Early and Late Seeding.

The department of agriculture have issued Bulletin No. 8, giving results of early and late seeding of barley, oats and wheat at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. These experiments must be of general interest to the farmers throughout the Dominion as they thus get the benefit without incurring the expenses of experimenting for themselves. This bulletin is devoted to a test of the advantages of early and late sowing of the above crops, commencing on the 22d of April and ending on the 23d of May, at intervals of one week between each sowing. A marked decrease was the result of each after the first. Early sown barley yielded forty bushels and thirty pounds to the acre; late only eleven bushels and two pounds. Oats of the first sowing yielded thirty-seven bushels and two pounds, while the last yielded but seventeen bushels and twenty-two pounds. The difference in the yield was greater, being eleven bushels and thirty-five pounds from the last. The difference between the first and second week was considerably greater than between any other two successive weeks, barley falling from forty bushels and thirty pounds to twenty-four bushels and thirty-eight pounds, oats from thirty-seven bushels and two pounds to thirty-three bushels and twenty-three pounds, wheat eleven bushels to nine bushels. It is estimated that in Ontario alone the farmers may lose by a delay of one week in the time of seeding barley over two and a half millions of dollars; and by a delay of two weeks more than three and three-quarters millions—estimating the value of barley at fifty cents per bushel.

Resolved that report and account of C. I. Wolfe, Inspector of License, and accounts of Stipendiary Magistrates, E. M. Beckwith, J. P. H. E. Jefferson, J. P. be referred to auditors.

Resolved that all accounts compiled by the auditors be referred by them to the finance committee.

Resolved that highway labor returns be referred to finance committee.

Wednesday, January 14th, council met at 10 a.m. All the councillors present. Minutes of previous day's proceedings read and approved.

A. D. Nichols appointed stipendiary magistrate for Aylesford.

Resolved that salary of Chas. I. Wolfe, Inspector under the Scott Act, be \$100.

Resolved that road in Walkbrook running by house of George B. Caulfield be closed.

Resolved that road near his own residence, labor on private road near his own residence.

Petition for road from John O. Lane's road to O.W. Lane's near Gasperau Lake, New Ross road and prayer granted, J. S. Woodworth, commissioner.

Petition for road from New Ross post road through lands and farm of John Butler read and prayer granted, E. M. Butler, commissioner.

John Beanson allowed to perform statute labor on private road near his residence, Belcher street.

Resolved that R. E. Harris have privilege of erecting telephone posts between his residence, Belcher street, and Port Williams under supervision of councillor for the ward.

Report of finance committee on accounts of trustees of school lands, Cornwallis, 1890, received, adopted and ordered published.

Resolved that it is the opinion of this council that it is deemed advisable that the wood lands with privilege to the lessees to cut timber should be retained.

Resolved that the committee on public buildings and lands cause fences to be erected on the line of the court house grounds as early this spring as posts can be set and that the rents due for ground rent of all offices on said grounds be collected and paid over to the treasurer.

Resolved that the action of the board of revision and appeal in reference to the assessment rolls of this county be confirmed.

Resolved that all printing for county be done by tender and contract as far as possible.

Resolved that the committee on the municipality be revised and that councillors Bishop, Morse, Cook and the warden be a committee for that purpose to report at a council meeting April term.

Resolved that the collectors of county, railway and poor rates for 1891 shall give bonds in two instalments to pay one-third such rates by May 1st, 1891, and one-third by August 1st, 1891, and one-third by December 1st, 1891. The bonds to require payment whether such rates be collected or not and that collectors' commission for collecting such rates be 4 per cent.

A Timely Suggestion.

DEAR EDITOR,—I see by looking over the minutes of the municipal council of last week a resolution was moved that a portion of our public land in Kentville, on which the court house stands, be advertised for sale; also a petition from the town of Kentville asking for a grant of a portion of said public land for street purposes. The above matter was deferred to April term. Now, sir, it strikes me that it would be doing wrong to sell any part of this land at present for two reasons. First, land in Kentville is rising in value every year and will continue to do so; second, you are aware, sir, that in the near future we will be forced to build a new court house; and when that time comes, as come it will, and that very soon, then would it not be better to sell all our public land in Kentville with the buildings thereon, for which a large sum could be realized, which would, if properly handled, go a long way in erecting such buildings as we would require for a court house and jail on our exhibition grounds on the hill, which would be a proper place for them. And by so doing we will be saving a heavy tax on the county which is already overburdened with the same. To Bridge the Annapolis River.

It is proposed to place a first class steel truss span and draw bridge over the Annapolis river at Granville ferry. This bridge will be about 1,500 feet from shore to shore at high water. The main channel of the river is 45 feet deep at low water. This will be spanned by a steel truss of 400 feet resting on stone piers built in 25 feet of water at lowest tides. The draw will be the largest and most complete of any in America, having two openings each 80 feet wide, with 22 feet water at low tide, and an extensive mooring pier. This draw will be nearly in the middle of the river, but where there is only 2 knots current at half tide with a counter current on the inshore side, and will admit of ocean steamers of over 3,000 tons passing up the river into French Bay—even at low water. As the Annapolis river above the town of Annapolis is not navigable about four months of the year the draw will not be required to open during that time, and only for the upriver traffic by sail or steam (which is very limited) during the navigable season.

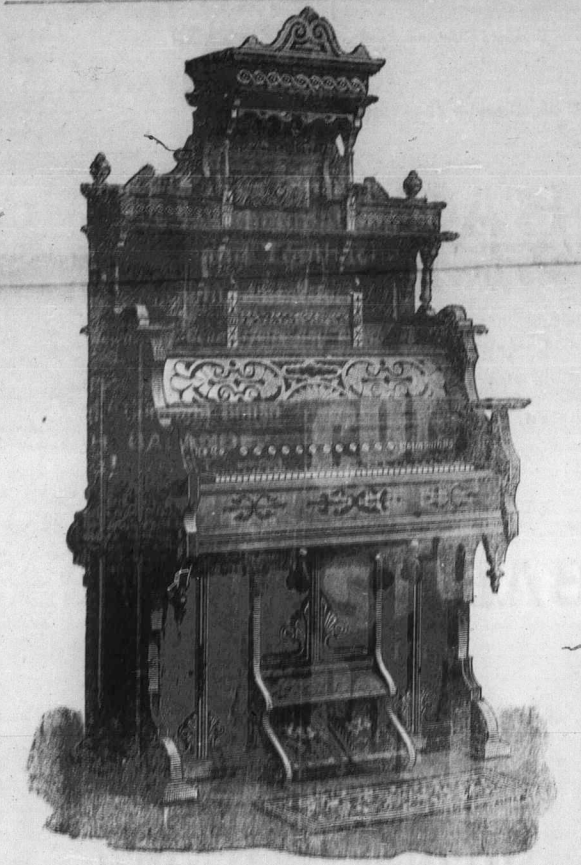
