Grant for the latter service be discontinued, and that a Grant of £10 be made to carry into effect the arrangement prayed for by the Petitioners.

“ The Petition of C. R. Hatheway and others, praying for an additional Grant to provide a semi-weekly communication between Fredericton and Saint Andrews :

“ We recommend that £100 be granted to provide for the conveyance of a weekly Mail, and refer the subject of an increased allowance to the consideration of the House.

“ The Petition of Solomon Vail, praying to be compensated for losses sustained while running a Stage between Fredericton and Saint Andrews in 1842 :

“ We cannot recommend that the prayer of this Petition should be complied with.

“ The Petition of Richard Hayne and others, praying for aid to support a Mail Stage between Fredericton and Stanley, for which we recommend a Grant of £25.

“ The Petition of William Straight and James G. Watson, praying for compensation for ferrying the Mail across the Washademoak during the past year : As this line is sustained by a Provincial Grant, and the support received by the Petitioners from the Public is very limited, we recommend the Petition to the favourable consideration of the House.

“ The Petition of Thomas Hardy, praying for aid to enable him to run a daily Stage between Saint Andrews and Saint Stephen :

“ The Petition of James Green and John Winters, of a like prayer, for a Stage between Saint John and Fredericton :

“ We are of opinion that the prayer of these Petitions should not be complied with, but recommend that the usual Grant of £15 be continued to the former for carrying the second weekly Mail between Saint Andrews and Saint Stephen, and that a Grant of £10 be made to the latter for services rendered to the Legislature during the Session.

“ The Petition of James Whitney, praying for remuneration for carrying the Mails by Steamers between this Province and Nova Scotia, and between Saint John and Saint Andrews :

“ We are of opinion that services of this nature should be chargeable on the funds of the Post Office Department.

“ The Petition of Honorable John Robertson, Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce of the City of Saint John, praying for a Grant to defray the expense of bringing on the English Mails for New Brunswick from Halifax by Express, which we beg leave to refer to the favourable consideration of the House.

“ We further recommend that such Grants as were made last year for Post communication, and not herein referred to, should be continued for the present year.

“ Petition of Thomas Lamb, Keeper of the Quaco Light House, praying Legislative aid towards obtaining an Assistant Keeper : The Committee recommend that a sum not exceeding thirty six pounds be granted to enable him to pay an Assistant.

“ Petition of George Rogers, and others, praying that a Light House may be erected at Apple River, in Nova Scotia : The Committee recommend that a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty pounds be appropriated in part for this object, and that a negotiation be entered into with the Government of Nova Scotia for the furtherance of the same.

“ Petition of Rufus Cole, and others, of the County of Westmorland, praying that a Light House may be established at Cape Maranguin, in the said County : The Committee do not feel justified in recommending an appropriation for this object ; but from the information furnished to the Committee, they recommend that the Commissioners of Light Houses for the Bay of Fundy be required to report thereon at the next meeting of the Legislature.

“ Petition of John Connolly, Keeper of two Light Houses on Machias Seal Island, praying increased allowance for his services, and that the establishment may be placed in a more efficient state : The Committee recommend that the sum of £20 be granted to Petitioner, as an additional remuneration for his services ; and in consideration of there being two Lights requiring his attention, they further recommend that an appropriation of thirty six pounds be made to enable him to pay an Assistant.

“ Petition of Isaac Woodward, Commissioner of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, praying remuneration for services performed as the Acting Commissioner in that service : Your Committee, after carefully investigating the subject matter of this Petition, recommend that the sum of one hundred and twenty five pounds be granted to Petitioner in full for past services ; and they further recommend that in future the sum of one hundred and twenty pounds per annum be allowed to the Commissioners of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, in lieu of commission for their services, the one half of which amount to be paid to the Acting Commissioner and Secretary.

“ The Petition of E. R. Frankland, and others, praying that measures may be adopted for the erection of a Fog Bell on Gull Rock, near the Island of Grand Manan : The Committee recommend that the sum of one hundred pounds be granted for this object.

“ In consequence of the erection of a Rope Walk interrupting the usual communication to the Light House in the Harbour of Saint Andrews : The Committee recommend that the sum of twenty five pounds be appropriated for the erection of a Bridge on the north west side, and in a line with Patrick Street, across Salt Water Pond ; also the sum of twenty pounds to repair the Road leading to Cape Ronce Light House ; the same to be taken from the Light House Fund.

“ The Committee also recommend that the sum of fifteen pounds be granted for repairing Roads and Bridges from Head Harbour Island to the Island of Campo Bello ; the same to be taken from the Light House Fund.

“ The Committee recommend that the sum of one hundred and twenty three pounds and eleven pence be granted to the Commissioners of Light Houses in the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, to pay the balance due them as per their Account audited.

“ The Committee also recommend that the sum of fifty nine pounds thirteen shillings and four pence be granted to the Commissioners of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, to pay the balance due per Account audited.

“ The Auditor General's Report on the Accounts of the Provincial Light Houses, together with the Accounts and Vouchers, have been under the examination of the Committee, and they have much pleasure in pronouncing them satisfactory. The Committee have recommended that appropriations be made for the balances due on the expenditure of the Commissioners of Light Houses for the Gulph of Saint Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy for the past year, as well as to grant a sum for contingencies for the present year.

“The necessity of large investments for the advantageous prosecution of Mining operations, and the deficiency of surplus Capital in this Province to invest for such purposes, render it absolutely expedient to hold out such inducements as will encourage the introduction of Capital from abroad, for this important purpose.

“The present rate of five per cent., imposed by the Government, has, so far, produced no Revenue whatever, while it has, no doubt, prevented the undertaking of Mining operations in many instances.

“The great advantages which will accrue to the Country from the successful and extensive working of our Mines, would be sufficient in themselves, as a source of Provincial wealth, without any tax on the Mineral.

“The rapid diminution of our Wood Staple should induce a provident Legislature to direct the labour and capital of the Country to those natural sources of wealth which present an inexhaustible field for industry and enterprise.

“The Iron Mines in this Province, although of superior quality, will require such a large outlay of Capital before they can be profitably worked, that the Committee are of opinion some extraordinary inducement should be held out to encourage the investment of Capital in this branch of Mining operations.

“The Committee therefore recommend that Leases in perpetuity should in future be made by the Government, at public auction, subject to such rules, and at such nominal rent, as they may deem absolutely necessary; and in reference to the Iron Mines, they recommend that a Bounty of £250 be granted to the person, association, or company, that shall first produce 100 tons of malleable Iron, provided the same be produced within two years from the first day of May next.

The Honorable Mr. Baillie, from the Committee appointed on the twelfth day of March last, to examine into the state of Government House and Premises, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“ The Committee for examining as to the state of Government House and Premises have attended to that duty, and beg leave to report that the buildings lately erected there, under the superintendence of Benjamin Wolhaupter, Esquire, have been done in a substantial and workmanlike manner, with a due regard to economy, and beg to express their approval of the same.

“ Your Committee are of opinion that two sheds are required at the stable yard, as well as fences to enclose the same yard. Fences are also wanted around the Garden, as well as from the Guard House up to the end of the Government House Grounds, all of which are quite rotten and unserviceable.

“ Your Committee also recommend that the out buildings be painted.

“ For the above repairs, your Committee consider that a sum not exceeding five hundred pounds should be voted.

“ With respect to the interior of Government House, Furniture, &c., of the Public Rooms, your Committee beg to report that as far as relates to the house itself, no substantial repairs are required; but they consider that much good may be done by a thorough cleansing and white-washing of the whole of the interior of the building, at such time as may be convenient to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

“ Your Committee do not recommend that either the Drawing Rooms or the Dining Room should be papered at present, but the Council Room requires papering. No new curtains are required for the Dining Room, but curtains for the Drawing Rooms are necessary; as also new carpets for the Drawing Rooms, Dining Room, and Lieutenant Governor's Office; new chairs are also required for the Drawing Rooms.

“ The old carpets and chairs, your Committee are of opinion should be sold, the proceeds of which would go far towards meeting the expense of new ones; whereas, if they are kept in use another year or two, they would be entirely worthless.

“ New chandeliers are also required for the Public Rooms, and the old lamps should be sold.

“ Your Committee beg to report, that, in their opinion, it is absolutely necessary that a good and sufficient well should be dug in the most eligible situation, with a leading pipe to the force pump at present erected in the south west wing of the building.

“ Your Committee beg further to recommend that a flag staff should be erected in front of Government House, and a proper set of colours procured.

“ For all these objects, your Committee recommend the further sum of not exceeding four hundred pounds.

Mr. End, from the Committee appointed on the twenty seventh day of February last, to take into consideration various Petitions relative to loss sustained on certain Grants of Land, submitted a Report in reference to a Petition from Thomas Baldwin, which he read; and handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows :—

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Thomas Baldwin, of Saint John, praying compensation for losses sustained on account of a portion of a tract of land granted to him having been included in a prior grant, Report—

“That a Grant of three hundred acres of land in the rear of the lots fronting the south eastern shore of Loch Lomond was made to the Petitioner in the year 1823; that this Grant issued on the survey and return of the then Local Deputy, under Warrant from the proper Office; that the Petitioner made improvements upon, and cleared a considerable portion of the said tract, and that his right does not appear to have been disputed until a quantity of logs were cut and hauled from it without his knowledge or consent; that, on discovering this supposed trespass, the Petitioner applied for a Warrant, to test, by actual survey, the boundaries of the tract granted to him, as well as those of the adjoining lots fronting on Loch Lomond, the result of which survey seems to have justified the subsequent proceedings of Petitioner, who soon afterwards commenced an action of trespass against the party who had cut and hauled those logs; that this action was tried at Saint John in January, 1845, and a verdict of fifty pounds and costs found in favor of the Petitioner; that, in Hilary Term, 1846, this verdict was set aside, and it appeared evident that, at the time of making the Grant of three hundred acres to Petitioner, the Crown had title to one hundred and seventeen acres only, the residue being included in previous Grants.

“Between subject and subject, your Committee cannot doubt that the Petitioner might have his remedy on the implied warranty; and your Committee consider his claim to be just and equitable, and his case to be one of great hardship.

“He states that he has thus been deprived of his clearance, and that he has been put to very serious expense in surveys, damages, costs and charges, and has lost the opportunity of obtaining other lands by depending on the stability of his title to this tract, conveyed to him under the Great Seal of the Province.

“The aggregate of those costs, charges and damages, as stated by Petitioner, amounts to a large sum; but it appearing to your Committee that his title to one hundred and seventeen acres of the tract, or probably more, remains undisturbed, your  
Committee

Committee recommend that the sum of one hundred pounds be granted to Petitioner to reimburse him in part for the actual outlays connected with this matter.

"Whereas the present mode of raising the amount required by Law for the support of the Parish Schools is unjust and unequal, inasmuch as while some persons of large estate in many instances contribute nothing therefor, others of less ability are obliged to pay largely in order to educate their children; and whereas it is reasonable and just that property should contribute to the support of general Education;

"Be it therefore enacted, That from and after the passing of this Act, the amount heretofore required to be raised by subscription for the support of the Parish Schools, shall be levied and raised by assessment upon the property in the respective Counties, and shall be distributed for the support of the several Schools in such Counties respectively as hereinafter provided."

And upon the question for adopting this Section, the Committee again divided as follows:—

That the Committee then proceeded further in the Bill before them, and the two Sections thereof being under their consideration which provide for the allowances to Teachers of respective classes, as also the average daily attendance of Scholars to entitle the said Teachers to rank or claim under such classes—

It was moved—To expunge both of the said Sections, and substitute the following, and that it stand as the XVIII Section to the said Bill.

"XVIII. And be it enacted, That all Teachers of the first class shall be entitled to receive from the Treasury for teaching a School six months — pounds, being at the rate of — pounds per annum: and for a Teacher of the second class, the sum of — pounds for teaching a School six months, being at the rate of — pounds per annum; and for a Teacher of the lower or elementary class, the sum of — pounds for teaching a School six months, being at the rate of — pounds per annum; provided that the inhabitants of the said District shall have subscribed and paid the sum of — pounds for the support of such Teacher for a period of six months, or provided board and lodging for the said period."

And upon the question for adopting the said amendment, it was carried in the affirmative; and the blanks providing for the Teachers of the first class severally filled up with the sum of *fifteen* pounds and *thirty* pounds; and those of the second class with the sums of *eleven* and *twenty two* pounds.

The question was then taken as regards the allowance for a Teacher of the lower or elementary class, for the filling up the blanks severally with the sums of *nine* pounds and *eighteen* pounds, and upon this question, the Committee divided as follows:—

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to

The Bill to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Carleton to levy an assessment for the erection of a new Gaol and other County Buildings in the said County, and to pay off the County Debt and Contingent and other Expenses of the said County; and

The Bill to amend an Act, intituled "An Act for the appointment of Town and Parish Officers in the several Counties in this Province;"

Without making any amendments thereto.

Mr. R. D. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the second day of March last, to take under consideration a Petition from Terence Ferguson, as regards loss sustained on a Road Contract, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Terence Ferguson, setting forth, that he had taken and completed a Contract on the Great Marsh Road in the vicinity of Saint John, in the year 1845, in which he alleges, that owing to the extreme wetness of the season, and the great and unexpected distance that he was obliged to cart the gravel, he had sustained a very serious loss, and praying an investigation and relief in the premises, Report—

"That after examining the documents and certificates accompanying the Petition, and after having had before them the Supervisor and Petitioner, your Committee are of opinion that the Petitioner did take the Contract at a less price than he was able to perform the work, as admitted by the Supervisor;—that the extreme wetness of the season, and constant travel upon the Road, did also occasion an increased expenditure to the Petitioner, and under all the circumstances, although your Committee feel that their interference in such questions might have an injurious effect on the Road service, by opening a door to applications from parties who had sustained loss by taking Road Contracts, yet, that in consequence of the heavy loss that the Petitioner in this case has sustained, your Committee would recommend that a sum not exceeding forty pounds should be granted to him, towards relieving him under the peculiar hardship of his case; the same to be taken out of the Grant for that Road.

“That they are well satisfied the Petitioner, Charles Rainsford, Esquire, performed the most valuable services to a portion of the 104th Regiment, on the occasion referred to in the Petition, and that through his extraordinary and unparalleled exertions, the lives of many brave and valuable men were saved, who afterwards did good service to their country on the battle field: The Committee therefore unanimously recommend that such a sum of money be granted in Supply as will pay for five hundred acres of Crown Lands, to be granted to the Petitioner.

“With respect to the Petition of Peter M'Kenna, the Committee are of opinion, that he deserves some small consideration, and they recommend such a sum to be appropriated as will purchase fifty acres of Crown Land.

“As to the Petition of William Camber, the Committee cannot recommend a compliance with the prayer thereof.

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Richard M'Laughlin, formerly Deputy Surveyor and Commissioner of Crown Lands, and Seizing Officer for the Counties of Gloucester and Restigouche, praying compensation for services performed as such, from the year 1833 to 1836, having had the same under consideration, and having made searches at the Crown Land Office, as well as other Public Offices, and examined the papers and accounts connected therewith, Report—

“That from the account on file in the Crown Land Office, made up to the first January, 1835, a balance was then due by the Petitioner to the Department (after giving credit for sums for various services) of eleven pounds sixteen shillings and four pence halfpenny, against which credit was to be given for several surveys, the returns for which had not at that time been made; that, in December 1835, a Warrant appears to have been issued in favor of the Honorable Thomas Baillie, Surveyor General, for one hundred and forty nine pounds, for a survey between Tabusintac and Bathurst, which was made under the Petitioner, and which sum your Committee cannot discover he has ever been paid; and that, deducting the sum of eleven pounds sixteen shillings and four pence halfpenny from the amount of the said Warrant, it would leave a balance due the Petitioner of one hundred and thirty seven pounds three shillings and seven pence halfpenny;—that under these circumstances the Committee recommend that a Grant be made to the Petitioner for that amount.

“Your Committee further report, that, from their own knowledge of the Petitioner, he is in very needy circumstances, and is suffering very much for the want of the money, and is now even in want of the common necessaries of life.

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of the Honorable John Robertson, respecting the “Black Reserve,” so called, Report—

“That having taken the matter into consideration, and investigated the subject by the aid of documentary as well as oral evidence, they find that the Petitioner claims to be at present in the position of the original Reserver, whose title has descended to him through several conveyances duly recorded in the Crown Land Office, and fully recognized by the Government.

“That those conveyances have been before your Committee, the considerations of which are very large, and appear to have progressively augmented by the value of the improvements of the several holders.

“That the Reserve appears to have cost the Petitioner a sum not less than two thousand pounds, purchase money and expenses, and that it is also made evident to your Committee, that the Petitioner, relying on the equity of his title, accruing as it did long before the passing of the Civil List Act, has expended from two thousand to three thousand pounds in purchasing, erecting, and improving Steam Saw Mills at Saint John, for the supplying of which, with Logs he is mainly, if not solely dependent on the said Reserve, as he is not possessed of any other.

“The Petitioner does not claim to be exempted from the Export Duty Act, nor from the Mileage Regulations, to the extent of the upset price, and merely prays to be protected from a competition which might be induced by the value of improvements which he has actually paid for.

“Your Committee, under the peculiar circumstances of the case, have no hesitation in expressing their opinion that he is entitled to favourable consideration.

Mr. S. Earle moved the following Resolution:—

"Whereas for the want of correct information respecting the several sums of money required for the opening and repairing the Great Roads of Communication throughout the Province, and the crection and repair of the Bridges on the same, much uncertainty exists in apportioning the public money to the relative wants and necessity of said Roads and Bridges; therefore

"*Resolved*, That it is the opinion of this House, that a Law should be enacted, authorizing His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, to appoint one fit and proper person to examine and report to

to His Excellency, for the information of the Legislature, the state of all the Great Roads and Bridges in this Province,—the sum that may be required to keep each of the said Roads and Bridges in repair the ensuing year,—and also, the manner in which the work has been performed under the direction of the several Supervisors,—and all such further information as may be required, for the purpose of keeping the said Roads and Bridges in an efficient state of repair;” whereupon

Mr. Hanington moved the previous question—That the question upon the Resolution be now put.

And upon the question, the House divided—

The Order of the Day being read, the House according thereto resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the matters referred to them again under their consideration, had passed a number of Resolutions; and he having read the same, handed them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were again read, and are as follow:—

*Resolved*, That there be granted

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £10 to remove two snags from the River Saint John, near Major's Island.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £1000 towards the support of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum for the year 1847.

To John Harris, of Saint John, Nurseryman, Seedsman and Florist, the sum of £25, in consideration of the large expenditure and the great exertions made by him for the advancement of Horticulture.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £12, to be applied towards payment for a lot of one hundred acres of Crown Land for Nathaniel Green, of South Richmond, Carleton, for a Mill site; such sum to be paid when it shall be certified to His Excellency that a Mill has been erected and is in operation on the said lot.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £20, to be paid Barnard Duffy, of Harvey, in the County of Albert, when it shall be certified to His Excellency that an Oat Mill and Grist Mill shall have been built by the said Duffy, and are in operation; such sum to be in addition to the Bounty for the Oat Mill.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £700, to encourage the importation of an improved breed of Horses into the Province, to be applied as follows:—£200 to be paid as a premium for the best thorough bred Stallion, not under sixteen hands high, and not less than four nor more than six years of age; £150 to be paid as a premium for the second best Stallion of the same description; £200 to be paid as a premium for the best Stallion of the Irish Hunter breed, not under sixteen hands high, and not less than four nor more than six years of age; £150 to be paid as a premium for the second best Stallion of the description last mentioned. The said Horses are to be imported from England or Ireland during the current year; and before any premium be paid, it shall be certified to His Excellency, by competent judges to be appointed by His Excellency for that purpose, that the Horse is in every respect of the character, age, and description required, and that the owner thereof is justly entitled to the premium therefor; and further, the owner or owners of every such Horse shall give a sufficient

Bond in the penal sum of £1000, to keep the said Horse for the space of five years within the Province for the purposes intended.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, not exceeding the following sums for the support and encouragement of Agricultural Societies in the respective Counties the present year, viz :—

which sums, or aliquot portions thereof, shall be paid to the order of the President of the respective Agricultural Societies, when it shall be certified to His Excellency that any portion of the inhabitants of any one of the said Counties have subscribed and paid during the present year a sum equal to one half of the respective sums above mentioned, or the said aliquot portions thereof, for the support of Agriculture; which sums so paid shall be accounted for to the Legislature: provided always, that in such Counties in which District Agricultural Societies are formed, embracing one or more Parishes only, it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency to apportion the amounts so to be granted to those Counties among the said District Societies: and further provided, that no Warrant do issue for such sums, or any parts thereof, until an account current for the past year of the Society for whose benefit such application may be made, duly attested by the Treasurer, be first laid before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, to be laid before the Legislature at its next meeting.

To R. S. M. L. M'Donald the sum of £10 for teaching a School in the Parish of West Isles, in the County of Charlotte, for six months ending on the ninth day of March, 1846.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £40 for the support of a Courier between Miramichi and Pokemouche, via Tabusintac and Tracadie.

To James Tupper, Courier between Fredericton and Woodstock, the sum of £75 to compensate him in part for losses sustained by him in consequence of the Bridges on the line having been carried away by the Freshet last spring.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £20 for the encouragement of running a Packet between Prince Edward Island, and Bay Verte, in the County of Westmorland, to be paid to William Weeks, on a satisfactory certificate being produced that the said Packet has run at least once a fortnight during the season, touching at Bedeque and Charlotte Town each alternate voyage.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £40 to enable him to pay a Courier for carrying the Mail once a week between Madawaska Post Office and the River Saint Francis.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £10 to provide for the services of a Courier to carry the Mail once a week between Sackville and the North Joggins, in the County of Westmorland.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £20 to pay a Courier for carrying the Mail once a week between Hampton Post Office and the Parish of Upham, Kings' County.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £10 to provide for the additional expense of carrying the Mail between Nerepis and Gagetown, through the Jerusalem Settlement, instead of the present route.

To Commissioners to be appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £100 towards encouraging a weekly communication between Fredericton and Saint Andrews, to be paid quarterly upon its being certified that the communication is efficiently kept up.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £15 to pay for the conveyance of a semi-weekly Mail between Saint Andrews and Saint Stephen.

To James Green and John Winters the sum of £10 for services rendered to the Legislature during the present Session.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £25 to provide for the services of a Courier between Fredericton and Stanley.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £60 to enable him to pay a Courier for carrying the Mail once a week between Fredericton and the Finger Board.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £100 to defray the expense of a semi-weekly Courier between Miramichi and Dalhousie.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, the sum of £30 to enable him to pay a Courier for carrying the Mail once a week between the mouth of the Nerepis and head of the Long Reach, through the Parishes of Westfield and Greenwich.

To Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Gloucester the sum of £30 to pay a Courier from Bathurst to Pokemouche, via Shippegan, for the year ending first June, 1847.

## SUPERANNUATION TO JUDGE BOTSFORD.

(Copy)

[No. 45.]

Downing Street, 19th January, 1847.

SIR,—I have read with very lively concern the Letter to myself from Mr. Botsford, of the 11th December, 1846, accompanying your Despatch of the 23d of that month, (No. 117). Lord Stanley obviously accepted Mr. Botsford's resignation under the conviction that the claims of that Gentleman to a retired allowance, at his advanced period of life, and after so long a course of honorable public service in so high and eminent a station, would be favorably received by the Legislature of New Brunswick; nor do I doubt that if His Lordship had regarded their concurrence in such a grant as questionable, he would have directed that the resignation should not be actually made until that question had been set at rest. To have taken such a precaution might indeed have appeared to imply some unbecoming distrust of the justice and liberality of the Assembly; and for that reason, as I presume, Lord Stanley omitted to take it. The omission is now irreparable, except by a reconsideration on the part of the Local Legislature, of their refusal of the proposed grant. Her Majesty has, by the Civil List arrangement, been entirely divested of all resources for satisfying any such demands on the justice or liberality of the Crown. To the Assembly therefore the case must be again referred, with as strong a recommendation of the claim to their favorable notice, as it may be possible to address to them. I am convinced that if the case had been understood by that House, as it is now represented by Mr. Botsford and by yourself, they would not have declined to accede to his request. A repetition of their refusal, would, in any future case, render impossible the voluntary resignation of any Judge, however much age or infirmity might have disqualified him for his judicial duties. The saving of a charge of £300 per annum to the Local Treasury, or even the habitual saving of any such charges, would be a very inadequate compensation for the injury which the public at large would sustain from the continuance on the Bench of men who had survived the power of discharging aright that most important and arduous trust.

The Bill to authorize the Trustees of Saint Stephen's Church, in the City of Saint John, to sell and dispose of certain Lands in the said City: and

The Bill to provide for the incorporation of certain Presbyterian Churches in this Province;

With amendments, to which they desire the concurrence of the Assembly.

The amendments made by the Legislative Council to—The Bill to authorize the Trustees of Saint Stephen's Church, in the City of Saint John, to sell and dispose of certain Lands in the said City,—were severally read a first and second times, and are as follow:—

At A in Section I. expunge the words "or any part or parts thereof," and insert the words "in such lots as the said Trustees may determine, at public auction, giving one calendar month's notice in two or more Newspapers published in the City of Saint John, of the day, hour and place of such sale."

At B insert the words "by and under their Corporate Seal."

At G in Section II. expunge the remainder of the Section, and insert as follows:—"Shall be deposited by the said Trustees in some one of the Banks in the City of Saint John, on interest, to be applied in manner hereinafter mentioned."

At D. expunge the Section, and add as follows:—

"III. And be it enacted, That so soon as the said lots of land, with the Church and other buildings thereon situate, are disposed of, it shall and may be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for the time being, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, on the application of the said Trustees, to appoint five Commissioners from among the proprietors of pews in the said Church at the time of such sale, and from time to time in case of death, removal from the City of Saint John, or refusal to act, to appoint another or others in the room and place of the Commissioner or Commissioners so dying, removing, or refusing to act, for the purpose of selecting and purchasing a site for a new Church, to be built by them from the surplus funds arising from the sale of the said lots of land and buildings hereinbefore described, and which funds shall be deposited in a Bank as aforesaid, and be drawn by them as required for the purpose; and the said Church, when completed, shall be in connection with the Church of Scotland as by Law established; and the said Commissioners shall be and are hereby authorized to set apart pews in the said Church to the several persons who shall be proprietors of pews in the said Saint Stephen's Church at the time of its sale, and who shall have paid up all arrears of rent and purchase money of said pews before the time of sale, to correspond as near as may be with the position and extent of such pews respectively, as in the judgment of the said Commissioners may be just and equitable; such pews to be held on the same terms and conditions as the pews formerly held by them respectively in the said Saint Stephen's Church; and it shall be the duty of the said Commissioners, or the major part of them, and they are hereby required to proceed with all reasonable diligence in the execution of the duties devolved upon them by their appointment under this Act.

"IV. And be it enacted, That in case any pewholder or pewholders in the said Saint Stephen's Church shall object to the sale of the said lots of land and buildings, such objection being made in writing at the time of sale, it shall and may be lawful for the Trustees for the time being to pay to such pewholder or pewholders such sum

to

of money as he or they shall make it satisfactorily appear that he or they paid for the pew or pews of which he or they may be the proprietors, after deducting any arrears of rent or purchase money due on such pew or pews, to the said Trustees; and upon such payment, the said pewholder or pewholders so objecting as aforesaid, shall cease to have any interest therein.

“ V. And be it further enacted, That so soon as the said building is erected and completed, and the pews set apart in manner aforesaid, the said Church shall be and is hereby construed to be a Church erected in connection with the Established Church of Scotland, with all the powers, rights, and privileges, and subject to all the provisions of the ninth section of an Act made and passed in the second year of the reign of His Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled “ An Act to repeal all the Laws now in force relating to Saint Andrew’s Church in the City of Saint John, and for incorporating certain persons, pewholders of the said Church, and of the several Churches erected or to be erected in this Province, in connection with the Church of Scotland,” and all the other provisions of the said Act.

“ VI. And be it further enacted, That the said Trustees of Saint Stephen’s Church, in the City of Saint John, shall be at liberty, in making sale of the said Church and lots of land, to reserve so much of the interior fittings of the said Church as they may deem serviceable for the purpose of finishing the said Church so to be erected, and the said interior fittings, so reserved, shall be applied for such purpose or sold at the discretion of the said Commissioners.”

At E in the Preamble, insert the words “ together with a Church and other buildings erected thereon.”

At F in the Title, add the words “ and to re-invest the proceeds thereof.”

*Ordered*, That the said Bill, as amended by the Legislative Council, stand for a third reading to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,

The House went into Committee of the whole on a Bill to regulate the exportation of Lumber.

Mr. Hanington in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their further consideration, had made an amendment thereto, and then agreed to the said Bill, under the Title of—

A Bill to continue an Act to regulate the survey and exportation of Lumber.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed as amended, under the amended Title.

On motion of Mr. Woodward,

Whereas by the second Section of the Act 5 William IV. cap. 49, it is provided “that the principal Officers of the Customs in this Province shall render and exhibit, and have filed in the Secretary’s Office, a true Account of all Duties by them collected within the year, with a particular Account of all Merchandize upon which such Duties were imposed and collected:” And whereas the form in which such Accounts are returned for the information of the Legislature is more minute and voluminous than is requisite or necessary; therefore

*Resolved*, That in the opinion of this House, Quarterly Abstract Returns, shewing the principal articles, and the whole amount of Duties collected by the Customs Departments in this Province, would be all that is necessary for the information of the Legislature.

Mr. Fisher, from the Committee appointed on the first day of March last, to take under consideration a Petition from the Honorable Thomas Baillie, as regards certain arrears of Salary due to him, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk’s Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of the Honorable Thomas Baillie, setting forth that there is an arrear of Salary of six hundred and sixty three pounds sixteen shillings and one penny due him as Surveyor General and Commissioner of Crown Lands, for a period commencing the first day of April, 1839, and ending the twenty second day of January, 1840, and that his Salary as Surveyor General, since his reinstatement to office, on the sixth day of August, 1841, should have been computed at the rate of one thousand two hundred pounds Sterling, instead of one thousand two hundred pounds Currency, and praying the interposition of this

House with Her Majesty's Government, to obtain for him a just and equitable adjustment of these several claims, have attended to that duty, and submit the following Report—

“As to the first claim, after an examination of the Documents submitted, your Committee have not sufficient information to enable them to arrive at a conclusion, but are of opinion, that it is a matter which should be investigated and determined by the Government:—That as to the claim for the payment of Salary in Sterling, your Committee, on the evidence submitted to them, are of opinion, that Mr. Baillie was, after a protracted discussion on the subject of the Salary with the Government, restored to the office of Surveyor General, on the sixth day of August, 1841, on a proposition made by Mr. George Baillie to Lord John Russell, in which he says—‘with the view of preventing further reference to His Lordship, or Sir William Colebrooke, he (Mr. George Baillie) would recommend him (Mr. T. Baillie) to accept the Salary of one thousand two hundred pounds Sterling,’—which proposition, your Committee are of opinion, was acceded to by His Lordship and Mr. T. Baillie, and on the faith of which he returned to office:—And your Committee can discover no act on the part of the Government, altering or affecting this agreement; nor does it appear to your Committee that Mr. Baillie has done any act to impair his right to have such agreement carried out; but they are of opinion, that the whole subject should have been investigated and adjusted by the Government:—That to avoid misconception of their opinion as to the Salary that ought to be attached to the office of Surveyor General, your Committee most respectfully state, that in their opinion, the sum of six hundred pounds Currency is an adequate compensation for discharging the duties devolving upon that Officer; and if the question of determining the Salary for the office of Surveyor General had been referred to them, irrespective of any compact or agreement with the Government, they would have fixed it at that amount.

Mr. Read, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of the House of yesterday, praying for copies of the correspondence relative to the resignation of the Honorable Judge Botsford, reported—That they had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, the wishes of the House should be complied with.

On motion of Mr. Wark,

To which Mr. Partelow moved as an amendment—To expunge the word “now,” and substitute the words “at the next Session of the Legislature.”

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wark return the Bill, with the amendments, to the Council, and acquaint them therewith.

The Honorable Mr. Baillie, from the Committee appointed on the twenty seventh day of February last, to take into consideration a Petition from the Honorable John Robertson, relative to a Mill Reserve; and to whom were referred the several Petitions of James Wilson, John F. Ogden, and Roderick M'Leod, submitted a Report relative to the three Petitions last named; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom were referred the several Petitions of James Wilson, John F. Ogden, and Roderick M'Leod, beg leave to submit the following Report—

“Petition of James Wilson, of the Parish of Saint James, in the County of Charlotte, praying for Legislative relief, by reason of his having been put to loss of Land and great Law expenses, in consequence of the said Land, although granted to him, having been previously granted.

“Petition of Thomas Robinson, whose Grant is represented to interfere with the Grant to James Wilson, was entered at the Crown Land Office on the second day of October, 1833, for lot No. 9, and his Grant issued in May, 1836, for that Lot, as surveyed by Deputy Smith.

“James Wilson's Petition was entered on the twenty first day of November, 1835, for the lot adjoining to Robinson, and his Grant issued November, 1836: The same ‘Spruce Stake’ is mentioned in both Grants as the bounds between the two lots, and No. 9 is described as bounded by No. 8; there cannot therefore be any doubt as to the division between them, which must be as originally marked by Deputy Smith; but the Grant to Wilson describes his lot as fifteen chains wide, instead of twelve, which it actually is; and, as containing one hundred and twenty acres, when the true quantity is only one hundred. He consequently paid for twenty acres too much, which, at the rate of two shillings and six pence per acre, (which he paid,) amounts to two pounds ten shillings, which sum your Committee recommend should be granted to Petitioner. With regard to the expenses attending any Law Suit between Petitioner and Robinson, your Committee had no evidence before them which could enable them to make any report thereon.

“Petition of John F. Ogden, of Bay de Verte, in the County of Westmorland, setting forth, that he made purchase from the Crown of a certain tract of Land, which it appeared had been previously granted, before the division took place between this Province and Nova Scotia, and consequently he had to perfect his title by making purchase from the original Grantee; and praying that the amount paid the Crown

may

may be refunded, or such other relief in the premises as to the House may seem meet: In 1827, Petitioner applied for lot No. 14, and paid the sum of twelve pounds nine shillings, as Grant Fees on four hundred acres, with ten per cent., the said lot being situated at Gaspereaux River, in the Parish of Westmorland; the Land was surveyed by the Local Deputy at that time, whose return is dated the twenty seventh day of February, 1828, in which year the Grant issued; your Committee are unable to certify whether it had or had not been previously granted under the Great Seal of Nova Scotia, although it is certainly within the described exterior bounds of the 'Township of Cumberland,' but there is no information in the Surveyor General's Office to enable your Committee to state whether or not the particular portion thereof was granted to any particular individual. The plan of the Grant in 1828 is signed by Surveyor General S. P. Hurd.

"Petition of Roderick M'Leod, Esquire, of Tabusintac, in the County of Northumberland, praying that an Act may pass, securing to him his Mill Reserves, granted prior to the passing of the Civil List Act, upon such terms as the House may deem meet: The statements made by Petitioner in regard to his Mill Reserves are correct: in 1824 he was ordered an addition of two thousand acres to the five thousand allowed him in 1823, making seven thousand acres in the whole, which he held until the notice of the thirteenth day of April last, abolishing all Mill Reserves, and requiring applications to be made under the Mill Reserve Act, which entitled Mr. M'Leod to five thousand acres only, which is all the extent he now holds; as, however, your Committee cannot discover that Petitioner has suffered any considerable loss, they are not prepared to make any recommendation in his favor.

Mr. M'Leod, from the Committee appointed on the thirteenth day of March last, to take into consideration a Petition from James B. Toldervy, Esquire, M. D., relative to certain charges against him as Indian Commissioner, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Doctor Toldervy, praying investigation into his conduct as Indian Commissioner, having had certain charges preferred before the Committee, and a written explanation in answer made, and your Committee having examined the witnesses and evidence adduced, and duly considered the whole case, Report—

"That, under all the circumstances, no blame can fairly be attributed to Doctor Toldervy; that the question of the extent to which Medical aid should be afforded must be a matter in the discretion of the Commissioner, when such Officer is a Physician.

"That the Office of Indian Commissioner is a most troublesome and thankless one, and the management of the Indians, from their character, prejudices and habits, is surrounded with great difficulties.

"That Doctor Toldervy appears to consider that the views of the Legislature can be best met, and the sufferings of the Indians best alleviated, by extending to them relief in food and clothing, rather than by incurring heavy charges for Medical attendance.

"That Mr. William Wilmot, Senior, resides in the immediate neighbourhood of the Indians, and having constantly under his notice the privations of these unfortunate people, whose condition, under the most favorable circumstances, may now be characterized as one of suffering, and actuated by the most charitable and praiseworthy feelings, took great interest in their case, and extended to them sympathy and aid; and the state of the Indians, which, to an unprofessional eye, had the appearance

of an alarming epidemic, no doubt led him in the present case to attach blame which the circumstances would not warrant; this, and an evident misunderstanding as to the effect of a conversation which took place between Mr. William Wilmot, Senior, and Doctor Toldervy, and a like misunderstanding, as explained by Doctor Toldervy, as to a similar conversation between Doctor Hartt and Doctor Toldervy, led to the charges under consideration; and which charges, although unsupported, your Committee are of opinion, were brought forward in the discharge of a public duty, and from no desire wantonly to assail Doctor Toldervy.

SUPERANNUATION ALLOWANCE TO JUDGE BOTSFORD.

*Fredericton, N. B., December 23, 1846.*

MY LORD,—Referring to my Despatch, No. 89, of the 13th October, and to Lord Stanley’s reply, No. 340, dated 4th November, 1845, on the subject of the retirement of Mr. Justice Botsford from the Bench of the Supreme Court, I have the honor to enclose the copy of a Letter which I have received from that Gentleman, with one to your Lordship’s Address, in which he has recapitulated the circumstances attending his resignation, and the grounds on which he repeats his claim for a Pension, in consequence of the House of Assembly, to whom his claim was referred in the last Session, having declined to pass an Address to concur in such an appropriation from the Surplus of the Civil List Fund. I regretted extremely the circumstance, from a knowledge of the high and honorable motives by which Mr. Botsford had been influenced in the course he adopted ; and being aware, that the claims of old servants of the Crown, which existed prior to the transfer of the Crown Revenues, had been regarded in some cases as entitling them to special consideration of Her Majesty’s Government, it would have given me much satisfaction to have been able to have reported a different result.

MY LORD,—A year having elapsed since Her Majesty was graciously pleased to approve of my retirement from the Bench of the Supreme Court of this Province, and having as yet received no intimation

intimation that any superannuation allowance has been assigned to me, I am constrained to bring under your notice my present unexpected position.

In a Letter to Sir Archibald Campbell, in September 1836, I wrote thus:—"Being now of the age of 63 years, and feeling some of the infirmities that usually attend persons in advanced life, I am conscious of their effect, and therefore beg leave to tender the resignation of my seat upon the Bench, but with such retired allowance as Her Majesty may graciously be pleased to grant."

In answer to this, Lord Glenelg writes to Sir Archibald Campbell, under date 31st October, 1836—

"Sir,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 47, of the 12th October, enclosing an application from Mr. William Botsford, the senior Puisne Judge of New Brunswick, who is desirous of retiring from his judicial duties, upon a pension being assigned to him. Before this communication reaches you, you will have received my Despatches of 31st October and 5th September last. It will be obvious to you, that the financial arrangement, which you are instructed by those Despatches to submit for the consideration and sanction of the Provincial Legislature, renders it impossible for me now to advise His Majesty to place any new charges upon the Crown Revenues of New Brunswick; but I am commanded by the King to direct you to recommend to the Assembly in the strongest terms, such a Grant as will enable His Majesty to make provision for Mr. Botsford's retirement.

"That the Assembly will give a ready assent to that proposition, I am bound to believe, from the assurance you give of the universal satisfaction which the measure would produce."

This Despatch of Lord Glenelg was sent to me by Sir John Harvey, the successor of Sir Archibald Campbell in the Government of this Province, together with a Note from Sir John, in which he was pleased to say—"I shall be happy to meet your wishes in any way which may be in my power in connexion of the subject of it."

To this offer of Sir John, I replied by requesting him to submit my application to Her Most Gracious Majesty for her approval. Of the result of Sir John Harvey's correspondence, I have never been apprized.

Thus the matter rested, and I continued in the performance of my judicial duties until October 1845, when I renewed my application to retire from the Bench with a Pension. In my communication to Sir William M<sup>r</sup>. B. G. Colebrooke, in which were embodied my correspondence with Sir A. Campbell, and my Lord Glenelg's Despatch, I wrote thus:—"Being now in the 73d year of my age, I find my infirmities, in particular that of deafness, have so increased, that in justice to myself, and for the public interest, I ought to retire from public life; I therefore most respectfully beg leave to tender the resignation of my seat upon the Bench, with such retired allowance as Her Majesty may graciously be pleased to direct."

I may state also, that I forwarded at the same time to Sir William Colebrooke, a private Note, as I had done to Sir A. Campbell, stating that I would be contented with an allowance of three hundred sterling per annum.

In answer to this application, I was favored by His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke with the following extract from Lord Stanley's Despatch, under date of the 4th November, 1845:—

"I have received your Despatch, No. 89, of the 13th October, communicating the resignation of Mr. Botsford of his Office of Senior Assistant Justice of the Supreme Court in New Brunswick, and proposing that some provision for his retirement may be made from the Surplus Civil List Fund of that Province.

"I have to inform you, that the Queen has accepted Mr. Botsford's resignation, and has been graciously pleased to command me to signify to you Her Majesty's regret that Mr. Botsford should be no longer able to continue in that career of public service, to the value of which you have been able to bear such high and honorable testimony.

