

## Operations on Ship Canal Will Be Resumed Shortly; Four or Five More Years' Work Yet

### Four or Five Years More Will Be Needed To Complete the New Welland Ship Canal

Work of Cutting Out Great Waterway Not More Than One-quarter Finished—Colossal Enterprise All the Way Through—8,600,000 Yards of Material to Construct Great Harbor at Port Weller.

It will take four or five years to complete the ninety million yard ship canal, work upon the construction of which it is expected to be resumed within a few days, is the statement of engineers in charge of the great work to a Journal representative.

Not more than one quarter of the work has been completed and some of the most difficult portions are yet to be taken up. In No. 3 section at Thorold, where the flight of three double and a fourth are being hewed out of the solid rock, the blasting has not gone half way down as yet.

The estimated time for four sections of a boat will be twenty minutes. Between Lakes Ontario and Erie there is a difference in level of 326 ft. and seven mammoth locks larger even than those of the Panama Canal will take the place of the 25 on the present Welland Canal which was built in the seventies. The locks will be lift locks each lock raising or lowering a vessel 46 and one half feet. The locks, a number of which have been partly completed are 800 feet long in the clear, 80 ft wide with depth of 30 ft. on water on sill. Perhaps the most interesting part of the canal will be the three twin flight locks, 4, 5, and 6, ascending the escarpment at Thorold. The locks are twin to allow vessels to pass each other, and thus save much time. There are entrance wells not less than 800 feet long on the west side at the lower and upper approaches to the locks.

Above Lock 7, nine miles from the Lake Ontario entrance, twin guard gates will be situated as a protection against accidents to the locks below the summit level. Above these the summit level extends about 16 miles to the guard lock at Port Colborne. All the way through the Ship Canal will be built for 25 feet depth of water but with provision made for deepening to 30 feet should occasion require. Sections 1, 2, and 3 are being cut through new territory, which previous to 1913 when the canal was started comprised some of the best fruit farms. Section 5 involves the widening of the present Welland Canal on the west side through what is known as the Deep Cut, a distance of 2 miles from Allanburg to Port Robinson, and the substructure of a bridge at the latter place.

Altogether there will be 22 bridges crossing the new waterway and except where these are located at locks it is intended to use bascule lift bridges affording vessels a clear channel 200 feet wide. The alignment of the canal, almost straight will afford easy navigation. The work will be resumed on the cost plus per centage basis, the contractors using the Government's equipment which was taken over on suspension of the canal work in 1916. After the Armistice it was decided to resume the work last year as provided in the Reconstruction Period operations but there was trouble with the men last summer over hours and the canal was finally shut down entirely last autumn.

Now, parliament is passing \$5,500,000 in the estimates and this appropriation will cover the operations during the present year it is expected. The resumption of the canal building will give employment to thousands of men and make the Niagara District boom.

### Port Dalhousie Harbor is Free of Ice; Toronto Locked

Things are all ready this side of the lake to open navigation but reports from Toronto say the bay is still frozen solid with no signs of a breakup or of the ice moving out. This will keep back the opening of navigation considerably. The Dalhousie city is about ready to make her first trip of the season and the Captain expects to win the Toronto Harbor-master's silk hat. The ice in Port Dalhousie harbor broke up and left some time ago and the lake on this side is now clear away out. Everything at Port looks favorable to an early spring. Quite a lot of people visited the lakeside summer resort on Sunday.

### Tony Gingo Sent Up For Trial on a Charge Of Assaulting a Girl

Tony Gingo, the Italian charged with assaulting Miss Clara Morton, on the night of the 16th of March, ejected to be tried by a jury when arraigned in police court today. He was committed for trial. He was defended by E. H. Lancaster, and Crown Attorney Brennan prosecuted. Miss Morton said she had attended a concert with a girl friend and left the church at 11 o'clock. Going home she went by Lake St. and Russell Ave. She saw a man cross Russell Ave. going back of Schenck's factory and as she was crossing Genaban St. she heard steps behind her. Then she heard a man running towards her. It was near her home and she ran closely followed by the man. When she reached her yard she fell exhausted, to the ground. The man said, "You 'frail lady, me pick you up."

