HURRICANE

Alabama and Florida Suffer from Storm Causing \$100,000 Loss.

TWO KILLED.

Many Ships Sunk or Wrecked off Coast During Gale.

By Courier Leased Wire. Mobile, Ala., Oct. 19 .- Southern Alabama and Western Florida were recovering to-day from the hurricanwhich swept out of the gulf acros this coast yesterday, causing two deaths and property and marine loss. Although the wind attained a greater velocity than that which accompanied the storm of last July, both Mobile and Pensacola, the chief cities in the hurricane's path, suffered far less damage. The total loss in the

The chief damage here was railroad sheds and terminals and to telephone, telegraph and light and power service. Train service from Pensacola to Jacksonville will be suspended for a week.

Marine damage was heavy, both in this harbor and at the Florida port. Two small vessels here sank, while four others were driven ashore. In addition a number of small craft were destroyed. At Pensacola one steamer went down, another is missing, with the fate of the crew undetermined.


WORK RESUMED

With federal conciliation commissioners on the ground and the company expressing a willingness to consider the strikers' demands for bet-ter wages if they resume their places indications were to-day that the controversy will be settled shortly.

Sale of Ale in England Was Limited Under Saxon

The first prohibitive measure was that of the Saxon King Edgar, who nearly a thousand years ago, on the advice of Dunstan, put down many ale-houses, only allowing one to exist in any village or small town, and at the same time limiting the draughts of the drinkers. The common drinking cup of that day heid about two quarts, and Edgar had eight pegs placed at stated distances in each cup, heavy penalties being imposed on those who drank from one peg to another at each time. Neither the working nor the result of the act encouraged Edgar's successors to further action, and the next prohibitive legislation on the sale of liquor is due to Henry VII. who, by an act against vagabone and beggars in the year 1495, gave power to any two justices of the peace to stop the common selling strong ale in towns and any other places they thought necesary.



VON KLUCK HAS RETIRED

Hun General, Prominent in Early Days of the War Now Quits.

Berlin, Oct. 20 .- Field Marshal Alexander von Kluck who command ed the right wing of the German army in its sweep towards Paris in the fall of 1914, has been placed on the retired list at his own request. He had never returned to the front since he was wounded by shrapnel fire in March, 1915, while inspecting advanced positions. The Field Mar-

shal was 70 years of age last May. Field Marshal von Kluck and his army took an important part in the German advance toward Paris in September, 1914. His advance halted about thirty miles from the French capital and his force with the rest of the German army, was checked and driven back in the battle of the

Field Marshal von Kluck was born in Muenster, Germany, May 20, 1846, and entered the German army as Second Lieutenant in 1865. At the outbreak of the war he was in com mand of the army corps at Koenigs berg. He fought in the war Austria in 1866 and in the Franco-Prussian war in 1870.

He is said to have received his wound in March. 1915, by recklessly exposing himself after a stormy interview with Emperor William. Last August it was reported he was soon to take a command on the eastern front. His son, Lieut. Egon von Kluck, was reported killed at Middel-kerke early in 1915.



In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter ection alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