"It would therefore have afforded me peculiar satisfaction to have advised the Queen, in compliance with your recommendation, to grant to that Gentleman, during the rest of his life, a Pension or superannuation allowance, charged on the annual Surplus of the Civil List Fund of New Brunswick.

"But in making that proposal, you can scarcely have adverted to the correspondence, (noted in the margin,) which took place in the year 1840, between Lord John Russell and your immediate predecessor in the Government, on the subject of the Pension which it was then proposed to assign to the Provincial Surveyor General, Mr. Baillie.

"The result of that correspondence is, that by the distinct and deliberate admission of Her Majesty's Government, as then constituted, the compact of 1836, between the Crown and the two Houses of Local Legislature, must be so construed as to deprive the Queen of the power of making any such appropriation as you now suggest of the Surplus Civil List Fund. Such an acknowledgement is binding upon the faith and honor of the Crown, and whatever may be the inconveniences of adhering to such a pledge, (nor am I by any means disposed to underrate them,) the infringement of it I need scarcely say, is impossible. \* \* \* \* \* Thence I infer that the claims of Mr. Botsford must be presented to the Assembly, as an isolated demand on their liberality."

The subject matter of my Pension was submitted by His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke to the House of Assembly at the last Session, and lost by a majority against it. That I did not intend my resignation to be irrespective of a retired allowance, I must be permitted emphatically to state, for in addition to the serious inconvenience consequent upon giving up the emolument of my Office in the evening of my days, I confidently relied upon the fact that my former resignation had been treated as conditional.

In confirmation of this, I beg leave most respectfully to refer to the spirit of my correspondence with Sir A. Campbell, and to the favorable indulgence of my then Sovereign, as expressed in Lord Glenelg's Despatch.

The undoubted right of my Royal Mistress to dispense with my services at any time, I do not question; to Her gracious protection I respectfully and willingly submit any claim which long and faithful service may suggest.

If under these circumstances, my Lord, I am not to have a retired allowance, with all duty to my Queen, and respect to Her Minister, I cannot but feel, that in my old age I shall have been dismissed by a Government in whose service the greater part of a long life has been passed.

May I request of you, my Lord, to lay my application at the Foot of the Throne.

“The Committee to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, relating to the Office of Government Emigrant Agent at Saint John, and the remuneration now received by that Officer, have had the same under their consideration, and report, that they consider the present Salary insufficient as a remuneration for the services rendered by him; and the Committee are of opinion, that a further sum should be added to the Salary at present charged upon the Civil List for that Officer, and the Committee have therefore prepared a Bill for that purpose, which they submit for the consideration of the House.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at half past 9 o'clock.

Whereas the subject of Immigration, so intimately connected with the prosperity of this Province, has deeply engaged the attention of this House during the present Session, and a Bill for the encouragement and settlement of Emigrants has been reported by a Select Committee, and fully discussed by the House: And whereas the said Bill was abandoned for the purpose of substituting, in lieu thereof, an Humble and Dutiful Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen; and a Committee was appointed to prepare the said Address: And whereas it appears, on further investigation, that the subject is surrounded by very serious difficulties and liabilities, involving the unavoidable expenditure of large sums of money, altogether beyond the means of this Province; and although this House is of opinion that the employment of Emigrants on any Public Works carried on by the Home Government on a large scale, would tend to advance the settlement of the Wilderness Lands, while the placing of inexperienced Settlers in the woods would unavoidably lead to distress, suffering and want; therefore

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to

The Bill to authorize the granting of a tract of Land, as a Mill Reserve, to the Honorable John Robertson; and

The Bill to provide for the erection of a Building for a Provincial Lunatic Asylum; Without making any amendments thereto.

And that the Council had concurred in

The Resolutions of Appropriation sent up from the Assembly, dated the tenth day of April instant.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the first day of February last, to take into consideration all matters relating to the Indian Reserves, submitted their Report, which he read; and handed the same in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Select Committee on Indian Affairs have had before them the following Petitions, and beg leave to Report—

"The Petition of J. W. Holderness and Chilton, praying for a return of £37 12 6 paid to the Commissioner for Indians in the County of Kent for Stumpage on Logs cut on Indian Reserves in that County: We cannot recommend compliance with the prayer of this Petition.

"The Petition of Robert Hay, of Woodstock, praying relief from costs incurred in consequence of a suit commenced against him by Peter Watson, claiming a right to lands in charge of the Indian Commissioner: As the suit is not yet finally decided by the Court, we cannot recommend a compliance with the prayer of this Petition.

"The Petition of Peter Muzerall, praying for compensation for services performed as Commissioner of Indian Reserves for the County of Kent: This Petition cannot be complied with.

"The Petition of Donald M'Kay, and nineteen others, settlers upon Indian Reserves in the County of Northumberland, praying that measures may be adopted for carrying into effect the provisions of the Act to regulate the management and disposal of the Indian Reserves in this Province: After a careful consideration of the subject of the Indian Reserves, and an examination of the Plans and Surveys thereof, we are unanimously of opinion that immediate proceedings should be adopted by the Government to dispose of those Reserves as opportunities arise, and as the Government may deem advisable.

"Having referred to the Surveys of the Northumberland Reserves, we recommend that all the allotments at present occupied by settlers, and which have been surveyed, should be sold under the directions of the Government during the present year, at such upset price as may be deemed reasonable, and subject to a valuation of the improvements.

"With respect to the Tabusintac Reserve of 9000 acres, we are informed that applications have been made for a part not yet surveyed, to the extent of 2000 acres; we therefore recommend that 3000 acres of this Reserve be forthwith surveyed, and offered for sale at four shillings per acre upset price.

"As a general rule, we recommend that in all cases where portions of the Indian Reserves in any parts of the Province may be advantageously sold, they should be disposed of for actual settlement so soon as practicable, always reserving such camping grounds and wood lands as may be required for the several tribes or parts of tribes in their respective localities, and also allotting to each family desirous of cultivating the soil, a lot not exceeding 50 acres.

"The Act 7 Vic. c. 47, has clothed the Government with ample provision to carry out our recommendation; and we hope that such an available fund will be realized by the disposal of the Reserves as will relieve the Revenues of the Province from any further charges for the support and relief of the Indians.

"The amount reported by the Road Committee, and granted in Supply for that service, was more than the estimate of the seventeenth of February could possibly bear; and although the internal improvement of the Country is an object of great importance, that appropriation carries the amount far beyond the limits assigned by one of the most essential rules of the House.

"Your Committee intended to recommend the disposal of the large sum of money at present in the Bank of New Brunswick, at the credit of the Province, in some way to produce a fair amount of interest; but, as a considerable portion of this sum ought immediately to be applied to the calling in and payment of Debentures for the Burnt District, and the remainder will probably soon be wanted to meet a portion of the heavy expenditure of the present Session, any special interference in this matter becomes unnecessary.

And His Excellency was then pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:

*" Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

*" Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

" In bringing the Session to a close, I avail myself with much satisfaction of the occasion, to congratulate you on the spirit with which you have applied yourselves to the Public business, and the measures which you have thus been enabled to accomplish.

" It is especially gratifying to me that you have concurred in the importance which I have attached to the introduction of an improved system in the management of the Parish Schools; and I hope that you will have reason to find that the powers which you have intrusted to the Executive Government, as a Board of Education, have been exercised in such a manner as effectually to realize the objects for which you have so liberally provided.

" The Acts you have passed for the removal of all Fiscal restrictions on Trade between these Colonies, and for the protection of English Copyright in Books, will, I doubt not, be productive of all the benefit to be expected from measures which evince your liberality and sense of justice.

*" Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

" I thank you for the Supplies which you have granted for the Public Service. The promptitude with which you came forward at the opening of the Session for the relief of our suffering fellow subjects in the United Kingdom, claims from me, in the name of Her Majesty, the warmest acknowledgments.

" The liberal encouragement you have given for the opening of Rail Roads, while it will facilitate the settlement of the Province, will secure to it a participation in the advantages which have elsewhere attended the introduction of these useful works.

*" Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

*" Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

" The measures to which I have alluded, and the general course of your proceedings throughout the Session, have manifested your desire to strengthen the bonds which unite you to the destinies of that great Country with which it has been your pride to be connected by such memorable associations; and I feel the utmost confidence, that in returning to your homes, you will continue to cultivate in the minds of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects, a sense of the many blessings which that connection is calculated to secure to them."

*" Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

*" Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

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**REPORT FROM COMMISSIONER FOR WINDING UP THE AFFAIRS.**


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*Fredericton, 11th September, 1846.*

SIR,—I beg leave to acquaint you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that conformably to my appointment as sole Trustee of the Fredericton Savings' Bank, under the Act of Assembly of last Session, for the purpose of winding up its affairs, I have used every diligence in attending to that duty, and the result, up to this time, I have now the honor to report.

The communication of the Commissioners last autumn shewed the insolvent condition of this Institution, and the unbusiness like manner in which a large portion of the securities had remained over for years, without even the promissors or endorsers having been called upon to renew their notes, and I felt satisfied that in many instances when the drawers had become unable to pay, the endorsers would avail themselves of their legal protection by pleading exemption in consequence of not receiving the proper notification. To remedy this difficulty as far as practicable has been my unceasing endeavour, and I have therefore been enabled principally by persuasion in getting some of the parties who were thus situated to renew their obligations, by either themselves becoming promissors, or endorsing new paper for the old obligors. I have now on deposit at the Central Bank, forty-three notes, most of which, if lenity be used, will be eventually paid, amounting to £2,192 10 7, besides £116 ls. in cash at my credit; and I have made arrangements with that Bank to send the requisite notices from time to time to the drawers and endorsers free of any charge, so that there should be no escape from liability.

I have only as yet lodged three notes with Solicitors for collection, amounting to £347 13 2; one of which, £110, endorsed by the late Peter Fraser, of nearly six years standing, is disputed by the Executor of the Estate, but which, from the investigations I have made, I entertain very sanguine hopes of recovery.

I shall be obliged to put other notes in suit, to the extent of £350, unless some satisfactory arrangements be made before the October term of the Supreme Court; and I shall continue to use my best exertions to wind up the affairs of the Bank as speedily as possible, in order to ascertain the deficiency, which I hope will come within the estimate given by the Commissioners last autumn.

The amount due the depositors, as far as I have ascertained, which I believe will prove correct, was £4,675 18 8, 1st January, but which will be reduced about £75 by the proceeds of a suit on a Savings' Bank note handed me by Mr. Taylor to meet a deposit of that amount, previously to the Act of Assembly.

The depositors have generally been made acquainted with the course I am taking; and I am happy to say, that in no instance has any dissatisfaction been expressed, but on the contrary, a patient willingness has been shewn to abide the result.

# AUDITOR GENERAL'S OFFICE.

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## Increased Duties, and inadequacy of allowance for Clerkship.

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(Copy)

Audit Office, 31st May, 1845.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR.

*May it please Your Excellency,*

An imperative sense of public duty induces me to again trouble Your Excellency on the subject of the Provincial Office of Audit.

From the period of my being directed by Your Excellency, in the year 1841, to undertake the inspecting and auditing of the Provincial Accounts, I have devoted my best energies to the performance of the duty in the most thorough and efficient manner; with what success, I leave it for Your Excellency to say.

The duties of Provincial Auditor, at all times onerous, have materially increased during the last year, notwithstanding which, I have not, as Your Excellency knows, received any compensation for my services in that capacity; and the allowance of £150 Currency made me for Clerk hire, being insufficient for that purpose, I have in consequence been obliged to appropriate a portion of my very moderate stipend, as Auditor of the Casual and Territorial Revenues, to assist in paying for the labour of inspecting, auditing and reporting upon the Provincial Accounts.

The Building which I at present occupy as an Office, is the same which I occupied when discharging the duties of Auditor of the Casual and Territorial Revenues alone, and the accommodations were sufficient for that purpose; but numerous important Provincial Documents are now accumulating daily, references connected with the auditing of the Public Accounts are being hourly made by Supervisors, Commissioners, Contractors, and other interested parties, and accommodations are required for two Clerks, and I therefore beg again to submit to Your Excellency, that the public service requires that a commodious fire proof Building be provided for the Office of Audit.

I beg, Sir, to call Your Excellency's attention to the fact that my Lord Glenelg, in his Despatch to Sir Archibald Campbell, of the 5th September, 1836, on the subject of the surrender of the Casual and Territorial Revenues of the Crown, remarks, that the appointment of an Auditor, immediately responsible to the Crown, is more consistent with the British Constitution than the consigning the duty of examining the Public Accounts altogether to the Representatives of the People; that the office of Auditor, as then constituted in New Brunswick, was, His Lordship apprehended, insufficient for the duties which he proposed to devolve on it; and that among the objects to which it was his purpose to devote a portion of the Surplus of the Civil List, was the institution of an efficient Office of Audit within the Province for all the Revenues raised and expended in it; and in consequence of the suggestions of His Lordship, the Legislative Council of this Province did, on the 28th of February, 1837, recommend the sum of £850 Currency as a reasonable annual allowance for such office.

I have to beg that Your Excellency will be pleased to give the subject matter of this communication your most serious consideration, and if Your Excellency agrees in the opinion expressed by my Lord Glenelg, that an efficient Office of Audit, immediately responsible to the Executive Government, is desirable, and if you are likewise of the opinion that my humble exertions, made under Your Excellency's special and specific instructions, have been successful in placing the Provincial Office of Audit in the requisite state of efficiency, I beg, Sir, that you will cause it to be placed on such a liberal footing in respect to the salary of the Incumbent, and the allowance for

Clerk hire, Contingencies, and Office accommodations, as its importance justly entitles it to, and as a due regard to its continued efficiency, important as it is to the financial interests of the Province, renders necessary; and should Your Excellency not feel yourself justified in complying with so reasonable and equitable a request, I have to beg that you will sanction my bringing the subject, by Memorial, under the notice of my Lord Stanley, and afford it such support as Your Excellency shall consider due to its importance.

SIR,—I had the honor, on the 31st of May last, to call the attention of His Excellency, the Lieutenant Governor to the fact of my having been for a length of time in the discharge of the duties of Provincial Auditor, under special instructions from His Excellency; that I was not receiving any compensation for so doing; and that the allowances made me for Clerk hire and Office accommodations were insufficient; and I requested of His Excellency, that if he considered it desirable to have an efficient Provincial Office of Audit, responsible to the Executive Government, he would be pleased to cause it to be placed on such a liberal footing as its importance entitled it to, and I begged that if he did not feel himself justified in complying with my request, he would sanction my bringing the subject, by Memorial, under the notice of my Lord Stanley, and afford it such support as he might consider due to its importance.

Not having been favoured with an answer to such communication, and the labors of the Office continuing to increase to such an extent that I am obliged to have it kept open until nine and ten o'clock in the evening, whilst important public documents are daily flowing in without my having the means of filing them away systematically, I have to request that you will move His Excellency to inform me at what time I may look for an answer to my said communications.

SIR,—I have to beg through you, as head of the Audit Office, to bring under the notice of the Government the inadequacy of the remuneration which I receive as chief and only Clerk in your Office, when compared with the labour and responsibility which devolves upon me.

I have spared no pains to keep up the work of the Office, and although in doing so Office hours have been entirely out of the question, and I have for months in succession devoted from eight to ten hours a day to Office work, still I should not have stirred in my own case, were it not that with my large family of eight children, (six of them under ten years of age,) I cannot with the strictest economy make both ends meet, and I am in consequence obliged, not only to stop my children from school, but

but to sag at the Office with the harrassment and annoyance arising from pecuniary obligations staring me in the face, whilst I am so tied to my official duties that I can devote no part of my time to earning something in other ways.

I beg, Sir, that you will request the Government to place me on such a footing as respects salary, as my services entitle me to, and as will suffice to keep myself and family above want; and if any doubts are entertained as to the extent of my duties and of my necessities, I beg that a Committee may be appointed to inquire into them.

SIR,—I have the honor to request that you will acquaint His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that in conformity with the instructions which he has from time to time conveyed to me during the current year, I have certified such applications for Warrants on the Treasury from Clerks of the Peace, Overseers of the Poor, Commissioners of Light Houses, and other persons, as have been transmitted to me for that purpose, and that I am continuing to certify them as they come before me.

His Excellency is aware that this is a branch of duty which had not previously been devolved upon me, nor has it been usually considered of a nature to bring it within the province of the Auditor of Public Accounts to report upon, and I beg to assure His Excellency that the performance of it adds not a little to the labours of my Department.

In the various Communications which I have from time to time had the honor to make to His Excellency since the labour and responsibility of keeping, inspecting and reporting upon the Provincial Accounts was added to my duties, I have invariably informed His Excellency, that the strength of my Office was not sufficient for the proper discharge of the services I had to perform, and that although my own time and attention was wholly devoted to the duties of my Office, still my principal and only Clerk was over worked and inadequately paid; and I am now under the painful necessity of most respectfully stating for His Excellency's information, that it will not be in my power to have the Annual Reports upon the principal Public Accounts ready to lay before the Executive, at the usual time after the meeting of the Legislature, unless I am furnished with the means of obtaining additional assistance.

I have therefore to beg that His Excellency will be pleased to sanction my procuring the services of a copying Clerk, at a moderate salary, until the close of the next Session of the Legislature, or until the subject of placing my Office on a footing more adequate to the arduous and responsible duties devolved upon me can be taken up; and I beg, Sir, to assure His Excellency, that in making this request, I have no other motive, and can have no other motive, than a zealous desire to have the public business, so far as it is connected with my Office, disposed of in a proper manner and in proper season.

SIR,—I feel that the importance of the subject will be a sufficient apology for my again troubling Your Excellency on the subject of the Office of Audit.

Waiving the subject of my just claims for managing the laborious and responsible office of Provincial Auditor, I beg most respectfully to represent to Your Excellency, that the Public Accounts of the Province must fall into confusion, and the public interest must consequently suffer unless I am furnished with such permanent additional assistance as will enable me to keep up the business of my Office.

Adverting to my several communications to Your Excellency on this subject, I beg to state, that early in December last, the various additional duties which had been imposed on me, the great increase of public business, and the arrearages of the ordinary

ordinary business which had accumulated in my office for want of sufficient clerical assistance, convinced me that I would be unable to complete the inspection of the Public Accounts at the usual time, and finding that the application for an additional Clerk, which I had the honor to make to Your Excellency on the 7th of December, could not at that time be complied with, an earnest desire to avoid the inconvenience which the country would inevitably experience, if the Reports on the various Public Accounts were not ready at the customary periods after the meeting of the Legislature, induced me to engage the services of a copying Clerk until the close of the present Session, and I have the honor to request that Your Excellency will be pleased to sanction the step which a sense of public duty induced me to take, and that you will authorize the payment of the said Clerk by Warrant on the Surplus Civil List Fund or otherwise, at the rate of eight pounds per month.

Your Excellency is so well aware of the variety, the laboriousness and the responsibility of the duties which are of necessity allotted to me in my capacity of Auditor General, and I have so repeatedly brought them in detail under Your Excellency's notice, that I consider it would be superfluous to dilate upon them at this time; Your Excellency must be satisfied that the present allowance of one hundred and fifty pounds currency for clerkship, is not sufficient to enable me to discharge those duties in that prompt and efficient manner which a due regard to the public interest would require, and I regret to say, that notwithstanding the most unremitting attention on my part, and the incessant application at all hours and seasons, of my Clerk, Mr. Beckwith, my Books and Records have fallen so far in arrears, as to materially impede the efficiency of the Department, and that unless further permanent provision be forthwith made, the public business must continue to go more and more behind hand, and the communications which I have been in the habit of making to public accountants, explanatory of errors and deficiencies in their Accounts, and the verbal explanations which are daily being given them in my office, must be hereafter unavoidably discontinued; as although they are, as I conceive, necessary and important items of the duty of an Auditor, and a great convenience to public accountants, still, as they take up the greater part of the time of one person, other more important items of duty must be attended to in preference.

Having, Sir, by this Letter, and by my former communications on the same subject, brought the duties of my office fairly and fully under Your Excellency's notice, I have to beg that Your Excellency will be pleased to appropriate an additional sum of not less than one hundred and fifty pounds currency, per annum, for the in-door establishment thereof, commencing with the commencement of the current year; and I assure Your Excellency, that I cannot with a smaller allowance undertake to perform the duties of the office in such a manner as to satisfy the just and reasonable expectations of the Government and of the Country.

I beg also to again submit to Your Excellency's notice, the fact, that the great and daily increasing accumulation of important public documents in the Audit Office, and the large amount of public business which is being transacted therein, renders a more convenient and roomy building, with a commodious fire proof vault attached thereto, highly necessary.

I can, Sir, scarcely permit myself to believe that this earnest and respectful application will be made in vain, but should such unfortunately be the case, I beg to assure Your Excellency that I will continue to discharge my official duties with my accustomed zeal, and to the best of my abilities, but that I feel that I should not be held responsible for any inconvenience which the public may suffer from the arrearages of business which must of necessity continue to accumulate, and for the imperfect audits which must of consequence be made of the Public Accounts.

# LAZARETTO AT SHELDRAKE ISLAND.

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## Report from Commissioners of Lazaretto at Sheldrake Island.

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*Miramichi, 9th February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honor to enclose herewith a statement of the expenditure of the Board of Health for the past year, amounting to £538 0 6.

This sum has principally been expended in supporting about a dozen of the unfortunate Lepers on Sheldrake Island. During the last year three of the diseased persons died, making, altogether, six persons who have died in the Lazaretto since its establishment.

Early in the past year four of the male Lepers escaped from the Island, and as they published their determination not to be retaken, one of the members of the Board was sent to Tracadie early in the Summer, with instructions to enforce their return; he however failed after incurring a heavy expense, but brought up a new case, a middle aged man named Breds, who escaped shortly afterwards, and is still at large. Two of the other deserters have voluntarily returned to the Island, bearing marks of the increased ravages of the disease.

The number of persons in the Lazaretto at present is twelve. Four are mothers, and three are fathers of families; the others are young persons. All are confirmed cases of the loathsome disease. The poor creatures appear to be satisfied that it is incurable; some of them are so satisfied of this that they have made up their minds never more to mingle with their families. I apprehend no future attempt to escape being made by any now on the Island. Their last ray of hope departed with the failure of some nostrums prescribed by a quack for Breds. They refuse all prescriptions ordered by the Medical Officer for the disease.

The members of the Board have visited the Island from time to time, and have used their best efforts to render the situation of the Lepers as comfortable as their afflictions will admit of. All these efforts have failed to render them satisfied, or to induce them to use the slightest trouble for their own personal comfort; while this disposition is increasing, the Board have no means by which they can remedy the evil.

There is an impression gaining ground, that new cases of the disease are appearing at Tracadie and elsewhere.

The communication of Mr. James Young to the Grand Inquest of Gloucester alleges that eight new cases exist. His opportunities of knowing the state of the district of which he speaks are good, and it is to be regretted that he did not give the Board such information as would have enabled them to ascertain the correctness of the report he has elsewhere made.

The Board, from its first formation, has had to contend against many prejudices, some of which have greatly increased the difficulty and expense of managing the Lazaretto.

I see no prospect of improving the management of the establishment under the present system, and the Board have long felt, that notwithstanding their anxious desire to make the expense of maintaining the Lazaretto as moderate as possible, they have been unable to bring it down to any thing like a satisfactory amount. It is absolutely necessary that a radical change should be effected, but what, under all the circumstances, would be most advisable to provide for the future comfort of these sorely afflicted people, and to prevent the further spread of the loathsome disease, I am utterly incompetent to determine.

I am directed by the Board again to urge respectfully and earnestly for Your Excellency's consideration, the expediency of at once appointing and sending competent persons to investigate the whole matter, and to report thereon to Your Excellency, before any further action be taken by the Legislature.

The undersigned, one of the Grand Jurors, at present assembled, begs to lay before his fellow Jurors the following statement:—

That in the Parish of Saumarez, notwithstanding the exertions that have been made by the Legislature, (through the representations of a former Grand Jury of this County,) that horrible disease, the Leprosy, has continued to spread: That eight new cases have occurred since the erection of the Lazaretto in Miramichi, which together with two infected persons who have escaped from thence, make ten cases at present existing, old and young, and all principally belonging to destitute families.

These unfortunate persons threaten to become a burden greater than the Parish can reasonably bear; added to which, by their unrestricted intercourse with the inhabitants, the disease must continue to spread, as it has done the past two years, until actually the whole County may become infected.

The undersigned begs therefore that the present Grand Inquest will make such presentment to the Court or Government on the matter, as may lead to some permanent relief and remedy being applied.

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**Reports from Commissioners for the erection of New Buildings.**


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*Saint John, October 12, 1846.*

SIR,—We beg leave to submit, for His Excellency's information, copies of Tenders received by us for the erection of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum, and also the copy of a Contract which we have entered into with Mr. Otis Small for the completion of the same, agreeably to the specification annexed to it.

The amount of the Tenders was greater than we anticipated, but we presume that our known determination to have both the workmanship and the materials of the best description, may have somewhat helped to make it so.

We shall be prepared, before the meeting of the Legislature, to shew the cost of Insane Hospitals in the United States and Canada, in proportion to the accommodation to be afforded, when it will be seen that ours will bear a favorable comparison.

It must be borne in mind, that this is not a *pauper* Institution alone. It is one fit for the reception of all classes, and will afford the accommodation to each class which they have been accustomed to at home; and when it is known that no insane man recovers at home, and all experience has proved that it is the paying patients of an Institution that mainly support the pauper portion, the little increased outlay in the first instance for a suitable building should not be objected to.

SIR,—The Commissioners for the erection of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum have the honor to report for His Excellency's information, that they have expended the money intrusted to them towards that purpose, and in the plan of the building which they have adopted, and which received His Excellency's approval, they have endeavored to profit by the experience of all recent institutions in Great Britain and the United States, and so avoid a *great fault*, which, as Dr. Connolly, the highest authority of the present day, states, is generally committed in the original construction of Asylums, which subsequently entails many other faults. The Asylum is usually erected merely for the supposed actual number of Lunatics; and in consequence of the incurable patients not being discharged, the building becomes, in the course of ten years, crowded with double the number of patients first provided for. This evil is attempted to be remedied, first by means of the erection or extension of wings, to which, if the original plan has been well devised, there exists no objection; but afterwards by piling a third story wherever it can be raised, or by excavating rooms or wards under ground. These arrangements have every disadvantage; they make proper classification, either within doors or without, almost impossible, and by the accumulation of so many persons, day and night, in a lofty building, many of whom can seldom leave the wards, and none of whom are in perfect health, the Asylum becomes subject to every atmospheric and terrestrial influence unfavourable to life. If no epidemic outbreak alarms the Governors into an investigation and reform of buildings so arranged or ill placed, or otherwise unhealthy, the inmates are merely all brought to a low standard of health, to uneasiness, suffering, and a disposition to illness. There is always a risk of more active disease, and this may not only depopulate the Institution to a great extent, but spread pestilence around it. Lessons of this kind are learnt with unwillingness, because they are opposed to the strong avarice which governs mankind; and they are also soon forgotten. The terrible examples afforded us in 1832, when the malignant

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Cholera last visited us, are so unheeded, that when the malady comes again it will find almost every Asylum, public and private, equally unprepared with reasonable preservatives against it.

We could produce abundant testimony to the same point, but believing that the principle which is fully recognized every where else will be admitted here, that there is no such thing as a just and proper curative or ameliorating treatment of the Insane in cheaply constructed Institutions, which, as Dr. Bell observes, can be only dignified with the name of a better description of Alms House, where the most patients, or rather the most sufferers can be crowded together, and that, therefore, if we wish to do the greatest possible amount of good to the Insane, we must have recourse to the same expensive arrangements as are found indispensable in other countries.

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# PROVINCIAL PENITENTIARY.

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**Report of the Commissioners of the Provincial Penitentiary for the Year commencing 1st January and ending 31st December, 1846.**

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The Account submitted herewith shews a total expenditure for the year amounting to two thousand and eighty eight pounds, and of receipts two thousand three hundred and eighty six pounds sixteen shillings and one penny; of which, nine hundred and seventy three pounds eight shillings is proceeds sales of Bricks; one hundred and eighty three pounds fourteen shillings for Brushes, all convict labour; nineteen pounds ten shillings and two pence, miscellaneous; one hundred and ten pounds three shillings and eight pence, Soldiers' Diets; one thousand one hundred pounds by Warrants on Provincial Treasury; which added to balance, one hundred and twenty pounds three shillings and eight pence half penny, of last year's account, makes a total sum of two thousand five hundred and six pounds nineteen shillings and nine pence half penny, leaving a balance in the Commissioners hands of four hundred and eighteen pounds nineteen shillings and nine pence half penny, a considerable portion of which is expending in the purchase of wood required in the manufacture of Bricks the current year. The severe gales of wind in the Autumn laid prostrate the whole of the fences enclosing the grounds, which cannot be replaced till the Spring, when any wooden fence put up must be subject to like casualty, the frequent repairing and replacing which has been and must continue a heavy item of expense to the Institution, and can only be provided against by the erection of a permanent Stone and Brick Wall.

Much inconvenience and suffering to the prisoners is caused by the want of a suitable building as an Hospital, which the Commissioners have not funds to provide for the erection of, and unless provided for by Legislative grant, the sick prisoners must remain without that care in their treatment, necessary to restoration to health, and in frequent cases to the preservation of life, while the expenses of their support are in a two fold degree increased by the extra care required, and loss of the prisoners' services during their illness. On this subject the Commissioners refer to their preceding year's report, and to the three preceding years' reports, as respects a stone wall enclosure. The accompanying returns exhibit, of Males, one hundred and eight committed, and one hundred and fourteen discharged; Females, eighty one committed and seventy three discharged, during the year.

Thirty seven Males and fourteen Females are the remaining inmates on 31st December, 1846.

Notwithstanding the extra expenditure the past year for this service, and the late reduction in the rate of Light Dues on Tonnage, such has been the increased Trade and Commerce, that the collection of Light Dues at this Port alone, is more than sufficient to meet the whole expenditure for the support, repairs and improvements of all the establishments in the Bay of Fundy.

The extra outlay on the Partridge Island Station, for the repairs of the building, the new Lantern, repairing Lamps; &c., &c., will, we trust, render it efficient for many years;

years; the same may be said also of the Quaco Station, with the exception of the Lamps and Reflectors, which at that and several other Stations, require repair or renewing.

We have it in contemplation to make some alteration in the Light Houses at Machias Seal Islands, as stated in our Report of last year, next season, which is confirmed by the Report of the Honorable Captain Owen, who inspected the Station, and furnished us through our Secretary, with a very able and long Report, under date of the 16th May last, a copy of which is herewith forwarded, to complete which, and other improvements intended, will in all probability require an extra expenditure this year of a similar sum to that disbursed in 1846.

The Light House Stations were all visited the past season, as follows:—In June, Quaco and Cape Enrage Stations, by Messrs. Ward, Woodward and Hare, the former more particularly for inspection of the state of the foundation of the Light House, to arrange (if necessary) for the building of a Breakwater, which was done; and in the month of August, the said Station was again visited by Messrs. Ward and Woodward for inspection of the said work, which they found well and efficiently completed to their entire satisfaction, by the Contractors, Messrs. M'Lauchlin and Stackhouse: Point Lepreaux, Head Harbour, Saint Andrews, Machias Seal Islands, Gannet Rock, also Briar Island Stations, were visited and inspected by Mr. Woodward, in the month of September; those, with the former, and Partridge Island and the Beacon, the two last being constantly under the eye of the Commissioners here, were all in good order, for which the different Keepers deserve credit.

An arrangement has been made with the Gas Company in this City, to place a large Lantern with three Burners, at Reed's Point, to serve as a leading Light up the Harbor, the Light House Fund to pay for the additional consumption of Gas over what an ordinary Street Lamp burns, for which this Light also answers, and for which the City Corporation pay; this will be completed in a few days.

Our attention has been given to the necessity of having something more efficient than a Bell for a Fog Alarm; and in the month of April last, we sent to England a Bill of Exchange for twenty five pounds sterling, for the purchase of a metal Gong, as an experiment to be tried at the Partridge Island Station, it is expected out shortly, and if it should answer a good purpose, similar Alarms will be procured and placed at all the Stations to be worked by the Machine made by Mr. John Hutchinson last year. The Gong expected out, is said to produce, on being struck, a sharp, shrill sound that can be heard at a distance of more than four miles in a heavy breeze of wind, which if it prove correct, will be very important and a great improvement to the navigation of the Bay in foggy weather.

Public attention has lately been particularly called to the want in this Harbor of the Channel being buoyed out as a guide to vessels that may be compelled to run in during heavy weather, without a Pilot. An unfortunate case occurred a short time since, of the Ship "England," running in a gale of wind for the harbor without a Pilot, struck on the foul ground, and driving off the next flood tide, became a total wreck, with the loss of several lives. It may be fairly presumed that if the said reef or shoal had been marked, that the Ship would have been enabled to run into the harbor safely. For many years there was a buoy on the foul ground, and if carried away by any accident was usually replaced, till the last time it was removed, now some years ago, since which time it has not been again laid down.

**Report from Honorable W. F. W. Owen, Captain, R. N., on Machias Seal Island Light Houses.**

(Copy)

COLUMBIA, *Campo Bello*, 16th May, 1846.

SIR,—I request you will be pleased to acquaint the Commissioners of Light Houses for the Bay of Fundy, that in furtherance of my pledge to them to visit (in company with Captain Hare, of whom I have not since heard, being, as I believe, ill,) the Machias Seal Islands, and its two Light Houses, which I did in the Columbia, on the 7th instant, in order to enable me, with the assistance of Lieutenant Shortland, to offer opinions on a feasible mode of rendering those Light Houses more useful. We sounded round them for one entire day, and surveyed the space immediately round them; I forward a sketch of our work.

1st. The Light House Lanterns have eight parabolic Reflectors of twenty three inches diameter, set in a circle of sixteen feet circumference, with one large Argand Lamp to each; and each Lamp having a pipe of communication with a common reservoir in the centre, in which the oil is kept fluid in winter by an Argand Lamp burning under the reservoir; the Lantern is only seven feet in diameter, so that the Light House Keeper has really no room for the necessary operations of feeding and cleansing, and the glass of the outer frame is so near the Lamps as to be constantly misted. The loftiest light is now about forty seven feet above high water, which rises here from eighteen to ten feet; the upper, or western light, is said to be six feet lower, or forty feet above high water.

The southern Murr Ledges, for which these Lights in one E. S. E. and W. N. W., are the clearing mark, are about twelve miles off, so that the Lights at present are scarcely high enough to serve well for such a mark.

We are of opinion that the base of the Lanterns should be raised six feet, which the present structure seems equal to bear, leaving a base for a Lantern of ten feet diameter, and a gallery outside of the same, one foot lower, well supported to the building by solid knees of wood, and with an outer strong iron rail, and the glazed portion of the outer frame need only be glazed about three feet in height.

I am of opinion, that the present mode of lighting these Houses is capable of great improvement, and recommend a suit of consistent experiments for that purpose. My opinion is founded on the fact, that there never can by this arrangement be more than one Reflector whose plane of diameter is perpendicular to the line of vision, in any direction, and when the line of vision is oblique to those planes of the outer rims of the Reflectors, much light is necessarily lost, so that, in fact, more than the light of one Lamp is never seen at the same time.

I am of opinion, therefore, that one good and sufficient compound Argand Lamp, with three or four concentric wicks, but a sufficient distance each wick from the other nearest to it, to admit of as much air as will be consumed, with a proper globe and chimney to consume its own smoke, and no Reflectors at all, will be found not so expensive, and more serviceable.

The form of the glass globe and chimney must be determined by experience, and whether the globe shall be a lens or not in every direction.

We found two species of glass chimneys in use at Machias Seal Islands. The Keeper declares, on his experience, that numbered one, of the largest dimensions, to be very much preferable, for when the chimnies are long they consume their own smoke, which the straight glass, number two, do not, nor do the smaller size globe chimneys number one. Of the compound Argand it may also be solarized, but the solar cap should not be of metal or glass, but earthenware, because of the intense heat, to avoid which an expedient is used in France, and at the Breakwater of Plymouth Sound. I understand that there four Lamps are set close together, because the more the Lights are concentrated the stronger the light, and if the four Lamps were concentrated into one, (of four concentric wicks,) the light and heat would become sixteen times as strong as from one Lamp only. The four Lamps at Plymouth are covered by a common globe and chimney of sufficient length, (and it cannot well be too long,) the inner two Lights are red; the outer two, white Lights; and when outside the Breakwater, the Lights seen are white only; when inside of the Breakwater the Lights are red; and both red and white Lights are seen when in the line of direction of the

Breakwater. The common globe cover to these four appears to have four lenses adjusted to the focus of their corresponding Lights, and the outer frame of the Lantern is glazed with large plate glass, and about five feet from the Lamps.

Most assuredly, I would recommend the numerous Lamps now used to be substituted by one, two, three, or four Lamps at most, and to get rid of the metal Reflectors altogether; and the Machias Islands having two Light Houses, offers the means of comparative efficiency; or the experiments may easily be made at the Beacon Light House of Saint John.

I would propose a Letter to Trinity Board, in London, or their Secretary, requesting they will please to send you a description of the Eddystone Lights, those on the Breakwater, the Lizard two Lights, Saint Anne's, of Scilly, revolving, and of that near Brighton or Beachy Head, proposing to pay the expense, &c. &c. &c.

2d. Having thus presumed to offer some notions on Lights, I would also add a few words on Fog Signals. At Machias Islands the Keeper has one old iron 12lb carronade, bedded in its carriage in the earth, without a platform or lock, and in short, with no special preparation for its proper use. If such ordnance be insisted on, I would recommend two guns at this station, with a platform, and proper hut built over it, and so that one at least may be fired in any direction.

It also seems to me incumbent on the Commissioners to arrange such a system of Fog Signals as may always indicate the station, making a signal by firing a single gun or two, on the principle, that no Ship's time can easily be in error half an hour: thus, if Machias, Seal Islands, in thick or foggy weather, were to fire one gun every four hours, always in thick weather, and Ships or Vessels not visible from the station at one mile or two, at precisely noon, four, eight, midnight, and four and eight, A. M., and Gannet Rock Light House one gun every four hours, at 2h. 6h. 10h. P. M. and at 2h. 6h. 10h. A. M. If a gun be heard in thick weather from these Stations, respectively, the time itself would inform a Ship clearly which Station fired the gun. Brier's Island in like manner might fire at 1h. 5h. 9h. P. M., and at 1h. 5h. 9h. A. M.; and Head Harbour Light House at 3h. 7h. 11h. P. M. and 3h. 7h. 11h. A. M. In like manner Lepreaux might fire every three hours, at 12½h. 3½h. 6½h. and 9½h.; Digby at 1h. 30m. 4h. 30m. 7h. 30m. 10h. 30m., and Partridge Island at 2½h. 5½h. 8½h. and 11½h., and Quaco and Enrage every two hours, &c. &c. &c.

This mode I but suggest for the consideration of the Commissioners to adopt some such on one consistent system; but it is sometimes desirable that two or more guns should be fired nearly at the same time, for which precise and public instruction and arrangements would be necessary. But whatever mode or system may be decided on, it will be right to train the Light House Keepers the use and due care of such, artillery, and to keep the ammunition prepared in proper cartridges, and always ready for use.

Fog Bells may sometimes be used with advantage, but the Bells used for this purpose ought to be of the largest dimensions, and not so diminutive as not to be heard at a reasonable distance, as that at Partridge Island seems to be, and signals by Bells may be arranged systematically to any extent, which I hold myself ready to do, when required by authority, and as a means of further utility, the combination of sky rockets, and false fires, or blue lights, may be used with advantage provided the arrangement be published.

I would also suggest to the Commissioners the propriety of some simple experiments in Acoustics, to improve a system of useful Fog Signals from our respective Light Houses, or Stations, and one such as follows:—A horse pistol, a bore one inch in diameter, more or less, as convenient, and of very convenient length, fitted to a trumpet with such a length of continued barrel as appropriate, reaching precisely to the focus of a parabolic bell mouth, elaborated into a parabolic reflector, which finishing as a bell (of the said trumpet,) three or more feet wide and of a parabolic form, the focus being the outer end of the trumpet barrel, into the inner end of which the pistol barrel should screw; it is imagined that less than an ounce of powder fired from such a pistol, might produce a sound as intense as from a large piece of artillery, if so, an arrangement of such means would be much better, and very much cheaper than by any bell.

I but suggest these subjects, being persuaded that some well arranged system of experiments is incumbent on us in particular, as Commissioners of Light Houses.

Of the Oils used, being Sperm Oil, Seal Oil, and Porpoise Oil, the two former kinds congeal at certain temperatures and require an arrangement to keep them fluid; that described herein, by a common reservoir, heated by an Argand lamp, seems practically inconvenient, and the modern valuable discovery by our late fellow Commissioner, (Mr. Campbell, of Saint Andrews,) that Porpoise Oil (unadulterated) never does congeal, even with intense frost, which is unequivocally asserted also by Mr. Conly, the Light House Keeper at Machias Islands, and some Porpoise Oil in his possession was certainly as purely fluid as water, when the oil in use, which the Keeper called American Oil, was like soft tallow, the thermometer being about 50°.

By due care and providence it is presumed that a sufficient quantity of Porpoise Oil might be obtained for this use, (although from the limited demand, the Indians, who now exclusively hunt the Porpoise, allured by the higher price, seldom now supply an unadulterated article,) at least during the winter months.

3rd. We were much surprised, on enquiry into the appointments for the very arduous and important duties for the care and management of these two Light Houses, being, as we understood, then nearly as follows:—

with no Assistant, and very frequent demands, when much property is at stake, for a Pilot, and the Keeper is a Branch Pilot, and is thus precluded from rendering good service to commerce and to his own interest, because the Light Houses cannot be left without a guardian, and if he should fall sick, or an accident occur, serious and very great evils might occur, without any remedy available within time to prevent their occurrence, by the attention duly to be expected from such an advanced post, or to keep the lights and the fog signals duly attended.