"I tried to get up," said Miss Morton, "and he pounced upon me holding me down on the ground. He had my hands pinned down. I yelled and he hit me five times on the face." Miss Morton said her assailant said, "I shoot you," and then he got up and ran up Geneva St. She said Gingo was the man who had attacked her. She identified him without hesitation. Questioned by Mr. Lancaster, Miss Morton said there was no doubt Gingo was her assailant. She said he had a light cap and dark overcoat on. She said when Gingo ran she noticed a man across the street. This man, whose name is Henderson, came to her house next night explaining that when he saw Miss Morton fall he ran up to a house where there was a light in the house and asked if there was a man in the house. Gingo was also charged with assaulting two other girls, Edna Duncan and Lillian Saville, and the hearing in these cases was adjourned at the request of Mr. Lancaster to April 6th. Bail was renewed.

### Teiper, on Eve of Trial, Confident Fate is With Him

BUFFALO, March 29—Sitting on the edge of his cot in the cell at the county jail yesterday afternoon, John Edward Teiper said: "I've steered myself against worrying. I'm going to be cool and take things as they come. If the motion for adjournment of my trial is denied tomorrow morning, I'm all set to believe it's for the best. I believe fate has stepped in and is taking a hand in my case. I have believed this since the first break came my way on March 13 1919. It was on that date that the appellate division reversed the verdict against me and ordered this new trial." Teiper is charged with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Agnes Teiper, on the Orchard Park road on the night of January 30, 1916. His brother, Fred Teiper, was killed and his sister Miss Grace Teiper, barely escaped the same fate. At the first trial the prosecution proved to the satisfaction of the jury that Teiper murdered his mother, killed his brother and seriously wounded his sister. The jury returned a verdict of murder in the second degree against him. It is the contention of the defense that the tragedy was committed by holdup men with robbery as their object. "At my first trial the sentiment was against me," said Teiper. "The people clamored for my conviction. Then, I believe, they have had time to think things over and there is no longer that bitterness against me. I really am of the opinion that, generally, the sentiment has changed." Immediately after court convenes this morning, George Clinton, Sr., chief counsel for the defense, will make his motion for adjournment, based on the grounds that Daniel J. Kenefick, recently retained by the defense, is not prepared to go on with the trial at this time. District Attorney Guy B. Moore, will oppose the motion. Sheriff Fred A. Bradley will have a large force of deputies on hand to handle the crowd, which is expected to seek admission to the courtroom. The corridor will be patrolled to permit passage of those having priority claim to admittance.

CONFUSION BY TIME CHANGE  
NIAGARA FALLS ONT., March 29—A great deal of confusion resulted yesterday in the change of time in Niagara Falls, N.Y. The International Railway ran on daylight-saving time while the Niagara Falls, Canada cars ran on standard time. Daylight saving goes into effect here tonight at midnight.

### VINDICATES MRS. GOODERHAM'S ACTIONS

Mrs. John Bruce National President of the Daughters of the Empire has given out a statement in which all the actions of Mrs. A. E. Gooderham are vindicated. Mrs. Gooderham resigned her office as president and Mrs. Dr. Smith of this city also stepped from the office of National Educational Secretary to show her faith in Mrs. Gooderham.

### Storm Damage Estimated at Many Millions

CHICAGO, March 29—A score of persons were killed and 100 or more injured yesterday by a tornado that swept the country and a number of towns north and west of Chicago, and ravaged some of the city's northwestern suburbs. The property damage ran into millions of dollars, including the demolition of many buildings and the razing of telegraph and telephone lines. Communication with rural areas was for a time cut off.

Six persons were killed and a score injured when the tornado swept through the centre of Elgin, Ill., about 30 miles west of Chicago, causing \$4,000,000 damage to property. From Elgin the storm passed on to the northeast. Half a dozen business buildings, two churches and twenty residences were demolished in Elgin. Meager reports brought in by farmers indicated great damage in a wide spread rural region. Falling telegraph and telephone poles cut off communication and many trees uprooted by the twisting wind, so tangled the wires that restoration of communication presented a difficult problem.

