



Russian Government. The population, which in 1897 was over five millions, had twenty years later reached 9.580,000. and consists of Russians and Poles, Lithuanians and Germans, Turko-Tartars and Mongols, Samoyedes and Tunguses, Chinese, Japanese and Koreans. The majority of them-some five to six millions-are members of the Or-

thodox Russian Church, about a quarter of a million are Riskolniks, over a million are Mohammedans. 250,000 are Buddhists 30 000 are Jews and 20,000 are Protestants.

True, the climate of this vast country, three times the size of European Russia, offers many difficulties to priests of a milder clime, but our apostles are no accustomed to consider personal comfort.