4th. This appointment is discreditable to the Province; the United States are not so unreasonable. A year ago I visited Mount Desert Rock, a station with one Light House only, the station itself not differing from Machias Islands by any disadvantages.

The Keeper's salary was \$650 a year, with an allowance for an assistant, and for fuel, &c., and I do not remember that he had a gun to attend to, and he stated that he made \$1000 more by the fish he caught and dried, an advantage which Mr. Conly has not.

This comparison, I conceive, is very discreditable to our Province, and I urge, with all the influence my opinions are worth, a strong appeal to the House of Assembly (as is just) not to interfere with the duties of the Commissioners in the particular of Keepers' Salaries, or other minor arrangements, unless when we may be forced to ask some additional supplies, or when we may be charged with improper conduct or neglect, and remembering that I once did advocate in that House an Assistant for the Gannet Rock Light House, which was granted; I have no hesitations in offering my opinion, that Machias Islands have twice the need of an Assistant, and I aver that the duties at this latter could not have been adequately performed, but that Mrs. Conly has most ably and efficiently assisted her husband, besides the necessary care of her numerous family, and for which she certainly is entitled to some consideration in acknowledgment. I therefore beg leave to suggest, that the establishment we shall recommend for Machias Islands, be as follows:—

and that a certain quantity of provisions be stored there, as now, under the Keeper's charge, and also a Life Boat, and a moderate allowance for additional Assistant or Apprentice to serve as crew of Life Boat, in need; the public ought to expect this from us, and I cannot but suggest to the other Commissioners, that the present

Keeper's

Keeper's wife be paid, as a reward for past services for three or four years, £10 for each year, with our thanks.

5th. We found the Light House very clean and in excellent order, and my visit was without previous notice and quite unexpected, therefore the Keeper had made no particular preparation for it.

The largest Island has no soil, but is covered with a boggy peat quite unproductive; means might be found much to increase the comforts and advantages of the Keeper by a gradual importation of earth or soil, at all times of communication, in quantities however small; and as at this station it is desirable to keep up the means of offering an asylum to wrecked persons, in severe weather, I was surprised to find the only dwelling house so ill fitted for any such emergency, or even for the rational comfort, (in winter particularly,) even of the Keeper's own family.

There is required to make his present establishment but commonly comfortable, decent and effective, besides the previous suggestions, one thousand feet of two inch plank, one thousand feet of one inch board, and a proper proportion of nails, spikes and board nails, as the house in great part requires to be limed and plastered, and requires an external platform, 6 casks of lime and sand, with proper brushes and materials, or tools.

The Station requires a light handy boat of 20 feet long, and five feet and a half greatest beam, or left to the Keeper to provide by contract, to his own dimensions. He should be supplied with a common clock, and a common dial, (and all the Light-houses should have a common dial attached to them as well as a clock.) he requires five buckets, four signal lanterns, and two or three good tackles, which last the Keeper should be directed to provide on his own responsibility, and he has pointed out the propriety of being supplied with one hundred weight of birch bark, to be made up in convenient torches for cases of distress, as well as for landing or embarkation in the night. For want of all these, much serious inconvenience commonly occurs, and in some cases their want may prove disastrous. I therefore urgently beg these necessities may be supplied to Machias Light Houses, to render this (the most important Light House Station in our charge,) fit for all purposes that may be required of it.

I took on myself, on behalf of the Commissioners, to give the Keeper the instruction for fog guns, on the principals explained, which, if they are pleased to approve, they will confirm, and (I hope) extend the system to other Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.

## SAINT JOHN HARBOUR.

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**Report from the Honorable W. F. W. Owen, relative to the improvement of Saint John Harbour.**

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H. M. S. COLUMBIA,  
*Campo Bello, 27th January, 1847.*

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of both the Letters and their enclosures from the Honorable Secretary, relative to the Port of Saint John, and the melancholy loss of the Ship England, and the improvement of Saint John's Harbour.

I have always been in habits of free communication through the person of the Mayor of Saint John, and but recently, tendered to him our original Survey of the Port and environs, on a scale of five hundred feet to one inch, for transcription, for the use of his Office, or that of the Commissioners of Light Houses, and of which Your Excellency is in possession of one copy on half that scale; on which last named scale, (viz. 1000 feet to one inch,) the Admiralty have published a plan available by any body; and moreover I have always proffered the fullest information we possessed but of which not one syllable has ever been required by the Mayor, Corporation or any other.

The navigation of the entrance of the Port of Saint John, might easily be rendered reasonably safe and commodious, even for strangers, at all times, by properly marking distinctly and conspicuously the points of danger, of which I do not know of more than three requiring it at this time, viz:—The southern extreme of the foul grounds, which I think ought to be marked by a Beacon; 2d. The north eastern extremity of the ledge extending north eastward of Partridge Island; and 3rd. The America Rock; the two latter requiring only a conspicuous Buoy on each. But the Corporation of the City of Saint John, being by Charter the conservators of the Port, all others are interdicted from interference with those duties. Nevertheless, the interests of the Province do seem to me to demand, not only for the Port of Saint John, but also for all the navigable waters of New Brunswick, that a system of supervision and scientific information should be established, so as to enable the Government to recommend, and the Legislature to adopt such information and measures for their improvement, as the interests of the whole Province, or of specific localities, may require.

And for this purpose, I do most respectfully but earnestly recommend to Your Excellency, the establishment by Legislative enactment, of a "Nautical Commission for all the coasts and navigable waters of New Brunswick," for improving navigation and preservation of public privileges, the fisheries and commercial facilities, and for the improvement (by supervision) of the condition, education, protection and rational encouragement of all classes of seafaring persons of this Province.

Presuming such a Nautical Commission established, the Government and Legislature need no longer be ignorant of any of the localities or circumstances which affect commercial interests.

Such a Nautical Commission being entirely subject to Government, and under its directions and controul, should, I conceive, in the very first instance, be charged with a full, critical and scientific examination of, and to report fully as may be required, or periodically, to the Governor, on the present state, condition, &c., and with a complete description of the present and prospective limits of the Port and City of Saint John, with such suggestions for improving them, as to them may seem proper, and to report specifically on the deterioration and changes which the Harbour may now be subject, and to propose plans and methods for its conservation and improvement; to report by what species of tenure and by whom the property adjoining the shores are now held;

held ; what persons are now specifically charged with the conservation of the Port, and responsible for it ; and what funds are now or may be made available for that purpose, &c. &c.

It is my present opinion that a conspicuous Beacon should, as soon as convenient, be erected on the southern extremity of the ledge of the foul ground, extending southward from the Breakwater towards Partridge Island, also a Buoy should be placed on the north eastern extremity of the ledge or reef which extends north eastward from Partridge Island, and another Buoy to mark the situation of the America Rock, which is small but dangerous ; these are the only points which suggest themselves to me for immediate attention.

I beg leave to offer a few additional observations on the "Nautical Commission," which I have ventured to recommend, viz :—That it should be charged with the superintendence and conservation of all that relates to external navigation ; of all public or special privileges on the coast waters, including the fisheries, and all commercial facilities, &c. &c.

This Commission to be a permanent or standing Commission, in continuous operation, under the immediate direction of the Governor in Council, and to embrace all the purposes of that similar Commission in England lately emanating from that on the Tidal Harbours, to acquire a complete and critical knowledge of the Rivers, Ports, Harbours, &c., on the whole coast, &c. &c.

The Commissioners should be paid regular salaries, as their labor will be unremitting and important.

The duties should embrace all those now required from the Commissioners of Light Houses and of Buoys and Beacons, and may be provided for from the funds now appropriated for those purposes, and may be established and authorized by amending the Acts by which those Commissioners are now constituted.

The Commissioners of Light Houses and those for Buoys and Beacons, would thus be liberated, by Legislative enactment, from all further charge or responsibility by "the Nautical Commission," which, (I think,) should consist of a President and three others, being all nautical men of experience and science, and also one Secretary.

If Your Excellency should require from me any further information or suggestion on these very important subjects, I shall be proud to receive your commands, and

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.

*Fredericton, Legislative Council Chamber, 2nd March, 1847.*

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Your Excellency's commands, through the Honorable Colonial Secretary, to offer professional opinions on the subject of a Petition from the Mayor, &c. &c. of Saint John, relative to that Port, of which Port I was under the impression that the said Corporation was the Conservator by Charter, and that it levied a considerable annual sum from the commerce of that Port, for the express purpose and to the due performance of which, I did conceive the Corporation was bound by their Charter ; under this impression I should have felt it to be my duty to resist any such grant. But the interests of commerce and the immediate safety of navigation involving points of such serious importance in life and property, as well as the commercial reputation and integrity of this most important spot in the Province, demand much caution in delaying for a single hour arrangements absolutely required for the immediate security of lives and property as aforesaid ; and yet with nothing to guide us but this Petition, so very obscurely worded as to convey no precise information either of the present state of the Port of Saint John or of the precise nature and description of the work required to render its approach, exit or shelter commodious or safe ; it is to be apprehended that any sum placed at the disposition of an irresponsible and needy body, without specific arrangement and security for its due and proper application, would be unwise, and that the ostensible purpose might be defeated by the misapplication of the funds.

Referring

Referring to my letter of the 27th January last, I find that I pointed out distinctly such Beacons and Buoys as there appeared to me to be immediately required, and that under the seeming deficiency of well arranged superintendence and care of the Port of Saint John in particular, I took leave to suggest the propriety (nay, as I think, the necessity) of a Nautical Commission, under Legislative authority, for purposes therein superficially explained, whose first duty should be to examine and report upon the present state and condition of the Port of Saint John, and to propose prospective places for its conservation and commodiousness, &c. &c.

I am decidedly of opinion that no time should be lost in erecting a Beacon on the extremity of the foul ground, and in laying down the Buoys therein mentioned, and that £500 will or may be required for that purpose, and this sum should be loaned to the Corporation, but to be administered by the Executive, who would appoint a Commissioner for its expenditure, according to some well approved plan, &c.; this Commissioner for "specific service" being distinct from the Nautical Commissioners alluded to in my letter of 27th January, which perhaps may not then be organized.

On the subject of the extension of the Breakwater from Sand Point, I do not feel myself, at this distance, competent to offer any specific opinion, but its importance and propriety is not so urgent for immediate attention, and therefore no evil will arise from withholding any grant for this purpose just now, and indeed altogether without further information.

The Legislative Council have, on motion from myself, resolved to address Your Excellency to cause some specific Returns of amount of Port Dues, and how they are expended, to be obtained from the Corporation of Saint John, for the said Port Dues being generally levied for the conservations of the Port, on which head it does not appear that the Corporation has made any appropriation whatever; and I know not whether there be any Commissioners of Buoys and Beacons at Saint John, but on whomsoever the duties required for constant attention to Buoys and Beacons may devolve, regular periodical Returns of their state and condition should be required from them.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

On the 2d instant, I had the honor to receive a communication from Mr. Secretary Saunders, informing me that Your Excellency had appointed Messrs. Nehemiah Gilman and Nelson Cliff, Commissioners to expend £750 towards opening a Channel through Bear Island Bar, and erecting a Wing Dam, and also for improving Chapel Bar, and instructing me personally to inspect the localities, and with the assistance of a competent Civil Engineer, to execute a working plan of the projected improvements for the guidance of the Commissioners, &c. In obedience to Your Excellency's commands, I procured the services of Mr. Wills, and proceeded, accompanied by that gentleman and the Commissioners, to make a careful inspection of the two impediments in the navigation of the River pointed out in Your Excellency's Instructions, and have the honor to report that at Bear Island Bar, there are at present three channels for the water; one between Bear Island and the left bank of the River, the centre channel, and the channel along the right bank. The bed of the River in the channel on the left bank is at least fifteen inches higher than in the centre channel, and must therefore be condemned. The channel on the right bank is out of the natural course of the stream, and is not therefore eligible. I have therefore made choice of the centre channel, contrary to the opinion expressed by Messrs. Ellison and Ray, in 1838. This channel and that along the right bank are divided for some distance by a Bar, through which, however, about five years ago, and subsequent to the Report above alluded to, the water forced a passage at the foot of Hog or Middle Island, about one hundred feet wide and three feet deep, running in a southerly direction towards the right bank. The effect of this passage is to drain the water from the centre channel where at present it is little more than fifteen inches deep, and by carrying a portion of it into the channel along the right bank to spread the water over so large a surface as to render the River unnavigable.

To remedy this evil, I propose to deepen the centre channel, colored blue on the accompanying plan, and to erect a Dam from the foot of Middle Island, two hundred feet long and varying from forty to twenty feet wide, and from five to two feet high, thus cutting off the flow of the water towards the right bank, and throwing it into the centre channel, by which means I am of opinion, a depth of about thirty inches of water may be obtained. By reference to the Report of Messrs. Ellison and Ray, it appears that experiments have upon former occasions been made on the channel, on the left as well as on the right bank, but without success, as there are at present but little appearance of any work ever having been performed. The reason appears to me obvious, neither of these channels are in the direct line of the flow of the stream, the consequence is, that the loose gravel of which the bed of the River is for some depth composed, is forced by the current into such dug ways.

Although I am of opinion that the measures I here propose to adopt will be of essential service in deepening the water in the centre channel, yet I conceive that these improvements should at a future day be followed up by other and greater works, and I beg to recommend that money sufficient to erect two other Dams of a height not exceeding four feet, should be granted. The one to connect Bear Island with the left bank of the River, the other to connect Long Island and Middle Island.

Chapel Bar is formed much in the same manner as Bear Island Bar, viz. by the water having too large a space over which it is spread to afford a sufficient depth in any one channel. I therefore propose at present to open a channel in as direct a line as the natural course of the River points out, which from the quality of the soil forming the Bar will render it of easy accomplishment; but at a future day I should propose the erection of a low Dam to connect Savage Island with Hart's Island.

The effect of all these Dams, if erected, will be to force the water into a narrower channel, while there is a sufficient volume of fluid to deepen by its own action the bed of the River.

This indeed is the principle upon which all the operations for improving the navigation of the River, must, for some years to come, be conducted, unless a vast outlay of money be contemplated. Several Dams in other situations should also in the course of a few years, I conceive, be erected.

Your Excellency's instructions having however limited my inspection of the two localities already treated of, I did not extend my observations to any other impediments to the navigation of the River by Steam Boats during the summer months, but I have no doubt from the observations already made, and my previous acquaintance with the River, that the sum of twelve thousand pounds would go far towards accomplishing this most desirable object, payable at the rate of two thousand pounds a year.

With a previous knowledge of and arrangement for the works to be erected during the summer months, the money thus to be appropriated could be economised and rendered of much greater service than a large sum placed at the command of an Engineer who would be obliged to make all his survey and arrangements subservient to immediate and inconvenient expenditure of the money. Notwithstanding with the present disadvantage of having to procure materials at a heavy cost, I am nevertheless of opinion that much good may be effected, and therefore beg to recommend that the warrant issue immediately.

In elucidation of this Report, I have the honor to attach sketches showing the several proposed works.

I also transmit for Your Excellency's inspection and approval, a working plan which has been prepared in reference to the present operations.

*Specification of Works required to be done in erecting a Dam at the lower end of Bear Island, in the River Saint John, New Brunswick, according to a Plan prepared for the purpose by Frank Wills.*

All the piles, sleepers, transoms, and other large timber used in the Dam, are to be of good sound Hemlock or Hacmatack; the planking is to be of Spruce, 3 or 4 inches in thickness. The piles are to be not less than 12 inches in diameter, and are to be placed 10 feet from centre to centre, along the outside edge of Dam, as shewn in the drawing; they are to be driven to a depth of 6 feet below the bed of the River. Immediately behind the piles, and bedded in the gravel, a sleeper, 12 inches diameter, is to be fixed, and secured to the piles by larch pins or strong iron bolts. Transoms 4 feet apart, and not less than 12 inches diameter, are to be laid on the present gravel bed of River, and securely fastened to the sleepers, and an apron on the south side to extend 10 feet. The superstructure is to be framed according to the drawing, properly notched and bolted together, and the transoms or cross pieces to be laid close together, so as to hold the ballast or loading on each floor, and splayed to receive the planking, which planking is to be fastened to the framing with iron spikes 8 inches in length.

The interstices are to be filled with gravel ballast taken from the adjoining shoals; it is to be well rammed between each timber. The lower edge of planking is to be protected by a layer of bushes and gravel, and is to be sloped as shewn on the drawing.

N. B.—Where the Dam crosses the channel at the foot of the Island, the same principle of construction is to be carried out, the piles being driven 6 feet below its bed, and the timbers above arranged similar to those over the shoal generally, and well secured to the Islands by brush, gravel and planks, driven when required.

Nehemiah Gilman, one of the Commissioners appointed to expend the sum of £175 towards improving Chapel Bar, and £575 towards opening a Channel through Bear Island Bar, and erecting a Wing Dam—

Begs to Report that the Commissioners have commenced operations in opening the Channel at Chapel Bar and at Bear Island Bar, and have made very satisfactory progress, particularly at Bear Island Bar, so much so that a sufficient depth of water is now obtained for the free passage of Boats. But as the season is now so far advanced, and with the prospect of heavy fall rains, he feels very reluctant to commence operations at the contemplated Wing Dam this Fall; and particularly as the difficulty of obtaining the materials necessary to the completion of the works, could be procured only at much greater expense than if delayed for another season.

He would therefore humbly submit the expediency of delaying the erection of the Wing Dam until next season, and in the meantime the Commissioners could proceed to enter into contracts for the delivery of such materials as would be required for the works.

*Report of Messieurs Nehemiah Gilman and Nelson Cliff, Commissioners to expend £175 in deepening the Channel of the River Saint John at Chapel Bar.*

We have the honor to report, that in conformity with our instructions, we proceeded to the spot with the Surveyor General and Mr. Wills, Civil Engineer, and arranged upon our mode of proceeding, conformably to the plan proposed by them. It being of a nature that could not be explicitly contracted for, and every dispatch being required to take advantage of the low state of the water in the River, we proceeded to employ as many men and teams as could work to advantage, by which means we completed the job within seventeen days of its commencement. We dug a channel of — rods in length and four in breadth, with two feet depth of water where there had been but four inches when we began, and by fixing particular in conforming to the freshet course of the current, we feel convinced that the work will be permanently beneficial to the navigation of the River.

*Report of Messieurs Nehemiah Gilman and Nelson Cliff, Commissioners to expend £575 in opening a Channel through Bear Island Bar, and erecting a Wing Dam.*

We have the honor to report, that on receiving our appointment, we in conformity therewith proceeded with the Surveyor General and Mr. Wills, Civil Engineer, to the spot, made a thorough inspection of the ground, and decided upon the mode of proceeding. In order to take advantage of the low state of the River, we at once put as many hands and teams in deepening the Channel as could be employed to advantage, and one, and at times both of us, continued on the spot working with the men and directing their operations during the whole time the work was being performed, viz. from the 5th to the 19th September, 1846; during which time we opened a channel across the Bar sixty rods in length and four rods in breadth, with a uniform depth of two feet of water where there was only from six to eight inches when we commenced; and we also worked about forty rods above the Bar, in deepening the channel and straightening in a direction to conform the usual set of the current in freshet time, conforming to the suggestions of the Surveyor General; and the result was, that when  
the

the work was finished, the largest boats, deeply laden, passed through with the greatest facility, and had water to spare, and this at a time when the River was lower than had been known for many years previous.

We considered it not prudent to proceed with the Dam the present year, owing to the probability of the River's rising, and destroying the work before we should have finished it, it being then late in the season, and from the much greater expense that would have attended the getting out the materials in Summer, all which we had the honor to report to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in September last, and we were in consequence, instructed to postpone that part of the work until next season, taking in the meantime all necessary Contracts at the proper periods, in order that the work might be done on the most advantageous terms; all which we will strictly attend to, and report our proceedings in full so soon as the Dam shall have been completed.

We have drawn from the Treasury, and expended, £436 13 3½, as per detailed Account and Vouchers herewith furnished to the Auditor General. £138 6 8½ of the Warrant remains at this time unexpended, which we propose to appropriate in satisfying Contracts for materials as they become due; and we beg to state it as our opinion, founded upon the data with which we have been furnished, and the calculations we have made, that it will require a further sum of four hundred pounds to finish the Dam.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. Saunders' letter of 28th ultimo, transmitting to me by Your Excellency's direction, the Reports of the Commissioners for removing obstructions in the River Saint John, and requesting my observations thereon.

In obedience to Your Excellency's commands I have only to observe that these Reports have fully confirmed the opinion I expressed to Your Excellency on a former occasion, when I made a personal inspection of the impediments to the navigation of the River.

That these impediments are capable of being removed I have no doubt, but the work could be done at much less cost and to much greater advantage if a certain sum were placed at Your Excellency's command, in order that attention should be paid to the seasons, and such work done in the different periods of the year, as the state of the River would permit.

In my former Report to Your Excellency, I recommended that certain Dams should be erected so as to guide the stream into the right channel when the water should be of a proper depth.

These Dams, I am of opinion, could be formed in the winter season at less than half the cost that they could at any other time, and I believe that they would be found fully sufficient, if formed of rubble stone, which could be piled up in heaps on the different farms in the neighbourhood in the summer, and hauled into the ice in the winter and deposited in the desired direction, when the ice could be cut and the stones would by their own gravity form the angle of repose, thus forming a Dam which could year after year be raised until the desired object could be attained and the River rendered navigable for Steamboats to the Grand Falls.

It forms, I imagine, no part of my duty to address Your Excellency on this subject, and I only do so in obedience to your commands and the anxious desire I feel to see the Province advance in prosperity by internal improvements carried on by a judicious expenditure of the public money.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

With the Annual Returns from this Office for the year 1846, I beg most respectfully to submit the following Report:—

The whole number of Immigrants to New Brunswick during the year 1846, is nine thousand seven hundred and sixty five; of these, nine thousand landed at the Port of Saint John, and the remainder at Saint Andrews, Richibucto, and Miramichi. Of the whole number, about four thousand five hundred re-emigrated to the United States very soon after their arrival.

Although it was necessary to land all the Passengers from several Vessels, in consequence of Fever prevailing on board, yet I have great satisfaction in stating that the number of deaths is unusually small, only thirty four having occurred during the voyages and in quarantine; of these, the greater number occurred on the voyage, and I feel that it would be injustice to Dr. Harding, the visiting Physician at Partridge Island, if I omitted to notice the very great care bestowed by him upon sick Emigrants, and the unwearied pains and attention he has bestowed on all who have fallen under his charge.

During the past season, no less than thirteen prosecutions were instituted against Masters of Passenger Ships for violations of the Passengers' Act, and convictions were obtained in every instance. As each case has already been fully reported, it is only necessary to notice them at present, with the hope that these prosecutions may have the beneficial effect of preventing violations of the law hereafter, and tend to secure better treatment for Passengers during the voyage.

The Emigrants who remained in Saint John have had employment during the whole season at very fair wages. In consequence, but few proceeded to the rural districts, where laborers have been much wanted. As the farmers cannot afford to pay the higher rates which may be obtained in the City, they have in many instances been obliged to limit their farming operations from the high price of labor.

There is every reason to believe that there will be employment for a very considerable number of farm laborers in this Province during the coming season, and also for female domestic servants, at moderate wages; say from ten pounds to fifteen pounds sterling per annum for the laborers, and from five pounds to seven pounds ten shillings sterling per annum for the females, with board and lodging in each case.

The settlement of this Province is advancing very slowly; and until a system of internal improvement on a large scale is adopted and carried out, it must continue to languish. The want of Roads and Bridges is the great drawback to settlement, and settlers have hardships and privations enough to encounter, without being subjected to the want of the means of communication.

It is greatly to be regretted that the system of selling land on credit, the amount payable in road work, has not been adopted in this Province. In the present position of New Brunswick, this is the only mode by which its settlement will make any considerable advance. The opposition to this system must arise from the want of information as to the true state of the country; and if the opponents of the measure would visit and examine the interior of the Province, and the back-woods settlements, the error of their views would be so apparent, that no further argument on the subject would be necessary.

The system of selling land at present in operation in New Brunswick, and the application of the proceeds of the sales, are such as to retard settlement very greatly, and to repel from our shores annually thousands of British subjects, who would willingly cast their lot among us, and retain their allegiance to their sovereign. As it is, these people are driven away—settlement scarcely advances—and the enormous quantity of inaccessible wilderness land, as compared with the amount under cultivation, bears heavily upon the Province, chills the energy of its inhabitants, and prevents them from reaping the full fruits of their industry.

I have already had the honor of stating to Your Excellency, that a very large number of Emigrants may be expected to arrive in this Province next season. It would be desirable to retain a portion of these in the colony, for the benefit of the agricultural interest. The most effectual means of doing so, would be to offer such facilities, for their eventually becoming settlers, as would induce them to remain in the Province. If some measure of this kind is not adopted, the better class of Emigrants, as heretofore, will merely pass through New Brunswick to a foreign land, and the poorest and most destitute will remain to burthen the country.

As connected with this part of the subject, I beg once more to draw Your Excellency's attention to the disposal of the tax levied on Emigrants, and the absolute necessity of causing this fund to be disbursed for the purposes contemplated by the Act which imposes the tax.

It only remains for me to mention, that although upwards of two thousand pounds has been collected from Emigrants the past year, no funds have been placed at my disposal; and the necessary outlay and expenses of this office have as usual, been defrayed by myself.

SIR,—I have the honor to enclose the Return of Contingent Expenses of this Office for the half year ended 1st January instant, amounting to £18 19 3, with certain vouchers for this and preceding Returns.

The various sums disbursed by me for these expenses since 1st July, 1843, and for assisting Emigrants to proceed to their destinations in this Province, now amount to £137 4 3, as noted in the margin.\*

The whole number of Emigrants in 1844, was 2605; in 1845 the number increased to 6133 souls; and in 1846 amounted to 9657 souls. Notwithstanding this great increase of Emigration, it will be observed that the expenses have not increased in the like proportion.

I need scarcely repeat what I have before had the honor of stating, that the reimbursement of these expenses is essential to the continuance of this Office and the efficient performance of its duties.

**Buildings on Partridge Island.**

*Government Emigration Office,  
Saint John, 12th February, 1847.*

SIR,—I have the honor to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that the two buildings on Partridge Island, used for the reception of Emigrants, are becoming much dilapidated, and require to be put in a state of repair before the arrival of Emigrants the present year. These buildings were erected by the Board of Health for the City and County of Saint John several years since, and when that Board ceased to exist in 1841, the Common Council of the City took possession of them; since that time they have received no repairs whatever.

Both the buildings will only accommodate one hundred fever cases; they were fully filled several times last season, and no room was left for those who were landed to undergo purification. The visiting Physician is compelled to reside, with his boatmen, in one of the Hospitals, which is highly objectionable.

I beg to suggest an immediate survey of the buildings in question, in order that an estimate may be made of the necessary repairs. A light Summer building, (or more than one if the emigration continues to increase,) will be absolutely requisite this season for those who land in good health, but need cleansing, as also a wash house with boilers. The necessary washing was performed out of doors last season, on the sea beach or under the cliffs, at much disadvantage.

The buildings, as well as the management of the Emigrants generally, ought to be under the control of a "Board of Emigration;" the necessary supplies could then be contracted for, and much expense saved to the shipowner and the public.

**Prosecutions at Saint John under Passengers' Act.**

Return, shewing the number of Prosecutions instituted at Saint John during the past year, under the direction of the Emigrant Agent, against Masters of Vessels, for breaches of the Passengers' Act, specifying the names of the Vessels, and of the Masters against whom such Prosecutions was brought,—the several Fines imposed, and recovered,—and the names of the Magistrates before whom such Prosecutions were heard and determined.

*The QUEEN vs. Richard Lang, Master of the Barque Margaret Thompson, from Donegal.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Henry Porter, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, that the Vessel was not supplied with any bread or biscuit for the voyage; that the flour issued to the Passengers was neither good or wholesome; and that provisions were not issued twice a week during the voyage, in violation of the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of twenty pounds, sterling, and costs. Penalty and costs paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. Matthew Flinn, Master of the Baque Recovery, from Sligo.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Robert Payne, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for not having supplied the Passengers with any bread or biscuit on the voyage, contrary to the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. Thomas Ellwood, Master of the Brig Ann Wise, from Sligo.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Robert Payne, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for not having a supply of bread or biscuit on board for Passengers' use. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. James Cooper, Master of the Barque Renewal, from Beerhaven.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Robert Payne, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for not supplying the Passengers with the proper quantity or quality of provisions during the voyage. Defendant convicted in the penalty of ten pounds, sterling, and costs; which sums were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. William Weightman, Master of the Brig Alexander, from Londonderry.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Robert Payne, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for irregular and insufficient issues of provisions and water to the Passengers during the voyage. Defendant convicted in the penalty of ten pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. Lawrence Moore, Master of the Barque Recovery, from Galway.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Robert Payne, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for having on board a greater number of Passengers than permitted by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. Richard Power, Master of the Brig Racer, from Tralee.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for having on board a greater number of Passengers than is permitted by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates:

*The QUEEN vs. James Cooper, Master of the Barque Renewal, from Beerhaven.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for having on board a greater number of Passengers than is permitted by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. James D. Cann, Master of the Brig Birman, from Sligo.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for having cleared and put to sea without having on board provisions for the use and consumption of the Passengers, of the kind and to the amount, and in the proportion required by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. James D. Cann, Master of the Brig Birman, from Sligo.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for not issuing provisions to the Passengers during the voyage in the manner required by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

*The QUEEN vs. Alex. M'Naughten, Master of the Brigantine Danube, from Ballyshannon.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for having cleared and put to sea from a port or place in the United Kingdom without having on board provisions and water for the use and consumption of the Passengers, of the kind and to the amount, and in the proportions required by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of fifty pounds, sterling, and costs; which were not paid.

NOTE.—In this case the first Summons was not properly served by the City Marshal, and the proceedings were abandoned; the second Summons was properly served, and the Defendant appeared, and was convicted.

*The QUEEN vs. the same.*

Before B. L. Peters, and John Kerr, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for carrying Passengers on board the Brigantine Danube, that Vessel not having lower or hold beams forming part of the permanent structure of the Vessel, as required by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of fifty pounds, sterling, and costs; which were not paid.

*The QUEEN vs. the same.*

Before B. L. Peters, and Henry Porter, Esquires, on complaint of the Government Emigration Agent, for not having on board the Brigantine Danube, before proceeding to sea, such medicines, and other things necessary to the medical treatment of the Passengers by the said Vessel, as required by the Passengers' Act. Defendant convicted in the penalty of five pounds, sterling, and costs; which penalty and costs were paid to the Magistrates.

The owners of Passenger Vessels not being liable under the Passengers' Act, their names were not ascertained.

The above Return includes all the Prosecutions instituted during the past year, and there being a conviction in every instance, there were no Prosecutions in which the Defendant escaped.

In order to recover the two penalties, of fifty pounds each, imposed on the Master of the Brigantine Danube, authenticated copies of the convictions have been transmitted to the Colonial Office, on which to prosecute the surety at Donegal, who signed the bonds required by the Passengers' Act, for the payment of all penalties and full compliance with the Act. This surety was stated to be a Merchant at Donegal, and a responsible person.

# RAILWAY AND ELECTRO-MAGNETIC TELEGRAPH.

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**Reports relating to the project of constructing a Railway, and a Line of Electro-Magnetic Telegraph, through the Province of New Brunswick.**

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Copy of Instructions from the Provincial Secretary to the Government Emigration Agent.

*Secretary's Office, Fredericton, 26th October, 1846.*

SIR,—I am directed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to inform you of your appointment to the undermentioned service, and to communicate to you the following Heads of Instructions for your guidance in the execution of the duty intrusted to you:—

Her Majesty's Government having undertaken to ascertain by Exploration and Survey, the practicability of constructing a Trunk Railway from the Eastern Coast of Nova Scotia to Quebec, which will necessarily traverse this Province, and some intelligent Officers of the Royal Engineers being at present engaged in this exploration, it has become necessary, in order to enable the Provincial Government to co-operate effectually in this important undertaking; to prosecute certain inquiries in regard to the resources of the Country which may be traversed by the Railway, and the means it would be likely to afford of rendering them more extensively available, not only to the people of the Province, but to those of the United Kingdom.

The prosecution of these inquiries is intrusted to you, with a view to which you are instructed to put yourself into communication with the Officers who are employed; and having ascertained from them the direction of the lines explored by them, to examine the nature of the country, fertility of the soil, the indications of Mineral resources on or adjacent to such lines, and the local advantages for settlement at particular sites where Stations are likely to be fixed.

Your attention should also be particularly given to the measure of establishing Branch Railways to connect the Trunk Line with Fredericton, Saint John, Saint Andrews, Woodstock, Miramichi, Richibucto, Dalhousie, and other parts and places in the Province, to which they might be profitably carried. And as the project is likely to be revived of connecting the Bay of Fundy with the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, by short Railways, across the Isthmus at the Head of the Bay, which would necessarily constitute Branches of the Trunk Railway, it would be desirable to ascertain in particular the nature and amount of the traffic to which the establishment of such lines would give rise, especially the encouragement they would give to the Fisheries, and the facilities they would afford of prosecuting them in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence; and on the Coast of Labrador. The positions along the Trunk Line from whence these and other branches should be carried, ought to be indicated with reference to the nature of the country to be traversed, and the greatest facilities of access to other places with which a beneficial intercourse might be established.

As it is understood that Coal and Timber may be conveyed by Railway with facility, as well as lighter goods, the practicability of obtaining at all seasons supplies of these commodities, at Fredericton and Saint John, more cheaply and expeditiously than can now be accomplished by sea and river navigation, should be ascertained, and the facilities that would also be afforded for the transport, at moderate rates, of the productions of Agriculture and the Fisheries.

Although the exploration now in progress will hereafter be followed by precise Surveys, from which the distances will be correctly ascertained, it may be practicable to estimate in a general way, the length of the projected Railways between the principal ports and places, and the time that would be employed in the transit of passengers and goods; also the cost per mile for their construction.

Any

Any information as to the practicability of keeping the Trunk Railway and its Branches open in the Winter, and thus securing the communication throughout the year, would be of great value, not only to those places where the navigation is closed in Winter, but where it is open, as in the Bay of Fundy; thereby affording at all times an uninterrupted outlet for the commerce of this and the neighbouring Provinces. The branches of Trade that might be opened or facilitated should be subject to your investigation; and the probable influence of such Trade, not only on the principal places to which it may be carried, but on the Counties that would be immediately traversed by the Trunk Railway, and its several Branches; and with this view, some account should be given of the description, quality and value of the Timber Trees, and of the Agricultural and Mineral productions of the several Counties, and of the Sea and River Fisheries.

The prospect of opening extensive and valuable tracts of wilderness land to Settlers, and of forming prosperous Settlements at the Railway Stations, should lead to such inquiries as will enable you to determine the most effective means of providing for the success of such Settlements, and the welfare of those who might embark in them; also the probability of a profitable passenger traffic arising from these undertakings, as well during the progress of the work, as after the Railway may be finally opened between the Atlantic and Quebec.

Any other information connected with this important project which you may acquire, and which may assist in forming a judgment of the practicability and probable advantages of the undertaking, locally and generally, you are requested to include in your Report; and in particular the prospect of being able to establish a direct intercourse, by Steam Navigation, with the United Kingdom for the conveyance of Emigrants to the Province, and the export of certain articles of produce to and from Europe.

SIR,—I have the honor to state, that in obedience to the Instructions furnished by you under date 26th October last, with reference to the prosecution of certain inquiries in connection with the exploration and survey, by Her Majesty's Government, of the line for a Railway from the Atlantic to Quebec, I have attended diligently to the duties therein assigned me, and now respectfully submit the following statement, with the several documents which accompany this communication.

It has already been officially announced, that Captain Pison, R. E., the Officer in charge of the Railway exploration and survey, was accidentally drowned in the River Restigouche, on the 28th October last, while endeavouring to save the life of a fellow creature. Owing to this melancholy and most unfortunate event, some delay occurred in placing myself in communication with Lieutenant Henderson, R. E., upon whom the whole charge of the survey most suddenly and unexpectedly devolved. That Officer has kindly communicated all the information he is enabled to give at present; and I am thus enabled to describe the several routes explored the past season by the surveying parties engaged in that service.

One party of Sappers and Miners, under Lieutenant Henderson, and accompanied by Mr. Wightman, a Surveyor from Nova Scotia, commenced their labours at the Boundary between this Province and Nova Scotia, near the head of Bay Verte. This party explored the country, on a line nearly parallel with the Gulf Shore of this Province, to the head of the Tide on the South West Miramichi, crossing the Shediac, Cocagne, Buctouche, Richibucto, and other Rivers on the route, above the tide-way on each. After crossing the South West Miramichi, this party proceeded up the valley of the North West Miramichi, to the northern boundary line of the County of Northumberland, and there separated into two divisions, one of which descended the valley of the Nepisiquit for some distance, and then followed a northwesterly course, nearly

nearly parallel with the southern coast of the Bay of Chaleur, terminating their exploration above the head of the Tide on the Restigouche River, nearly opposite the mouth of the Matapediac River. The other division crossed the upper waters of the Nepisiquit River, and followed up the valley of Middle River, thence through and across the vallies of the Upsalquitch and its tributaries, to the Restigouche, at the mouth of the Quotawam-Kedgewick, or northwest branch of that River, which, however, is now believed to be the main Restigouche, and not a tributary of what has heretofore been supposed the principal stream.

A second party of Sappers and Miners commenced their duties at high water mark on the wharf at the Bend of Petitcodiac, and thence followed the route formerly surveyed for a portion of the line of a Military Road, under the direction of Colonel Holloway, R. E., to Boiestown; thence up the valley of the North West Miramichi, to the River Tobique, above the Red Rapids, and thence a course nearly northwest, to the Waagan Portage, between Grand River, a tributary of the Saint John, and a small tributary of the Restigouche.

A third surveying party under Mr. John Grant, of the Crown Land Department, was employed in exploring the valley of the Tobique, and the neighbouring hills.

The sudden death of Captain Pison, and the early setting in of winter at the north, brought the labours of the season to a close without any exploration being made north of the Restigouche. That service Lieutenant Henderson proposes commencing as early as possible the coming season.

On the several lines explored, much broken and hilly country has been found northward of the South West Miramichi, especially in the vicinities of the Nepisiquit and Tobique Rivers. A further examination of the lines already explored, and of other lines of country, will be requisite next season, in order to ascertain the best and most practicable route for the line of the proposed Trunk Railway; until that is ascertained, and the country north of the Restigouche is thoroughly explored, the general direction of the line from the Atlantic to Quebec, through New Brunswick, cannot be determined. So soon, however, as that important decision takes place, the precise Survey will be commenced with strong parties fully qualified for that service.

The line of the proposed Trunk Railway not being yet ascertained, I cannot, of course, report upon the various matters referred to me with regard to the line of country to be traversed; but that duty will be attended to hereafter, when the precise Survey commences.

I have now, however, the honor to submit herewith, a Report upon the several Counties of New Brunswick, with reference to their Trade, Agriculture, Fisheries, Resources, and Capabilities; as also, Tables compiled by myself, shewing the principle articles exported from the Port of Saint John and its Out-Bays, from 1819 to 1845, both years inclusive; the estimated value in pounds sterling of the Imports and Exports of New Brunswick, from 1828 to 1845, both years inclusive; and the numbers and tonnage of the Ships built in this Province, from 1825 to 1845, both years inclusive.

I have the honor also to append a Report on the Forest Trees of New Brunswick, describing the most valuable Timber Trees, and their uses and properties, which is submitted with great deference, and for which every indulgence is claimed as the work of one who is not a professed naturalist.

The revived project of connecting the Bay of Fundy with the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, adverted to in my Instructions, being a subject of great importance, I visited the County of Westmorland for the purpose of collecting information with respect to it. The information obtained is embodied in the Report on Counties, under the head of Westmorland, where also will be found some valuable Statistics of the Population, Trade, Agriculture and Fisheries of Prince Edward Island, compiled from returns furnished by the Honorable T. H. Haviland, Secretary of that Colony, to whom I am under much obligation.

With reference to that portion of my Instructions requiring information as to the practicability of keeping the Trunk Railway and its Branches open in Winter, and thus securing the communication throughout the year, I am enabled to state, on the authority of E. H. Derby, Esquire, of Boston, a well known legal gentleman of high standing, extensively connected with Railways in Massachusetts, that the Railway Lines in New England have not sustained any very serious inconvenience of a permanent character

from snow. Every Railway is provided with Mammoth Snow Ploughs, of sufficient height and width to clear a passage for the Trains, each plough having two mould boards. These ploughs are impelled forward by two or three Engines placed behind, and thus the track is cleared of snow after a storm. When the snow is light, a single Engine performs the duty; but when the snow is long continued, and has accumulated to the depth of four or five feet, which sometimes happens in Berkshire County, Massachusetts, where the Western Rail Road surmounts an elevation 1,440 feet above the sea, more serious difficulties are encountered than in ordinary cases. The snow, after being repeatedly pressed out by the plough, occasionally becomes solid on each side of the road; the subsequent falls of snow, and the drifting snow which lodges in the track, at such times require a strong force with shovels to clear the way.

Drifts, however, are prevented in some places on the New England Lines, by board fences eight feet high, parallel to the tracks, at a few rods distance, against which the snow drives up and lodges in large masses; these fences have been christened "Snow-traps." From the best information, it is stated, that the expense of removing snow from the Rail Roads of New England, falls much short of one hundred dollars, (equal to £21 sterling,) per mile, per annum.