Martial Law Proclaimed  
The Elgin company of the state militia was placed on duty to prevent looting of property laid open to the public by the unroofing and upsetting of stores. Military law was declared. Melrose Park, a suburb of Chicago, reported six dead and Dumpling, another suburb, and Wilmette, a north-shore town, each reported two dead. At Melrose park on the western edge of Chicago, 60 houses were destroyed, the devastated area covering four blocks. The tornado followed in the wake of a severe hailstorm.

Last night six dead had been identified at Melrose Park, and it was predicted the fatality list would reach twelve. Scores were injured. Fires followed the collapse of buildings and the fire departments of several suburbs were summoned. A score of houses in Evanston, a northern suburb, were demolished and a number of persons injured, but no fatalities were reported. Roofs were carried from houses and trees were uprooted and carried a half block in some instances. The damage in Wilmette was estimated at \$500,000. Many buildings in the business quarter were damaged, with the town hall and the Episcopal church. The storm tore a path 200 yards wide through the main part of Wilmette.

### THE WEATHER

TORONTO, Mar. 29—A pronounced disturbance which was over Iowa yesterday morning has moved to Northern Ontario causing showers or thunderstorms throughout the Province and in Western Quebec, the weather has been fair in other parts of the Dominion. FORECASTS—Strong westerly winds, a few scattered showers but mostly fair colder tonight. Tuesday fair and somewhat colder.

### ESTIMATE MARASH MASSACRES COST 8,000 ARMENIAN LIVES

CONSTANTINOPLE, Mar 29—Estimates of casualties during the massacres at Marash last month, sent here by Americans, place the loss of life at about 8,000 Armenians. During the disorders fifteen Turks were killed. There are 10,000 Armenian refugees in Marash, of whom 2,000 are sheltered in American orphanages and hospitals.

### City Tax Rate Will To-night Be Struck; 36 Mills on the Dollar

This is An Increase of 4 1/2 Mills Over Last Year, the Board of Education Using 11 Mills on the Dollar on the Collegiate and Public Schools of City.

At the City Council meeting tonight it is expected that he rate for the present year will be struck. From what The Journal learns it will be 36 mills, 25 for the general city rate and 11 for the Board of Education. This will be an increase in the total over last year of about four and a half mills.

It is due largely to the fact that the law limits the amount which can be raised for general purposes and to the piling which has been done by the finance committee that the municipal expenses proper are to be kept to the 25 mill point. There have been demands made, which if granted would have led to an outlay that would require more than 25 mills. The efforts of the finance committee to keep things down are to be commended but the freedom with which the new Board of Education is spending money must take the breath away from the Councilors. Under the law this board fixes its own rate and the Council is morally and legally bound to find the money out of the taxes of the people whether it likes the job or not. With the large expenditures for various things which the Board deems it well to lay out the taxation must necessarily be heavy to take care of the obligations. Ratepayers reading the report of the Council which will fix the rate at four and a half mills higher than it was last year should not overlook the fact that the increase actually put on by the Council is only .85 of a mill where as the balance of the increase is all made up by the increase demanded by the new Board of Education.

### TEN MILLIONS IN GOLD ARRIVE TO HELP EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, March 29—Larded to the bulwarks with gold, the Red Star Liner Lapland arrived here this afternoon with \$10,000,000 in gold bullion from Europe. The bullion will help the sterling exchange rate in the United States and will help cover the enormous export of this country to England. Not even the officers of the vessel knew the bullion was on board until they neared New York. One of the passengers on the Lapland was Charles A. Tornquist, finance minister of Argentina, who was abrid negotiating the new Argentina loan of \$200,000,000 to the Allies to cover Allied imports of meat and grain from his country.

