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GENERAL NEWS.

At the 35th Loan Meeting of the Kingston Building Society, 1st of April, ten shares (£1000) were loaned, at an average bonus of 304 per cent.

We perceive by the Salem Register, that a large Canadian Ox, weighing 3,800 lbs., is now being exhibited in that city.

At the third monthly meeting of the Quebec Building Society, 23 shares were sold at an average bonus of 40 per cent.

The house of John Degnan, in North Eustopia, between Stratford and Bell's corner, was burnt to the ground on the night of the 24th ult. All the contents destroyed, and no insurance.

The Kingston Foundry was sold by order of the Court of Chancery, on Saturday last, by auction, and adjudged to Jos. B. Co., for the sum of £3,033. There were several bidders.

Mr. Benj. Geroy, of Ameliasburgh, unfortunately fell through the ice, on the opposite side of Bay, on Saturday last, and was drowned. The body was found the next morning.

The Army.—First Lieutenant Arthur Davere, Viscount Malden, from the Rifle Brigade, is gazetted to the Royal Horse Guards, as a Cornet, by purchase.

The grand jurors of the county of Oxford have memorialized the Provincial Legislature, praying that measures may be taken to prevent the immigration of poor emigrants into this Province.

HEALTH OF NEW ORLEANS.—Sporadic cases of Cholera had slightly increased in New Orleans on the 22nd March, but they were attributed to the atmospheric changes. The Board of Health had announced that they were investigating the extent of the disease.

The Bishop of Toronto is to leave for England on 10th. The subscriptions for the Church of England University amount to upwards of £25,000, in money, land and Building Society Stock, besides 610 acres of land, not yet valued.

A young man named Green, on his way from the United States to California, killed a squaw. The tribe to which she belonged followed him, and when they got him into their possession, they skinned him and ate his heart, and then they killed him.

Capital Punishment.—The bill for the abolition of Capital Punishment passed the Senate of Ohio by a very decided majority. It was defeated in the House.

As the duties of that department will require immediate and almost incessant attention, I shall be obliged to visit my friends before the day of Election, when my views on the present state of Public affairs will be fully explained.

The views I entertained in 1846 on the Policy of Canada, have undergone no change since I became a member of the Government; on the contrary, every succeeding public event has tended more strongly to confirm them.

An opinion appears to prevail in some quarters that the present Administration are opposed to "retrenchment." If that were the case I would not venture to appeal to you for a continuance of that confidence which I have so long enjoyed. Having resigned an office of one thousand pounds per annum to accept one of seven hundred fifty, you will therefore require no further practical proof of my sincerity on that subject.

gentlemen: There exists no reason why Canada should be more prosperous than previous any other country. Her natural advantages are fully equal to those of the adjoining States; her resources greater.—They must continue to pay to their Federal or second government an enormous tax for the sake of truth, and her present duties, for those general services which Great Britain performs for us without any additional expense to the Province; and we possess entire management and control of our own affairs.

These facts show that the means are in our hands. If you consider any other person promoting the prosperity of our common country select him, or even worse, who is obliged to devote my best energies to the attainment of that object.

APPOINTMENT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE COUNCIL AND ASSISTANT COMMISSIONER.

We learn that the Hon. Joseph Bourret of Montreal has accepted the office of President of the Executive Council, and Assistant Commissioner of Public Works. This is an excellent appointment. Mr. Bourret has filled the office of Mayor of Montreal on several occasions, and has been for many years an Alderman of that city.—Globe.

CLERGY RESERVES.—A few days ago we received a circular from the most distinguished clergyman in the Province, requesting us to attend a preliminary meeting to take into consideration the subject of the Clergy Reserves. It will be well for us to remember, however, that the Clergy Reserves, as they are called, are not really reserves, but are the property of the Crown, and are to be disposed of as the Government may see fit.

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The Cuban Expedition.—Although we have almost positive information that no important movement in relation to this matter is in contemplation at present, yet we notice one or two circumstances which appear suspicious. One of them is the large number of men from New Orleans concentrating at Chagres, all of whom may be intended for Cuba, and the fact that some six or eight small vessels are about to leave this port for Chagres without freight, is another unusual circumstance. The authorities here have an eye on a vessel lying up town, the movements in relation to which are suspicious, but nothing has yet been discovered making her liable to seizure.

We stated more than a month ago that the Spanish Minister had notified the Secretary of State that a new Cuban Expedition was on foot, and asked the interposition of the American authorities to arrest it. Discrections were given the United States officers to that effect, but the operations of the members of the Expedition have been conducted with so much caution that nothing tangible has been discovered.

We have no doubt that a second movement is projected, and that a large amount of funds have been provided, but it is yet in embryo, delayed by the want of a leader under whom success may be rendered as nearly certain as possible.—New York Tribune.

The World's Programme.

In a certain emergency, when a measure of great importance was under discussion, Washington remarked, "We must consult brother Jonathan on the subject."

Ploughing by Steam.

The Buffalo Journal states that a patent for a steam plough has been taken out by the inventor, Mr. James Usher, of the firm of Usher, and Co., of Edinburgh, and the machine will shortly be before the public. The machine is constructed to plough six furrows at once, thus doing the work and saving the expense of six double horse ploughs. The great weight of the machine which is estimated at three tons, may be thought an objection, but this is in a great degree obviated by the use of a large roller which is placed in the centre so to balance the machine, and prevent the wheels from sinking. The cost of the entire apparatus is estimated at \$2500.

The exposition recently made by the Chief of the Police of New York, of the large number of vagrant children who are engaged in crime in that city, has led to an application to the Legislature, by a number of benevolent gentlemen, for the passage of a bill to incorporate an association under the title of the "New York Juvenile Asylum," whose object shall be to reform vagrant children, by taking them from their parents, and training them to industry and morality.