The Snow Plough is used on the Great North of England Railway, and other Railways in that part of England, which are sometimes impeded with snow. It is stated by a gentleman who has been connected with the working of these Railways, that they suffer but trifling impediment from snow, although it falls frequently to some depth; but that sleet in the winter season, by rendering the Rails icy and slippery, at times delays the Trains. The remedy for this is strewing the Rails either with sand or ashes.

As an almost indispensable adjunct to Railways, the Electric Telegraph is becoming universally applied. It is now proposed, that without waiting for the establishment of the Trunk Railway through these Provinces, a Telegraphic communication shall immediately be established from Halifax to Quebec, by the ordinary Post routes now in use. With this view, a Company has been formed in Quebec during the present month, with a capital of £6,500, in shares of £10 each; which amount, it is presumed, will be sufficient to establish the Line from Quebec to the boundary of this Province. It is proposed that the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia shall form separate Companies to establish and manage the Line, each within its own Colony. With the present extremely high rates of Postage in these Colonies, and the dilatory mode of Post communication, apart from all other considerations, there can be very little doubt that Telegraphic Lines between the different Towns on the route, (as for instance between Saint John and Fredericton,) would pay from the very outset. The question therefore arises, whether the Telegraph would not be better managed from Halifax to Quebec, and thence to the extreme western part of Canada, by one Company, acting on a uniform system, or whether it would not even be more desirable that the whole Line should be established throughout, by the Imperial Government, which would secure proper arrangements for the transmission of important intelligence, and prevent those frauds and abuses which have occurred where Lines are under the control of companies or individuals.

If established by the Government, the Board of Ordnance would be able to appoint intelligent men from that branch of the service, who would perform the duties at the various Stations in a most satisfactory manner, at moderate rates of pay.

The value and importance of the Sea and River Fisheries of New Brunswick, the extent to which they might be profitably carried, and the impetus which would be given them by increased facilities of internal communication, are subjects which demand special attention, and the most careful and patient investigation. At present, no sufficient data, or precise information exists, from which correct or positive statements can be made with reference to these Fisheries; and I am therefore precluded from noticing them, except incidentally, in the Reports now submitted. This deficiency I hope to be able to supply to some extent in another season, after careful inquiry and research.

**Report on the several Counties of New Brunswick,**

*With reference to their Trade, Agriculture, Fisheries, Resources and Capabilities, and including Statistics of Prince Edward Island; by M. H. Perley, Government Emigration Agent.*

**COUNTY OF RESTIGOUCHE.**

This County, the most northerly in the Province, was formerly part of Northumberland, and afterwards a part of the County of Gloucester. It was erected into a separate County by Act of Assembly in 1837, and its northerly boundary is the line which separates New Brunswick from Lower Canada. It contains 1,266,560 acres, of which 156,979 acres only are granted and located, leaving 1,109,581 acres still vacant. The whole population in 1840 was 3,161, and the quantity of cleared land, 5,579 acres. The Settlements are almost exclusively confined to the Shores of the Bay of Chaleur, and the Banks of the River Restigouche; a large proportion of the land under cultivation is exceedingly rich and fertile. Limestone and Marl abound on the Coast of the Bay of Chaleur within this County, and the soil on the Banks of the Restigouche, (especially at the "Flat-lands" above Campbelltown,) is of excellent quality. The interior of the County, being in a wilderness state, and almost wholly unexplored, very little can be said of its resources or capabilities. The late Deputy Hunter has spoken in high terms of the excellence of the soil on the Upsalquitch, and to the southward and eastward of Campbelltown.

The principal Exports of this County, are furnished by its Forests and the Fisheries; and the extent of its Trade may be estimated from the following Table of Articles exported from 1835 to 1845, both inclusive:—

The above Table is made up from the Custom House Returns; but there is reason to believe that it by no means gives a full statement of Exports arising from the Fisheries. It is not unlikely that a large proportion of the fish caught and cured on the New Brunswick side of the Bay of Chaleur, has been carried across the Bay to Gaspe, and shipped from thence as Canadian.

An Agricultural Society was established in this County in 1840. At the Meeting called for the purpose of establishing the Society, it was Resolved—"That the new County of Restigouche has been and still continues to be chiefly a lumbering community; that the Timber Trade has done much for Restigouche, has been the chief support of its inhabitants, and continues to afford a valuable article of export; but that the Agricultural interest, which from the peculiar richness of the soil, it is so admirably calculated to promote, have been hitherto much neglected; and that it therefore becomes necessary to give every facility, countenance, and support, to this branch of industry." The proceedings of the Society have been of much interest. By the fourth Report, (published in 1844,) it appears that a number of premiums were awarded for various products of the soil. The best Wheat is stated to have weighed 65 lbs. 6 ozs. per bushel; the second best, 65 lbs. per bushel; the third premium was awarded for Wheat weighing 64 lbs. 11 ozs. per bushel. The best two-rowed Barley weighed 56½ lbs., and the second best, 52½ lbs. per bushel. The best four-rowed Barley weighed 57 lbs. 5 ozs. per bushel, and the second best, 53½ lbs. per bushel. The best Siberian Wheat weighed 63½ lbs. per bushel. The best Black Oats weighed 42 lbs. 14 ozs., and the second best, 42 lbs. 2 ozs. per bushel. The best White Oats weighed 47 lbs. 10 ozs., and the second best, 47½ lbs. per bushel. It

It appears that there was much competition for the premiums ; and the weight of each description of grain mentioned shows clearly that Restigouche possesses capabilities for producing grain of superior quality ; and that this, and the other northern Counties of New Brunswick, are well calculated to become hereafter the granary of the Province. As an erroneous impression has obtained, that these Counties, from their high northern latitude, were incapable of producing Wheat, it is important that the error should be corrected as speedily as possible.

COUNTY OF GLOUCESTER.

This County is estimated to contain 1,037,440 acres, of which 332,902 acres are granted and located, and 704,538 acres are still vacant. The population in 1840 was 7,751 ; and the quantity of cleared land, 11,681 acres. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 1,721 acres.

There is much good land in the County of Gloucester, and it occupies a very favorable position as regards the Fisheries of the Bay of Chaleur and the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. Of late years, increased attention has been given to Agriculture, and the results have fully demonstrated that the capabilities of the soil and the climate enjoyed by this County, are such as to render it essentially a grain growing district. The great weight of the Wheat and other descriptions of grain grown in Gloucester of late years, has been such as to attract public attention, and elicit expressions of surprise. The Report of the Gloucester Agricultural Society for 1843, states, that—" Since the establishment of the Society, Agriculture has been gradually and steadily advancing, every succeeding year's exhibition shewing a manifest improvement in the weight and quality of all descriptions of grain, until the present year, when we have numerous stocks of Wheat weighing 68 lbs. to the bushel, and may safely state the average weight of Wheat and Barley throughout the northern part of the County to be about 64½ lbs. for the former, and 53 lbs. for the latter, an average not surpassed in this Province. The increased quantity grown of late years also affords cause of gratulation. From statistics collected by the Secretary, and not yet complete, it appears that all the grain raised in the Parish of Bathurst in the year 1833, did not exceed six hundred bushels ; while the quantity already ascertained of the crop of 1843, is beyond seven thousand bushels. But notwithstanding this gratifying state of things, your Committee must not be deemed unreasonable in stating, that they anticipate much more rapid progress yet, for a few years to come. Settlers will multiply—for the excellence of our soil is becoming known and appreciated ; cultivation will extend ; and in corn, at least, improvement must continue through assiduity and skill, until the weight of our Wheat reaches 70 lbs. per bushel, our Barley 58 lbs. to 60 lbs., and our Oats, 48 lbs. to 50 lbs., and this may be considered perfection, for it is improbable that grain, by any process, can be raised, to approach nearer the density of water than Wheat at the above standard ; a weight too it has not attained in any country, except in some rare and solitary instances."

A very interesting Statistical Return of the Agricultural Produce of the County of Gloucester, for the year 1844, made up with great ability by Henry Baldwin, Esquire, High Sheriff of the County, shews the following results :—

The valuable and highly interesting information collected by Sheriff Baldwin, has been of essential service to the County of Gloucester ; and it is greatly to be regretted that

that efforts have not been made, either by private individuals, or at the public expense, to collect and compile similar information in other Counties of the Province.

The quantity of Dried Fish exported from Caraqueet, of late years, has formed a very considerable proportion of the whole export of that article from the Province. The fishing grounds being in close proximity to the shores of Gloucester, are much frequented by Fishing Boats from Gaspe; the New Brunswick Fishermen also, frequently carry a portion of their Fish over to Paspebiac, whence they are shipped to Foreign Ports.

Besides the exports mentioned, very considerable quantities of Manganese have of late years been exported to England from Bathurst. At this time, an exploration for Coal is going on in Gloucester, with very favorable prospects; the boring has at present reached the depth of three hundred feet. The mineral wealth of this County is reported to be very considerable, but the settlements being confined almost exclusively to the coast, and the interior remaining in a state of unbroken wilderness, a perfect and thorough examination of the country cannot yet be made. Abundance of Lime, and Marl of a yellowish white color, strongly resembling chalk, have been found on the coast of the Bay of Chaleur, north of Bathurst, and the use of these powerful stimulants to vegetation has been attended with the most beneficial results.

## COUNTY OF NORTHUMBERLAND.

This is the largest County in New Brunswick, containing 2,980,000 acres, of which 986,168 acres are granted and located, leaving 1,993,832 acres still vacant. The population of the County in 1840, was 14,620, and the quantity of cleared land 25,323 acres, or one thirty-ninth part only of the lands granted and located, and only one hundred and seventeenth part of the area of the County. The area is equal to 4,656 square miles, and the population barely exceeds three souls to each square mile.

The whole Colony of Prince Edward Island contains 1,380,700 acres, or less than half the number of acres in the County of Northumberland.

There is much good land, well adapted for settlement and cultivation, in this County; but the immense quantity of fine Timber within its limits, and the facilities for floating it to market were so great, as to withdraw the attention of the settlers from agricultural pursuits. To remedy this state of things an Agricultural Society was established in 1838, which presented a first Report in 1839. From this Report some extracts are given with reference to the state of Agriculture and the capabilities of the County:—

“As to the County in which we reside, we would remark, what is generally known, that its inhabitants have been chiefly a lumbering community. The Timber Trade has done much for Northumberland; it has built its villages, and been heretofore the chief support of its inhabitants; and it has afforded a very valuable article of export. Unfortunately, however, it has been of far less advantage to this community than it might have been, had Agriculture been more extensively prosecuted. Our forests have been a mine of wealth, but that wealth has for the most part gone to enrich other countries and communities, which have supplied us with the necessaries of life. Had one part of our population kept to the cultivation of the soil, while the other was engaged in the manufacture of Timber, much of the money that was made in the County, instead of flowing into other channels, would have remained in it, and left us in very different circumstances from those in which we now find ourselves placed. Had the Farmer kept apart from lumbering entirely, or employed himself only in getting out such a quantity of Timber during the winter months, as he could on his own resources, without incurring risk; and had he laid out his energies in clearing and cultivating the soil, and in endeavoring to raise supplies, not only for his own family, but as far as possible also to meet the wants of his neighbours who were engaged in the labors of the forest, he would have slowly, but surely, arrived at independence and substantial comfort. His labors, instead of being like those of the lumberman, of a transitory, would have been of a permanent description; and while they added to the real wealth of the country, would have created a valuable inheritance to transmit to his children.”

“An idea long prevailed, that this could never become a Farming Country; that the soil was of an inferior description; and that the seasons were too short and precarious for the successful prosecution of Agriculture; and it was correctly said, that provisions could be purchased cheaper than they could be raised in Miramichi. Hence the occupants of the soil, without giving their farms a fair trial, or endeavoring by industry and perseverance to overcome the difficulties incident to the settlement of a new country, thinking they had discovered a nearer and easier road to wealth than the clearing of the forest, deserted their farms and embarked in lumbering. To enable them to carry on this business extensively, they found it necessary to obtain large supplies from Merchants on credit. It is needless to dwell upon the evils and abuses arising out of this system. It is sufficient to say, that from the heavy expense and great risks attendant on the manufacture of Timber, the great majority of those engaged in it have become involved in difficulties, from which they have been unable to extricate themselves. Those who once engaged in this employment seldom have had the resolution to quit it, as long as it could afford them a support, however precarious—this, at least, has been the case in Miramichi. Now, however, that the forests are so much thinned of the heavy growth of Pine, the manufacture of Timber cannot be carried to the same extent as in former years, very many, therefore, who have heretofore depended on it, must either quit the country or look to the soil for the means of support.”

“It is well known that until lately this County had to depend on other countries for a supply of every necessary of life; and this is still the case to a deplorable extent. Even potatoes, for which our soil is so admirably adapted, were supplied to us almost wholly from the neighbouring Colony of Prince Edward Island.”

“Wheat is a tolerably sure crop, and where the soil is in proper condition, gives a fair return. More attention should be given to the raising of Oats, which have proved to be a sure and productive crop. Barley, in general, is found to answer well in our soil.”

This Report gives a statement of the quantity of provisions imported into Miramichi during the year 1838, the value of which is stated to be £102,770 currency.

It is very pleasing to notice the rapid progress of Agriculture in Northumberland since 1839. In the Report of the Agricultural Society for 1842, it is stated—“that the

the quantity of Wheat raised in the County during the past season, was at least twice as great as that produced in any preceding year. The Oat crop also was abundant, and the quality good. From the superior description of Mills lately erected, the quality, both of Flour and Oatmeal, produced in Miramichi, has been quite equal to any thing imported either from Canada or Britain. The return of Potatoes last year was very abundant, and amply sufficient to supply the wants of the County. The Committee feel warranted in saying, that a marked impulse has been given to Agricultural pursuits in this section of the Province, by the operations of the Society; and they humbly hope that the Legislature will continue, and even increase that patronage to it and kindred institutions, which may enable them further to promote the great ends they have in view; and that the day may come when New Brunswick may be enabled to raise provisions sufficient to supply the wants of the population. Then, and not till then, can we expect the Colony to attain any thing like substantial prosperity and independence."

The Report of the Society for the past year (1846) has just been published; from which it appears, that the annual Show took place at Newcastle, on the 7th January, 1847; and that the exhibition far exceeded any thing of the kind ever before witnessed in Miramichi; the farmers beginning to feel the benefits of the Society, and to take a livelier interest in its proceedings. A very large quantity of Butter was exhibited, and premiums were awarded for the best samples in firkins of not less than 30lbs. weight. The show of Grain was, by far, the largest ever exhibited, comprising sixteen samples of White Wheat, weighing from 63lbs. to 67lbs. per bushel, and stated to be very superior. Seven samples of Red Wheat, five parcels of which weighed 66lbs., one parcel 65lbs. and another 66½lbs. per bushel, all of very fine quality. Seven parcels of White Oats, weighing from 41lbs. to 46lbs. per bushel, all very good; three parcels of Black Oats, weighing from 39½lbs. to 43lbs. per bushel; five samples of Barley, weighing from 52½lbs. to 55½lbs. per bushel, very large and even; and six samples of Peas, weighing from 67lbs. to 68½lbs. per bushel, large and even, and all of good quality. Two samples of Timothy seed were also exhibited, the one weighing 43lbs. and the other 48lbs. per bushel.

This Report is highly creditable to the County of Northumberland, and affords the most convincing proof, not only of the progress of Agriculture, but of the capabilities of its soil for producing every description of Grain of the first quality, and in abundance. A very different state of things now exists in this County from that so well depicted in the Report of the Agricultural Society for 1839.

The following Table of the Exports of Timber and the produce of the Fisheries from this County, from 1835 to 1845, both years inclusive, will furnish a correct view of the great extent to which the Timber Trade has been carried in this part of the Province, and the state of its Fisheries:—

The extent to which Shipbuilding has been prosecuted in this County will be seen on reference to the Return of Vessels built and registered in this Province, which is appended to this Report.

## COUNTY OF KENT.

There is scarcely a single hill of any magnitude in the whole of this County, and the land, especially on the Gulf Shore, is very low and level. It may be described as the most level County in the Province. The Settlements are chiefly confined to the coast and the banks of the Rivers along the tide-way, where the Acadian French, who constitute a considerable proportion of the population, reside in close proximity to each other.

The County of Kent contains 1,026,400 acres, of which 386,398 acres are granted and located, and 640,002 acres are still vacant. The population in 1840 was 7,477 souls, and the estimated quantity of cleared land, 20,413 acres. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 2,777 acres.

The quantities of Timber and Fish exported from this County, from 1835 to 1845, both years inclusive, are given in the following Table:—

As the County of Kent possesses several good Harbours on its Coast, and is in other respects well situated for prosecuting the Fisheries in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, the small amount of exports arising from the Fisheries is somewhat striking, and shews that something is wanting to give an impetus to this branch of industry.

The lands already settled in Kent are of good quality, and much yet remains vacant equally good, and well adapted for the culture of Grain and Potatoes. The Agricultural Society of this County has of late years used strenuous exertions to improve the mode of farming. The Report for 1842 states that preparations were made in that year to bring a much larger quantity of land under cultivation than in any previous year, and in most instances the expectations of the farmers were fully realized. The best Wheat exhibited at the Show of that year weighed 70lbs. per bushel, the best Barley 56lbs., and the best Oats 48lbs. per bushel, fully proving the capabilities of this County for growing the different kinds of Grain.

## COUNTY OF WESTMORLAND.

In 1845 the County of Westmorland was divided into two separate Counties, that part lying south and west of the River Petitcodiac being erected into a new County, by the name of Albert. The area of the present County of Westmorland is 878,440 acres, of which 577,440 acres are granted and located, leaving only 301,000 acres vacant land.

The population of Westmorland, at present, is estimated at 18,360 souls; and the area of the County being equal to 1372 square miles, the proportion of population exceeds thirteen souls to each square mile.

This is eminently an agricultural and grazing County, as the abundance of rich compost, and the extensive dyked marshes within its limits, teeming with inexhaustible fertility, offer the greatest means and facilities for growing every description of agricultural produce, and for grazing and feeding Stock. In 1840, the County of Westmorland, (including the present County of Albert,) numbered no less than 3,421 horses, 20,754 head of neat cattle, and 27,553 sheep, besides 16,545 swine. The increase of Stock has since been very considerable, but no data exist from which to compile an accurate

accurate account. Although very large quantities of Butter are annually sent to market from Westmorland, yet there is reason to believe that the dairy capabilities of this County are as yet only beginning to be developed. The introduction of capital and labor, with skill and science, would tend greatly to develope fully the numerous and abundant resources of Westmorland, and would undoubtedly render this County one of the finest districts in all British North America for grazing purposes, and for the pursuits of agriculture generally.

The Science of Agriculture has made very considerable advances, under favorable circumstances, in that part of Westmorland known as the Parish of Sackville, where the proprietors of farms are reaping the rich reward of their skill and industry. Among the numerous Acadian French inhabitants in the Parish of Dorchester, on the fertile banks of the Memramcook and Petitcodiac Rivers, an onward movement has been commenced through the exertions of the Reverend Ferdinand Gauvreau, their Pastor, who, at his own expense, has not only imported some of the latest and most improved agricultural implements, and put them in actual use, but has also, by precept and example, endeavored to induce his parishioners to adopt improved modes of farming and feeding stock. If this class of inhabitants can be induced to depart from the mode of cultivation introduced by their forefathers, and followed without deviation from generation to generation, it will materially increase the wealth and advance the prosperity of Westmorland.

Of the products of this County, a large proportion is sent to Saint John and passed over to Nova Scotia, without any account being taken of the quantities.

The following Table of Exports from Dorchester is given with the view of shewing the increase of Trade of late years, and not as giving an accurate statement of the Exports of the County :—

The Exports the past season from Dorchester and Shediac consisted of White and Red Pine Timber, Birch Timber and Planks, Larch Timber, Railway Sleepers, Scantling and Treenails, Spruce Deals, Battens, Oar Rafters, Spars, Small Poles, Scantling, Boards and Plank, Hemlock Lathwood, Pine Boards and Plank, Laths and sawed Palings, and Ash Hogshead Staves, all for the United Kingdom.

During the last few years the Shad Fishery has been prosecuted to a considerable extent, on the River Petitcodiac, as well as at Sackville, and has proved very profitable

to those engaged in it. In the season of 1846, there were two hundred boats engaged in taking Shad on the Petitcodiac, each boat having two men. One hundred and sixty of these boats were fitted out and manned by the Acadian French, and the remaining forty boats by English Settlers. The catch of each boat averaged twelve barrels of Fish, although some boats took upwards of twenty barrels. These quantities are over and above what were consumed fresh, of which an estimate can scarcely be formed; the quantity must be very large however, as fresh Shad are said to constitute a principal portion of the food of the inhabitants during the Summer.

The quantity of Shad now caught and cured annually at Dorchester and Sackville has been estimated at three thousand barrels, the Market value of which was five thousand pounds. The Fishery may be prosecuted to a still greater extent, and is well worthy of encouragement.

The ledges of Sandstone at Cape Maranguin furnish Grindstones of superior quality, and the business of making them is prosecuted to some extent. A number of persons engaged in making Grindstones reside on the Cape, and each man makes on the average four hundred Stone, by measurement, during the season. The "Stone," by measurement, is two feet in diameter, and four inches thick, the value of which at the Cape is two shillings, or a little more. The Grindstones when made, are principally bought by persons from the opposite shore of Nova Scotia, at the South Joggins, and shipped to the United States, where they are in high repute and extensively used for grinding and polishing tools and cutlery. The largest Grindstone made at the Cape the past season was six and a half feet in diameter and twelve inches thick. The whole quantity made annually does not fall far short of 18,000 stone by measurement, and the quantity may be increased to any desired extent, as the ledges are extensive and seem to be almost inexhaustible.

At Grand Aunce, to the northward of Cape Maranguin, there is an extensive deposit of Gypsum close to the shore, and superior Flag-Stones have been shipped from a quarry near the Gypsum.

The project of connecting the Bay of Fundy with the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, by means of a Canal, having been for the present abandoned, a Railway for effecting that object has been proposed. As this Railway would, to a certainty, intersect the Trunk Railway from the Atlantic to Quebec, should such be established, and would lead to a more extensive prosecution of the Fisheries in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, as well as a large and increasing trade and intercourse with Prince Edward Island, the proposal is worthy the most serious consideration. Without adverting to the advantages which would necessarily arise from this Railway forming branches of the Trunk Railway, which would be matter for future consideration, it becomes in the first place necessary to indicate the most eligible line of country, with the best port, as well on the Gulf Shore as on the Bay of Fundy.

The Honorable Captain Owen, R. N., states, that Dorchester, if ever adopted as a Commercial Port, has many great and important advantages, which no other place in its vicinity can ever obtain. There is never less than five fathoms water near Dorchester Island at low tide; and it is in fact the only Ship-Harbour in this part of the Bay of Fundy, where vessels can load at all times with perfect safety and facility. During the past season, a Steamer has run from this place to Saint John, and made the trips regularly in eleven and twelve hours.

The distance from Dorchester Island to Shediac Harbour, (at the mouth of the Scadouk River) was ascertained to be 25½ miles, by the Survey of Captain Crawley, R. E. That Officer commenced his Survey at the Bridge over the Scadouk River, near its mouth, and proceeded one mile and a half up the Scadouk River, to a small Brook called Underwoods; thence in a south westerly direction, crossing the low lands through which the Scadouk winds its course, to the Memramcook River; thence more southerly, following the general course of the Memramcook, to Dorchester Island. Whatever obstacles may exist on this route to prevent a Canal being made, there would seem to be none to prevent the establishment of a Railway. The dyked Marshes in the Valley of the Memramcook would afford a dead level for more than one-third the whole distance, while the Valley of the Scadouk offers a level plain for another third of the route. The intermediate distance between these two Valleys is not by any means an elevated country, not sufficiently so even to prevent a Canal being made

at moderate expense, had there been a sufficient supply of water on the summit level.

The following Estimate of the probable average cost, in the Province of New Brunswick, of one mile of Wooden Railway, the Wood prepared by "Payne's Process," was published in the Royal Gazette of the 24th December, 1845:—

The foregoing Estimate is founded on authentic information, and the current rates of the Country. It has been ascertained by actual survey, that the very worst grades, in a *direct* route, and confined to a limited extent of country, do not exceed one in fifteen, and they are, in most cases, easy of reduction, while the greater portion is ascertained to be very favorable. It must also be recollected that from the abundance of timber on the spot, an immense saving may, in many situations, be made, by substituting substantial wooden structures in lieu of embankments, &c. The purchase of valuable property, which in this country may be safely considered as a part of the contingent account, does, in some Districts, most materially augment Railway Estimates.

It may be remarked, that a Railway could be constructed on Wood upon the dyked Marshes, along the Valley of the Memramcook, much below this estimate. In the dyked Marshes wood never decays, and is not liable to be thrown out of its place or upheaved by frost, which are very important points.

With reference to the Harbour of Shediac, the following information has been obtained from the most authentic sources, and from personal observation.

Captain Bayfield, R. N., Marine Surveyor in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, in a Letter dated 25th January, 1841, states as follows:—"Shediac is the only Harbour of New Brunswick, eastward of Miramichi, which a vessel in distress could safely attempt to enter in heavy northerly gales, its entrance being less difficult and dangerous than that of any other on the coast." By Captain Bayfield's observations, Shediac Island is in latitude 46° 15' 15" north, and longitude 64° 32' 10" west; Longitude in time, 4h. 18m. 8-40s.; variation of the Compass, 19° west.

Those well known and most intelligent Pilots at Shediac, Messrs. James and William Milne, state that during the Summer Solstice, the time of high water at the full and change of the Moon, is 7 A. M.; and during the Winter Solstice, at 12, noon. The verticle rise of a medium spring tide they state to be from three to four feet, and the neaps from one and a half to two and a half feet. In the fair-way or ship-channel, at the distance of two and a half miles from the Harbour, twenty five feet of water is to be found, which is continued up to the entrance of the Harbour with little variation; from thence there is nineteen to twenty feet in the channel, gradually lessening until off the anchorage at Point Du Chêne, where sixteen and a half feet will be found at one third of a mile from the shore. The anchorage is good all over the fair-way to the northward and westward of the Medea Bank, in blue clay, with three to five fathoms water. Vessels discharging ballast lay in sixteen feet water, off Point Du Chêne, alongside a bank upon which there is only three to five feet water, and cast out

out their ballast in tubs. The Messrs. Milne further state, that they have taken loaded vessels safely out of Shediac Harbour drawing eighteen feet water; and that there is only fourteen feet water to be relied upon at Cocagne, and eleven and a half feet at Buctouche.

During the season of 1846, ten Ships and Brigs, in all 4546 tons, loaded at Shediac with Timber, Deals, and Railway Sleepers, for Ports in England and Ireland. A number of Schooners also sailed for Saint John's, Newfoundland, with Boards. Two Packets ply regularly every week to Bedeque, Prince Edward Island; and it is proposed to run a Steam Boat next season to Bedeque and Charlotte Town regularly.

As a communication by Railway between Dorchester and Shediac, and a communication thence by Steamers to Prince Edward Island, would cause a large portion of the Agricultural Exports of that fertile Island to be sent over by such communication to Dorchester, to be shipped from thence to a market, it becomes important to inquire into the value and character of the Imports and Exports of the Island.

The following Account shews the total value of Imports, distinguishing each Port in the Island, for the year ending 5th. Januay, 1846:—

It will be observed that nearly two-thirds of all the Imports of the Island are drawn from the other North American Colonies, and that the same proportion of its Exports are sent to the same Colonies. The Imports consist principally of British manufactured Dry Goods, Coals, Iron, Cordage, Sail-cloth, Soap, Salt, Stationery, Nails, Tea, Tobacco, Wines and Spirituous Liquors, Sugar, and Molasses. The following is an account of the quantities of Agricultural Produce and Stock exported in the year ending the 5th January, 1836, and the products of the Fisheries:—

In the year 1845, the number of vessels launched and registered in the Island was 88, with a total of 9,649 tons; and certificates previous to registry were granted for four other vessels, with a total of 664 tons, making in all, 92 vessels, 10,313 tons.

A census of the Island was taken in the year 1841, from which it appears, that the whole population then amounted to 47,034 souls. The number of acres of arable Land is returned as 141,560. The Crops of the year 1840 are thus stated:—

If facilities were created for transporting the surplus produce of Prince Edward Island to Shediac, and thence to Dorchester for shipment, a certain market could always be found for such produce at remunerating prices, and the imports of the Island would find their way there by the same channel. The exceeding fertility of the Island, and its capabilities for producing Grain and Potatoes to an immense extent, are well known facts; and it needs only a steady market to increase its population and its products, and render it a wealthy and flourishing Colony.

The Port of Shediac is well adapted as a station for carrying on the Fisheries in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, at the Magdalen Islands, and on the coast of Labrador; yet only one small vessel was fitted out there for these Fisheries during the past season. A fishing vessel was fitted out last Spring at Campo Bello, for the Labrador Fishery, and on the voyage, to the southeastward of Shediac, took one hundred barrels of Spring Herrings. This vessel put into Shediac, sold the Herrings, procured a fresh supply of Salt, and sailed for Labrador, where a full fare of Fish was taken. At the end of the season this vessel returned to Campo Bello, after having made a very profitable voyage. The long voyages to and from Campo Bello must have been a great drawback; and this case is mentioned to indicate the advantages of fitting out such vessels at Shediac, if a Railway or other ready communication existed between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of Saint Lawrence.

It only remains to mention, that some very superior Steam Saw Mills have recently been erected at the mouth of the Scadouk River, in Shediac Harbour, and that very extensive water power for manufacturing purposes, exists on the Scadouk and Shediac Rivers, at the head of the Tide on each River, and within short distances of the Harbour of Shediac. A Quarry of Sandstone of superior quality for Grindstones has recently been opened on the Scadouk River, which is about to be worked; an out-cropping of Coal has also been noticed on this River, as also at Tedish River, to the southward of Shediac, but no examinations have yet been made to ascertain the existence of large deposits of this valuable mineral.

#### COUNTY OF ALBERT.

Up to the year 1845, this new County formed part of Westmorland, as stated in the preceding notice of that County. The area of Albert County contains 433,560 acres, of which 233,700 are granted and located, and 199,680 acres remain ungranted and vacant. The present population is estimated at 5,660, and the quantity of cleared Land upwards of 25,000 acres.

This County contains much good Land, and excellent dyked Marshes of considerable extent. A large proportion of the vacant Land is of good quality, well adapted for settlement and cultivation, offering many advantages to Settlers. The Settlement formed by Saint John Mechanics in 1842 on the Pollett River, and since called the “Mechanics’ Settlement,” is in Albert County. It is now in a flourishing condition, needing only good Roads to cause its rapid advancement, very considerable progress having been made by the Settlers, under very discouraging circumstances.

The resources of Albert County consist of Timber and Lumber, Agricultural Produce, Fish, Gypsum, Grindstones and Freestone. The Timber of various kinds is generally

generally shipped on the Petitcodiac River, and shipped as from the Port of Dorchester. The sawed Lumber is sent to Saint John generally for a market, as also the surplus Agricultural Produce. Owing to the recent organization of this County, no Agricultural Society has yet been established, nor can any account be given of its Exports.

A large deposit of Gypsum of the best quality exists in the Parish of Hopewell; and Freestone and Building Stone are shipped from Grindstone Island.

There are quarries at Mary's Point, opposite Grindstone Island, of dark red Freestone of very fine grain, and easily worked. It may be obtained in blocks of the largest size required for building purposes. This stone has been highly approved in New York; it has been analyzed by a celebrated American Professor, and pronounced equal, if not superior, to the well known Freestone of Connecticut. The stone procured above the tide is very compact, smooth-grained, and entirely free from defects, and has been found to resist the influence of the atmosphere and frost as well as any Freestone in North America.

The Shad Fishery is prosecuted by the inhabitants along the Bay Shore, which bounds the County on the South.

The following extract of a letter from the Honorable Captain Owen, R. N., to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, dated 8th December, 1845, is here given, as it embraces various points of interest with reference to the New County:—"It is known that from the *debouche* of Petitcodiac River, at Folly Point, (very near, and immediately opposite, and southwest from Dorchester Island,) the opposite shore of Albert, all the way down to New Horton, or nine or ten miles, is covered by a mud flat, which renders it most inconvenient for water communication; and no part of it offers a point where even landing can be conveniently effected for any considerable time, or more than two hours from high water, and not one spot that can be considered a Port or Harbour at all.

"It is very true that a Ship may lay at anchor in Five Fathom Hole, near Grindstone Island, and so she may in any part of the sea-approach to Cumberland or Westmorland, even as low as Cape Enrage, and Apple River, and thence all the way up to Dorchester Island, and even a few miles up the Petitcodiac, above the Ferry, and it appears to me that no one point of the coast-line affords a convenient spot for continued and uninterrupted intercourse by water, all the creeks and rivers being absolutely dry three fourths of every tide.

"In choosing a site for the County Town of Albert, I am of opinion, that we should not for any partial interest or policy lose sight of the great principal, viz:—'that facilities of external intercourse do best promote the real interests of any local community, in peaceable relations with their neighbours.'

"The present Ferry between Ferry Point and Dorchester Island, (the latter being a terminus of the Great Road of Communication with the eastern section of the County of Westmorland, and with Nova Scotia,) has been adopted practically, as the most convenient place on the side of Albert, for maintaining most efficaciously this intercourse, and it would seem to have been adopted, because found practically to be the most convenient. The Point, therefore, is in my opinion, the most suitable for the County Town, and from thence a Road will ere long be opened across the country, which would materially shorten and facilitate the communication with Saint John.

"At the most convenient point for Ferry communication, improvements might be made by Legislative aid and enactment, to render the passage across (about three miles) to Dorchester Island, available at all times of tide, and a Steam Ferry might be established there; and to the improvement of that Point for the purpose of facilitating convenient intercourse, it should, I conceive, be the first object to which to direct the energies of the new County of Albert, to which nothing can more contribute than to keep them under the eye and immediate regards of all their local authorities, and in which their locomotive facilities and conveniences are so intimately connected.

"The part of the river between Ferry Point and Dorchester is unquestionably the best and most convenient anchorage above Grindstone Island, as Your Excellency might have observed of the Columbia's anchorage, on your late visit to Albert; she never had less than five fathoms of water at low tide; and Dorchester, if ever adopted as a mercantile Port, has many great and important advantages, which no other place in its vicinity can ever obtain.

"The

“The River (so called) of Shepody, and Five Fathom Hole, can never become a place of any general importance or utility, and all intercourse with the shore is precluded for nearly three fourths of the time; and a Ferry from them must either go to Dorchester, nine or ten miles, always against a strong counter-tide going or returning, or to Point Maranguin, four or five miles, with similar inconvenience; and then the high road to Nova Scotia, through Westmorland, would require to be brought to the same point, which after the best arrangements, would not be so convenient as the Ferry between Dorchester Island and Ferry Point now is. In my opinion, there is not a point on the whole sea coast of Albert, northward of Cape Chignecto, more objectionable for the site of the County Town for Albert, than the (so called) Shepody River.”

With reference to a new line of Road from the County Town of Albert to the City of Saint John, alluded to by Captain Owen, it may now be stated, that by an exploration recently made eastwardly from the Mechanics' Settlement, it has been ascertained that the prolongation of the main Road which passes through that Settlement on a due east course, will strike the new County Town, and will shorten the present Road to it by at least twenty miles. If the Road through the Mechanics' Settlement be prolonged westerly through the Baskin and Donegal Settlements, along Bye Roads now opened to the Dutch Valley, and thence follow the new line of Great Road to Saint John by way of Loch Lomond, the whole distance between the County Town of Albert and the City of Saint John will be shortened at least thirty five miles. By the establishment of this line as that of the Great Road of the County of Albert, great benefits would be conferred on that County, a number of new Settlements, now languishing for the want of Roads, would immediately become populous and thriving, while a large quantity of vacant land of superior quality would at once be brought into request for settlement and actual cultivation.

If it be determined to try the experiment of settling new land by Emigrants or others, upon the principle of making a portion of the land pay the expense of making Roads through it, no line of country in New Brunswick, at the present moment, would seem to offer so favorable an opportunity of giving the scheme a full and fair trial, as this line from Saint John to Albert.

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#### CITY AND COUNTY OF SAINT JOHN.

The number of acres in this City and County is 414,720, being the smallest quantity in any County in the Province. The quantity of granted and located Land is 309,147 acres, leaving only 105,573 acres vacant, situate chiefly at the extreme eastern and western limits of the County. The quantity of vacant Land sold in 1845 was 3,859 acres. The population of the City of Saint John in 1840 was 20,716, but the populous Suburb of Portland would add at least 5,000 to the number. The population of the City and the Suburb of Portland may now be safely estimated at 30,000, and the rest of the County at 8,000 souls, in all 38,000 souls, equal to one fifth the whole population of the Province.

As the County of Saint John stretches along the northern shore of the Bay of Fundy for nearly ninety miles, and is just of sufficient breadth to include those elevated ridges of primary rocks which give such a forbidding aspect to the coast, it cannot be expected that much good land would be found within its limits. Yet in the valleys and less elevated parts of the County, the soil, although not of the best description, produces good crops of Oats, Potatoes, and Turnips, while considerable advance has been made in the culture of Wheat. The Agricultural Society of the County are using their best endeavours to induce the farmers to avail themselves of the advantages afforded by the vicinity of a large town and the abundance of lime, for making compost. At the Society's Annual Fair in October last, three samples of Wheat, the growth of the County, were exhibited; one sample weighed 64lbs., and the other two, 63lbs. per bushel. Twenty samples of Oats were exhibited, all weighing above 40lbs. per bushel—the two best samples weighed 47lbs. per bushel. Some very excellent samples of Turnips were exhibited, and the produce of the fields where they were grown was stated to be at the rate of 800 bushels per acre.

The

The City of Saint John draws largely upon the Counties of King's, Queen's, and Westmorland, for supplies of beef, pork, mutton, butter, and all descriptions of Agricultural produce. The establishment of Railways throughout the Province would enable the farmer in the most distant situations to participate in the steady markets, not only at Saint John, but at Miramichi, Saint Andrews, and the other Sea Ports of the Province. The Trade of those Sea Ports also would be increased by facilities of communication with the interior, and by the trade arising from the various products of the soil, which could be readily and cheaply transported to the coast for shipment. The country, instead of remaining, to a great extent, in a state of almost unbroken wilderness, would soon be covered with an industrious, thriving, and numerous population; large towns would spring up at all the available ports of shipment, and manufacturing villages would be established near the Railway Stations, and upon the banks of the numerous Rivers and Streams in the Province, which from their character, furnishes such an extraordinary extent of water-power, cheaply obtained, and existing for ever.

The principal Exports of the Port of Saint John from 1819 to 1825, and from 1835 to 1845, are given in the following Table. From 1825 to 1835, the returns of Exports include Saint John and Out-Ports, and it is not now possible to separate the accounts so as to exhibit the Trade of Saint John only:—

By the foregoing Table, it will be seen, that the Export Trade of Saint John is large, and steadily on the increase. As the outlet of the extensive River Saint John, and its numerous tributaries, with a Harbour never impeded by ice, the City of Saint John must always be a place of considerable importance, and one which is sure to increase as the interior of the country becomes settled.

The number of new Ships launched and registered at the Port of Saint John during the last twenty one years, will be found in the accompanying Return; and it will thereby be seen that Ship Building has been an important branch of business. The superior Steam Saw Mills in Saint John and its vicinity, supply a large proportion of the

the Spruce Deals now shipped from the Port; and that branch of manufacturing industry increases annually. The manufacture by steam power, of Pine Clap Boards and Shingles for the markets of the West Indies and the United States, has recently been commenced, and bids fair to be successful. The several Iron Foundries, (at which Steam Engines are also made,) the Grist Mills, Tanneries and Breweries in Saint John, are on a respectable scale, and all of them employ Steam Engines in their several operations. There are also in Saint John numerous workshops for Blacksmiths, Boat Builders, Carriage Makers, Sail Makers, Riggers, Carpenters, Joiners, Tailors, Shoe Makers, Painters, Cabinet Makers, Bakers, and a variety of other Mechanics and Tradesmen. It is matter of regret that no effort has yet been made to ascertain the condition of these several branches of industry, the number of persons employed, or the value of the manufactured articles they produce.

As the Commercial Capital of New Brunswick, with a Port open at all seasons of the year, the City of Saint John would naturally appear as the terminus of several Railways, extending throughout the Province in all directions. A line of Railway from Saint John to Fredericton, and thence to the Grand Falls, on the Western side of the Saint John, has already been projected, and an Act of Incorporation has been obtained, which awaits the Royal assent; but as no preliminary survey or exploration of the intended route has yet been made, no information can be offered on the line of country to be traversed.

Another Railway from Saint John to the westward, will at a future day be of importance, and a project for establishing such a line has already been some time under consideration by persons largely interested in the wilderness lands of Charlotte County, and of the western parts of Saint John and King's Counties. But the Line of Railway which in all probability will hereafter become of the greatest importance to Saint John, would be one extending to the eastward, through the fertile vale of Sussex, to Shediac, in Westmorland, and thence along the northern coast of the Province to its utmost limits. Such a Railway would connect the Port of Saint John, which is always open, with the richest Agricultural and Mineral Districts of New Brunswick; it would transport their abundant products to the place of shipment, and a market; the Salt and Gypsum of Sussex and Studholm would be rendered valuable, and the immense deposits of Iron Ore in Springfield would be brought into profitable working. The Coal Mines of Queen's County would become of the utmost consequence for smelting the Iron Ore, for working the Line, and furnishing traffic in its transport to all parts of the country. A considerable proportion of the Trade of Prince Edward Island, and of the northern portion of New Brunswick, both import and export, would pass over the Railway, as would also the products of the Fisheries in the Gulf, which might then be safely prosecuted to an almost unlimited extent.