The Congress will open at Niagara Falls Monday morning, luncheon will be taken at the Refectory with the Victoria Niagara Falls Park Commission, followed by a visit to the Queenston-Chippawa Power Canal in the afternoon, and a banquet at Clifton House in the evening. On Tuesday the guests will be motored to Bridgeburg and Port Erie and lunch at Crystal Beach. A boat trip to Port Colborne and a motor ride to Thorold and St. Catharines will be broken at Welland by dinner, the night being spent in this city. On Wednesday morning Merriton, Thorold and the industrial section of Thorold Township will be visited, returning to Merriton or St. Catharines for lunch. In the afternoon this city would be covered and the guests motored to Port Dalhousie, Niagara-on-the-Lake, and Queenston to Niagara Falls where the conference will be brought to a close.

The male chorus made up of men of the choir sang selections with splendid effect. In the chorus work it was easily noticed that Mr. Marks has brought his choir into a fine state of efficiency and he holds remarkable control over the singers. The organization is well balanced and the choruses were sung with a precision and finish that resembled a beautiful machine if such an expression can be applied to art. **THE RAILWAY SITUATION**

The announcement made by the N. S. & T. Ry. on Saturday that extensions and improvements would be started almost at once that would run into an expenditure of upwards of half a million dollars invites a review of facts in connection with railway and civic matters in this city.

It will be recalled that last year, while occupying the office of Mayor, the editor of The Journal had, as a policy, a plan to secure considerable extensions to the local system in what he considered the interest of St. Catharines, providing the N. S. & T. could be induced to carry the program out. Many weeks were spent leading up to a tentative understanding by which a line was to be laid down Lake St. to Russell Ave., or Carleton St. a belt line along the north end of the city from Ontario to Niagara St. the erection of a fine new station on the west side of Ontario St. and the construction of a short line to Merriton to cut off a good deal of time to Niagara Falls. The eye sore adjacent to St. Paul St. high level bridge would have been converted into a revenue producing property, the offer being made by Mr. Hanna, president of the National System of \$2500 a year rental, but the Mayor felt that \$5000 per year was a fairer figure. However, the negotiations, brought up to the point where the National Board was willing to spend several hundred thousand dollars were all negated by the chairman of the then railway and industrial committee, Ald. Riffer, who brought a report which declared that in the committee's opinion nothing should be done because of a franchise clause. A lengthy debate ensued and Sir Adam Beck was brought to the city and asked what the Hydro Electric Power Commission was prepared to do if the scheme with the National Railway Board were abandoned. Sir Adam was cleverly elusive. He fenced with the issue but gave no assurances. He advised the council not to enter into an agreement with the N. S. & T. Ry. because if it did and the Hydro were later to takeover the road the people in the Hydro zone would have to pay heavily for the franchise. The Mayor read correspondence from Hon. Dr. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals, stating positively that the Dominion Government would not charge for such franchises in case of a sale. This cut away the foundation from under the feet of the chairman of the Hydro Electric Commission, who had supposed that the franchise would be calculated as worth a good deal.

Nevertheless, after all the facts were brought out and there seemed no sound reason left why the people of St. Catharines should not get the extensions and improvements if they could, at no cost to themselves, the municipal elections came on and the public opinion was poisoned by reports spread around that if the city entered into such an agreement with the National Board it would be giving away a birthright. The Hydro would come along almost at once and do all that the citizens wanted.

The position of the Mayor, supported by one member of the council, Ald.

Nash, was that the N. S. & T. was owned and operated by the people of Canada and that so long as there was no charge for the franchise there could be no harm in getting the improvements and letting the Hydro pay for them at cost price if at any time in the future the Commission on behalf of the municipalities were to take over the N. S. & T. It was pointed out that it would be two or three years before the Hydro would likely be in a position to build the belt line and make other purely local improvements that the citizens of St. Catharines need.

What has happened since that time? The present Mayor of the city in his pre-election speeches recognized the immediate importance of railway development but has conducted no campaign to get improvements. The long osts are still being held out in front of a waiting people for hydro radial construction but the horse is always kept just as far away as ever. The population north of Welland Ave., which could have been served by new lines, continues to walk and will still walk for months to come.

Without any urging from the present council which is supposed to have initiative in the interests of civic and industrial development, the officials of the N. S. & T. get money allotted to the total of nearly half a million for various improvements.

