

Reports on Civic Clerks.

The heads of several of the depart ments at the City Hall have completed the reports which they have been asked by the Board of Control. As the heads of departments, now unbridled by Aldermanic influence, have given a true and conscientious ap preciation of each and every employee under their jurisdiction, there will be a large number of dismissals In one department, at least, there will be something doing amongst the employees when the contents of the re port dealing with them is made known to the Commissioners.

In certain sections of the municipal service there is a feeling of satisfaction at the action of the commissioners in asking for a thorough report as to the standing and worth of each employee. In other quarters the feeling is on the opposite tack, and in one case the head of a Jepartment had considerable trouble in securing the information asked for by the controllers. Amongst the questions to which an answer was requested are those dealing with the age, duration of service, date of entry into the municipal service, salary on entry, date of subsequent increases and present salary of each employee Of course this information is of such a nature that it can be secured most self. 

> I must assume that when this communication was transmitted "the public of Bonne Bay" were laboring under a misconception of my attitude in respect to the Resolutions submitted by the Government in the matter of branch railways. When these Resolutions were before the House the Opposition's position on the question was clearly defined by my leader, the Right Hon. Sir Robert Bond, who drew a marked distinction between the proposed branch lines to Bonne Bay and Fortune Bay and the other branches named therein. Speaking for the Opposition Party Sir Robert said, "No person who knows anything about the country that the proposed lines will traverse will seriously contend that there is any considerable areas of agricultural, timber or mineral land that these railways can open up to enterprise and capital. I MAKE EXCEPTION ONLY IN THE CASE OF BONNE BAY. AND FORTUNE BAY. If a branch line of railway was run from say Bishop's Falls to Bay d'Est in Fortune Bay, it would open up well defined timber and mineral areas; and the same may be said in respect to a line from a point on the western railway to Bonne Bay." He then went on to say further that if these two branches were dealt with in a separate bill the Opposition would support the measure. The branch lines were not dealt with separately, or upon their respective merits, but the Resolutions had to be vot ed for or against as a whole. The Opposition having defined their position in respect to the branch line to Bonne Bay and Fortune Bay voted against the Resolutions as a whole and I feel quite sure that when my constituents have read the speech of the leader of the Opposition on the question they will entirely approve his attitude and that of his supporters in the House of Assembly.