In the absence of precise statements as to the value and extent of the numerous elements of wealth existing in the districts mentioned, few but such as have visited those districts, and ascertained the abundance of their resources in Timber, Coal, Iron, Salt, and various products of highly fertile soils, can form any just idea of the tide of riches which their development would pour in upon the City of Saint John, or the immense influence which a Railway would exercise in producing that development. To a large and valuable portion of New Brunswick, this Line of Railway would be of paramount importance, and the various matters connected with it are suggested as fitting subjects for further inquiry.

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#### COUNTY OF CHARLOTTE.

This County occupies the south west angle of New Brunswick, and is the last of the Maritime Counties which remains to be noticed. It contains 783,360 acres, of which 317,245 acres are granted and located, leaving 466,115 acres still ungranted and vacant. The population of the County in 1840 was 18,178, and the estimated quantity of cleared land 35,135 acres. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 3,786 acres.

Charlotte may be described as a hilly country, with ridges of granite rocks along its northern boundary. Yet there is much good land in the County, especially in the vallies of the numerous Rivers which intersect it in all directions. These Rivers have afforded the means of bringing large quantities of Timber from the interior to places

of shipment; and the value in pounds sterling of the Imports and Exports of the County for the last ten years are given in the following Tables:—

The Fisheries in this County, in the vicinity of West Isles, Campo Bello, and Grand Manan, are excellent, and have been prosecuted to some extent. That the exports of Fish should be so small as above stated, is somewhat singular, and requires explanation. These Fisheries might be prosecuted with advantage on a much larger scale, but they need protection against foreign aggression, and judicious encouragement. A plan for encouraging the Coast Fisheries of Ireland, has been adopted by the Irish Fishery Board, which is deserving notice. It was stated to a Committee of the House of Commons by J. Redmond Barry, Esquire, the Director General of Coast Fisheries in Ireland, that the Board had, within a few years, adopted the plan of small loans to enable the peasantry upon the coast to avail themselves of the advantage of their contiguity

contiguity to the Fisheries. Mr. Barry stated that the plan had worked admirably well. Many persons who were an incumbrance and burthen to society, no better than paupers, had become productive, useful, and industrious, and had repaid, with the most extraordinary degree of punctuality, these small loans. Mr. Barry being asked by the Committee, if there had been any other operations of the Fishery Board which had a tendency to develop and stimulate productive industry, replied that the Board had been engaged in the building of small piers upon different parts of the coast, for the purpose of encouraging the Fisheries. These piers had proved extremely useful for agricultural purposes, for landing sea manure, and for the general purposes of trade; it was added, that the piers had been built by grants in aid of local contribution.

The encouragement of the Fisheries of the Province generally is a subject of very great importance; and the establishment of Fishing Loan Funds, for aiding and assisting the poor but hardy and industrious fisherman, is a matter well worthy immediate attention.

An Agricultural Society has been established in Charlotte County nearly thirty years, and their annual Reports show that activity and enterprise have always prevailed among its Members. In the twenty third annual Report of the Society, presented in 1843, it is stated, that the bounty granted by the Society on Lime, had induced Members to try it as a manure, and wherever it had been applied on land sufficiently drained, the benefit had been obvious, and in several instances the yield of crop, especially of Wheat, had been extraordinary. One acre in the vicinity of Saint Andrews, thus treated, had yielded fifty bushels of good wheat, weighing 59lbs. per bushel.

The twenty seventh annual Report of the Society was presented on the 12th January instant, and it states that the past season having been one of the most favourable for agricultural pursuits with which the County had been blessed for many years, the different kinds of produce had amounted to a full average crop. The various kinds of grain had been very productive, and had been harvested in good condition. The potato crop in Charlotte was a total loss in the year 1845; this Report states the gratifying fact, that seed having been imported into the County, the potato crop of 1846 has been of good quality, and generally free from disease; and that with reference to the quantity planted, the crop had been a fair one.

There is abundance of both lime and marl in this County, as well as sea manure, and in those respects Charlotte possesses advantages over most other Counties in the Province.

In 1836 an Act was passed to incorporate the "Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Company," which still remains in force, and under which a Company has very recently been organized in terms of the Charter. A deputation from the promoters of this Railway proceeded to London in 1836, and submitted the project to Government, with a petition to His Majesty for aid. A sum of ten thousand pounds was thereupon granted for an Exploration and Survey of the Line, about £9,000 of which was expended in prosecuting the objects for which it was made, principally under the superintendence of Major Yule of the Royal Engineers, whose Report is extremely favourable to the undertaking.

In consequence of a remonstrance from the United States Government in 1837, further proceedings were suspended, and that suspension has continued until the past season, when measures were adopted for opening the Line as far as Woodstock, and the Company was organized.

On inspecting the Plans of Survey, and Sections of the Line prepared by the several Surveyors under Major Yule's direction, it appears, that the Survey commenced at Katy's Cove, (on the east side of the Town of Saint Andrews,) and thence proceeded on a course nearly north, to the foot of the Chamcook Lake; thence around the eastern shore of that Lake, and after crossing its inlet, thence northerly on the western shores of the second and third Chamcook Lakes, to the Valley of Waweig, which River it reaches at ten miles from the starting point; thence north eastwardly to the Valley of the Digdeguash, the western bank of which River is struck at twenty miles on the line; thence northwardly and westwardly, up the Valley of the Digdeguash, on its western side, to the sources of that River, at forty miles on the line; thence north eastwardly, through the Basin of the Little Digdeguash River, to the Valley of Cranberry Brook, which Brook is crossed precisely at the fiftieth mile; thence nearly

nearly due north, and almost on a dead level for ten miles, through the Valley of the Shugomock River, a branch of which is crossed at the sixtieth mile; thence north-westerly, through the Howard Settlement, to the north western bank of Eel River, which it touches at the seventieth mile. From this point the surveyed line followed a north west course, until near the Boundary, and thence proceeded northerly, along the Boundary between Maine and New Brunswick. In order to connect the line with the populous and thriving Village of Woodstock, it is now proposed to cross Eel River at the seventieth mile, and thence proceed on a course nearly north, until the west bank of the River Saint John is reached at or near Meductic Point; and thence to follow the level alluvial bank of the Saint John to Woodstock; the whole distance from Saint Andrews being about eighty two miles. None of the levels from Saint Andrews to Eel River exceed thirty feet per mile, being a gradient of 1 in 175.

It is proposed, at present, to commence the construction of this Railway, not at Saint Andrews, but at Waweig, ten miles from Saint Andrews, and thence proceed northwardly. There is a good harbour for shipping of the largest class at Waweig, and it is stated that each mile the Railway advances from that point, will develop abundant resources, the transportation of which to the place of shipment will render the line profitable from the commencement.

It is also proposed by the Saint Andrews Company to adopt Wooden Rails; in fact, to construct the whole Railway upon wood; and to use upon their Carriages Prosser's Patent Railway Guide Wheels, which are peculiarly adapted to Wooden Rails. The following brief description of these Guide Wheels, and of the manner of constructing the intended Railway, is condensed from information furnished by the President of the Company, and is offered as possessing peculiar interest at the present moment.

The Guide Wheels are the invention of Mr. Prosser, the Patentee, who projected them in order to improve the mode of guiding carriages along the rails, and to diminish the friction and wear and tear of machinery, thus enabling him to construct cheap lines, by the substitution of a less expensive material for rails than iron.

The four principal wheels which support the carriage are without flanges, and present a perfectly flat surface to the rail. It is evident, that upon encountering the slightest curve in the rails these wheels would be quite inadequate to keep the carriage upon its destined route. The remedy provided is in four extra, or anti-friction wheels; these are placed, two in front and two behind the carriage, upon axles, at an angle of forty five degrees with the main axles. A deep groove formed by two flanges is made in their circumference, exactly corresponding to the inner and upper angle of the rail, and thus they serve as the guiding wheels to the whole machine. When the Railway is in the direction of a right line, only one of each pair of bevel wheels can be in action at the same time, according to the tendency which the carriage may have to move on either side from the centre of the rail. On a curve, the difference is simply, that the outside bevel wheel of the front pair, and the inside one of the back pair, come into play, and counteract the disposition there is in the carriage to fly off at a tangent with the curve. Another very important function performed by the bevel wheels is, that in case of an accident occurring to the running wheels, they would act as supporters to the carriage, and carry it on in safety. In traversing curves, the advantage of the bevel wheels is stated to be very great, as with these wheels a curve of six hundred feet radius may be traversed with safety at a speed of twenty five to thirty miles per hour. The rails may be made of beech, or other hard timber, six to eight inches square, let into wooden sleepers, and secured by wooden wedges, forming one great frame or wooden grating of longitudinal and cross sleepers.

The bite of the wheel upon an iron rail is stated to depend much on the weight of the engine, which is generally made to weigh from 16 to 18 tons. This weight on moderate gradients, and at a speed of 20 or 30 miles per hour, enables it to draw from 80 to 100 tons. The carriages are built to weigh about three tons; this strength being found necessary to withstand the concussion, abrasion, and oscillation. An Engine weighing ten tons, running on wood, is alleged to have more tractive power than one weighing 18 tons running on iron; and as the concussion and abrasion is comparatively but trifling, carriages built to weigh one and a half tons will be as strong as those having to run on iron weighing three tons.

An important question connected with this subject is the durability of the materials of which the rails are composed. A short experimental line of wooden Railway was laid down near Vauxhall Bridge, and a second experimental line nearly two miles long was afterwards laid down on Wimbledon Common. The Engine employed for the experiment weighed about six tons; it passed over the rails during the two months it ran, 8000 times, in every variety of weather, which is stated to be nearly equal to seven years' traffic of twelve engines per day. The rails were made of larch, (prepared by Payne's Patent Process for preventing dry rot,) about nine feet long and six inches square; yet upon examining them after the severe test to which they had been subjected, they exhibited no appearance of wear from the friction of the wheels on the upper surface, as the saw-marks were not even effaced, nor had the bevel wheels exercised any abrasing effect on the edges, which remained as sharp and well defined as they were when first laid down.

It is stated, that the result of a series of experiments, made to ascertain the proportionate power of the bite of wood over iron, has fully borne out the assertion of the Patentee, that the bite of the driving wheel on wood, is nearly double that on iron. A consequence of this difference is, that railway trains may be propelled up much steeper inclines on a wooden railway than could be overcome on iron rails; and as the cost of making Rail Roads depends greatly on the quantity of earth to be removed, the vast expenses of deep cuttings and lofty embankments, and above all, the necessity of costly tunnels, may be avoided by the adoption of the wooden rail.

From the very level character of the country already surveyed for the Saint Andrews Railway, and the abundance of excellent Timber along the line, the Directors are impressed with the belief that they can construct a Wooden Railway to Woodstock at an average cost of one thousand pounds per mile. If a good working Railway can be constructed on this line, at even double that amount per mile, there can be very little doubt that the investment would prove an extremely profitable one. The anchorage at Waweig is the point nearest to Woodstock, which can be reached by Ship Navigation; and the great difference in distance alone must give this line several very decided advantages.

The Reports state, that there is much good vacant Land on the surveyed line of this Railway, which also passes through and near some very thriving settlements. It is also stated, that extensive groves of valuable Timber of large size exist in the vicinity of the line, which, from their situation, will probably never be brought to market, unless by means of a Railway.

A Rail Road to Woodstock, from any accessible point on the sea-board, is a matter of very great moment, as connected with the supply of the upper part of the Saint John with a large amount of Merchandize, yearly on the increase, and the ready transport to a Port of shipment of the products of the Forests, of the Soil, and of the Mines and Quarries, which may be worked extensively in the County of Carleton.

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 KING'S COUNTY.

This County contains 849,920 acres, of which 662,752 acres are granted and located, leaving 187,168 acres ungranted and vacant. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 12,896 acres. The population in 1840 was 14,464 souls; the estimated quantity of cleared land, 69,452 acres. There has been a considerable addition to this amount of cleared land since 1840, settlement and cultivation having made great advances subsequently to that period.

King's is an Agricultural County, and the land in the eastern division is of superior quality, and settling rapidly. The western division of the County, with the exception of the flourishing Parish of Greenwich, is almost in a wilderness state. The Parish of Westfield is very broken and hilly, with numerous lakes and streams, abounding, however, with valuable Timber.

There are no statements existing from which any account can be given of the quantity of agricultural produce raised annually in this County. The amount, however, must be very large, and the surplus finds a market at the City of Saint John. It has been previously stated that salt and gypsum are abundant in Sussex Vale; the deposit of iron ore near Bull Moose Hill, in Springfield, is very large, and, it is stated that the ore is of good quality. A Railway through the Vale of Sussex, even if constructed on Prosser's principle, with wooden rails, with branches or feeders from the Valleys of the Mill Stream, Smith's Creek, Ward's Creek, and Trout Creek, would open up a most valuable country, abounding in resources of every description. Among the advantages of wooden railways, not the least is the cheapness and facility of their construction, especially in a country abounding in timber well adapted for the purpose. If it be deemed more advantageous to construct long lines of railway with iron rails, still the feeders from towns or settlements within their reach, may be accommodated with railway communication, at an expense which their more limited traffic will enable them to bear. These branch railways would pour into the main line a great accession of traffic, and all parties would thus be benefited.

A great eastern line of Railway from the City of Saint John, through King's County, to Westmorland, and the Northern Counties on the Gulf Shore, would, in a few years, be maintained profitably by such feeders, which would be constantly adding to their number; and, by promoting the settlement of the country on a large scale, would increase its productions, and cause the development of its valuable resources. The County of Albert would be immensely benefited by such a line of Railway, and in return, would most certainly prove a valuable supporter, from the large quota of traffic which it alone might furnish.

The line of the proposed Railway from Saint John to Fredericton, on the western side of the River Saint John, will pass through the western division of King's County, and will, when constructed, lead to the immediate settlement of the great wilderness district in that part of the County.

The valuable quarries of excellent granite, now largely worked at the head of the Long Reach, must not be omitted in estimating the resources of King's County.

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 QUEEN'S COUNTY.

The great extent of rich alluvial land in Queen's County renders it exceedingly valuable for all the pursuits of agriculture. The quantity of land in this County is 961,280 acres, of which 514,204 acres are granted and located, and 477,076 acres remain ungranted and vacant. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845, was 5,793 acres, all in small lots, chiefly for immediate settlement. The greatest quantity sold to one individual in that year, was 265 acres; two lots of 200 acres each were sold to settlers, and all the remaining quantity was disposed of in lots of 25 acres and upwards.

The population of Queen's County in 1840, was 8,232 souls, and the estimated quantity of cleared land, 43,089 acres. The population and quantity of cleared land have been steadily on the increase since the census of 1840, and the population of the County is now estimated at nearly 12,000 souls.

This County has furnished the Port of Saint John with large supplies of Timber for a great number of years, and appears likely to do so for some time to come.

There is stated to be an extensive bed of iron ore at Coote Hill, to the westward of the River Saint John in this County, which requires further examination, no researches having yet been made to ascertain the extent of the deposit, or the value of the ore. As connected with Railways, every deposit of iron ore in New Brunswick now requires to be carefully examined.

In almost every part of Queen's County, east of the River Saint John, a seam of coal has been found at 20 or 30 feet from the surface, varying from 18 to 21 inches in thickness. This coal is highly bituminous, possessing the rich caking qualities of the Newcastle coal of England, and has, at different places and periods, been worked to some extent. Researches have also been made to ascertain if thicker beds of coal existed at a greater depth from the surface, and, on one occasion, the borings were continued to the depth of 410 feet, passing through several thin seams of coal, but without indicating a thick bed. There is some reason to believe, however, that the borings were not made in the best situations, or that the parties conducting the borings had neither sufficient skill or science for so important an undertaking. The existence of deep beds of coal in this County remains to be determined; but, in the meantime, the actual presence of a seam of good quality, easily worked, and extending over a wide extent of country, is a most important fact in connection with the proposed establishment of Railways, and is a matter of the greatest consequence to Queen's County, and to the Province.

An Agricultural Society has been but recently established in Queen's County; but no statements exist from which the amount of the annual Agricultural products of the County can be ascertained.

A striking instance, well authenticated, of the progress made by an Emigrant who settled in this County some years since, having lately come to the writer's knowledge, it is here mentioned, not as a solitary case, but as one among many others of similar character, and as exemplifying what may be effected by prudence and industry in New Brunswick.

The Emigrant landed at Saint John from Scotland, in the year 1820, with a wife and five children, (the oldest 13 years of age,) but without any means. He obtained employment during the summer as a Stone Mason's labourer, and by the most severe economy and frugality, saved the sum of eighteen pounds in that Season. With this sum he procured a grant of Land in the New Jerusalem Settlement, then first forming in Queen's County, and went to his lot in the Wilderness, three miles distant from any settler. He had no neighbour for three years, nor during that time any road to his clearing; and it was some time after that before anything approaching to good roads were opened or made. Yet here he pursued a steady course of industry, his family increasing to eleven in number, five boys and six girls, some of whom have married, and he has been able to settle them comfortably by giving them Farms and an outfit. This settler now owns 500 acres of Land, part of which is in a good state of cultivation, with three Farm-houses, five Barns, an Oat Mill and Kiln, and a large amount of Stock upon it. A valuation of this Emigrant's property was made in this month of January, 1847, for the purpose of a division among the children, and, at a moderate estimate, was found to amount to three thousand pounds. A large family has been brought up decently and comfortably, and are now in a position to become independent and wealthy.

The extreme Western portion of Queen's County, like that of King's, is nearly all in wilderness state. The proposed Railway from Saint John to Fredericton will probably traverse this portion, and in such case will add materially to its value and importance.

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#### COUNTY OF SUNBURY.

When the whole Province of New Brunswick formed a part of Nova Scotia, it was designated the County of Sunbury. At present, the County bearing that name is the smallest in New Brunswick, with the exception of Saint John. It contains 782,080 acres, of which 377,078 acres are granted and located, and 405,002 acres remain ungranted

ungranted and vacant. The population in 1840 was 4,260 souls, and the quantity of cleared land 12,262 acres. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 2,114 acres, in lots from 50 to 130 acres, except one lot of 240 acres.

Lumbering has always been followed by the inhabitants of this County to a greater or less extent, and greatly to the neglect of agriculture. The first British settlement in New Brunswick was made in 1762 on the alluvial banks of the River Saint John, in what are now styled the Parishes of Maugerville and Sheffield. The Report of the Sunbury Agricultural Society for 1842, says—"Much remains to be effected in removing prejudice, and producing reform. There are still allotments of land, containing 500 acres each, which have been settled or occupied from 50 to 70 years, which have not yet 30 acres cultivated, although in the centre of the Province, and bounded on the beautiful River Saint John, within ten miles of Fredericton. Thousands of acres of valuable alluvial land in this County are still unreclaimed, and there are many acres of old worn-out meadow-land which has been annually mown in the summer, and pastured in the fall, for more than 50 years, without ever having been ploughed in that time, and which, although naturally a superior soil, now produces but a light crop; and we still see the barnyard drained across the highway into the river, to the great annoyance of the traveller, and loss of the owner."

Some of the finest land in this County is on the North and South Branches of the Oromocto, and many farms there, for picturesque beauty and fertility, may compare with any in the Province. The new Settlements, too, in that quarter, are in a thriving condition; and farming, generally, appears to be there conducted in a more thorough and energetic manner than in that part of the County which has been long settled.

The writer had occasion to examine this part of Sunbury last season, and can state that the rivers generally flow through wide valleys, with very level alluvial land in the bottom, and gently sloping hills bounding them on either side. Through these valleys a more direct and much more level route between Fredericton and Saint John can be found than by the Nerepis Road. A series of bye roads now pass through the Maryland Settlement, the Rushagonis Settlement, and thence, by Hart's Mills, to the valley of the South Branch, whence the valley of Back Creek is followed through the Patterson Settlement, and down the valley of the Douglas to the Nerepis Road, a short distance above the Eagle Cliffs, at the Bridge over the Douglas River. The distance between the Seat of Government and the City of Saint John, by this route, is only sixty miles, instead of sixty five by the Nerepis Road; and it has the advantage of being a much more level country, where a good road can be readily and cheaply made, with no large rivers to cross, and no danger of the road being rendered impassible by back-water in the spring. This line of country offers great facilities for the establishment of an excellent line of great road between Saint John and Fredericton; and the promoters of the New Brunswick Railway will doubtless avail themselves of the advantages it offers for their line of Railway.

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#### YORK COUNTY.

This is one of the largest Counties in the Province, containing 2,201,600 acres, of which 940,914 acres are granted and located, and 1,230,686 acres remain vacant and at the disposal of Government. The population in 1840, was 13,995 souls, and the estimated quantity of cleared Land, 44,818 acres. The population of the Parish of Fredericton in 1840, was 4,002 souls; but the Town of Fredericton alone is now supposed to contain 6,000 souls.

Although Lumbering has been prosecuted to some extent by the people of York, yet Agriculture has not been altogether neglected. As the capabilities of the County are great, and it possesses some advantages in being placed almost in the centre of the Province, in a favorable position on the River Saint John, and with the Seat of Government within its limits, Farming has been prosecuted to some extent, and with marked success.

An average crop of Oats in this County, of the best quality, is stated to be thirty bushels to the acre; but in the season of 1846, there were fields in and near Fredericton which yielded sixty bushels to the acre. In 1842, before the Potato disease was known, land of good quality, in proper condition, yielded an average of six hundred bushels

bushels of Potatoes per acre. The Wheat crop in this County has suffered greatly from the ravages of the Weevil of late years. The weight of a bushel of Wheat grown in York averages about sixty pounds. The Potato crop, which was almost an entire failure in 1845, suffered but partially in 1846; it is hoped that if the season of 1847 prove favorable, the disease will disappear altogether.

Two very striking instances of the success attending the formation of new Settlements in the Wilderness, by associations of Settlers, having the privilege of making their own Roads at a reasonable rate, can be adduced in this County. The Harvey Settlement was formed in 1837 by a party of Emigrants from the North of England, who landed in New Brunswick in a very destitute condition. A Report upon this Settlement was presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Honorable L. A. Wilmot, the Commissioner who formed it, on the 9th February, 1844, accompanied by a statistical Return. This Report states, that it is shewn by the Return, that from land where not a tree was felled in July, 1837, there had been taken, during the preceding autumn, 260 tons of Hay and Straw, and 15,000 bushels of Grain, Potatoes and Turnips; and that the great success which had attended the labours of these industrious and valuable Settlers, afforded an unquestionable proof of what might be done on the millions of Wilderness Land in New Brunswick. The Return shows the number of Settlers to be forty five, and the value of their improvements to be £4,289 10s. The Settlers accompanied the original Return with the following observations:—"The climate of New Brunswick agrees well with the constitution of Englishmen; the air is salubrious, and the water as pure and wholesome as any in the world. During the six years of our location but two deaths have occurred, while there have been thirty nine births without the presence of Medical aid. Six years' experience have convinced us, that notwithstanding the privations to which new Settlers are exposed, diligence and perseverance must ensure success."

The "Teetotal Settlement" was formed in 1842, under the same Commissioner, by a party of destitute Emigrants from the South of Ireland. In a Report from the Commissioner, dated 25th January, 1844, it is thus stated:—"The results of this the second effort in which I have been engaged in forming Settlements in the Wilderness, have afforded me the most unmingled satisfaction. Where but two years ago stood a dense forest, there have been gathered by thirty five Settlers, during the past autumn, 7,236 bushels of Grain, Potatoes and Turnips. The accompanying Return shews an estimated value of £1,137 in buildings and clearings, and when there is added to this the market value of the crop, exceeing £800, we have about £2,000 return (exclusive of the making four and a quarter miles of Road) from a tract of Land, which in its wilderness state, would not in the same time have produced one shilling. I cannot now consider the successful occupation of our Wild Lands by associated bodies of Settlers, having the privilege of making their own Roads at a reasonable rate, as a doubtful experiment. No antagonist theory can prevail against the practical experience which can now be referred to. Similar management must produce similar results, and I am well persuaded, that no other system is so well calculated to promote the improvement of our millions of wilderness acres, and thus to advance the population and commerce of the Province."

The central position of the Town of Fredericton, its importance as the Seat of Government, its recent establishment as a Free Port for the admission of British Vessels, and the advantages of its situation with reference to the Great Highway of the River Saint John, point it out as an eligible focus for Railways extending to various parts of the Province. The New Brunswick Railway already mentioned, is one of these. Another eligible line might be formed by passing up the valley of the Nashwaak, thence across the Portage to Boiestown, there to connect with a Railway from the Towns on the lower part of the Miramichi. The determination of a line for the Trunk Railway from the Atlantic to Quebec would also determine the various branch lines which might be profitably formed to intersect that line, and act as feeders for its support.

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**COUNTY OF CARLETON.**

This is by far the largest County in the Province, containing no less than 5,292,000 acres, of which 811,402 acres are granted and located, and the remaining 4,480,598 acres are vacant, and at the disposal of Government. A portion of this County, containing by estimate, 2,700,000 acres, (of which 280,600 acres have been, at various times, granted and located by the Province of New Brunswick,) has been claimed by the Province of Canada since the settlement of the Disputed Boundary with the United States by the Treaty of Washington. The Government of New Brunswick has ever exercised jurisdiction over this portion now claimed by Canada, and has borne all expenses occasioned by its management and protection. A portion of New Brunswick which lies north of the Restigouche, and eastward of the due north line from the monument, is not included in the estimate of the number of acres in Carleton.

An Act of Assembly was passed in 1844, with a suspending clause, for erecting the upper part of this County into a separate County, by the name of Victoria; but, owing to the unsettled state of Boundary with Canada, the Act has not yet come into operation.

The population of the County of Carleton in 1840 was 13,381 souls, and the estimated quantity of cleared land, 49,553 acres. The quantity of vacant land sold in 1845 was 5,871 acres, all, with one exception, in lots less than 200 acres.

An Agricultural Society was established in this County six years since, and the Annual Reports show that the members have been both active and diligent. The soil of Carleton, generally, is of very superior quality, and the portion already cleared and cultivated produces crops of Grain and Potatoes quite equal to any in the Province, both in quantity and quality. Some very superior Stock has also been introduced by Charles Perley, Esquire, who, at very considerable expense, has imported animals of the best breed in the United Kingdom, and thereby greatly improved, not only the stock of this County, but the stock of several other Counties. The County of Carleton, from this gentleman's spirited exertions, may boast the best breeding stock in New Brunswick.

There is some land of very superior quality in the Valley of the Tobique, which, as yet, is almost wholly in a wilderness state. Whenever this Valley is rendered accessible to settlers by highways or Railways, it will be one of the districts to which there will be a rush of settlers.

There are extensive deposits of gypsum on the Tobique River, and very fine slate for roofing purposes near its confluence with the River Saint John. Near Woodstock there is a deposite of iron ore, which the Geologists of Maine have ascertained to be of very great extent, and of excellent quality. The County of Carleton furnishes a large proportion of the squared Pine Timber sent down the River Saint John, and it possesses an almost inexhaustible supply of the best Timber of all descriptions. The establishment of Railways from Saint Andrews and Saint John, or from either, to Woodstock, will throw open the vast resources of this County in Timber and Iron, and rapidly develop its agricultural capabilities. As a station for supplying the upper country on the Saint John River, Woodstock is of some importance. The formation of Railways from Saint John or Saint Andrews, would almost certainly lead to the establishment of other Railways from Woodstock to the Grand Falls, (another most important station,) to Boiestown, and to Campbellton, and Dalhousie, on the Restigouche, with which it is highly desirable a communication across the country should be opened.

So great an extent of this County remains in a wilderness state, that it is difficult to state its resources or capabilities; but from what is already known, it may be safely stated that they are not inferior to those of any other County in New Brunswick.

**Report and Estimate concerning an Electro-Magnetic Telegraph between  
Fredericton and Saint John,**

*Addressed to Sir William M. G. Colebrooke, K. H., &c. &c., Lieutenant Governor of the Province  
of New Brunswick.*

*Fredericton, 25th January, 1847.*

SIR,—At the desire of Your Excellency we have prepared a short Report upon a line of Telegraphic communication between Fredericton and Saint John.

It has been drawn up with as much care as the novelty of the subject, and the means of judging at our command have allowed, and, in submitting it, we desire to say that it will always be our anxious wish to assist Your Excellency in forwarding this most important and laudable undertaking.

A revolution in the Telegraphic system has been recently effected by the aid of a force called Electro-Magnetism, and this application of the force in question, seems to be fraught with consequences not less important to mankind than those which have resulted from the application of steam to the purposes of locomotion.

The Electro-Magnetic Telegraph can be made to convey intelligence in a few or in many words, on matters of trivial or of vital importance, openly or with secrecy, for one or for one thousand miles, by night or by day, in winter or summer, at a cost not greater than is incurred by the present Post Office system, and with a velocity which is only comparable to that of a thought or a sensation, or to a ray of light, or a flash of lightning.

Not only are all these marvellous effects asserted to be possible, but they have been demonstrated, and are capable of being realized wherever it is thought worth while to try.

The value of such a mode of transmitting intelligence cannot be over-estimated, and we feel confident that, within a few years, the adoption of this system will become general in all civilized countries. The thoughts, the feelings, and the wishes of one man will be conveyed to another, one hundred miles off, as fast as they can be uttered or intelligibly expressed to himself, or to his nearest neighbour, and we will at length have acquired a power over time and space as great as that which we have already acquired over matter.

As these remarks are based upon a consideration of what has been already achieved and done by means of the Electro-Magnetic Telegraph, it remains still to determine whether the importance of the communications between any two given places is sufficient to justify the outlay required to secure the advantages of such rapid transmission.

Although we do not feel that it is our province to decide upon the importance of the communications now going on between the Seat of Government and the chief seat of Commerce in New Brunswick, yet we cannot refrain from stating our decided conviction that, if the present communications are not of sufficient importance, the mere fact of the establishment of an Electro-Magnetic Telegraph would soon make them so.

These considerations are entirely apart from any that might attach to a line of Railway from Saint John to Fredericton, or to the connection of our Telegraphic Circuit with others from Quebec to Fredericton, or from Saint John to Halifax; we speak at present in favour of a line between this place and Saint John, and of that line as being worthy of immediate adoption.

By the estimate which we have attempted to make, the cost of construction and maintenance for the first year would not much exceed five thousand pounds currency, and the permanent charges would not exceed one thousand pounds a-year, so that we may be justified in saying that the outlay is not great in comparison of the public advantages which would result from its establishment.

But it is not all expenditure: there is a certainty of considerable returns, at both termini, in the course of every year. If these exceeded the interest on the money expended, it might fairly be asked whether, in view of the responsibility connected therewith, the Government was not entitled to secure and maintain the Telegraph as a source of Provincial Revenue; or, supposing that the returns did not cover the interest on the investment, whether the Government ought not to assume the loss, in consideration of the public benefit derived therefrom. It is to be doubted, after all, whether private parties would be likely to take up an enterprise of so novel a character; whether

whether they could give it the same title to public confidence; or whether they could, so efficiently as the Government, protect it against wanton or malicious injury.

There has been considerable difficulty in preparing the estimate herewith annexed, and there are several of the rates which we state with great diffidence; yet, on the whole, we apprehend that the general charge will be found adequate to meet the several heads of expenditure.

It will be necessary to make some further explanatory remarks upon the various charges, which, it will be seen, refer—1st, to the apparatus and the wires; 2nd, to the posts which sustain the wires; and, lastly, to the salaries and office expenditure.

The system which we advise for adoption in New Brunswick is that of Professor Morse, of New York. His method is not only cheaper than all the others, but likewise excels them in the important peculiarity which it offers of *registering upon paper* all Telegraphic communications.\*

It would be only fair to Professor Morse to ascertain how far the adoption of his system in this country, without reference to him, would prejudice his rights. At all events, we are not now prepared to recommend any system which does not *register upon paper* the Telegraphic dispatch.

We suggest that a double circuit should be established in the first instance, and that this be attempted with two wires only, the earth being, by a peculiar arrangement, rendered available in both circuits. If a third wire, or other circuits, were found to be necessary, they could be added at any time, and at an outlay for the wire only.

The estimate has been made out for a line of sixty five miles, which, we believe, is the length of the route to Saint John, by the valley of the Nerepis River; and we have preferred the present highway to any other line, because it is already well cleared of trees, and, therefore, less likely to endanger the wires and posts by "windfalls," &c. A shorter line through the woods might, no doubt, be found; but, in such a rough country, and in such a tempestuous climate, it would be liable to accidents which would be always difficult to detect, and almost impossible speedily to repair. On the present highway the wires would always be under inspection, and there would be no difficulty in proceeding with any occasional repairs.

By the route proposed, the wires would keep the right bank of the River Saint John as far as the Falls, where nature has very greatly favored their transmission across the River to the City of Saint John.

We suggest that posts, eight inches square below, six inches square above, and about twenty feet long, with a board capping (to prevent the lodgment of water or ice about the wires) and strongly braced, and loaded with two or three tons of stone, should be set upon the ground, at distances not exceeding two hundred feet apart. Where the ground is favorable for sinking, the posts might be set in the ground, but it would be necessary to enter them to the depth of five or six feet, a cross sill having been previously fixed at their lower extremity, to prevent the disturbing action of the frozen soil upon them.

Where the posts are thus sunk, we conceive that a considerable saving might be effected in the estimated charges for scantling, for framing, and for loading with stones.

Whatever method of securing the posts is adopted, it must never be forgotten that their stability and sufficiency are of paramount importance.

It would seem, at first sight, that metallic tubes placed under ground would be safer and better conductors of the wires; but the expense of trenching and the difficulty of seeing and remedying defects, forbid their adoption in the present case.

If the Telegraph was adopted by Government, and put under the control of the Post Office authorities, we imagine that the requisite accommodation for the apparatus might readily be found in their offices, at the respective termini; and the charges for transmission of correspondence and intelligence need not exceed the average rate under the present method.

The salary of the Chief Superintendent of construction ought not to be less than £500. His familiarity with all the chemical and mechanical details must be undoubted; while his personal presence on the line would be continually required, and no portion of the work could be completed without his most thorough supervision and warranty. The above charge need not, however, become a permanent one, although those for the

the Clerks and Messengers undoubtedly would remain. The Clerks would have to acquire a familiarity not only with the Telegraphic characters, but also with the details of the galvanic battery and register.

The estimated average cost per mile of this line is considerably greater than that which has been adopted as the ground of action elsewhere; but it does not at present seem possible to establish a double circuit in this Province at any thing so low as £41 per mile.

SIR,—In reply to Your Excellency's note of the 30th ultimo, requesting us to extend our estimate for an Electro-Magnetic Telegraph from Saint John to Halifax, we beg to state for Your Excellency's information, that we are inclined to believe that it might be continued at nearly the same rate of outlay as that at which we have already estimated it between Fredericton and Saint John.

The distance from this place to Saint John, by the Nerepis Road, is 65 miles, or exactly one fifth part of the distance from here to Halifax, so that the charge for establishing the whole Line of Telegraphic communication from here to Halifax, would be somewhere near £25,000.

It will be seen that our estimate for this distance is as great as that assumed by the parties in Quebec, as sufficient for the whole Line from Quebec to Halifax, but we frankly avow our inability to reduce it to a figure so low, and we doubt whether they can have taken up the details of the subject with sufficient accuracy. They also seem to think that a short saving of distance by the Metis Road and the Gulf Shore, might induce them to carry a Line in that direction, but while all the difficulties of maintaining the Line in an unsettled country would thus be greatly increased, almost all the advantages

advantages of a Telegraph would be lost to this Province. Thus we at once decide against the feasibility of any Line in the direction above referred to.

In the present state of our knowledge regarding the maximum distance to which the powers of a Galvanic Battery and its conducting wires are limited in practice, it would be premature to decide minutely upon the number of points or stations along the Line, where it would be necessary to take up and repeat the Telegraphic Despatch; but as it will always be a matter of the greatest consequence to be able to discover where interruptions have arisen, it would not be prudent to place these repeating stations more than sixty or seventy miles apart. In this view of the case, one repeating station between Saint John and the Nova Scotia Frontier, would be sufficient, and again, another between that point and Halifax, making in all, three stations intermediate between Saint John and Halifax.

The small outlay required for this undertaking, when compared with the immense advantages which must accrue from it, seem to warrant us in the belief that it might be proceeded with immediately. If there was a Line of Railway actually in existence, no doubt the Telegraphic Line would accompany it; but as many years must elapse before the Rail Road is completed, it becomes a matter of consideration whether the Telegraph should be doomed to the inevitable delay to which the other is obviously subject: and again, were the present plan adopted, the commercial advantages of the Telegraph would be at once secured at places which the Line of Rail Road might not probably approach.

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**Reports of Mr. Wilkinson on Electro-Magnetic Telegraphs and Railways  
in the United States.**

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*Fredericton, 24th February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In obedience to an instruction communicated to me, at the instance of Your Excellency, on the 8th ultimo, that I would take the opportunity of my intended visit to the United States, to obtain for the Government such practical details respecting the construction and expense of Wooden Railways and the Electric Telegraph, as would be likely to be useful in reference to the project of establishing the same in this Province, I have, with a view to these objects, employed the necessarily short period at my command, embraced in a month's absence, including going and returning.

In order to report to Your Excellency in a manner sufficiently full and intelligible, with regard to both Railway and Telegraph, it is probable that a longer time will be necessary than may be desirable in relation the Telegraph separately.

As I was in fact prevented by want of time from applying to all the sources of information I should have wished to consult respecting the Telegraph, I am the less disposed to speak minutely on the details of construction, or to claim for my observations generally higher authority than would be due to those of any intelligent observer of what is passing amongst our neighbours, during an excursion of a few days through the most populous, active and improved parts of their country. I therefore beg Your Excellency's permission the more generally to treat of this object, and to report on the other separately, and with the more particular consideration which, I trust, it will be found to claim.

The Magnetic Telegraph is now so well established, and its results have become so divested of uncertainty, that it can no longer be considered as a subject belonging only to the progressive investigations of science. Like other high achievements which have preceded it, it is now in full energy, exerting and daily extending its influence upon the affairs and relationships of communities and of the world, but more than all others does it exhibit a capacity of rapid and universal extension.

In the year 1844 the first American line of Telegraph was completed by Professor Morse, of the United States, under the sanction of Government, and extended between the Cities of Washington and Baltimore, a distance of forty miles. This experimental line fulfilled all that was promised by its projector; but continued the only one in operation until the Spring of 1846, when, by the exertions of Joint Stock Associations, Philadelphia and New York were also connected with the Cities first named; and from that time, within a few short months, the system embraces an extent of upwards of thirteen hundred miles, connecting the following important points of the United States and Canada:—

From New York to New Haven, Hartford, Springfield and Boston,....	265

In addition to these, besides several contemplated inferior Lines, a principal one of nearly 1400 miles is represented as already contracted for, and most probably is in progress, extending from Washington, by way of Charleston and Mobile, to New Orleans. In fact no Schedule of Telegraphic Lines can now be relied upon for a month in succession, as hundreds of miles may be added in that space of time. So easy of attainment does such a result appear to be, and so lively the interest felt in its accomplishment, that it is scarcely doubtful that the whole of the populous parts of the United States will, within two or three years, be covered with a Telegraphic network, like a spider's web, suspending its principal threads upon important points along the sea-board of the Atlantic on one side, and upon similar points along the Lake frontier on the other. The experiment has proved that no important intelligence of general interest could touch any one point, but that, if need be, it would be instantly and simultaneously understood at every other point of such a system. This is assuming, however, that a net-work so liable to derangement by accident or by wanton injury, is at the moment in perfect working order. It is found not to be exempt from such occasional derangement; yet that the defect is, in most instances, such only as may be speedily detected and repaired. The whole range of wire being exposed to observation along a public way, it can be examined nearly as rapidly as the inspector can travel by the ordinary modes of conveyance adapted to such way.

This difficulty is therefore not considered of much weight against the more important recommendations of the Telegraph as at present constructed. It is besides surrounded by the moral and social protection of a well-understood common interest and benefit; so that a wilful injury to the Telegraph would bring upon its author, if detected, besides the proper civil penalty, also the disgrace which would be due to an odious offence against the public.

The confidence in the efficiency of Telegraphic communication has now become so established, that the most important commercial transactions daily transpire, by its means, between correspondents several hundred miles apart. Ocular evidence of this was afforded me by a communication a few minutes old between a merchant in Toronto, and his correspondent in New York, distant about 632 miles. The advantages of this rapid mode of communicating and of spreading intelligence, are also not less experienced by other classes, and especially by the farmer, who can thus, as promptly as the merchant, avail himself of a knowledge of changes in the market. This effect was remarked after the arrival of the *Hibernia* last month, with heavy orders for agricultural produce, and the news of the scarcity in Great Britain, Ireland, and elsewhere. Within four days from the time of the Steamer having touched at Boston, and almost as soon as the news could ordinarily have reached them, the farmers from the interior

of the State of New York, informed of the state of things by the Magnetic Telegraph, were thronging the streets of Albany with innumerable team-loads of grain, whilst the freight-trains of the Railways from thence to New York and to Boston, were wholly inadequate either to the conveyance of the accumulating supply, or to meet the urgent demands at the shipping ports.

From such general facts alone it may be inferred that the extension of the Magnetic Telegraph between important points, has not only so far been practically advantageous and successful, but, on the Great Lines at least, financially a good investment. The profits, in fact, are represented to exceed, on some Lines, the expectations of the projectors; but no authentic statements, I believe, have yet been put forward. The first dividend publicly declared on Telegraphic Stock is said to be on behalf of the New York and Buffalo Company, being 3 per cent. for the first four months—from 7th September, 1846, to the 7th January, 1847. It must be understood, however, that the right of the Patentees is agreed at one-half, whence the dividend of 3 per cent. to the Stockholders is only half the actual profit. This right does not at present extend to the British Provinces; yet all lines established in the latter would undoubtedly more or less contribute to the profit of those Lines which are beneficial to the Patentees. The claim of the American Patentees is chiefly, if not solely, to the mode of registration, which, because more simple, efficient, and certain than European modes, has been altogether adopted in the United States. But another mode is, I believe, before the public, claiming the superiority of legibly printing at once, on slips of paper, the ordinary letters of the alphabet, instead of the substitutes of lines and dots.