The editor of The Journal feels gratified that these expenditures are being made in refutation of all the twaddle and prejudiced nonsense that was published last election. He regrets though, that many other developments such as those outlined above and which could have been easily secured were all thwarted and defeated without sound reason and for no good purpose.

Time is showing conclusively that the large railway development programme as outlined by the Mayor of last year was business like and in the interests of the public. It will come about regardless of the narrow vision of those who allow election clamor to becloud their judgment.

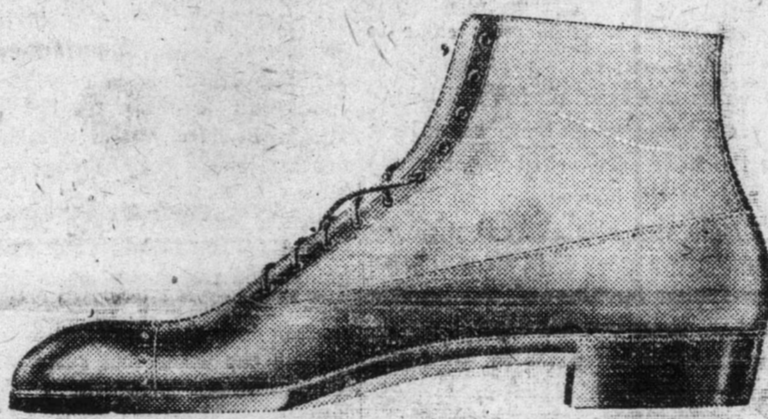

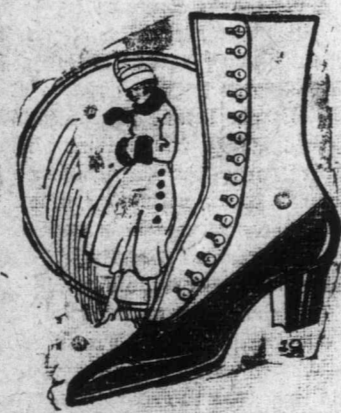

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

**CLASS 2**  
Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:  
All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.  
Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.  
Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.

**Time Limit**  
All persons in Class 1, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.  
All persons in Class 2, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

**General Instructions**  
Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.  
Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.  
Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

### Admits Inability To Stop Liquor Smugglers' Work

BUFFALO, March 27—No drastic steps to prevent the unlawful importation of liquor into the country from Canada by means of small boats will likely be taken by the local customs authorities this summer, George D. Davidson, Jr., collector for this district said last night in commenting on the situation in Buffalo.

"A month ago I requested the authorities to furnish us with two motor boats, one to patrol the river above the Falls and one to ply in the lower river and Lake Ontario," he said. Congress struck out the measure in the appropriation bill, setting aside a sum of money to aid the customs authorities in the enforcement of prohibition, we lost our chance to get the two boats which undoubtedly would have been a great help in prevention of smuggling."

"At present the local department has only one power boat which is constantly needed for other routine work. When we need a boat for business in the river below the falls we have to hire one."

Efforts to keep Buffalo free of smuggled liquor are not likely to be of much avail until the river is thoroughly patrolled by boat, Mr. Davidson declared.

**POSTAL CLERKS**

OTTAWA, March 27—The Dominion Postal Clerks, who are meeting in convention here, do not intend to go back home to the two thousand employees of the Post Office Department they represent without making every effort to reach a definite understanding with the Government on the much vexed question of classification—which is another way of saying the salary question.

The conference yesterday with Dr. R. M. Coulter, Deputy Postmaster-General did not touch on the salary question, but was entirely devoted to working conditions, and it was non-controversial in tone. While it was originally planned to close the convention here tonight it is now agreed that there is so much work ahead that the delegates will require at least till Friday evening before all business can be satisfactorily accomplished.

### No Dempsey For N. Y. State

ALBANY, March 27—Jack Dempsey will be allowed to fight in this state. Upon being informed that the former service men in the state would defeat his bill if he did not make certain that Dempsey could not fight in this state, Senator James J. Walker said he would amend it so as to overcome the objection of the former wearers of the olive drab uniform.

