Any person who is the sole bead of samily, or any male over 18 years old available Dominion land in Manitobs Saskatchewan' or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Do-minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son daughter, brother or eister of intending

Daties-Six months' residence upor and cultivation of the land in each three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestand or s farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by sim or by his fatha mother, son, daughter, brother or sie

In certain districts a homesteader I good standing may pre-empt a quarte section slongeide his homestead. Prin

Daties-Must reside upon the bom a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acree extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchas ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre, Duties.—Must reside ax months in such of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a homeworth \$300.00. W W. CORY.