To this assumed improvement, however, Professor Morse has himself devoted much study; and, though he admits it to be practicable, does not acknowledge it to be susceptible of equality with his Telegraphic alphabet for the purpose of rapid communication; and that such improvement can besides be attained only at the expense of simplicity, and consequently increased risk of derangement in the mechanism employed. For these reasons he considers it unlikely to supersede the Register at present in use.

There is, however, another difficulty in the way of adopting different modes of registration, not very dissimilar to that of the break of gauge on Railways; wherever it occurs a certain delay must be the consequence. No doubt a method of printing the letters of the Roman alphabet at once, if unattended with any serious practical objection or difficulty, would be preferable to any other, and it would be desirable that its adoption should be general. But when a different system, answering so well, has already been widely extended, some time would be necessary to effect a change. Within the British Provinces, where Telegraphic communication has only commenced, any approved method might be adopted with less disadvantage, as only one point of communication, that by way of the Niagara, with the whole American system, would perhaps be established for some years to come. At that point only would the interruption and re-transmission of each communication be necessary, but would unavoidably incur serious delays when communications should follow each other in uninterrupted succession, unless the two modes of registration were equal to each other in point of dispatch. The accumulation of delay would vanish in the proportion that this equality should be attained; and when perfected, the inconvenience would be reduced simply to the loss of time incurred by each re-transmission.

With regard to the method and the expense of construction of Lines of Telegraph, the extensive demand in the United States has there created a class of persons who have acquired skill and experience which enable them to contract at a moderate rate for Lines of any extent, including all materials, excepting the Registers and Batteries, which make comparatively a small part of the whole cost of a long Line. The New York, Albany and Buffalo Line is reputed to be one of the most efficient in the United States. From such information as I deem to be reliable, the portion of this Line between New York and Albany was constructed by sub-contractors at about \$125 per mile, including all materials, with two Copper wires of 100lbs. each to the mile.

A Line between Halifax and Quebec, along the only Post Road at present in use, 668 miles, estimated at the same rate, would cost as follows:—

To the above must be added the expense of cutting down trees which may be likely to fall within range of the wires. On the whole Line of the Saint Lawrence, from Quebec to River du Loup, the Road passes through cleared country. A very large proportion of the remainder of the Line to Halifax is also cleared; but an examination would be necessary in order to judge safely of the expense of clearing away such trees and such portions of the forest as might interfere with the wires.

I am personally ignorant of the character of the land route from Saint John to Halifax; but, assuming the obstacles on an average on that portion of the Line not to exceed the same from River du Loup to Saint John, I should conceive that it would, by judicious arrangements, cost less than £5,000 to remove the whole; and that this sum, with the view to an approximate estimate, may be assumed as a maximum. This would make the total cost of the Line £26,200.

The number of intermediate stations suggested may not at all times be so much demanded by the Telegraphic business at those points, as by the efficient preservation of the Line in working order, and the promptitude they will afford in detecting and repairing injuries. They may also beneficially promote, through the interior country, an intelligent appreciation of the merits of the Telegraph, and create a common interest in the security and perfect working of the Line at all times.

In order to judge of the extent of business necessary to yield a revenue equivalent to the above expense, the Tariff of the New York, Albany and Buffalo Line may be taken as a guide. (Copy annexed.)

Assuming that the Telegraph shall be in operation 300 days in the year, then 188 communications per day, or equal to 94 in each direction, of not exceeding 15 words each, transmitted the whole length of the Line, or 134 communications per day, or equal to 67 in each direction, if exceeding 15 words each, transmitted the whole length of the Line, charged at the rate of 2s. 6d. each for the former, and 3s. 6d. each for the latter, for transmission and delivery, would be necessary to yield the required Revenue: that is to say, without reliance upon profits from the intermediate stations, yet which may prove to be of importance.

In order to estimate the time which the transaction of the above extent of business would occupy at each of the extreme stations, we may take the 94 communications from each to be composed of 7,050 characters; which, at the rate of 80 characters per minute, would require 88 minutes for the transmission, an equal time being simultaneously occupied for writing out and delivery. But a skilful operator can transmit on emergency 100 to 120, or even more characters per minute, or equivalent to the above 7,050 in about an hour.

Gentlemen engaged in mercantile affairs in the principal sea-ports of the British Provinces, are the most competent judges whether the average of about one hour per day be the extreme probable employment that will be given to a line of Telegraph capable of transmitting in both directions, when connected with Montreal and Toronto, almost instantaneous intelligence between all these places and the several ports of the

Atlantic

Atlantic coast, from the Gulf of Saint Lawrence to the Gulf of Mexico. Also rendering the arrival of a British Packet at Halifax equivalent in the effect of the intelligence with which she may be charged, to her arrival at New Orleans, and at every telegraphic station nearly at the same time; and again, her departure from Halifax to Europe, equivalent, in point of intelligence, to her departure, nearly at the same instant, from all the important points of North America.

With regard to the time that would be necessary for the construction of a Line of Telegraph between Quebec and Halifax, all the poles might be deposited in their places, and all materials be nearly in a state of readiness before the present frost be out of the ground; after which the progress of the work will depend much upon the arrangements made and the force employed. If so desired by the respective Provincial Legislatures, and the gentlemen who may actively interest themselves in the accomplishment of the object, and provided the necessary exertions be ordinarily prosperous, the whole line may be fit for the transmission of intelligence by the end of July next.

I have estimated for the cost of a line by way of the Post Road at present used by Her Majesty's Mails, chiefly because the route appears to offer facilities for the prompt construction, and afterwards for the management and preservation of the line, at materially less expense than seems to be practicable by any other route, whether shorter or longer, no other being as yet so well settled or free from natural obstacles. The opening of any other and more eligible line is merely a question of expense. The difference with respect to local objects would be comparatively small.

If I may be permitted to express an opinion as to the reason assigned for preferring a line remote from the American frontier, I should say that it is in a material degree founded in misconception. From the observations already made, it is manifest that there is and must be a common interest in the security and success of such a line, as the principal or trunk line of the most rapid communication between the whole of this Continent and Europe. Our interest in partaking freely of the advantages of the whole American system cannot be less important to us than a like interest in our system to them.

For the present the British Mail is transmitted through New England to Montreal, but the establishment of Railway communication for the same object through the Provinces, will no doubt embrace also the means of telegraphic communication. Yet, independently of this, it is true with regard to both the immediate and prospective importance of a line of Telegraph by way of the Metis, that it holds out the recommendation of touching at several ports along the eastern coast between Quebec and Halifax, and thus promises to benefit in a high degree the shipping and commerce of the River and Gulf of Saint Lawrence, whilst the distance being nearly the same, the heavier cost of constructing and protecting the line, might not, upon investigation, seem to outweigh its advantages; and if once in operation, the same consideration of utility would tend to ensure its permanence, even after a more direct line along the route of the Railway may be established. Should the coast line, therefore, be at all events preferred in Canada, these may be reasons for concurring in its adoption:

In the mean time it is our obvious policy to inspire and advance our frontier population by the encouragement amongst them of every judicious enterprise that may tend to such a result.

All which is with great deference submitted.

(SUPPLEMENTARY.)

Since closing the foregoing Report, I have, at Your Excellency's request, perused the Report and Estimate of Doctors Robb and Toldervy, dated on the 25th ultimo, with regard to a Telegraphic line between Fredericton and Saint John. In their Report generally I entirely concur, excepting with regard to the expense of constructing the line mentioned. In the absence of other data for their guidance, they have very properly, and of necessity, founded their estimate upon the circumstances of perfect novelty and inexperience involved in the undertaking in this Province. They have consequently assumed to be necessary to the efficiency of the Telegraph certain precautions, materially enhancing the cost, which experience in the United States has proved to be dispensable.

1. The insulating of the extended wire, (except at the points of suspension.)
2. The bracing, framing, planing, ballasting, &c. of the poles.

It is found to be sufficient to use a simple pole of Oak, Hemlock, Pine, Spruce, or Hacmatack, in its rough state, with the branches merely trimmed off, and measuring about thirty feet long, eight inches diameter at the butt, and four to six inches at the top. This is inserted in a hole about five feet deep, made by a boring tool contrived for the purpose. Such poles may be obtained in this Province, delivered where required, at from 8d. to 1s. 3d. each, according to situation.

The additional expense of Kyanizing or Paynizing might be advisable. The expense of the former process, which is found to be efficient, is about equal to 2½d. currency per cubic foot. It would probably enhance the cost of the poles about 50s. or 60s. per mile.

Whilst the experiment was yet untried in the United States, Professor Morse estimated the expense of constructing a line on poles at \$350 to \$400 per mile; but, including every thing, the actual cost of the line between Washington and Baltimore largely

largely exceeded this estimate; involving as it did, numerous expenditures of an experimental character. Profiting by the experience thus obtained, and by still more extended trials, it is now found practicable in the United States to construct an efficient line at the comparatively trifling cost exhibited in the Estimate which I have submitted to Your Excellency.

I believe it would not be found difficult to contract with competent persons in the United States to construct a long line at that rate, but probably for a shorter one a higher rate might be demanded.

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**Report to His Excellency Sir W. M. G. Colebrooke, K. H., &c. &c. &c.**

*On some of the results of experience in the United States, with regard to the use of Wood in the construction of Railways, and with reference to the construction of similar Works in the Province of New Brunswick, by J. Wilkinson, of Surveyor General's Department, N. B.*

*Fredericton, 17th March, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Agreeably to the instructions communicated to me by direction of Your Excellency on the 8th January last, I have now the honor to submit such observations on Railway experience in the United States, as may be useful in this Province.

The pressure of time on this occasion does not permit me to treat the subject either as fully, or with so much care, as I should otherwise desire; but any further information in my power to communicate is at Your Excellency's command.

In the construction of Public Works, it is doubtless the wisest policy to have regard to the utmost degree of perfection consistent with circumstances and a well-considered economy. Hence the costly degree of perfection generally exhibited in such works in Great Britain and other portions of Europe, and also in the older parts of the United States, where population, trade, manufactures and wealth are so largely disproportionate to the corresponding circumstances here. For this reason there are but few of the more perfect models which we are competent in all respects to imitate. We can understand and profit by the same principles, but the same details of application are, as a general rule, not expedient.

But it does not necessarily follow that we must wait until our social condition be advanced to that of older countries, in order to enjoy, in many respects, equally the advantages of science and mechanical skill in our public works. We are, on the contrary, surrounded by inducements and by natural advantages, which, though associated with some difficulties, hold out the promise of ample success to well directed industry and enterprise, even with very moderate extraneous aid.

The enormous expense of the first Railway experiments in England for the transport of both passengers and freight, did not divert our neighbours on this side of the Atlantic from the incalculable advantages which were assured by an improvement so great and so peculiarly adapted to this Continent. On the contrary, they immediately began to consider the means within their reach of securing its benefits. They had the advantage of experience, purchased so liberally by British enterprise, and also natural advantages of their own, not available in England. In New England, indeed, where population, wealth, and local circumstances, amply justified the attempt, Railways were begun and finished very closely after the English model. But in South Carolina, where the abundance of timber and the favorable character of the country naturally suggested the idea, timber foundations, and also rails essentially of timber, were adopted to obviate the costly alternatives of earthen excavations and embankments, solid masonry, and the heavy iron rail.

A Line of this kind was constructed between Charleston and Augusta, 136 miles, within the years 1830 to 1833. Descriptions of the road, more or less particular, are given in some of the published official reports in relation to the work, on the authority of which I believe that dependance may be placed.

The result appears mainly to have fulfilled the expectations of the projectors, leaving no material difficulty to be provided for besides the consequence of the perishable quality

quality of the structure, which was well understood and anticipated. It was necessary that all the timber should be periodically renewed, or that permanent earthen embankments and masonry should be supplied. The latter alternative was adopted, and the road being in full operation afforded facilities for embanking which rendered the cost comparatively light. But it does not appear from the experiment, that had any certain means of *preventing the decay* of the timber been known and made use of, that any necessity for embanking would have arisen for an indefinite period, if at all.

The manner of construction was, upon well-driven piles when the ground was soft, upon trestles when firm and solid, and simply on longitudinal under sills united by cross-ties, when excavations occurred, or where the grades coincided nearly with the natural surface.

Besides the exceedingly small expense, the advantages of this method in superseding, to a great extent, the necessity of bridges, culverts and drains, and in avoiding the disasters which are so liable to be the result of any insufficiency in these structures, appear to have been very deserving of notice. The adaptation of the plan to large portions of this Province, and to similar descriptions of country everywhere, will appear by the following extract from the Report of the Commissioner of the South Carolina Rail Road, dated May 1st, 1838, being after the first year of trial of that Road:—

“The plan adopted in the construction has been peculiarly fortunate; it has been emphatically called the ‘Inland Bridge’—recently it has proved itself so. At a time when every mail teemed with accounts of the disasters occasioned by the late heavy freshets; when the Savannah River rose higher than it has done since the memorable Yazoo freshet; when serious apprehensions were at one time entertained for the safety of the Augusta Bridge; when the houses in Hamburg were encompassed by water, and all communication between Hamburg, Augusta, and Barnwell Court House was suspended for three days, and resumed on the fourth at the risk of losing the mail and the lives of those entrusted with its conveyance; when the navigation of the rivers was stopped, their banks strewed with fragments of houses, mills, &c.; the highland roads washed into gullies, and the bridges in the low countries in many places washed away—at this period, so destructive to property, and when intercourse between various parts of the country was entirely stopped, it will be gratifying to stockholders to learn, that, with the exception of the sliding of the side of a bank on the road (avalanche) within two miles of Hamburg, the works have not sustained injury to the amount of five dollars. *During this whole period the trips were performed regularly in the usual time and with the usual load, and the passengers experienced no inconvenience, except that resulting from a moist atmosphere.* Had the system of embankment, which is generally resorted to in similar works, in order to preserve the grade over low grounds, been adopted in this work, it is probable that a large portion of it this day would have been a mass of ruins; as human sagacity could scarcely have anticipated the necessity of culverts sufficiently capacious to have afforded an outlet to such immense and overwhelming floods.”

But the security afforded under such circumstances as the foregoing is not the only benefit likely to be derived from the same plan in a climate where deep and drifting snows threaten to interrupt, if not to prevent railway communication for several months in the year. So plainly essential to the success of a railway are certainty and regularity of communication, that without some satisfactory assurance that these are attainable at a limited and reasonable expense, the prudence of embarking in such an enterprise might be justly questioned. When, however, uninterrupted transportation may appear to be feasible by a plan not only avoiding extraordinary outlay, but requiring even a less expense for the whole construction and management than by any other, its claim to consideration in these Colonies seems to be such as will scarcely be overlooked. Such plan appears to be that of an open wooden structure, elevated above the ordinary level of the snow, and presenting slight obstruction to the same in a drifting state. There are questions of detail in relation to this object which may for the present be deferred.

After an eight years trial of their system, the President of the South Carolina Rail Road Company, in a Report dated in 1840, thus speaks of its merits:—

“The superiority of the peculiar construction of our road—the superstructure on piles driven into the ground and embanked afterwards—was shewn very satisfactorily in

in the repairs after the great flood of the Savannah River in May last, which raised the water five feet over the top of the rails, yet not one fourth thus covered were removed; and had it not been for the great weight of timber, houses, and whole trees, which were forced against it with great violence, no part would have been dislodged from its foundation.

“The plan, regarded by many as a great mistake in the building of the Road, has proved an economical one, as well in repairs as original construction.”

The following is from a semi-annual Report in 1843:—“The construction of the Road on piles is becoming more in favor with others, as well as those having the advantage of it. Several Roads at the north are partially on this plan. The New York and Erie Rail Road, to be 446 miles long, is to be about one half built in this way. Over 70 miles of piles have been already driven.

“It saves much of the cost of embanking a Road by being able to transport the earth upon it to fill the vallies and swamps, and before it is necessary to do this, the income of the Road is providing for the payment while it is constructing.

“It preserves the line and level of the Road after the embankment is made. When Roads are built on fills and cuts without piles, the superstructure is continually liable to be disturbed by the sinking of the banks, or water settling in the excavations, much to the injury of passing trains, breaking axles, and otherwise deranging the machinery of the engines.”

The same Report furnishes a statement of the cost of the Road, from which it appears that, for the wooden structure and materials, it amounted to \$584,542 43; or equal to \$4,300 per mile, exclusive of iron and spikes for the plate rail, which amounted to \$125,309 47, or about \$921 per mile. Preliminary expenses, Surveys, Engineer department, workshops and materials, machinery, engines, cars, inclined plane, land, road police, office expenses, &c., amounted to \$241,296 47; or equal say to \$1,774 per mile.

The Road continued in active operation as thus constructed until 1836, when heavy repairs became necessary. At this time, therefore, the whole expense of the construction of the Road, exclusive of the *Iron rail* and the other expenses above enumerated, was no more than \$4,300, or £1,075 Halifax currency, or about £896 sterling, per mile; and including everything, only equal to about £1,460 sterling per mile, under the unfavorable circumstances of a first experiment.

Afterwards the replacing of such timber as had began to decay, the embanking of the piled portions of the Road, and importing heavy flanged iron, increased the whole cost to \$2,506,762 61, or equal to \$18,432 per mile, up to the year 1839. Since then the increase of cost appears to be upwards of one half more. But how this arises, or for what reasons the Company may have deemed it necessary or expedient so largely to increase their permanent expenditure, are questions which do not seem to be involved in that under consideration. It appears that during a period of at least four years the advantages of a Railway were obtained and enjoyed for the small expenditure before stated; but afterwards that the progressive re-construction of the work, at heavy expense, became necessary. It is therefore chiefly desirable to ascertain whether the same advantages might not have been secured for a much longer, or even for an indefinite period, without further extraordinary expenditure, or any serious practical objection to the plan itself, had the material employed in the first construction been *imperishable*.

The opinion of Engineers of long known ability and experience in the United States, as well as of others practically conversant with the subject of Railways, is, that there is no valid objection to a properly constructed wooden foundation, except *the perishable nature of the material*. That as a general rule, to which all must assent, the introduction of perishable materials into works intended to be permanent, is as much as possible to be avoided; and at the present time wherever the means can be commanded, earthwork and masonry are generally preferred. Under different circumstances, however, and where wood is abundant, the piling system is adopted, if the character of the country will permit; for besides being more rapidly executed, it is regarded as an efficient and economical foundation, even at the risk of a periodical renewal every five or six years.

In some of the substantially constructed Railways of New England, small portions founded wholly on wood are to be met with, and which have been so constructed either from the necessity of the case, or from some consideration of present economy. In passing over these the passenger is unconscious of any transition from the earthen foundation.

I was kindly invited to pass over and examine, in company with the Engineer, a portion of wooden foundation adopted on a Branch Railway from Salem to Danvers, just completed and opened for traffic. It had been thus constructed with a view to dispatch and the more immediate benefit of the Railway, leaving the filling up with earthwork to future convenience before the wood should have time to decay. The elevation of the work, substantially constructed on piles, is from five to thirty feet above the natural surface of the ground. During the passage of the train no vibration or unsteadiness was perceptible; and in standing upon the platform behind the last car, as it were in mid air, and in clear view of the open wooden framework below, retreating with a velocity of 25 miles per hour, it was not easy to conceive how it could be more difficult to pass any ordinary depth of our northern snow, and that at rates of speed equal to those attainable under the most favorable circumstances.

The expense of this wooden structure was from two dollars to six dollars per running foot of the Railway. But besides the great elevation of the way, a large proportion of the piles were driven to a great depth, and in deep water. At two dollars per foot, for which a portion of this example was made, the cost would be equal to about £2180 sterling per mile, the elevation being about 10 feet, and the piles driven to a depth of 12 feet. The timber was here, however, comparatively expensive, being obtained from a distance, and as an article of merchandise.

I was favored in a very obliging manner with the opportunity of inspecting the result of a wooden structure on the New York and Erie Rail Road, which is of the broad gauge, and intended as one of the great trunk lines of the Lake and Western Trade. The portion to which I have reference is near its commencement, and consists of a viaduct 60 feet at its highest part above the bed of the valley over which it passes. Thirty feet of this height consists chiefly of an earthen embankment, and partly of a stone bridge; but in order to avoid the delay and immediate expense of so heavy an embankment as that which would be required for the whole elevation, the remaining 30 feet was filled up with strong trestles of white oak. At the time of my visit this had been subjected to a regular traffic of upwards of five years, and still remained strong, steady and sufficient. But in order to provide against the certain effects of gradual decay, the whole structure was in progress of being embanked with earth to the level of the Roadway. Earthen embankments had also been made on this division of the Road wherever the timber structure had in the first instance been employed. But I was assured by the Engineer of the work that no practical or efficient objection existed to this kind of foundation, except that of the perishable nature of the material, and that notwithstanding this objection, where wood was abundant, the plan was the most easy and rapid of execution, as well as in the first instance the most economical, and in a climate where communication was liable to be impeded by snow, it was superior to any other that had been devised.

A large portion of the Line of the New York and Erie Rail Road, where the country was favorable, has been piled; but the financial difficulties of the Company having caused a suspension of their works until recently, they will be deprived of much of the benefit of the wooden structure. It has been exposed to decay during several years, but will still afford the foundation of a Railway, which beside sustaining a regular traffic in the meantime, will facilitate the substitution of earthen embankments in an economical and expeditious manner.

A practical exposition of the merits of this system is afforded by the following extract from the evidence of one of the intelligent and experienced Engineers of the New York and Erie Rail Road, as given before a Committee of the Legislative Assembly of the State of New York, appointed to investigate the affairs of the Company, in the year 1842:—

“ Question 23.—Have you made or examined any tests with the view of ascertaining the comparative merits of a Rail Road constructed upon piles, and one upon a bed of earth or stone, and if so, state the conclusions to which you have arrived, with the facts connected therewith? ”

“ Answer.

“ Answer.—I have made numerous examinations relative to the construction of Rail Roads upon *piles* within the last three years, and have become thoroughly convinced that the piling system is an important improvement in Rail Road construction, and especially in *northern climates*, where *severe frosts* and *deep snows* are common in the winter months.

“ A Road resting upon white oak piles (from eleven to eighteen inches in diameter,) driven to a depth of *five* feet or over, and in all cases reaching a solid foundation, and sawed off two or three feet above the surface of the earth, is not liable to derangement by *frost*, nor obstructions by *snow*, and combines in a greater degree than any other mode that has been adopted in this country, *cheapness and permanency*—the two most essential requisites in Rail Road construction. Piles that have stood in the most exposed situations on the Utica and Syracuse Rail Road for the *four* past winters, and those driven on this division during the summer and fall of 1840, in every variety of *soil*, abundantly prove the fact that *frost* cannot displace them, if they are driven to a depth of *five* feet or over.

“ A piled road is also free from the obstructions and dangers incident to a graded (earthen) road, in consequence of the washing of the banks by floods and rain, and by *settling* when on a *soft* bottom; thereby requiring constant *annual expense* to adjust the road and replace the earth material.

“ It will, I think, also lessen if not entirely prevent the frequent accidents that occur on graded (earthen) Rail Roads, arising from cattle and other animals obstructing the track when trains are passing at high rates of speed.

“ The permanent and uniform foundation that a piled road affords during all seasons of the year, cannot, I think, be too highly appreciated; and for roads calculated to transport heavy freight, its decided superiority over the usual modes of constructing Rail Roads in the State cannot be questioned.

“ From the experience afforded me during the construction of the Syracuse and Utica Rail Road, as well as the two past years on this division,\* I have no hesitation in strongly recommending the adoption of a piled road, wherever the nature of the soil, surface of the country, and a supply of suitable timber will admit of the structure. On this division\* there is being made over *one hundred* miles of *piled* road, along the valleys of the Susquehannab, Chemung, Tioga, and Canisteo Rivers, of which the piles are now driven for *seventy* miles; and the eight steam pile-drivers are now in operation, driving the residue at the rate of *ten* miles per month.

“ The actual cost of this piling (when sawed off in readiness to receive the superstructure) has averaged less than *two thousand dollars per mile*,† including the white oak pile timber, from eight to thirty feet in length, and from eleven to twenty inches in diameter, costing on an average about three and one half cents per lineal foot, delivered on the line of road. These piles are driven from five to twenty feet, and where required by the looseness or softness of the earth, double piles are driven to the depth of fifty feet or more, and sawed off from two to four feet above the embankment, or the natural surface of the ground.

“ To have substituted a graded (earthen) road-bed in place of this *piled road* in this division would have cost not less than *four thousand dollars per mile* for the whole distance, without including the grading necessary for the piled road, when the surface of the earth requires to be excavated or embanked for the purpose of bringing the earth grade from *one* to *four* feet from the grade-line of the road. No difficulty has been experienced in driving white oak, chestnut, or Norway pine piles below the reach of the *frost*, in sand, gravel, clay, or alluvial soils; and wherever excavations or embankments occur exceeding four feet in depth or height, the cost of removing the additional quantity of earth necessary for a graded road-bed, with its side ditches, *exceeds* the cost of piling, including the piling timber.

“ The excavations for piled road on this division are made twelve feet wide on the bottom, with side slopes of one foot verticle to one and a half feet horizontal. The piles are sawed off one foot above the bottom of the cut, and a ditch of three feet wide and one foot deep is made between the rows of piles, to carry off the water. The earth from the excavations is carried into embankments, where the grade exceeds

“ three feet in height. The embankments are made to within three feet of the tops of the piles, twelve feet wide on the top, with side-slopes of one and a-half feet to one foot.

“ From the experience that I have had in the construction of pile road, and from the examinations that I have made relative to the cost of grading, and keeping in repair the ordinary graded roads of the country, I think I am within bounds when I say that the interest of the amount saved by building a piled road instead of a graded road, for the one hundred miles on this division, together with the annual expense in keeping a graded road-bed in good adjustment and repair, will *renew the piles*, should it be necessary, every *five or six* years, so long as suitable timber can be obtained at *twice* its present cost in that division.

“ If the white oak piles should not remain sound more than eight or ten years, the expense of filling around them with earth, at the expiration of that time, with the use of cars to move the earth, would cost at least *fifty per cent.* less than it would now cost to make the embankments to the graded line with barrows or waggons; as most of the earth would require to be drawn from the hills, for great distances, in consequence of the alluvial soil, found along the bottom lands of the rivers, not being suitable for a road-bed for a graded road. Wherever the valleys to be filled are deep, and the excavations from which the earth is to be taken to embank over them, are at any considerable distance off, the hauling of the earth is postponed until the track is laid on the piles, and then done with cars at a great saving of expense.

“ Another consideration in favor of a *piled road* is, that when the piles are partially decayed, the earth embankments can be *cheaply* brought up to grade, as has been shewn, and the strength of the *pile* will, for many years thereafter, keep the road from settling; thus you will perceive that the superstructure having been kept from the ground, and of course in a great measure preserved, the earth being brought to grade, as before remarked, and well rammed under the superstructure, we have a new and permanent road, much more permanent than roads where the rail is laid upon a new, and of course not thoroughly settled embankment.

“ The construction of pile road on this division has, I think, enabled the Company to make contracts with the landholders along the route (where such road is made) for right of way, fencing and farm-crossings, for at least *seventy five per cent.* less than they could have done had a graded road been substituted in its place. This arises from the fact that while the piles remain in good preservation, there will be no necessity of fencing along the Rail Road, excepting the nailing of a few boards upon the piles, while the farmer can cultivate all the land sold to the Company, and which is from four and a half to six rods in width, (until it is required for a graded road,) except the width of eight feet, occupied by the *piles*. The piled road also permits cattle and other animals to pass *under* the track, and thus saves the great expense usually required on graded roads, to make embankments on the roads for farm crossings, or expensive bridges or culverts, to allow teams and cattle to pass under the road. A large amount is also saved in the single item of *cattle guards*, necessary on graded roads, to prevent cattle from passing from private or public roads, on to the track of the Railway, and thereby obstructing the passage of trains; and which occasions a great share of the destruction of life and property on graded roads.

“ As I have before remarked, the great advantages of the *piling system* consist in its *cheapness* and *permanency*; and in regard to its *durability*, it will be seen, that if the perishable material of which it is constructed can be renewed at an expense of less than the *interest* upon the difference in the first cost, and necessary annual expenses, (when compared with a graded road,) it must result in an ultimate *saving of expense.*”

The substance of this testimony, received with that consideration to which the opinions and experience of other competent Engineers support its claim, gives to the question of Wooden Railways a peculiar interest in these Provinces, and places in a striking light the importance of some available method of insuring their durability after their first construction.

The most satisfactory experiments which as yet appear to have been made in the preservation of wood, are by the process of “Kyanizing;” not that they conclusively establish the comparative merits of this process, but because they extend over a longer period

period of time, say than any experiments by the more recent methods which have been introduced to public notice, amongst which the most approved appears to be that of "Paynizing."

No well authenticated instance is known of the failure in the United States of the Kyan process where it has been fairly tried. On the contrary, prepared Railway sleepers of Spruce, one of the most perishable of American woods, exposed in a manner least favorable to its durability, have been found at the end of six years, the full time of its ordinary duration, remaining quite sound and elastic, and even retaining the original marks of the saw. The cost of this process by hydraulic pressure has been found to be 5 12-100 cents, or about equal to 3 1-8d. Halifax currency, per cubic foot. By soakage only, it ought to be much less, as the value of the corrosive sublimate necessary to each cubic foot, does not, according to some experiments, exceed 1 1/2d. currency. The efficiency and economy of this process, as now confirmed by numerous experiments, has tended to create a general confidence and renewed interest in it; the risk of further trials is now freely incurred, and its extensive adoption is highly probable.

The simple process of natural absorption, by immersing the foot of a newly-felled tree in a preservative solution, say the pyrolignite of iron, seems well deserving of consideration and further experiment. By this process it would appear that the vitality remaining in the wood for a short time after it has been cut, causes the artificial fluid to circulate with the natural sap throughout the whole tree. Mr. Bethell claims a right in this process by patent, dated July 11th, 1838. Public attention was drawn to the discovery by Dr. Boucherie, of Paris, in 1840. It would of course be necessary that this process should be practised on the spot where the timber is cut.

It seems difficult to attach too much importance in these Provinces to some feasible and certain method of rendering wood, if not imperishable, at least capable of resisting decay for a long period. The effect would be to place us in a position to prosecute a railway system, and other works, at a cost so moderate as to remove reasonable fears of success. It would probably also give us a large share of additional manufacturing benefit in the staple of the country. For the preservative process seems to be most easy and effectual when applied whilst the wood is in a *green* state.

#### WOOD AS A SUBSTITUTE FOR IRON RAILS.

So far we have chiefly considered the eligibility of Wood as the principal material in Railway foundations. The entire substitution of Wooden for Iron Rails, and thereby avoiding nearly the whole expense of the latter, has perhaps engaged more attention in these Provinces than in the United States. On first naming the subject of wooden rails in that country, you are understood to mean the wooden rail, or longitudinal sill, upon which a light plate of iron is laid and secured, as in the first experiments there. But this expedient, having been found to be very objectionable and insufficient, especially under heavy locomotives and high velocities, is generally becoming abandoned in favor of the heavy iron rail. The light iron plate of 2 1/2 inches by 1/2 inch, is found to be too flexible, and the wood beneath it too compressible. It is now deemed necessary, even with a continuous wooden bearing, that the iron should possess the stiffness of the usual forms of the heavy iron rail. The failure of the light plate rail, therefore, seems to have created a degree of prejudice against much dependence upon wood, and a dependence upon it altogether is regarded as somewhat chimerical. The results of the limited experiments in England have not apparently had the effect of disturbing in the United States the general conviction of the necessity of employing strong rails of iron in order to sustain a heavy transportation.

It may be allowed that the statements of the experiments as yet made, though calculated to give a favorable impression, do not conclusively settle the question of the safe application of the wooden rail to the various circumstances of a long line of Railway, intended to sustain heavy loads and high velocities. Enough however has been made known to draw attention in these Colonies to the importance of a more perfect investigation of the subject. A few suggestions in relation to it I will venture to submit.

The principle of the wooden rail is acknowledged to be without novelty. Its employment is merely a return to what was in use upwards of two hundred years ago, but

now resumed under the more favorable circumstances of greatly advanced knowledge and experience. The form of the rail appears to have been not materially different from that which has been subjected to recent experiments; but the wheels of the wagons are said to have been, during a long period, only of wood, and of rude construction. Afterwards cast iron wheels were introduced, which, it would appear, from their imperfect adaptation to a rail of much softer material, soon led to the use of cast iron rails. Again a difficulty was experienced. It was found that the cast iron rails, especially *when their surfaces were narrow*, cut the rims of the iron wheels, forming indented grooves, which caused considerable friction, and the frequent breaking of the rails. To remedy this, *the breadth of the surface of the rail was increased*, which diminished the evil to a certain extent, but the expense of repairs was still considerable. A complete remedy was eventually effected by "*case-hardening*" the rim of the wheels in the process of casting. The further improvement of introducing malleable iron rails, was for several years retarded by the same evil which first appeared in the use of the cast iron rail; *the narrowness of the edge* being found to cut the periphery of the wheels. The cast iron rail, with a broader surface, was therefore preferred, because a malleable iron rail, with a surface *sufficiently broad*, was too costly. But eventually a malleable iron rail was produced, the section of which presented *the same bearing surface* as the cast iron rail, combining with lightness the necessary degree of strength.\*

Now it seems manifest that these progressive improvements proceeded from a *necessary regard to the relative hardness of the periphery of the wheel and the bearing surface of the rail*. Cast iron wheels were found to cut a soft material like wood, and rendered also cast iron rails *apparently necessary*. But these, when narrow, were found in return to cut the wheels, an evil which was in part remedied by making the surface of the rail *broader*, and more perfectly remedied by making the periphery of the wheel *harder*. It was also found necessary to the success of the malleable iron rail that the *breadth of bearing surface* should be adjusted to the relative hardness of the periphery of the wheel.

These considerations seem applicable to the failure of the iron plate rail spiked upon a rail of wood, as tried in the United States. It is obvious that a thin ribbon of iron, only 2½ inches wide, could do no more than protect the wood from the abrasive action of the wheels. It was too narrow and flexible to prevent the effects of *compression*. Hence nearly the same result might be expected, though in a less rapid and sensible degree, as from the first experiments of narrow cast iron wheels running immediately upon wood. A thin strip of iron, subjected to the rolling action of a heavy pressure, and depending for its stiffness upon a soft and irregularly compressible bearing, must necessarily lose the essential qualities of a rail. It could not remain either uniformly plain or rigid.

For this evil there appears to be three remedies, differing materially in their relative economy.

1. An iron plate rail widened to an extent to be determined by its increased stiffness, and the hardness of its wooden bearing.
2. An iron rail of suitable form, and sufficiently stiff to compensate for its narrowness of bearing upon wood.
3. A rail exclusively of wood, to which the width of the rim of the wheels of the locomotive and of the train shall be duly adjusted.

The second of these remedies is that adopted in the United States, and which involves a minimum of expense of eight or nine thousand dollars per mile for the iron and its fastenings.

Yet without further and satisfactory experiments, there seems to be no sufficient reason to doubt that nearly the whole of this outlay might be avoided by the third proposed remedy; and which is the adoption of a duly proportioned wooden rail, to be acted upon by iron wheels, *the peripheries of which shall be plain, and of a width which shall be adjusted to the weights and velocities to be sustained, and the relative hardness of the wood*, thereby obviating the necessity of a bearing surface of metal in any form.

But the experiment should include the substitution for the "flanches" now in use, either the grooved diagonal guide wheels of Mr. Prosser, or plain horizontal wheels to roll against the inner side of the rail, for the same purpose.

I would therefore suggest, in order more perfectly to test the merits of this kind of rail, that such experiments should be made as may be sufficient to determine whether its efficiency does not depend upon a due adjustment of the width of the iron periphery of the wheel as may be due to the relative hardness of the wood under the pressure of given loads, and under the least favorable circumstances incident to railway transportation. It is probable that one result of such experiments would be to show that the diminution of the compression is nearly as the square of the ratio of the increase of the width of the periphery of the wheel, that is to say, by increasing such width twice, thrice, or four times, we relieve the fibres of the rail from the compressing or crushing effect as four, nine, or sixteen times.

Further experiments appear also to be necessary in order to determine the adhesion of the driving wheel upon wood under various circumstances. It has been represented as much more than upon iron. In a dry state this is very probable; but in a perfectly wet state it is doubtful whether it will not be considerably less, and if so, the supposed advantage of being able to ascend steeper acclivities on the wooden rail may cause disappointments against which it is very material to guard. The same expedient, however, which has been beneficially adopted in the iron rail in a wet state, that of sanding, may prove to be equally or more efficacious on wood.

In the meantime there appears to be no sufficient reason to discourage a reliance upon the wooden rail under ordinary circumstances, if abundant breadth be given to the rims of the iron wheels. In the breadth of the wood a liberality can be observed, which in the use of iron is restrained to a minimum by its costliness.

In closing these imperfect observations, it may be proper, with regard to the general recommendations which they convey of wooden foundations for Railways, to remark that it is not pretended that they can always obviate expensive cuttings and embankments, which must in some instance of necessity be encountered.

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**Extracts from Reports of the Honorable Captain Owen, R. N.**

*On the Port of Whitehaven, and other Ports and Harbours on the Atlantic Coast of Nova Scotia, eastward of Halifax.*

(Copy)

COLUMBIA, *Halifax, N. S.*, 5th September, 1846.

SIR,—Your Excellency was pleased to refer to me on the subject of the Ports in the Promontory of Canseau, but as the information I was then (last Wednesday) able to give Your Excellency was verbal, and therefore evanescent, I have presumed it may be more acceptable in an authentic and tangible form.

My attention was directed by His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke, to the necessity of making such a nautical reconnoissance of the Coasts of the Promontory of Canseau, as might assure us that there was at that point a safe Port, easy of access, not incommoded by ice at any season; and, in short, such a Port as might with advantage be used as the junction of sea and land communication between Great Britain and her Colonies in North America, &c.

As I had never before visited any of the Ports at that extremity of Nova Scotia, I examined (by actual visitation) Country Harbour, Torbay, Whitehaven, and the Ports of Canseau and Guysboro', and reconnoitred all the intermediate shores.

There are serious nautical objections to the adoption of any of the points mentioned, which are unnecessary to detail in this communication, except only Whitehaven, of which the Admiralty Charts give very good plans. Lieutenant Shortland, Commander of the Columbia, surveyed the approaches to Whitehaven, and we gave three days to its examination.

Whitehaven

Whitehaven is not only most conveniently situated, being the nearest approachable point of the Continent of North America to England or Ireland, (in latitude  $45^{\circ} 10' N.$ , longitude  $61^{\circ} 8' W.$ .) but is a splendid and most commodious Port, whose immediate entrance and its Harbour are never obstructed or incommoded by drift or packed ice.

It has very great facilities of approach, and has only two out-lying dangers or small rocks between the Port and the open sea, and these only about half a mile from the shore; and in short, its nautical facilities of attainment greatly exceed those of Halifax, or any other point on this coast that I have seen. The upper parts of its fine and beautiful Harbour (like Bedford Bason and Halifax Harbour,) in some winters freeze over in part, but never so as to obstruct its external communications, its approach, or its perfect safety; and its configuration, as regards the proximate coasts, prevents the accumulation of drift or packed ice, either to obstruct or incommode it.

Its shores offer no impediments to Rail Road termini, wherever convenient, and the vicinity is (in my judgment) perfectly practicable for Rail communications; and if the new road from Dartmouth to Guysboro' were continued, it would bring Whitehaven within 120 miles of practical road distance; and, (as I have understood,) on a level so unobstructed as to invite to that direct line of Rail Road to Halifax from Whitehaven, should it be adopted as the sea terminus, and this distance in Rail time requiring less than four hours, saving a voyage of sixteen hours under favorable circumstances; and considering the inconveniences at present existing to the nautical commodiousness of the Port of Halifax in times of fog, the advantages of the shorter communication must be indefinitely manifest.

Thus, Sir John, I have certified to Your Excellency this one important fact, that at the nearest available point of North America to England or Ireland, there is a splendid Port—(Whitehaven)—most conveniently placed, and endowed in every way inviting to its use as the junction of Sea and Rail communication between Great Britain and these Colonies.

*Extracts from the Reports of the Honorable Captain Owen, R. N., Marine Surveyor, relative to Whitehaven Harbour, near Cape Canseau, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.*

No. 1.—Extract.

*Campo Bello, 11th September, 1846.*

SIR,—By Your Excellency's suggestion, and since that, by authority of the Lords of the Admiralty, I proceeded with the Columbia, on the first of last month, to make a nautical reconnoissance of the Shores and Ports of the Promontory of Cape Canseau, to ascertain the most proper point or Port therein for the junction of sea and land communication between Great Britain and British North America, with reference to a former Report of mine (in November last) on this subject to Your Excellency.

In the first instance we did not stop to examine Country Harbour, conceiving that point, 1st, as too remote from the north east extremity of Nova Scotia, or the nearest point on this Continent to Great Britain and Ireland; and 2d, that its external dangers, with the distance of pilotage water, were irremediable obstacles to its unobstructed approach in fogs, however safe and convenient the Port might be in other respects. The Columbia entered and reconnoitred Torbay, and found similar objections to its adoption.