Aroused by the announcement of Tex Rickard that he proposed staging the Dempsey-Carpentier fight in New York, the 34 former service men who are serving in the Assembly early today decided that Dempsey will not be permitted to engage in any boxing contest in this state. The chairman of the soldiers conference was instructed to confer with Senator Walker, introducer of the bill, and serve notice upon him that unless the bill is changed so as to exclude Dempsey from appearing in this state the service men will defeat the measure.

Senator Walker said that an amendment such as has been suggested would in his opinion be "unconstitutional" but that he would accept an amendment providing that "no man convicted of evading the draft" would be allowed to box in the state under this bill. The Walker Bill passed the Senate 30 to 19.

BRIDGEBURG, March 27—The Bridgeburg council is facing a most peculiar situation here in connection with the municipal income tax.

The problem is a complex one and it is likely that considerable legal red tape will have to be unwound before a definite decision is reached in connection with the matter.

The question is: Shall residents of Bridgeburg, working in the states, pay the municipal income tax? The municipal income tax, it must be kept in mind, is altogether separate from the Canadian federal income tax which it has been ruled is not applicable to those across the line.

Commuters residing here but working in Buffalo, already have to pay the state and federal income tax there, and rightly contend that they would be harshly treated by the application of the municipal income tax which is being applied in Bridgeburg for the

first time, and is one of the relics of the war.

The council has instructed Solicitor George H. Pettit to obtain a ruling on the question.

**C. N. R. WILL NOT**  
**ELECTRIFY LINE!**  
"The rumors in connection with the  
electrification of the roads operated  
by the Canadian National Railways  
are unfounded, so far as the general  
system is concerned," said President  
D. B. Hanna yesterday. "We have  
taken over the railway known as the  
Toronto Eastern Railway, and also  
some other lines, and we have an  
agreement with the Hydro to sell these  
roads to the Hydro Commission, and  
when taken over by the commission  
they will naturally be electrified.  
This also concerns that line known as  
the old Central Ontario Railway,  
where passenger traffic is far in ex-  
cess of the freight transportation, but  
this applies to that section only, not to  
the Central Ontario Railways in gen-  
eral, some people have understood  
from my speech to the Canadian Club  
in rockville.  
"So far as the increase in rates is  
concerned, we are simply marking  
time awaiting the decision of the United  
States Interstate Commission of  
Railways," he said. "The Railway  
in that country has practically agreed  
that the railways are entitled to an  
increase, and it has been our policy  
so far to follow generally the United  
States in that matter." Mr. Hanna  
said he did not think that the increas-  
ed motor traffic would have any effect  
whatever on the traffic on the rail-  
ways.

## Catholic Hits The Sinn Fein! A Hard Blow

LONDON March 27.—Cardinal Logue, head of the Roman Catholic church in Ireland, recently struck a serious blow at the Sinn Fein movement when he condemned the republican agitation. Now another blow has been struck by the church at the revolutionary propaganda through the radical trade unions which are closely associated with Sinn Fein.

Father Peter Finlay S. J., professor of Catholic theology in the National university, has just issued a pamphlet defining the attitude of the church toward socialism in which he lays down four conclusions as follows:

"Catholics are forbidden under pain of mortal sin to become or remain members of any socialist association such as the pope has condemned. The Socialist Internationale is such an association.

"Catholics also are forbidden to become or remain members of any body affiliated with such associations.

"The penalty for disobedience is excommunication.

"Catholics therefore, sin mortally and are in our excommunication who become or remain members of the Irish Labor Party and Trade Union congress which by formal resolution has united with the Socialist International."

The point of this is that the Irish Labor party is the backbone of Sinn Fein and the Sinn Fein movement is supported and aided by the continental socialists of Europe. Recently there has been evidence that foreign agitators, some of them Russians, have been active in the anti-British movement in Ireland. The church has become alarmed at the affiliation of an Irish national movement with a con-



NEW YORK, March 27—New York's vice hunt, being conducted by Assistant District Attorney James F. Smith, took a new turn when Commissioner of Accounts Hirschfeld made public "information" to the effect that Mr. Smith himself had opened a gambling house known as the Civitas club and had told his partner that he would "close up a lot of these poker houses around here and make them come to us."

