

Disaster May Be Averted by Spok Word That Travels Faster Than the Flood.

\$100,000,000 for Toys.
The people of the United States
spent more than \$100,000,000 for toys and games during 1921. The National City bank announces that the factory value of toys manufactured here more than trebled when the war cut us off from Germany, formerly the chief source of our toy imports. In 1919,

the value of toys made here was \$46,-000,000 as against \$14,000,000 in 1914. Toy imports fell from \$8,000,000 in the year before the war to \$1,000,000 in 1918. In 1920 imports rose to \$6,-000, and this year to \$10.000,000. Capital engaged in the industry here advanced from \$10.000,000 in 1914 to \$25,000,000 in 1919. Exports of Amer-lean toys advanced from less than \$1,-000,000 in the year before the war to \$4,000,000 in 1920.—New York Sun.



From Sept. 1 to Nov. 31, a period of 91 days, the Canadian Pacific Railway loaded and shipped an average of 1,265 cars per day. This requiring the dispatching of a train every 45 minutes during that entire period, carrying more than 1,000,000 bushels daily. This movement exceeded even that of the bumper crop year of 1915.

One of the many instances of the splendid work carried out at the Liverpool docks is afforded by the Canadian Pacific liner "Metagama." On a recent arrival at that port she started the discharge of her cargo and coaling at 6 o'clock in the morning. Allowing for the usual dinner hour, she took on board in her side bunkers 1,000 tons of coal, which was completed by 2.45 the same efternoon. At the same time she discharged 1,700 tons of cargo, the greater part of which consisted of package freight, completing this operation by 7.15 the same evening.

In 1922 Canada produced minerals estimated to be worth \$180,622,000, an increase of practically \$6,000,000 over the previous year.

A British silk manufacturing firm has decided to establish a large plant near Quebec city for the manufacture of artificial silk yarn.

A train nearly a mile long and drawn by a single locomotive re-cently carried 165,000 bushels of grain over the Canadian Pacific western lines.

Almost sixteen and a half million bushels of wheat were exported from the port of Vancouver during the period September 1, 1922, to May 31 of the present year, accord-ing to figures issued by the Mer-chants Exchange.

Among the large number of un-accompanied women on the last westward voyages of the Canadian Pacific liners "Montclare" and "Melita" were twenty-three who were coming to Canada to be married in various parts of the Dominion.

An official in charge of the cattle shipments from the Port of Montreal recently stated that nearly 40,000 head of store cattle would be shipped from the port this year. He declared the rush seasons would be the monts of August, September and October.

On her last eastward voyage the Canadan Pacific liner "Empress of Canada" established a new trans-Pacific record of 8 days, 10 hours and 55 minutes from Yokohama to Vancouver. The previous record, 8 days, 18 hours and 31 minutes, had been held since 1914 by the "Empress of the same line." been held since 1914 by the "Em-press of Russia" of the same line.

Following the opening of the Banff-Windermere Motor Highway, Lieutenant Governor Nichol of British Columbia and Randolph Bruce were honored by the Kootenay Indians who made them an honorary chief and full chieftain of their tribe respectively. Several new air stations are to be opened in Ontario and Quebec in the near future for the purpose of extending the forest area to be partolled by airplanes. A base is to be established at Ramsay Lake near Sudbury, and from this point all Ontario work will radiate; operations being carried on at Orient Bay, Remi Lake and at least two other substations not yet announced.

If the Canadian pre-war exports of flour are considered as 100, the Dominion's average export total between 1921 and 1923 can be considered as 207. Comparatively, pre-war exports of the United States being rated at 100, its present export is at the rate of 147. This indicates that Canada has more than doubled her export trade in flour while the United States has increased its trade by 47 per cent. Before the war Canada exported 3,832,000 barrels, while at present her exports average 7,885,000 barrels a year.—"Journal of Commerce."

HIS Royal Highness the Prince of Wales will for a month or so become a simple Canadian rancher. 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



Quebec is the eighteenth century keeping pace with the twentieth, yet retaining its identity.

One stops at little wayside shrines. The wooden cross, the patron saint in effigy, the nurtured flowers, the woman at her distaff, the white-walled houses close at hand transport you to the distant land from whence the original settlers came. Yet, over there, beyond that little hedge or cedar fence the farmer gathers in his crop with up-to-date machinery, and stores it in a modern barn. Behind, the hum of the telegraph wire reminds you that you are not living in a by-gone day and, if that is not enough, through the not too distant fields, a huge train thunders.

Near the white walls the lady of the house draws water from the old-fashioned well, and bakes her bread in an old brick oven, the like of which was used by her ancestors in France four centuries ago. She spins her own wool and shares with her husband a faith, which though not old-fashioned, is almost as old as the Christian era. A kindly hospitable soul is she, nor is she always backward in learning, for she probably attended the convent of the Ursulines at Quebec, or la petite école at Louiseville. 

New York Aug. 29-Dr. Armin Demuth of Hamburg, co-inventor with Dr. Rudglpb Wagner of a huge tur bine-propelled airship, who arrived recently from Germany to finance an aeronautical company, yesterday outlined in full the plans of his leviahan of the air at the Hotel McAlpin It is Dr. Demuth's hope that with his large machine he may cross the Atlantic from Hamburg to New York in a non-stop flight of twenty-four

His plane, he said, of the double fuselage, seaplane type, with four ousher propellers and four turbing engines, each one capable of producing 9.000 revolutions a minute. The one wing has a spread of 56 feet, is thickness. The entire plane is constructed of aluminum and weighs more than 112 tons when fully loaded with mail, fuel and passengers.

It is outfitted as elaborately as transatlantic liner, having accommodation for sixty passengers, a crew writing room, stateroom, crew's quarters and kitchen. The flying ship carries a crew of twenty men, among which are included a captain, two pilots, four firemen, four machinists a radio operator, two stewards and a kitchen force

It is planned to build the plane on the shore of the Soder See, a large lake, bordering on both Switzerland for two mammoth flying boats will be built. The planes will take off directly from there for Hamburg where they will receive passengers and mail for New York.