On Sunday, 2d August, she entered Whitehaven, by the western channel, and as it appeared at first view to offer all that could be required, I directed Lieutenant Shortland to survey the approaches, and report to me his opinion on those and the Port itself, which Report I enclose for Your Excellency's information. We found the Haven to be a splendid and convenient Port, as capacious as Halifax Harbour between George's Island and Bedford Basin, and as safe and commodious, and its approaches safe, and under any circumstances easily attainable from the open sea, and within the extreme points in perfect shelter and security, not being more than a mile of pilotage water; but the shaft or channel to the Haven itself, although well sheltered and safe, yet

yet is very narrow in some places, for a distance from one to two miles, according to the channel by which entered. Mr. Shortland's plan shows all the dangers we could discover.

The Haven finishes to the northward at Pleasant River, also very convenient and navigable for two miles by vessels of any burden, and for small craft two miles farther still, to its head, which northern extremity is only four miles from the high road between Guysborough and the Port of Canseau.

Whitehead Island, the outer point to seaward of the Haven, is one hundred and forty feet high, and may be considered as the northeast extremity of Nova Scotia, and the nearest available point of this Continent to the British Islands, although itself isolated. The Acadian French Settlement of Molasses Harbour, is separated to the westward by a very narrow isthmus of mere beach from the western part of the Haven, besides which there are not now more than eight or ten establishments around Whitehaven.

Well arranged Light Houses and Fog Signals will be as necessary to the Port of Whitehaven as to other Ports that are much frequented. Under all circumstances and at all times a Light House on Whitehead Island will be extremely well situated for all this coast, and might be seen seven leagues. For the Port of Whitehaven, one Harbour Light on Beacon Ledge would serve for all three of the principal entrances, and Fog Signals might be so arranged as to lead a vessel safely through any of them in fogs.

Our inquiries relative to ice in Winter were very satisfactory. Pleasant River is generally frozen all down to the Haven in January and February, and in severe Winters the Haven has been known to be entirely frozen over, but only once known to have happened to the southward of Fisherman's Island, and the nature of the Coast and entrances preclude the possibility of packed or drift ice accumulating, so that the ingress and egress is always free and open.

It is not more or less subject to fogs than the whole of this southeast Coast of Nova Scotia, which is all seriously inconvenienced by this impediment to comfortable navigation; and the soundings, with attention, may always give sufficient indication of approach; and the rocky ledges of the coast form an almost continued steep barrier of land.

It will not be necessary in this Report to explain the arrangements that may be required to facilitate the safe entrance of this Port from sea in fogs; it is sufficient to say, that it will admit the use of definite signals, to secure at all times a safe and easy entrance.

I forward to Your Excellency a trace of Lieutenant Shortland's survey of the main shaft of communication, from the sea to the Haven, shewing the three principal passages within the anchorage, which is all safe and commodious. There are, for the convenience of small craft, four or five other small passages from the sea, on whose critical examination we gave no time.

The northern shores of the Haven are everywhere safely approached, and capable of maintaining good wharves, &c.

Having satisfied myself of the eligibility of Whitehaven, we proceeded on the 6th August, coasting and reconnoitering towards Cranberry Island Light House, off Cape Canseau, five leagues from Whitehead Island. We passed Raspberry Island and Harbour, Whale Island, and Big Dover Harbour and Bay, Little Dover or White Point, Saint Andrew's Island or Cape Canseau proper, and entered Canseau Harbour, of old the winter rendezvous of the French Navy in these seas, found most of these misnamed on the Charts; and nowhere, any spot, bay, or point, that could at all compete with Whitehaven, the approaches to all being difficult and dangerous in fogs or by night.

The Port of Canseau is very small, and is undergoing serious changes for want of care. The spot called Burying Island is in great part washed away, and soon will all of it be so, if not protected.

The approach to it is intricate and confined; and finding, moreover, that in every Spring, the Port of Canseau, and indeed all the Bay of Chedabucto, are seriously obstructed by drift ice out of the Saint Lawrence, we merely measured the distance from the Light House to the outer Basses, and obtained proper marks for the dangers in the direct route, and then left Canseau by the little Gut, for Guysboro', where

Captain Pipon, the Commissioner, had made an appointment to meet me, and who, seeing us from heights, came on board from Fox Island, as we were passing, and we passed on to Guysboro' on the 8th August, an appropriate point for the junction of the sea route with a Rail Road or land communication, on any point of the shores of Chedabucto Bay, and the approach from sea is simple, safe, and easy; but it is so incommoded every Spring by drift ice, as to render it useless at that season for the purpose in question.

Having determined to return to Halifax, and to pass through all the sea-points with Captain Pipon on board, to enable him to see with his own eyes every one of them that could be brought in question, therefore we quitted Guysboro' on the 11th early, stopped at the Port of Canseau, where Captain Pipon landed to reconnoitre, for some hours, when he re embarked. We left Canseau and coasted the outer dangers to Whitehaven, which we entered by the eastern channel. Captain Pipon from two hills reconnoitred, and remained in the Haven until next morning the 12th August, when we quitted Whitehaven, by the western channel, coasted Torbay, and proceeded along shore to Country Harbour, the channel into which is long, intricate, and in some places shallow, therefore not at all recommendable; nor is the western or open sea-approach unobjectionable, on account of its numerous outlying dangers for nearly three leagues; and the place itself appeared to me too far removed from the northeast extremity of Nova Scotia, as before said. In the afternoon we landed Captain Pipon seven miles up the beautiful and navigable River of Country Harbour, and proceeded to Halifax in the *Columbia*. We put into *Marie et Josef* in a fog on 13th, and on 14th coasted the outer dangers with very foggy weather, and arrived at Halifax at 9 P. M. on the 14th.

COLUMBIA, *Halifax, N. S.*, 27th August, 1846.

SIR,—In pursuance of your orders, I have made a rough sketch of the inner part of the entrance of Whitehaven, which, with the accompanying remarks, I beg to submit for your consideration.

In fine clear weather, and by day light, the approach to Whitehaven is easy, the shores being bold and no out-lying dangers, if we except two rocks nearly a mile distant from the shores of White Island, one to the S.W., and the other to the S.E. These generally break and so show themselves.

White Island forms the turning point of the shore of Nova Scotia, as it deflects towards the northward to Canseau. The white rocks, and its elevation of 140 feet, make it stand out prominently, and easily distinguish it.

There are several channels into Whitehaven. Three can be used by Steamers of any size. The middle, which is between White Island and the ledges to its westward, appears to be the best, is about 250 fathoms broad in its narrowest part, and carries bold water on both sides, and is besides the shortest and most direct, not exceeding half a mile in length. However, as the directions of the channels differ, and all radiate nearly from the same point, a sailing vessel can use that most favorable with respect to the winds. The western is also a very good channel, and is preferable for vessels going or coming from that direction. The soundings without this Harbour are (near the shore) very irregular, especially in the approach to the eastern channel, which is also injured for vessels of large draft of water, by a rocky patch with 13 or 14 feet water; it is situated near the entrance, and rather more than one third across channel from the small Island (Grassy Patch) off White Island.

When inside the Harbour care must be taken, as there are several shoal rocky patches (see Plan) which render the navigation difficult to strangers, and require to be well determined and buoyed, should the Harbour be used for commercial purposes. There is an abundance of safe anchorage, with good holding ground, black muddy bottom, land locked, and perfectly smooth.

In foggy weather this Harbour is difficult of approach, especially to a stranger, as the soundings in shore are very irregular, and I have not been able to learn any good indications

indications of its vicinity to be gathered from the lead, so as to render its approach by that means certain; and Torbay, its immediate neighbour to the westward, is a dangerous place to get into.

From the fishermen and small coasters I understand the currents round the point are uncertain, and generally depend upon the wind, though the prevailing current is to the westward.

I experienced the current in a boat when I visited the outer break; it was then setting to the westward at the rate of one and a-half mile per hour at least. I also perceived vessels in the offing setting rapidly in the same direction; the breeze was from the eastward and light, though it had previously blown hard from the same point. We also, in our passage from Halifax to Canseau, during a fog, with the wind from the S. W., experienced an easterly current; but the land once made, the Harbour is easily attained, especially by a Steamer.

A judicious arrangement of Fog Signals, and Light Houses, with Buoys on the principal dangers, and a good survey, with the sea soundings well laid down, would make the approach in the night or during fogs attended with small danger to a careful seaman.

Latitude of Observation Rock, Whitehaven,  $45^{\circ} 14' 0''$  N.

Longitude " " "  $61^{\circ} 11' 4''$  W.

Variation  $21^{\circ} 42' 20''$  W. Rise of Tide from 3 to 6 feet. High water at the change of the Moon, 7h. 40m.

In the Admiralty Plan of this place, the general features and soundings appear correct, if we except some of the inner dangers, which are not noticed; but the scale is discrepant.

SIR,—In referring to my Report of the 11th, principally showing Whitehaven to be a port in every way calculated for the purpose designed, it has shown me that possibly there may have been some points neither so fully nor satisfactorily explained therein as might be considered desirable; and principally the deservedly high character of Halifax as a safe and convenient Port, has been not unfrequently adverted to by persons not very conversant with the details of minute navigation, implying that Halifax being so safe and secure a Port, it would not be prudent to establish another Port, and which could not fail to be detrimental to its local interests, (*viz.* of Halifax,) and could not on their assumed suppositions be either so safe or convenient. The comparative advantages of Halifax and Whitehaven must be in the first place decided by their respective Geographical positions, which is proved to be so much to the advantage of Whitehaven, (in the only view here taken of them) that the communications between Great Britain and Halifax (itself) would be accelerated at least twelve hours under any circumstances, and under some circumstances possibly by twice, or even thrice that difference of time. This fact must be decisive in the mere Geographical comparison.

In the second place, comparing the two points nautically, Halifax is a good, capacious, fine, safe harbour; so is Whitehaven, and in nothing that I know, inferior to Halifax.

In clear weather, by night or by day, both are equally available, and equally safe and easy of approach; so that the only circumstance still open to comparison, is in the too common case that at the time when entrance is sought into them respectively, all the points and the ship herself may be enveloped in a dense fog, and possibly her own jibboom-end not visible—the most perplexing and appalling case in precise navigation to seamen.

In case of fog, the attainment of Halifax Harbour requires twenty miles of pilotage navigation; for Whitehaven, never more than three or four; and the last is also more surely beacons. In truth, in the case of fogs, Halifax is difficult, and with the loose management of modern navigators, it is dangerous; in proof of which, it is a well known

known fact, that ships of war and others are sometimes detained outside the Harbour from half a day to three days before they can effect a sure and safe entrance, and serious delay to the Packets frequently occurs; besides, the known fact that one of these (the Britannia) once narrowly escaped wreck with serious damage among the dangers of Sambro, at the entrance of Halifax, near six leagues from the Port, and which must always be passed before that can be attained; and no longer ago than the middle of July last, the same vessel overshot the entrance to Halifax, and very narrowly escaped wreck, with serious damage, among rocks and ledges thirty miles beyond it, about Jeddore.

Both places must be subject to the casualties and accidents arising from mismanagement; but the field of occult movements, (in fogs) and the sphere of uncertainty in the navigation, is full ten times greater at Halifax than Whitehaven.

At the latter I could pledge myself to direct vessels as surely and certainly to any spot within its precincts, in fogs, as by a human voice in a boat ahead of and guiding them. Nevertheless, Halifax is by no means incapable of such arrangements for foggy weather, although no such attempt hitherto can be said to have been made, and they would there also be required on a much more extensive scale than at Whitehaven.

At a time when assiduous efforts in the United States are directed to the accomplishment of both Telegraphic and Rail Road communication with Montreal, as a central point through which to draw off the trade of the Canadas from British outlets, and by the advantages of such communication, eventually to supplant British manufactures and British shipping, the above comparison with regard to a countervailing advantage of the highest importance presenting itself to British Capitalists within their own territories, and under the protection of their own Government, may tend to demonstrate the practicability of securing and maintaining British commercial ascendancy in the Canadas, and that a national line of Rail Road, projected from the nearest available point of Nova Scotia, and judiciously and energetically carried into effect, promises, as far as the Canadas are concerned, not only to perpetuate such ascendancy, but also rather to benefit, by rendering tributary to a more extended commerce, all similar works in the United States.

The subject assumes unlimited interest as connected with an eventual overland communication with the Pacific, say at the rate of 14 or 16 days from Europe. The copper and silver mines now working and in progress of extensive discovery on Lake Superior, within the British as well as American territory, on the direct line of such communication, may tend, with other and more important causes, to accelerate the accomplishment of this design.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Your Excellency's communication of the 2d instant, accompanying the Commission in the Court of Governor and Council in causes of Marriage and Divorce.

I am quite aware of the terms of the enactment to which Your Excellency refers, by which the Lieutenant Governor is authorized to appoint either of the Judges of the Supreme Court or the Master of the Rolls to preside in the Court. It is obvious, however, though not expressed in the Act, yet as a matter of necessary implication, that a suitable place, properly appointed, and proper attendance should be provided for the holding the Court when Causes are to be brought before it during the stated Terms. These, it is true, are matters of minor detail, which, nevertheless, it is very necessary should be arranged before-hand in a satisfactory manner; indeed I deem it indispensable, not merely for the proper accommodation of the Members of the Court and Bar, but in order that the administration of Justice should be conducted in an orderly and respectable manner.

I am the more particularly impressed with the necessity of a proper understanding upon these points, from the circumstance that a Court of the high nature of that in which my present judicial duties are performed, after repeated representations to Your Excellency on the subject, has been left literally without an attendant officer.

That it is the duty of the Government to make the necessary provision for holding the Court, has not been denied, nor is the necessity of the case in the instance referred to, disputed; yet a state of things so unworthy has been allowed to remain without any effectual means being directed to supply the deficiency.

The particular requirements for the Court of Governor and Council which it occurs to me as necessary to specify, are—

1st. The place of holding the Court.

In Your Excellency's communication of the 20th ultimo, the Legislative Council Chamber is designated as the place in which it was to sit. It will be requisite that I should be informed whether this is to be the appointed place for its future sessions. During the sitting of the Legislature I presume it would not be practicable to use this apartment, and other provision must be made.

2d. Fuel for warming the Court Room; from whence to be obtained?

3d. Attendance to prepare and warm the Court Room, and for the necessary services of the Court during its sittings.

Your Excellency has mentioned the Messenger of the Executive Council as the Crier of the Court.

Is it to be his business, in addition to his attendance, to discharge the other several duties which I have specified?

Upon receiving satisfactory assurance on these points, I shall be ready to accept the Commission which Your Excellency has done me the honor to cause to be transmitted,

and which I at present retain, subject to the result of the arrangements I have referred to. But Your Excellency will, I trust, pardon me in frankly stating that I cannot consent to encounter, in a new Court, the probable recurrence of a state of things from which so much and so long continued inconvenience has resulted in the Court of Chancery.

SIR,—In my Letter to Your Excellency of the 6th November last, I had the honor to specify the particular accommodations which I deemed necessary to be settled and secured for duly conducting the judicial proceedings in the Court of the Governor and Council in matters of Marriage and Divorce, previous to my entering upon the office of Vice-President of the Court; expressing at the same time my readiness to undertake the duties on the necessary provision being made.

These particulars comprised and were limited to an apartment for the sitting of the Court, fuel, and attendance. The requisitions thus made were few, simple, and necessary, and nothing would seem to be more easy than for the Executive Government, in whose province it rested, to have given the desired satisfaction.

In that case the difficulty would have been removed, and the vacancy filled. I have yet to learn that the request was unreasonable.

To this Letter I have to the present time received no answer, but I have now the honor to acknowledge the receipt of a Minute of the Executive Council, under date the 10th day of December instant, enclosed to me by order of Your Excellency, for my "information and guidance," which, I presume, I am to consider Your Excellency's reply to my communication.

In this Minute no notice is taken of the representation made in regard to the particulars submitted, nor any information whatever afforded of the future arrangements of the Court; but I am informed, that in the opinion of the Gentlemen composing the Committee of Council to whom the correspondence had been submitted, (being the same Gentlemen, who afterwards, in conjunction with Your Excellency as a Council, approved of the Report,) "a plain duty was imposed upon me by Law, upon the "issuing of the Commission, from which I could not relieve myself," and of their "surprise and regret" that I should have declined undertaking the business of the Court on the 20th October last, on the ground of difficulties which they profess to consider purely imaginary, "and which the other Members of the Court saw no reason "to apprehend;" and dismissing in silence my representation as undeserving of notice, they recommend that I be peremptorily required to take my seat as Vice-President of the Court in the next February Term, at such place and hour as Your Excellency may appoint.

In reply, I beg to state, that if any "*plain duty*" has been imposed on me, which I have neglected, or shall neglect to discharge, I stand liable for the consequences. But with all possible deference for the opinion of the Gentlemen of the Committee, I must be governed by my own judgment of my duties and responsibilities.

When I expressed my readiness, on proper arrangements and accommodations being secured, to undertake the duties proposed, I did not stay to examine how far they were *legally incumbent* on me, but I conceived that whether *bound* or *not*, so to do, it was reasonable, that being named in the Act, I should be called on to lend my aid, provided the duties were not incompatible with other obligations. But I conceived at the same time that I had a full right to expect from the Provincial Government that due accommodations should be previously secured for the decent and respectable performance of these duties.

If any other or further obligation on my part is to be insisted on beyond this, it must be established on other authority than the opinion of the Executive Council; and with the Local Government must rest the responsibility of the proceeding, and of any delay in the administration of Justice that may result therefrom.

In

In pursuance of the intimation contained in my former Letter, and the views therein submitted, nothing now remains for me, having due regard as well to the station I am desired to occupy as that I have now the honor to hold, but most respectfully, but distinctly, to decline the appointment, and to return the Commission.

I beg further to state, that it is my intention to bring the whole subject under the consideration of Her Majesty's Government.

HON. SIR,—I had the honor to receive, on the 18th instant, your Letter of the 14th instant, on the subject of the correspondence which had passed between us relative to the Court of Governor and Council for Marriage and Divorce.

Having intended to reply to your Letter of the 6th November, after advising with the Executive Council, I regret that my intention should have been anticipated by a communication to you, in mistake, from the Provincial Secretary.

In no part of the correspondence has it been questioned that the Commission as Vice-President of the Court, which you have twice returned, was correctly issued under the Acts 31 Geo. 3, cap. 35, and 4 W. 4, cap. 30; and as it was discretionary with me to have addressed the Commission to one of the Justices of the Supreme Court, I think it right to observe, that in addressing it to you, I had not only in view to prevent the inconvenience that would have occurred from withdrawing one of the Judges of the Supreme Court then in Session, but also to avoid adding to the pressure on that Court, arising from the infirm health of the Chief Justice, and the increased labour on the Assistant Justices in the absence of Mr. R. Parker, whose health had obliged him to leave the Province.

In reference to the question of accommodation, I have to observe, that no special provision having been made for the Courts in which I have been called to preside, I have sometimes, as you are aware, sat in Chancery with the Judges or with yourself, either in the Supreme Court Room or in the Legislative Council Chamber, and if these had been pre-occupied, the Courts would probably have assembled at Government House, where every necessary arrangement would have been made for their accommodation and convenience; nor would this have been omitted in the case of the Court of Governor and Council.

In regard to your own Court you must be aware that beyond the assignment to you as Master of the Rolls of an apartment in the Public Buildings, the Government has had no means whatever at its disposal, and that a Bill to provide for certain Fees, to be applied to the payment of an Usher, which at your request was brought into the Assembly by Mr. Hazen in the last Session, was rejected by the House. How another Assembly may deal with the question, I am unable to anticipate.

On reference to the terms of the Acts, it is obvious that either your presence or that of one of the Judges, as Vice-President of the Court of Governor in Council, will be necessary in the ensuing Term, to prevent a denial of Justice; and although the Judges have always readily afforded me their assistance when required, I should regret extremely to be obliged to impose this additional labour on them, at a time when, from the great increase of duties which have devolved on them, they have already suffered in health.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge your Excellency's Letter of the 21st instant, on the subject of the Court of Governor and Council in Causes of Marriage and Divorce.

I have learned with some surprise, that the Minute of Council of the 10th instant was transmitted to me by mistake.

The terms of the Resolution adopted, expressing as it does the views of Your Excellency and the Members of the Council, and the measure to be taken thereupon, did not leave me room to doubt that it was intended to be communicated, as stated in the Letter of the Provincial Secretary which accompanied it, for my information and guidance.

If it was intended to continue the discussion while I was allowed to remain in ignorance of the foregone conclusion at which the Council had arrived, I cannot regret the accident by which I was made acquainted with it. If the Resolution was to have accompanied Your Excellency's Letter, discussion would in that case have been, as it appears to me now to be, superseded. The circumstance that I have been made prematurely apprised of the proceedings, cannot alter their character.

I thus stand charged in the opinion of Your Excellency's Government with the breach of a plain duty imposed by law, and a right is maintained, which I infer it is intended to enforce to unqualified and unhesitating submission.

All argument is of course at an end, and when the right and duty so relied on shall be established, will have become superfluous.

I shall be prepared to discuss the question of law before a competent tribunal, whenever the occasion may arrive. In the meantime, I must take leave to act on my own view of the law, even though it may conflict with the doctrine of the Executive Council.

In no part of my Letter have I questioned the reasons which have influenced the Local Government in the selection of myself, which Your Excellency has been advised to make, and therefore the reference to the infirm state of health of the Chief Justice, and the absence of Mr. Justice Parker from the country, was, I can assure Your Excellency, quite unnecessary. It is only to be regretted that Your Excellency's advisers have not deemed it consistent with their duty, by a different course of proceeding, to obviate any embarrassment in the appointment of a Vice-President.

I have been already made aware of the facts to which Your Excellency alludes in regard to the Court of Chancery. If the influence of the Executive Government has proved insufficient to command the small sum required for the needful accommodation of the Court, or even to procure the passage of an Act to make an alteration in the Fee Table, for this purpose, it is of course only to be regretted. But it must be assuredly admitted to furnish no great encouragement for leaving the arrangements of another Court to the chance of future contingencies. I have no desire to trespass further on Your Excellency by re-opening the discussion on the present occasion.

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The Committee, composed of all the Members of the Executive Council, having perused the Correspondence submitted by His Excellency relating to the refusal of the Master of the Rolls to sit as Vice-President of the Court of Governor and Council in Causes of Marriage and Divorce, at the Term of that Court on the third Tuesday in October last, advise His Excellency, that in their opinion, the Lieutenant Governor having, in strict accordance with the provisions of the Law establishing that Court, appointed the Master of the Rolls Vice-President thereof, by an Instrument prescribed by 31 Geo. 3, cap. 5, and bearing date 19th October, 1846, the Master of the Rolls could not relieve himself from the performance of duties (by no means onerous) imposed on him by Law, on the issuing of such Commission.

The Committee cannot but express their surprise and regret that the Master of the Rolls should have returned the Commission and declined to take his seat, in mere anticipation of inconveniences in regard to the place of holding the Court or the attendance thereon, which neither His Excellency or the other Members of the Court saw any reason to apprehend, and recommend that the Master of the Rolls be notified that he is required to take his seat as Vice-President of the Court, on the second Tuesday in February next, at such place and hour as His Excellency, as President of the Court, may be pleased to direct, on the approach of the Term.

# REPORTS ON ROADS AND BRIDGES.

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## FREDERICTON TO WOODSTOCK.

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### Annual Report on the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock, by A. Goodfellow.

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To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir William Macbean George Colebrooke, K. H.,  
Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having had occasion to report at different times during last Summer, on the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock, a lengthy Report is at this time unnecessary.

Accompanying this Report is a statement of the services to which the means at my disposal have been applied during the last Summer, which shews a balance of £36 12s. 6d. unexpended.

By the statement annexed, it will be seen that £944 7 8 have been expended in the erection of three new Bridges, in the room of those destroyed by the last Spring Freshet, on the southerly side of the Saint John River, and £281 17s. on a Bridge and Road on the north side of the River, leaving but a very small sum out of the whole Grant for the ordinary repairs of the Road.

In my Report for 1845, to which I now beg to refer, I noticed the then state of the Road, and suggested such alterations as I deemed necessary to improve the travelling, but in consequence of the unexpected destruction of the Bridges, the restoring of which was indispensable, nothing beyond keeping the Road passable has been done.

In the Report already referred to, after noticing the state of the Road from Fredericton to Springhill, I recommended an exploration for an improved line from the Indian Village to Cliff's Bridge. This has now become indispensable, owing to many parts of the Road between these points having become nearly impassable. From inquiry made last Summer, I have reason to believe, that a new line of Road, nearly level, and shorter than the Post Road, can be got with much less difficulty than was expected. There is no part of the line so much complained of by travellers as the part under consideration; and no expenditure that could take place would afford the same amount of benefit to travelling. To effect this alteration, the sum of £700 at least, would be required.

Cliff's Bridge will need repairing in the course of the ensuing Summer.

The repairing of Long's Creek and rebuilding Garden's Creek Bridges, will require at least £300.

For new covering, and otherwise repairing the several Bridges on the line, £250 will be necessary; and for the ordinary repairs that will be indispensable, £200.

During last Summer a new Bridge was built across the Nackawick, and 214 rods of Road completed. There are about 140 rods to be made on the lower side of the Stream, and about 270 rods on the upper side of it, in order to make a suitable connexion from the Bridge to the old Road, which will cost about £200; therefore a Grant of not less than £2000 will be required to put the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock in a safe state of travelling.

**Report on the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock, by A. Goodfellow.**

*Miramichi, N. B., 10th December, 1846.*

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 1st instant, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, enclosing a statement from Mr. J. R. Tupper, on the state of the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock; and I now beg to make the following Report for His Excellency's information:—

When I last examined the line of Road now under consideration, which was about the 10th ultimo, I found the travelling very bad, particularly the first 15 miles from Fredericton, occasioned from the late rains, which must always be the case at that period of the year, from the nature of the soil of which the Road is composed, until gravel is procured and applied as a top dressing after the Road is properly formed. Indeed the Roads generally were in a worse state previous to the setting in of Winter, than I have known them for years past, which I think has been occasioned by the excessive drouth of last Summer, which caused the Roads to become pulverized; and when the rains fell, the dust became a coat of mud. Even the repairs of last Summer were less beneficial than formerly, from the same cause; and I have no doubt, but the drouth was also injurious to the Bridges; having caused the covering and tree-nails to shrink and become loose; and where a little decayed, were, from having lost their moisture, easier broken. The Bridges particularly referred to by Mr. Tupper, are in nearly the state described by him, with the exception of the term "Cob-work,"

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and

and not fit to be travelled over, as they have been travelled over all the Summer and Fall without any inconvenience that I am aware of; the Road-way, however, over those Bridges is narrower than the ordinary width; and as the sides are unprotected by a Rail, it would contribute to the public safety, particularly in Winter, if a temporary Rail shall be put up, which can be done under the directions of the Commissioners of Highways, out of the Statute Labour, with some of the railing of the old Bridges. The means placed at my disposal during last Summer not having been sufficient to rebuild all the Bridges destroyed by the Spring Freshet, and a temporary passage having been made over the two Bridges referred to, they have, from necessity, been allowed to remain in the state described; but I am not prepared to recommend the rebuilding of them during the Winter, as it would be very difficult, if at all practicable, to get a sufficient foundation while the frost is in the ground; contracts should, however, be entered into without delay, so that the building materials could be prepared, and hauled to the spot during Winter, and the building proceeded with in the Spring.

The covering of several of the Bridges having become dangerous, I reported the circumstance to His Excellency on the 5th September last. In that Report I stated that arrangements had been made to have the Shockomock and Sullivan Creek Bridges repaired, with some of the old covering of the Bridges destroyed; but a sufficient quantity could not be got, it having been clandestinely taken away by the inhabitants in the vicinity of the Bridges. I have, however, since that time, taken the responsibility of having a new covering of 3 inch Hemlock Plank placed along the centre of the Shockomock Bridge, 10 feet in width, which renders travelling on that Bridge perfectly safe for the present. And I have no apprehension of any thing particular happening any of the other Bridges until the Spring sets in, when there is a probability that Mr. Tupper's fears may be realized, particularly at Garden's Creek.

I have repeatedly in my former Reports recommended the entering into Contracts in the Autumn for all wood materials required for the Road Service for the ensuing year, and I beg again to urge the same opinion. It is universally admitted that wood cut in Winter, when the sap is down, is much more durable than when the sap is up. The best time for cutting being from October to February, and when it is a distance to haul, which will be increasing as the woods are cut away, the saving would be great when compared with Summer hauling. Men are also more at leisure with their teams, the farming operations being then stopped, from the severity of the frost and depth of snow. When Bridges, &c. of any extent are to be built, if the Contract is not entered into until June or July, the work must be taken at a great additional price, (and generally not so well done,) to enable the Contractor to meet the expense; while, if the materials were on the spot in the Spring, the work could be proceeded with whenever the frost shall be out of the ground, and the public would get the benefit of the work early in the Summer. As regards new covering for Bridges, it might be well to make arrangements for a quantity of Hemlock Logs, to be hauled to the Mills nearest the Bridges wanting repairs, and have them sawn, so that they could be got to the spot before the breaking up of the hauling in the Spring; every means should be tried to improve the quality of Bridge materials, and prevent their decay; as I believe it is only five years since many of the Bridges, now wanting repairs, were built; and from the immense extent of Bridging on the line, the annual expense in future of keeping them up, must be very great. I am however of opinion, that on many of the small Streams, where at present there are Bridges, if Stone drains and Embankments of earth should be substituted, a great saving would be effected.

From long observation, I am convinced, that, if instead of repairing the Roads, as at present, by Contracts or day labourers, in June and July, in each year, that after the different lines of Road were opened up and formed, they were laid off in lots of from five to twenty miles, according to circumstances, and Contracts taken, for at least one year at a time, in this way the persons holding the Contracts would feel it to be their interest to attend to their repairs in the Spring and Fall of the year, which is the time they suffer most, while under the present system, they are entirely neglected at that season of the year; proper care being taken by the Superintendent, that proper materials were at all times applied. To effect this, it might be necessary to repeal the present Statute Labour Law, and substitute a small money tax in its stead,

along

along the lines of Great Roads, there being generally no good done under the present system, but an entire waste of the people's time.

**Report on Bridges between Fredericton and Woodstock, by A. Goodfellow.**

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 11th instant, informing me that His Excellency in Council has been pleased to appropriate the sum of eighty pounds for the repairs of the Bridges on the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock, and that a Warrant would issue in my favor for the same, and requiring immediate steps to be taken to place them in a safe state for travelling.

Having been called upon by your letter of the 1st instant, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to report on J. R. Tupper's communication of the state of the Bridges referred to by him, and having attended to that duty, (dated 10th instant,) I now beg to state for His Excellency's information, that although I cannot entertain a doubt of the present safety of the Bridges, beyond what I formerly expressed, still, I admit the necessity of arrangements being at once entered into to procure materials, so that the repairs may be proceeded with as soon in the Spring as practicable. I will, therefore, proceed to Fredericton with as little delay as possible, in order to have His Excellency's wishes attended to.

**Report on the state of the Bridges on the Woodstock Road, by A. Goodfellow.**

*Miramichi, 16th January, 1847.*

SIR,—In pursuance of instructions communicated to me in your letter of the 11th ultimo, and to which I have already replied, I proceeded to the River Saint John for the purpose of examining the state of the Bridges on part of the line of Road from Fredericton to Woodstock, and now beg to report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that I found all the Bridges on a distance of 33 miles from Fredericton (that being as far as I went) in the same state as when examined by me in November last, and since reported on; but as there is a probability that the temporary Bridge across Garden's Creek, may be carried away by the next Spring Freshet, I beg again to bring under the consideration of His Excellency the necessity of at once entering into a contract for a new Bridge across that Stream, so that the materials may be got to the site during Winter.

It will also be necessary to new cover the centre of Sullivan's Creek and Eel River Bridge, 12 feet in width, with Hemlock plank, which should be contracted for, and the plank got to the spot before the breaking up of the Winter hauling.

There are also several other Bridges on the line that will want repairs, particularly two small Bridges in the Parish of Dumfries, that should be contracted for immediately, for the reasons set forth in my Report of the 10th ultimo.

**Mr. Baillie's Report on Mr. Goodfellow's Reports relative to the Road between Woodstock and Fredericton, &c. &c. &c.**

*Crown Land Office, 22d January, 1847.*

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Mr. Secretary Saunders' letter of the 28th ultimo, enclosing to me Mr. Goodfellow's Report in reference to the state of the Road between this place and Woodstock, and requesting my attention to the suggestions of the Supervisor, and my Report thereon. It is also intimated, that if I could prepare a Bill in amendment of the Road Law, Your Excellency thinks it would be advisable to do so.

In obedience to Your Excellency's commands, I have the honor to state, that not having made a personal inspection of the Road with a view to report on the same, I am unable to enter into any particulars or details connected with the Road in question. That the Road must be kept in a state of repair will be readily admitted; and that it can be done at less expense by hauling out the stuff necessary for the repair of the Bridges in the Winter season, does not admit of a question; and the only impediment to such a continued arrangement from year to year, is the manner in which the money for the repair of the Great Roads is voted by the Legislature. This might be obviated if a sum of money were annually voted as Great Road Contingent Fund, and placed at the command of Your Excellency in Council, an account of which would of course be laid before the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, together with a statement of all Contracts entered into for each Road.

I quite agree with the remarks of the Supervisor, that in many places where expensive Bridges have to be built and kept in a state of repair, at a constant outlay of the public money, stone drains and embankments of earth could be advantageously substituted.

With regard to the construction of Bridges of wood, I beg to suggest to the consideration of Your Excellency in Council, that the Supervisors should be instructed, *whenever it is practicable*, to use Larch Timber, not only for the timbers, but also for the covering of the Bridges. It is stronger and much more durable than any other description of wood which is applicable to the general building of Bridges, and although it might, in the first instance, cost something more, yet its durability will fully compensate for such extra charge.

I generally concur in the remarks of the Supervisor, not only with regard to the times at which Contracts should be made and the work executed, but also that it would be very desirable that certain portions of the Road should be let, to be kept in a state of repair for a specified length of time; the advantage of such a system would soon be apparent, and I believe that a great saving of the public money would be the result.

That the expenditure of the Statute Labour upon the Great Roads is, in many instances, prejudicial to the Roads, I fully believe, but until a general amendment of the Road Law be deemed necessary by a very large majority of the Provincial Legislature, it would be deemed presumption in me, as a new Member of the Assembly, to prepare any Bill for that object; whenever it may be deemed expedient so to do, my humble abilities shall be devoted to the subject, but in the meantime I pray that Your Excellency will excuse me from so onerous a task.

**WOODSTOCK TO GRAND FALLS.**

**Report on Road from Woodstock to the Grand Falls, by James Ketchum.**

*Woodstock, 5th February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In laying before you my Annual Report of the Great Road of communication from Woodstock to the Grand Falls, I have to state, that all the Bridges injured and carried away

away by the Ice Freshet last Spring, between Woodstock and the Arestook, have all been put in a proper state of repair; the Little Presqu'ile Bridge has been built entirely new, besides two other small Bridges between that and the Big Presqu'ile River; the Bridge over the latter has been repaired, besides adding one more heater, and more ballast to the abutments. The building and repairing of these Bridges have cost a considerable more than the amount appropriated for that purpose: consequently I have not been able to make any great improvements on this part of the Road; but it is in a tolerable good state of repair. On the new line of Road from the Arestook to the Grand Falls I have made four miles one hundred and six rods of turnpike Road, besides repairing it from Ballard's to Stephenson's, a distance of about four miles. There is still a great deal to be done on this Road to make it in a good passable state; in fact the whole line requires a great number of alterations and improvements, in order to avoid bad hills. One part of this line in particular, from Parson Thompson's Farm to the Mouth of the Arestook, overflows in parts in the Spring Freshets in such a way that it is difficult to pass; the distance is about two miles, and could be put on very advantageous ground, and greatly to the benefit of the public, at the expense of about £150 to £180.

In conclusion, I beg leave to submit, for Your Excellency's information, an estimate of sums that will in my opinion be required to make the necessary repairs and improvements on this line of Road, which is hereunto annexed.

#### PRESQUE ISLE BRIDGE.

##### Report on Bridge over Presqu'ile River, by James Ketchum.

Woodstock, 8th February, 1847.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having been appointed Commissioner to build a Bridge over the Big Presqu'ile River, over the Williamstown Road, (explored by Hayward and Brown,) beg leave to submit to Your Excellency the following Report:—

As

As early in the Spring as the Freshet would permit, I proceeded to measure the Stream, in order to make out my Plan and Specifications; and then immediately advertised for Tenders;—Jonathan Tracy's being the lowest Tender accepted, who entered into contract for the performance of the work, and has completed the Bridge in every respect in a satisfactory manner, and agreeable to the Plan and Specifications. The Bridge is in length 300 feet, 20 feet wide, and 17 feet in height from the bed of the River, erected on four shore Abutments, and two Piers standing in the Stream, with Heators or Fenders running up the River 35 feet, filled up solid with stone to their tops, leaving a span of 60 feet supported by queen posts and braces, made of sawn Tamarack timber, planed and painted; the railing is also made of Tamarack timber, planed and painted. The Piers, Heators and Abutments are all composed of square Hemlock timber of the best quality. The amount of Mr. Tracy's contract was £319 10s.—it being the amount of his Tender; which would leave a balance, over and above the Grant, of £82 due him; which balance he runs his own risk, by agreement, in his getting it from the Legislature. But I must say, in justice to Mr. Tracy, that the work done by him on the Bridge could not be performed for less money than the full amount of his contract.

### GRAND FALLS TO CANADA LINE.

#### Report of the Supervisor of Great Roads from the Grand Falls to the Canada Line.

*Madawaska, 13th February, 1847.*

*To His Excellency Colonel Sir William Macbean George Colebrooke, K. H., &c. &c.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I deem it proper at this time to report, for the information of Your Excellency, the condition of the Road under my supervision, and have set down the distances, so that in any Grant of Money to be expended on that Road, it may be known where the expenditure is most required.

Commencing at the Cross Roads at the Grand Falls near the School House:

From the School House to the Ferry Landing on the western bank of the River is 163 rods, (the River at the Ferry is 82 rods wide). The Road on the eastern bank from the Ferry was made, last Summer, as far as Thibideau's Mill; about 7½ miles: from that point, for 1½ miles, the Road is not made: between this point and Coombes' lower line, say about 3 miles, there is nearly a mile of the Road made.

From Coombes' lower line to Grand River, 3½ miles, there are parts of the Road made: through the swamps and over soft land from Grand River to the Sygas—2 miles—176 rods was made last Summer, except about 70 rods.

From Sygas to the Quisibis, about 4 miles not made: thence to Gagnon's, 4 miles farther, the Road has been made passable by Statute Labour only. On other parts of the Road, up to the Little Falls, there are some places which have not yet been properly made, and indeed the whole line will require repair.

Your Excellency will perceive by the foregoing, that it has been the business of the Supervisor, in laying out the Legislative Grants for the past two years, to endeavour to get the Road from Grand to the Little Falls passable; for this end he has repaired the Road where it was necessary, and opened and made only such portions of the remainder as will enable persons to pass over it.

A Bridge is required over the Quisibis River and over Grand River.

From the surveys and explanation of the Road between Little Falls and the Saint Francis, made by me in 1845, I am prepared to state, that it is not more difficult to make that Road, than a Road in any other part of the Country; as a general thing,  
the

the Road can be cheaper made. There will be a number of small Bridges required over Gullies and Brooks, the cost of which it is difficult to determine. In the whole distance of 36 miles there will be required 16 Bridges over small Brooks and Gullies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Legislative Grant of one thousand pounds for the Road from Fredericton to Newcastle, has been applied to the various wants of the line, which may be classed under the different heads, as per statement annexed; this statement shews an over-expenditure of £239 6 7.

When I entered into the Contracts in June last, I entertained the expectation that the Bridge across Bartholomew's River, might be kept passable another year, but about midsummer it became so dangerous that it was deemed necessary to build a new one, which has cost £229 19s.

With the hope of preserving the Renous Bridge in a passable condition, I have entered into a Contract for the erection of an Ice Breaker in the centre of the Stream, which will be completed by the 15th March next, at a cost of £139.

In consequence of the damage done by the Ice Freshet last Spring, which had to be met out of the ordinary appropriations, and the numerous wants of so long a line, say 100 miles, I have not been able to attend to the alterations recommended in my last Report, viz:—Below Hanson's, on the Nashwaak, and at Hovey's Hill, on the South West: These alterations are much required, and should be provided for in the appropriations of the current year.

I commenced to improve the line of Road from Wilson's Point, upwards, last Summer, and completed a distance of 3½ miles, but a farther distance of 1½ miles is necessary to connect it with the present Road at J. Willoughby's, Esquire, which will probably cost £150, including two small Bridges.

There are three Bridges on the line, one at Leslie's, one on the Glebe, and one at R. Crocker's Mill, that are all in a very dangerous state, and there is reason to fear that when the frost comes out in the Spring, they will fall down; but whether that happen or not, the travelling in Summer will be impeded, as there is no passing the Rivers over which these Bridges cross, without Bridges.

These Bridges should have been contracted for in the Fall, so that the building materials might have been prepared during Winter; they will cost from £300 to £320.

The Nashwaak Bridge requires to be attended to, as the materials appear to be rapidly decaying, and may not withstand the Freshet of next Spring.

In addition to the new Bridges required on the line, and the alterations suggested, £200 at least will be required for the ordinary repairs of the Road.

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**BRIDGE OVER SOUTH WEST MIRAMICHI.**


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Reports relative to Bridge across the South West Miramichi, by A. Goodfellow.

Fredericton, 17th March, 1847.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 23d ultimo, informing me that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to appoint me Commissioner to expend the sum of £900, granted by the Legislature for a Bridge across the South West, at the site fixed by James Brown, Esquire.