This "information" according to Hirschfeld, had been obtained from Harry A. Goldwater, Smith's alleged partner, in an investigation conducted in 1918 by the commissioner of accounts into the organization and management of the Civitas club, and resumed today.

Hirschfeld's action followed that of Police Inspector Dominick Henry in making public six affidavits filed with Police Commissioner Enright charging Smith had sought protection for certain disorderly houses and gambling resorts. Henry's district, embracing the "tenderloin" is under fire from the district attorney's office.

**At a meeting of the Niagara Falls District Industrial Association, held Saturday afternoon, arrangements were made for the entertainment of the delegates to the Imperial Press Conference. They will be taken around the Falls and given a close view of the Hydro Canal and works power development at Stamford.**

After living in Port Colborne for a short time they came to St. Catharines. Mrs. Parker was a member and worker in the church of England. She is survived by her husband and one daughter, Mrs. George Cole, of Port Colborne. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon from the family residence at 10'clock to Victoria Lawn Cemetery.**

**LEXINGTON, March 27—Although no trace of Paul Little, eleven-year old son of E. R. Little, Lexington (capital), kidnapped on Wednesday afternoon and held for ransom understood to be \$25,000 has yet been found it became known that the police are working on the theory that the lad might have been abducted by two men who are known by Mr. Little.**

**HAMILTON HAS BOOSTED WAGES OF ALL ITS EMPLOYEES**  
HAMILTON, March 29—The Board of control has recommended to the city council salary increases for civic employees that would amount to \$57,250 for the year, the increase to take effect after April 1. Laborers are slated for \$5 and 60 cents per hour. Practically every civic employee whose case has been dealt with has been granted an increase of \$100 per year or better, up to City Clerk Kent and City Engineer Gray, who are recommended for \$1,000 increases.

The recommendation in regard to firemen is that they be placed on the same pay basis as the members of the police force.

The Winnipeg strike leaders' trial concluded Saturday five being found guilty of seditious conspiracy, one, R. E. Bray, guilty of committing a nuisance, and one, Ald. A. A. Heaps, not guilty on all counts.

**Fuel Outlook**  
**Cause**

"At the present moment the outlook for the coming coal year is for grave anxiety, and for prompt and efficient action to avert subsequent shortages of fuel is provided.

There is only one way of averting these difficulties for Ontario—immediate action. Do not fall in prices or accumulation of coal, neither will materialize. These are extracts from a report on the coal situation issued last night by H. A. Harrington, Fuel Administrator for the Province of Ontario.

Mr. Harrington says in his report that there exists a shortage of coal throughout the United States of sixty million tons. Demand, he says, to make up this shortage is insistent, and when restrictions are removed tomorrow will be for the purchaser not a matter of price, but of coal.

Twenty-eight million tons of coal will be required to be transported this summer to the lakes, says Mr. Harrington, and with the removal of the surplus millions of tons must be moved to tide water for export. The shortage of bituminous coal, though 35,000 tons should be daily, only 20,000 tons are available.

**Assistant District Attorney Exonerated**

NEW YORK, March 31—The extraordinary grand jury, investigating the conduct of three assistant attorneys filed a presentment late supreme court late yesterday afternoon exonerating Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith of alleged bribery containing findings in Mayor Hylan's case. The grand jury reported a charge of which Assistant Attorney Smith was exonerated in a letter, sent by Mayor Hylan to the Police Commissioner on March 12, 1919. The letter in part:

"There seems to be a complaint around town that Rothstein gambler, gave \$20,000 to a man who was formerly a magistrate. The report goes, was divided equally between an assistant attorney and a magistrate. The case against Rothstein was dismissed."

"Testimony taken by us," the presentment said "has clearly shown that the teamsters who are on the Q. and G. road, which is taken over by the Government, are making a raise in pay. They are asking an hour for the teamsters an hour for the driver. The request has been made through Greenlaw, M. P. P.