I now beg to report, for the information of His Excellency, that having entertained doubts as to the safety of a Bridge at Swim's Ferry, and after having carefully examined the Report of Mr. Brown, as to the kind of Bridge he recommended, I am of opinion, that with a view of increasing the space between the Piers, and thereby increase the safety of the Bridge, when the Ice is breaking up in the Spring, a Truss Bridge would be better suited to that Stream than the one proposed by Mr. Brown. And I now beg to submit the design of one on the Plank Truss principle, which, if adopted, will permit of leaving out one of the Piers in Mr. Brown's design, and permit of shortening the end abutments. A Bridge on this principle has been standing across the Saint Croix, at Saint Stephen, for the last three years, and is now in a very perfect state. As it was necessary, before recommending this Bridge, to ascertain the probable cost, I proceeded to Saint Stephen last week for that purpose, and from information obtained there, I am of opinion that the additional cost of a Plank Truss Bridge, with a single Roadway, when closed in on the roof and sides, would not exceed £100 more than the Bridge recommended by Mr. Brown, although I am of opinion that his estimate is rather low.

If the Bridge now reported should be adopted, I beg to recommend that a Contract be entered into for the erection of the abutments, piers, heaters, fenders, and approaches; and as the Truss requires to be built with much care, an experienced workman be employed

employed by the day to superintend the erection of this part of the work ; this I deem the more necessary, because the Truss principle has not yet been fairly tested in this Province, and when attempted, has in part proved defective ; and also because it is difficult so to prepare a specification for work of a somewhat novel character, as to ensure its proper execution by captious or designing Contractors.

SIR,—I have to report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that after submitting my Report of the 17th instant, on the proposed Bridge across the South West, at Swim's Ferry, (and to which I now beg to refer,) I caused Handbills to be printed and extensively circulated, one of which is enclosed, advertising for Tenders to be received at Fredericton until 10 o'clock, A. M., on the 26th, and at Newcastle until 12 o'clock noon, on the 29th instant, for the erection of the under part of the contemplated Bridge. A Plan of the entire Bridge, and a Specification of the work to be contracted for, is also forwarded.

No Tenders were received at the former place, and only one at the latter, which I now beg to submit. The amount of this Tender is much above the sum contemplated in Mr. Brown's Report on the cost of said Bridge, and at least one hundred pounds more than I expected that part of the work to cost ; but as the expense of the part now tendered for, is dependent on the state of the weather of next Summer, and as a rainy Summer would materially increase the expense, if not entirely prevent the founding of the Piers, &c., it is impossible to say with any degree of certainty what it will cost.

I have intimated to Mr. Elliot, that I would submit the amount of his Tender to the consideration of His Excellency for his approval, and I now have to request His Excellency's early consideration of the matter and reply thereto.

Should the Tender be accepted, and the truss and closing in of the Bridge cost £600, which is the estimated amount, the sum of £500, in addition to the Grant, will be required to meet the expense of the Bridge and Commission.

I beg to request that the Plan and Specification be returned with the information now sought for.

### NEWCASTLE TO CAMPBELLTON.

#### Report on the Great Roads from Newcastle to Campbellton, by D. Crocker.

*Nelson, 3rd February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having been appointed by Your Excellency, Supervisor of the Great Roads from Newcastle to Bathurst, and from thence to Dalhousie and Campbellton, on the Restigouche, and having performed the work, beg leave to report thereon for Your Excellency's information :—

That, early in May last, I proceeded to Bathurst, and examined the general state of the Roads from Miramichi to thence, and having ascertained that immediate repairs were required, I employed a party of men, with a horse and cart, by the month, and in this mode put the Road in a fair state of repair. I subsequently advertized and took Contracts to the extent of the amount placed at my disposal, and having had the work performed early in the season, travelling was much accelerated, and the money, I trust, judiciously expended.

The greater part of this Road has been a long time made, and from the extent of travelling, is much worn out, and many of the Bridges will require repairing and new covering, which must be attended to early in the Spring. The Bridge across the Tabusintac is of great importance, and from its decayed state will require to be rebuilt, and will cost at least one hundred pounds.

I have expended the amount placed at my disposal from Bathurst towards Dalhousie in the following manner:—I have expended eighty six pounds in completing the Road to Belledune Bridge, and the balance in making from five to six miles of new Road between Nash's Creek and Eel River, in the County of Restigouche, which, with over one hundred expended in repairs throughout, has consumed the amount granted, and I now pronounce the Road from Tattagouche to Eel River Bridge, a distance of forty five miles, with the exception of the Bridge across Louisies Brook, in a very efficient state.

A new Bridge however will be required across Lonsong's Brook, the present one having been built on single bents, and from its dangerous state, I was obliged to expend twelve pounds to keep it up, and render it passable with safety. The Bridge is of some importance, the site is a deep Brook, with steep banks on either side, and will require to be at least twenty six feet high, and two hundred and fifty feet long, independent of the approaches, which on the western side is very considerable. Experience has taught me, that on the Bay Shore, unless the Bridges are raised on a level with the banks of the Stream, they are subject to the action of the snow drifts in the Winter, which form to such a depth as to render the travelling both difficult and dangerous. At least two hundred pounds will be required for this Bridge and approaches.

The Road from Dalhousie to Campbellton, a distance of sixteen miles, is very much out of repair, although I expended one hundred pounds on it last year; from the nature of the soil, and the face of the country, the Road is a very hard one to keep up, and being the great thoroughfare through the County, and connecting the Towns of Dalhousie and Campbellton, consequently the travelling is immense; as such, an annual Grant will be required for this service, and by degrees to reduce the number of steep hills on the Road. I should recommend an alteration in this Road, commencing about three miles below Campbellton, and extending to Walker's Brook, a distance of about three miles, in order to avoid long and heavy hills; I made an exploration last season, and such an alteration could be advantageously made, so as to shorten the present Road, and avoid the principal hills, by carrying the Road nearer the Restigouche River, and which alteration would cost in the whole about two hundred pounds.

In my former Report I had referred to the state of the Road from Eel River Bridge to Dalhousie, across the mountains, and would again bring the same under Your Excellency's consideration. I some five years ago ascertained that a line could be got from Eel River to the Crooked Bridge, and that a Survey and Plan would be requisite; I last year continued my exploration, and laid out a Road from Eel River to the Town of Dalhousie, across the mountains, a plan of which is herewith, and the said Road is staked throughout and ready for working the next Spring, and forms a junction with the Street in rear of Dalhousie; the line is the best that can be found, and although it is very hilly, and will require at least eight hundred pounds to complete it, still the Road, when completed, will be a very passable one. I should strongly recommend that an appropriation be made for the completion of this Road, as its present mountainous condition forms a barrier to the present route.

In October last I employed Mr. Deputy M'Niel, and with his assistance chained and took the courses and distances of the whole Road from Bathurst to Dalhousie, and procured a Plan of the same, which shews the distance to be fifty one miles, and from three to four miles shorter than the old Road. The Plan accompanies this Report, which also shews a number of the Bye Roads of both Gloucester and Restigouche, within the distance.

I would, before closing this Report, bring particularly under Your Excellency's consideration, the state of the Bridge across the Bathurst Basin, connecting the Town of Bathurst with the Village on the Great Road of communication from Miramichi to Restigouche; the Bridge is very extensive, and most useful for the wants of the public; from its extent requires constant supervision; and from the shallowness of the water, the ice has extraordinary action upon the Bridge, from which cause many of the blocks  
have

have been partially removed, and some lost their mud sills; the flooring is in some places much worn. I should recommend most strenuously that an appropriation be made for this Bridge, as from its extent, usefulness, and the amount required to build it, every means should be resorted to, and no means withheld to insure its permanency.

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### CHATHAM TO RICHIBUCTO.

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#### Report on Road from Chatham to Richibucto, by David Crocker.

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*Nelson, 2nd February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

As Supervisor of the Great Road of communication between Richibucto and Chatham, I have the honor to report thereon for Your Excellency's consideration.

That early last Spring I examined this line, and put three men, with a horse and cart, thereon, to make the necessary repairs for immediate travelling, which was done at the cost of sixteen pounds, and to my satisfaction. That on the 9th June last, I commenced to let the repairing of the Roads by Auction, and continued until the greater part of the money was expended, and the Contracts were completed early in August, with the exception of the Bridge across the Kouchibouguasis, on which I expended one hundred and three pounds; I caused one hundred and forty feet of it to be taken down, and rebuilt in a substantial manner; within the last two years I have laid out thereon one hundred and sixty pounds; but from its great extent of eight hundred feet, there yet remains three hundred and forty five feet in a dilapidated state, and which must be taken down and rebuilt the next season, and cannot be estimated at less than two hundred and fifty pounds.

The Bridge across Cafeley's Brook is in a dangerous state, and requires to be taken down in the Spring and replaced; the logs are rotten; and for the safety of travellers the Bridge must be renewed. The Bridge will require to be raised six feet higher than the present Bridge, as the hills on either side are heavy, and will cost at least ninety pounds.

There are a number of other Bridges on the line which have only received temporary repairs for some time, and will require attention in the Spring; the whole extent is forty miles through, on which there is immense travelling, being the mail route to Halifax, and will require at least two hundred pounds, independent of the sum named for the two Bridges, to keep the line in a passable state. I allow nothing in this estimate for Statute Labour, as that is exclusively appropriated to the Bye Roads.

After the money had been expended as granted on this line last year, the Bridge across the Bay du Vin River had been destroyed by fire, of which fact I, in August last, informed Your Excellency, and at the same time stated that it was absolutely necessary that the Bridge should be rebuilt without delay; I subsequently received an answer from the Honorable J. S. Saunders, acknowledging the receipt of my Report, and approving of my rebuilding the Bridge, and that he would again address me after the meeting of the Council, but I have not as yet received any further communication on the subject; I have however had a good substantial Bridge erected by Public Auction, across the said Stream, and have paid for the same the sum of eighty one pounds, in cash, and trust that the amount be appropriated this year.

**GOODFELLOW'S TO NORTHUMBERLAND LINE.**

**Report on Great Road from Goodfellow's, round the Coast, to the Northumberland Line, at Tracad, by James Davidson.**

*Miramichi, January 24, 1847.*

SIR,—As Supervisor of the Great Road from Goodfellow's, round the Coast, to the Northumberland Line, at Tracad, I beg leave to submit the following Report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor:—

Early in the Spring I examined the whole route, and as part of the Road was almost in an impassable state, not having received any repair since it was first made, I concluded it most beneficial for the public, to expend a considerable part of the small sum at my disposal in repairing.

On the 8th of June, I advertised the Road to be let by Public Auction on the 22d and 25th of the same month, when I attended and entered into Contracts with the respective parties who had purchased, for the faithful performance of the work, which has since been completed in a satisfactory manner and at a moderate rate, as will appear on reference to my Account.

I expended £91 2 6 in repairs between Bartibog and Tabusintac, and with the remaining £65 5 3, I opened and finished one mile between Tabusintac and Tracad, through the wilderness, which is turnpiked twenty feet wide, with water courses and drains to carry off the superabundant water.

I would beg leave to bring under His Excellency's notice the dangerous state of Bartibog Bridge. This Bridge is nearly 800 feet long; the butments are firm and good, but the covering has become rotten and very dangerous; I expended a small sum last Summer as well as the previous Summer, to keep it passable, but unless the covering is made anew it will be exceedingly dangerous for travellers, and to give it a thorough repair would cost about £125, and then there would be a good carriage Road as far as Tabusintac, which would only require a trifling sum to keep it in repair for many years. From Tabusintac to Goold's Ferry, at Tracad, the distance is about 12 miles, only one mile of which has been made, but as the ground is highly favorable for a Road, in my opinion about £750 or £800 would complete it, which, together with the sum required to repair the Bartibog Bridge, would be about £900, and that would complete a carriage Road to Goold's Ferry, at Tracad. I subjoin a table of distances, shewing the Bridges on that line.

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**FREDERICTON TO CORRY'S, NEREPI'S.**


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**Report on Great Road from Fredericton to Corry's, by H. T. Partelow.**

*Fredericton, 27th February, 1847.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Road from Fredericton to Corry's, as well as the Bridges on the same, under my supervision during the past year, have had my best attention; and I now respectfully beg leave to state, that between Fredericton and the Oromocto a Bridge on the Intervale has been erected, and three others repaired, and that the turnpiking, repairing, &c. of the Road has been also done in places where most required, the Road has also been gravelled, when the same could be obtained.

The Bridge over the Oromocto, as well as the Draw, have had considerable repairs, having been covered with Hemlock; the Planks, many, very many of them have decayed, and they have been replaced with Pine; the Bridge will require in the ensuing season a careful inspection of the covering, much of which will have to be replaced. The Bridge is 1,750 feet by 24, the covering 4 inches.

From the Oromocto to Corry's, on the Road leading thence, I have built two Bridges, one over the Rockwell Stream, the other over a Brook below Park's; several Bridges have been repaired, and the Road skirted, turnpiked, and wherever possible, gravelled; the only alteration made in the Road is very trifling, viz: The Hill on the Road leading from the Oromocto Bridge to the Highway in Burton, has been improved, by inclining the Road to the left, and cutting the Hill down.

In the ensuing season, besides general repairs of Bridges, and a number of cross drains on the route, a Bridge will be required over a Stream near Muldoon's, which will cost about £50. The Road still, and will always require a considerable amount of money to keep it up. In consequence of the land being so hilly, the heavy rains have great effect upon it.

The Statute Labour between Fredericton and the Oromocto, I believe, has been performed; at Garey the inhabitants work on the Roads adjacent, and through the Nerepis Settlement, the Commissioners, I was informed, compelled the inhabitants to work on the Bye Roads leading to new Settlements forming in the vicinity of the same.

I have transmitted my Account, with the vouchers, to the Auditor General, to which I would refer Your Excellency.

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**FREDERICTON TO FINGER BOARD.**


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**Report on Road from Fredericton to the Finger Board, by N. Hubbard.**

*Burton, 26th January, 1847.*

SIR,—I beg leave to submit the following Report for His Excellency's information:—The Road under my supervision from Fredericton to the Finger Board, was in October last in a good state of repair; still much room for further improvements, turnpiking, widening the Road by cutting out the trees and bushes that have grown up on each side of the Road since the Road was made; and from Colwell's, crossing the Jemseg, to the River Saint John, where it intersects the old Road, not any improvement has been made, (except the Bridge built over Trout Creek, and also a Causeway made,) which was done by the Grant, £70, made last Session to build the said Bridge over Trout Creek, and will now require a further sum of £150 to raise another Causeway, and to erect a small Bridge, and further improvements which are necessary to be made

made in order to make this new line of Road passable ; and £250 for the old Road ; and a further sum of £—— to pay William Colwell for damages in taking this new line of Road through his Farm. In making this new Road last Summer through Mr. Colwell's Farm, I considered that I would not be justified in paying Mr. Colwell his demand for damages out of the Grant, £100, made Session 1846 for said Road, as I had stated in my Report so much money was wanted for the Road, and nothing said about damages to pay William Colwell.

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**FREDERICTON TO MAGAGUADAVIC, AND EEL RIVER TO DIGDEGUASH.**

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**Report on Great Roads from Fredericton to Magaguadavic and from Eel River to Digdeguash, by L. B. Rainsford.**

*Fredericton, 1st February, 1847.*

SIR,—In accounting for Receipts and Expenditure during the past year as Supervisor of Great Roads, I have the honor to report, that on the Road from Fredericton to Magaguadavic I have remodeled and turnpiked it, in what were the worst places, and have repaired the Magaguadavic Bridge, and heator, and the approaches to the Bridge, and made shares to protect it ; and Contracts for new covering and railing it, and the Bridge at the Burnt Mill, are given out, but have not yet been completed. Some parts of the Road were originally turnpiked only twenty feet wide ; those parts require widening, and a number of new water courses are wanted.

On the Road from Eel River to Digdeguash, I have turnpiked two and a half miles near the north east end ; the residue remains as it was last year, and cannot be travelled in Summer beyond the Howard Settlement. When finished through, it will be much travelled upon, and I should consider it advisable to appropriate as much for it annually as can be spared for the purpose.

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**MAGAGUADAVIC TO SAINT ANDREWS, AND WAVEIG TO SAINT STEPHEN.**

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**Report on the Great Road from Magaguadavic to Saint Andrews, and Waweig to Saint Stephen, by William H. Mowat.**

*Saint Andrews, 24th December, 1846.*

SIR,—Having been appointed Supervisor of the Great Road from Magaguadavic River to Saint Andrews, and from Waweig to Saint Stephen, and having attended to the requisite duties of that appointment during the season, respectfully beg leave to submit the following Report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor :—

In the month of April, having examined the whole route, temporary Bridges over the Waweig, Digdeguash, and at Jones' Brook, requisite for public convenience, were made, until permanent repairs were completed.

After being apprised of the amount of funds granted for the Road and for Bridges carried away by the Ice, the Roads and Bridges were duly advertised to be sold at auction, and written Contracts were made with the respective Contractors for the faithful performance of the work, which has been completed in a satisfactory manner, according to the following Schedule :—

Road

Road from Magaguadavic to Saint Andrews—Alteration from junction of Commons' Road to Mulloch's Corner, 1½ miles opened and turnpiked, 28 feet in width :

Bridge over Ravine at Greenlaw's Cove—Foundation cleared, and materials in readiness to be finished 20th May, per Contract :

Two new Bridges erected across Waweig Stream :

4½ miles gravelled ; six Water Courses repaired, and new covered from Connick's to Reed's Mill, on Fredericton Great Road :

Seven Water Courses repaired and new covered ; sixty seven rods turnpiked ; and the whole distance from Reed's Mill to Digdeguash, (with the exception of one half mile, done with Statute Labour,) repaired, by raising the rocks, levelling and filling the inequalities of the Road, and clearing out the Ditches where necessary :

Bridge at the Digdeguash rebuilt ; a new Bridge at the north east end erected ; Sheer Water and Causeway repaired and ballasted :

Three new Water Courses ; thirty four rods of Causeway rebuilt ; and rocks raised between Digdeguash and Magaguadavic Rivers ; the Road repaired where necessary, and obstructions removed :

Jones' Brook Bridge raised and repaired :

Still Water Bridge repaired : and

Upper Trout Brook Bridge repaired :

Waweig to Saint Stephen—One and a quarter miles new Road from Fredericton Road to Saint David Road gravelled ; one Bridge raised and rebuilt ; the Ditches cleared, and obstructions removed :

Main Bridge across the Waweig River—Centre Band rebuilt, and sixty seven feet in the centre replaced ; foundation ballasted and secured :

Lily Hill, in Saint David, graded and turnpiked ; the lower side faced with stone and railed ; two new stone Water Courses thereon :

Bridge between Garcelon's and Crocker's Hill covered and repaired :

Three hundred and fifty rods from Saint David to Porter's Bridge, in Saint Stephen, turnpiked ; two new stone Water Courses thereon ; and all obstructions removed, with the addition of two wooden Water Courses :

Porter's Bridge in Saint Stephen, new covered, and an abutment repaired.

#### ESTIMATE.

Lower Trout Brook Bridge—The foundation of which is in a precarious state, and will require new covering :

Waweig River Bridge—Two Buttresses for the two centre Piers :

Several Bridges on this route having sustained damage, and from the wear of travelling, will require more or less repair during the ensuing season :

The Bridge across the Ravine at Greenlaw's Cove was contracted for £98 ; twenty five pounds of which has been advanced ; the balance of seventy three pounds will become due on completion of Contract, say May 20th, 1847 :

The probable amount required for Roads and Bridges on the Fredericton Road from Magaguadavic River to Saint Andrews, may be estimated at £350 ; and from Waweig to Saint Stephen at £200.

The proper Accounts and vouchers have been transmitted to the Office of the Auditor General, to which I beg leave to refer.

**OAK BAY TO LITTLE DIGDEGUASH.****Report on Road from Oak Bay to Little Digdeguash, by Josephus Moore.**

*To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir William Macbean George Colebrooke, K. H.,  
Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick.*

HUMBLY SHEWETH—

That the subscriber would beg leave to submit, for the information of Your Excellency, the account of the expenditure of the £250 Grant on the Woodstock Road, together with a Return State of the same for 1846, accompanying herewith; and would beg leave further to remark, that as the Road runs chiefly through low grounds, the constructions of a Road in such locations are more costly than Roads running over high lands, but when once built are more durable. The Road is fast improving; the lands adjacent, settling. A sum sufficient to build the Bridges—turnpike the swamps—grub and level up to the Little Digdeguash, the ensuing season, will be of great benefit to the County at large, and for this service, will, in my humble opinion, require £750.

Return State of the Woodstock Road from Oak Bay to the Little Digdeguash, for the Year 1846.—Josephus Moore, Supervisor.

Whole distance, 30 miles : distance worked, 16 miles : distance turnpiked, 14 miles : distance partly grubbed and cleared out, 2 miles : Bridges built, 4 : Bridges wanting repair, 2 : distance a Sled Road, 14 miles.

Upon examination of the Road in the month of May last, I found it required the outlay of the £250, Grant for 1846, as follows, to wit, from Smith's Mill, towards Oak Bay, £38; on the alteration at Smith's Mill, £25; the balance £162, (exclusive of Commission,) north of the Baillie Settlement Road; grading that part of the Road near Oak Bay, (after the outlay of £38, and what Statute Labour could be obtained on the same,) still in an unsafe state, I employed John Rogon to labour on the same at the rate of five shillings per day, (he finding himself,) to the amount of £19 5s., and gave him my due bill for the same, to be provided for by a Grant the ensuing season.

I would further remark, that on that part of the Road from Smith's Mill to Oak Bay, large quantities of Ship Timber and other Lumber is annually carted down the same, which causes the wear to exceed that of any other Road in the County by fifty per cent.; added to this, the Road chiefly runs through low grounds; the settlers located (or chief part) a greater or lesser distance from the same, on Bye Roads; consequently but a small proportion of Statute Labour can be had thereon; for example, from Smith's Mill to Oak Bay, a distance of ten miles, not more than twenty five persons reside on the same liable to perform Statute Labour.

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**SAINT JOHN TO SAINT ANDREWS.**

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**Report on Road from Saint John to Saint Andrews, by G. Anderson.**

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The Supervisor of the Great Road from Saint John to Saint Andrews, begs leave to make the following Report, viz:—That the said Road, from the work done upon it the last season, he considers is at present in a good state of repair. That a new Bridge has been built over the Bocabec River, by Mr. John Messinett, for the sum of two hundred and five pounds, and for which he has as yet received no payment, owing to the funds granted last season not being sufficient for that purpose. The repairs of the Digdeguash Bridge were contracted for by Mr. Benjamin Millican for the sum of fifty pounds; the Bridge was examined by Mr. Cunningham the Architect, and it being his opinion, as well as that of the Supervisor, that the work was not completed according to the terms of the Contract, he was paid only the sum of thirty pounds, which Report has already been laid before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in reply to Mr. Millican's Petition. The further repairs of this Bridge have since been undertaken by a Mr. Chadburne, of Saint George, who is now employed at the work, cross butting it with nine inch timber, and thoroughly bolting it throughout. The Supervisor has most particularly to call attention to the immense quantities of slabs and edgings which coming down the River from the Mills above, press against the Bridge with such force, that unless some means of prevention are found, it is the opinion of the Supervisor, that it will be impossible for any Bridge to stand there; the Supervisor begs to refer to James Boyd, Esquire, or Doctor Thomson, in support of the above opinion. The Bridge near the Lower Falls of the Magaguadavic, will require new stringers the next season, and from the great distance of the bents from each other, it will require timber of such length that it will be extremely difficult to obtain it in the neighbourhood; the Supervisor would also refer to Doctor Thomson, who lives on the spot. The Sir John Moore Bridge, over the Big New River, was repaired the last season; this is a good Bridge, in excellent repair, built of sound pine timber, but the Supervisor is afraid, in consequence of a new Mill and Dam having built the last Summer by Stephen Munson and others, a few rods below the Bridge on the old Road, there will be great danger of the water rising and carrying the Bridge away. The Abercrombie Bridge, across the Musquash River, is in like danger with the Digdeguash Bridge, from the slabs and edgings coming from the Mills above; this Bridge will require some repairs the ensuing Spring, some of the posts having been split and carried away by the Ice. There have been two small Bridges built this season, one over the western branch of the Musquash, and the other over Perch Brook, both in the Parish of Lancaster. The Members of Her Majesty's Council, and of the Honorable House of Assembly, who travel this Road, will have as good an opinion as the Supervisor can have of what sum will be required for the repairs on this Road the ensuing season.

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**SAINT JOHN TO HAYWARD'S MILLS, &c.**


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**Report of R. S. Matthew on the Great Roads under his Supervision.**

SIR,—I beg leave to submit the following Report for His Excellency's inspection, relative to the present state of the different Roads under my supervision, commencing with the Great Road leading from Saint John to Hayward's Mills:—

This Road, though very much improved within the last four years, yet, from its being the main artery of communication with the City, and the great number of long wooden Bridges on the same requiring more or less repair every year, renders a large annual outlay on this Road indispensable. The principal Bridges on this line that will require repairing in the Spring, are—The long Bridge at Hampton Ferry wants nearly all new flooring, new stringers to that part running over the Intervale, with the principal part of the topwork from end to end renewed: probable cost of same, about two hundred and fifty pounds. The Bridges over the Mill Stream and the River at Rouché's, will require new flooring, with other trifling repairs, and will cost about fifty pounds each. The Bridge at Ward's Creek wants new flooring and other repairs; probable cost, ten pounds. The Bridge over Salmon River, at the old Portage, requires renewing; probable cost, twenty five pounds. The Bridge over Hammond River, partial flooring; probable cost, ten pounds. With other small Bridges, estimated cost for repairs of which will not be less than twenty five pounds more. That part of the Road leading over the Great Marsh, though at present in excellent repair, will require a large sum annually to keep it so, from the immense traffic over it. The Great Road leading from Saint John to the Head of Bellisle is in very fair condition, and will require about the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds to keep it so for the ensuing year. At the last meeting of the Provincial Legislature the sum of one hundred pounds was granted for the building of a Bridge over Yandle's Cove, this Bridge is not quite completed, owing to the want of water to enable the Contractor to get the whole of his timber to the site, and there being none in the neighbourhood suitable; in the meantime the Bridge is made passable and safe for travelling over, and will be finished early in the Spring, the Contractor having left ample security in my hands for the completion of the same.

The next Great Road under my supervision is that leading from the Forks of the Marsh to Quaco. The wear and tear on this Road is very great, owing to the quantities of ship timber, deals, shingles, country produce, &c., which are daily carted over the same into the City; independent of which there are two Stages, capable of containing twelve persons, running from Saint John to Quaco every day, and always apparently filled with passengers. The principle Bridges on this line will all require to be renewed or repaired in the Spring. The first and most expensive is the Bridge crossing the Ravine at the foot of Long's Hill, this Bridge should be built solid, and will cost about one hundred and twenty five pounds. The Bridge over the Mispick Stream, near Cody's, requires repairs, if not renewing; the probable cost ten pounds. The Bridge over the Fishing Creek will require to be renewed; probable cost of same thirty pounds. The Bridge near Hodgekin's, in Quaco, will require renewing, and will cost about twenty five pounds; other small Bridges, say ten pounds; making in all for Bridges, two hundred pounds. A similar sum would not be more than sufficient to put the rest of the Road in such repair as its importance would seem to warrant.

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**TROUT CREEK BRIDGE.**


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**Report on damage done to Trout Creek Bridge, by R. S. Matthew.**

*Hampton, 12th January, 1847.*

SIR,—I have just returned from Trout Creek Bridge, and beg leave to state, for the information of His Excellency, that the damage to that Bridge from the late Ice Freshet, is not so great as I had anticipated from report, when last I wrote.

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The misfortune was occasioned by a large body of Ice jamming and carrying away another Bridge above, on the same Stream, the whole of which, with the wreck, came down and jammed against the main Bridge, by which one of the bents was torn out, causing the one end of the principle span to fall; fortunately the end which fell lodged on the bank of the Intervale, making an inclined plane, over which travellers pass with safety. I have made arrangements for the raising of the span, and putting up a new bent, the whole cost of which will not exceed ten pounds, and will be completed in ten or twelve days, should the water fall sufficient in the mean time to admit of the parties working at the foundation.

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**HAYWARD'S MILLS TO NOVA SCOTIA LINE, AND SHEDIAC TO PETITCODIAC.**

**Report on Roads from Hayward's Mills to Nova Scotia Line, and Shediac to Petitcodiac, by Bliss Botsford.**

*Bend Petitcodiac, 25th January, 1847.*

SIR,—In laying my Annual Report of the state of the several Great Roads under my supervision, before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, I have the honor to state, that the sums expended thereon last Summer, have been the means of improving the communication, but not to that extent which the importance of these lines would suggest.

I am also enabled to Report that the new line of Road from Keetch's to Black's, referred to in my Report of last year, has been turnpiked and opened to the public. This line is a great improvement upon the old route, avoiding as it does many steep hills, and shortens the distance. The Bridge over the Memramcook River is not in a very secure state, the top sides being much decayed, and a new one will be required to be erected the ensuing Spring; the cost of which, built upon the Truss principle, with stone abutments, from the height of ordinary tides, I put down as seven hundred pounds. There is one point worthy of consideration, that a great saving would be made by letting the Bridge this Winter, as parties entering into the Contract would be enabled to procure the necessary timber at a much cheaper rate than in the Summer season.

The Petitcodiac Portage is also in a very bad state, occasioned by the hauling of heavy loads of Railway Sleepers upon cart wheels, during the rainy season last Fall, and it will require one hundred pounds for repairs. It will of course be borne in mind, that the above estimate will be exclusive of the annual repairs required for the repair of injuries the Roads and Bridges do annually sustain by the operation of the Frost and Spring Freshets.

The Shediac Portage will also require a larger grant than was obtained last year in consequence of the daily increasing carriage upon wheels of heavy wood goods and other merchandize.

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**GAGETOWN TO NEREPIIS.**

**Report on Road from Gagetown to Nerepis, by Gilbert Williams.**

I have the honor to transmit my Accounts and Vouchers for my expenditures on the Great Road from Gagetown to the Nerepis Road, for the years 1845 and 1846. I beg leave to refer to my Report of last year for not transmitting my Accounts for the expenditure of the small Grant of £35, for 1845. The Grant for the present year was £65.

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The small amount put at my disposal for the two last years has given me much anxiety in keeping the communication open for the accommodation of the public, and at the same time to effect two very desirable alterations at both ends of the line under my charge.

On starting from Gagetown the Road was originally laid out upon what is called the Sprye Line, upon which there were several high hills, which made it very inconvenient for heavy loads, and subject during the Winter to snow drifts; and early in the Spring, the sun taking effect on the southern side of the hills, left the ground bare. I have been informed, at the time of laying out the Road, that the proprietors of the land would not consent to its passing through their land without remuneration. Lately the land has come into possession of Charles P. Wetmore, Esquire, and from statements made to him by the inhabitants of Gagetown, as to the great importance of the alteration, he most liberally permitted me to make it; the hills will now be avoided, and the distance considerably shortened, and the communication continued much longer in the Spring with sleds, which is considered of much importance by the back settlers in getting their wood to market. The other alteration I have been induced to make, from the application, I may say, from most all the settlers on the line, and persons residing on branch Roads leading into it, and having to go to the Saint John market; that after leaving the Nerepis Bridge, at Merritt's, and proceeding to what is called the Half-way or Government House, over high hills and rocks, to adopt at the said Bridge what is called the Fowler Road, already worked, thereby avoiding the hills and shortening the distance, coming out at the Great Nerepis Road about two miles below the Half-way House; this alteration, without causing but a small additional expense, will be of vast importance to the flourishing settlements connected upon this line, and upon which the whole of their produce is conveyed to market and supplies received.

I have endeavoured, to the best of my ability, to accomplish what I consider these desirable objects, and to keep the Road in a passable condition.

As to what sum may be required for the ensuing year, I beg leave to report, that in consequence of the Otnabog Bridge having given way, upon a statement to His Excellency I received £10, in addition to the original Grant, towards its re-construction; there is due to the Contractor for the Bridge £6 10s.; and I have been compelled, to keep open the communication, to advance a further sum of £14 5s. I should not have ventured to have exceeded the Grant put at my disposal, had not the Road been a Post Line of communication, as well as the great outlet to back Settlements to market, and trust I shall be sanctioned by the Government in the small amount I have over-expended. The main Bridge at the Nerepis has been built upwards of twenty years, and now requires a thorough repair. Should this Bridge give way it will not only put a stop to the whole communication with carriages upon this line, and is now dangerous to persons passing over with heavy loads. I consider that it will require at least £40 to renew it and make it secure, the materials for which could be procured during the Winter, at much less expense than in the Spring. I consider that not less than £160, in addition, will be required to put this Road in a good and safe state, as a Post Line, and the safe conveyance of carriages, it being so much used by the back settlers in going to and from market in the Spring and Fall, when the wet weather and frost causes much wear and tear upon it. I have received but little benefit from Statute Labour, the Commissioners generally putting the work upon the branch Roads leading to new Settlements.

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**SITE FOR THE BRIDGE OVER THE NASHWAAK.**

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**Report on Site for a Bridge across the Nashwaak, by Matthew Graham.**

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*Maқтаquак, September 29, 1846.*

SIR,—Having been appointed Commissioner to explore a Site for a Bridge across the Nashwaak River, and having attended to that duty, I beg leave to submit the following statements for the information of His Excellency, viz:— On

On Tuesday the 22d, I examined a proposed Site for a Bridge opposite an Elm Tree in front of the residence of Allan M'Lean, Esquire, the particulars of which are as follows :—

Width of Channel, ....	242 Feet.
Eastern Shore to high water mark, ....	18 "
Western do. do. ....	23 "
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Total width at high water, ....	283 "

The bank on the western side is about 25 feet high, composed chiefly of loose sand and gravel; there are no trees or bushes growing on it at this place, although there are both a little below and above; this is the outside bend of the River, and consequently the main current is on this side of the channel.

The eastern bank is 13 feet high, composed principally of earthy gravel, apparently not much exposed to the current. The channel is a smooth bed of gravel and small stones. At the time I examined the place, the water did not cover more than half the breadth of the channel, but run all on the western side.

Depth of water at the time, ....	2 feet 6 inches.

On Wednesday the 23d, I examined a proposed Site at a point of rocks a little above the head of Butternut Island, the particulars of which are

Width of Channel, ....	145 Feet.

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Total width at high water, ....	231 "

The eastern bank is 34 feet high, composed of gravel, with some alder bushes growing on it, and grass nearly down to the edge of the water, seemingly not much exposed to the current, being the inside bend of the River.

On the western side is a high hill, with the Road running along the bottom of it, about the same height from the water as the bank on the opposite side; the shore is rock for some distance at this place, the bank is stony, with bushes and grass growing on it. The main current is on this side.

The channel is not very smooth, being chiefly of considerable large stones, the water covers the whole width of the channel, but a good deal deeper towards the western shore.

Depth of water at the time, ....	6 feet 8 inches.
" High water, ....	19 " 4 "

N. B.—The perpendicular measurements were all taken from the deepest part of the channel.

Having carefully measured, and considered the matter, I give my opinion that the last mentioned place, namely, at the point of rocks a little above the head of Butternut Island, about a mile below the mouth of the Pennyack Stream, is both the safest and most suitable place to Bridge the Nashwaak River. When I speak of safety, I do not mean that a Bridge of the common construction, with huge wooden piers in the main channel, would be safe; but here, where the stone is plentiful, a piece of solid mason work ought to be built on each side, leaving a free course of about 120 feet; then I would consider it safe and perfectly practicable.—See the accompanying sketch.

As regards suitability, all the settlements on the eastern side of the Nashwaak, lies above this place; and when the Road is finished on that side, all may be accommodated at this Bridge, with only small inconvenience to any.

SIR,—In answer to your Letter of the 12th October, relating to my Report on the Site for a Bridge across the Nashwaak River, wherein it is stated, that an Estimate and Specification of such a Bridge as I recommended should have been given, I would

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beg leave to state, that not being aware at the time that such was the case, and having at that time furnished a very imperfect sketch, merely to give some idea of the sort of Bridge I would recommend, I have, since the receipt of your Letter, prepared a Plan as correctly as my ability enables me, with a Specification, which I herewith submit for the consideration of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor. And I further beg leave to state, that the probable expense of this Bridge, according to my judgment, will be £813 15s. A Bridge of this sort needs no recommendation from me; its lightness, strength, and durability, will recommend itself. True it will cost about one fourth more than one of the common construction, but here I never would advise a Pier to be built in the centre of the channel, therefore a Bridge of that sort cannot be built. A Bridge of this sort, if kept well covered, will last at least fifty years, therefore it is the best and cheapest wooden Bridge that can be built.

### SPECIFICATION.

*Specification for the Bridge proposed to cross the Nashuak River, near Butternut Island.*

The Bridge to consist of three openings, formed by the erection of two stone piers of common rubble work, and two abutments of squared hemlock timber. The middle opening to be 116 feet wide, and the others 23 feet each, at low water line. The stone piers to be 16 feet thick at the perpendicular of the upper side of the Bridge, and 14 feet at the lower, at low water line: to be 19 feet high above said line, and 25 feet broad at top; the sides and down-stream ends to batten 12 inches in every 6 feet 4 inches perpendicular: the up-stream ends to slope off at an angle of 1½ horizontal to 1 perpendicular. The top of said piers to be 8 feet thick at the lower, and 10 feet at the upper side of the Bridge; to have 3 pieces of timber of larch wood 26 feet long and 10 inches by 12 square; one piece to be in the middle of the top and one on each side, well bedded in the mason work. Three iron bolts, 8 feet long, to be well secured through the centre of each pier, to be of 1½ inch round iron, to be placed in the following order, viz. one exactly in the centre of the top, and standing 17 inches above the piece of timber bedded therein, the others to be 12 feet each way from the centre one, and standing the same height; each to have a strong screw and nut on the end, to fasten the ends of the trussed walls. The sloping ends of each pier to have pieces of 10 by 12 inch scantling, of larch wood, the whole breadth of the same, at 6 feet apart from the top downwards, well bedded in the mason work, and secured in their places by three 1½ inch iron screw bolts each; to be covered all over the sloping face with birch plank, 6 inches thick, and sufficiently pinned down to the cross pieces with 1½ inch pins of larch wood; the lower ends of said planks to be well secured by a sufficient quantity of stone being put over the same. The abutments to be built of alternate tiers of hemlock timber, not less than 12 miles square, 3 in the tier length-ways the stream, 23 feet 6 inches long, and 4 in the tier cross-ways the stream, 20 feet long, and pinned together at all the bearings with a two inch pin of larch wood: the last tier to be length-ways the stream and the same height as the top of the stone piers. The suspension or truss work of the principal space to be according to the order of the accompanying plan, and of the following scantling, viz:—

The truss braces to cross each other at right angles, four feet between centres, and fastened at each crossing with two  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch pins ; to be bound together at the top and bottom with two courses of double cord-ties ; the lower course to be 14 inches deep, the second 9 inches ; the top course 12 inches deep, and the second top course 9 inches : the space between the centres of the upper and lower courses of cord-ties is 16 feet, and from the centre of the upper and lower to that of their fellow, is 2 feet. The cord-ties and braces to be pinned together at every crossing with two  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inch pins, excepting the crossing on each side of a splice in the cord ties, to be bolted together with two  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch refined iron screw bolts. The joining or splice to be secured by a plate of plough plate iron,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet long and 8 inches broad, with four  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch refined iron screw bolts in each end. No joining to be within 12 feet of each other in the lower courses, and so in the upper. The three walls, thus finished and in their proper places, viz. one in the centre, and one at each side, measuring over all 25 feet, to carry a course of bridging joists 4 feet apart, between centres, the whole length of the wall, said joists to rest on the lower cord-ties, being notched 2 inches at all the bearings, and fastened at the centre and ends with a hook screw bolt of 1 inch round refined iron. The beams over the road-way to be perpendicular over the bridging joists, to be notched 2 inches down on the top of the upper cord-ties, and secured the same as the bridgings. The ends of the beams to project one foot over the cord-ties on each side, and to be sloped off to the pitch of the rafters to 3 inches on the end. Each beam to receive 4 braces underneath, from the walls, and to carry a pair of rafters and rafter braces, as shown in figure 5. The two sides and ends to be well boarded in, and covered with second class clapboards ; the roof to be boarded and covered with first quality rift pine shingles. Each side to have a course of windows 12 feet apart, of 4 lights 8 by 10 glass. The approaches to have 4 stringers each of hemlock or pine timber, 50 feet long, 14 by 10 inches square, extending from the end of the truss work, over the space and butment, to be placed at equal distances apart, measuring over all 23 feet 6 inches ; to be properly pinned to the timber on the corner of the stone pier, and also at each bearing on the abutment ; to have a tier of bridging joists, 5 feet apart, well pinned down to the stringers, each alternate bridging to begin with the end one to project  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet over the stringers, to receive the posts of the rail, and a brace outside of the same. The rail to be 4 feet high above the road-way ; the posts and caps to be of 6 inches scantling ; the posts to pass through a mortice 6 inches by 3 in the ends of the bridgings, and fastened with two sufficient spikes to the outside of the stringers. The caps to be morticed down on the tops of the posts, and pinned, and an intertie 6 by 2 inches tenanted into the posts  $1\frac{1}{2}$  foot above the floor.

The whole Bridge to be covered lengthways between end and end, and over all the bridgings, with spruce plank, 3 inches thick ; to be well fastened with sufficient spikes at the ends of the pieces, and pinned at each intermediate crossing with two 1 inch pins of larch wood ; a spike to be drove through each alternate truss brace into the middle of the outside flooring plank. All the pins in the truss work to be of oak, completely seasoned, turned, and well fitted to the bore.
