

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

## The Evening Chit-Chat

My hand to the man or woman who knows when to admit ignorance.

Among a group of us the other day was a young man who, though an exceptionally ambitious and knowing person, has not had great educational advantages. In the course of the conversation someone used the word "deterrent" in speaking to him. "Don't you find that rather a deterrent in your work, Mr. W.?"

A puzzled look fitted over his face. Evidently it was a new one to him. Nine men out of ten, seeing that the question plainly expected an affirmative answer, would have chanced it and said, "Yes, I do," or some similar bluff.

He, being a one-in-ten man, hesitated but an instant, and then said frankly, "I don't think I know just what 'deterrent' means."

I don't know what the rest thought, but I'm sure for myself that I never admired him so much as at that moment.

Of course, someone promptly defined "deterrent," so now he does know what it means.

That's the difference between him and the other nine. They would not have known the next time the word came up and would have to bluff again.

By confessing his ignorance he put an end to it.

By hiding theirs, they gave it a new lease of life.

"Learn to say 'I don't know,' my boy," is as needful a command, in its way, as "Learn to say 'no.'"

In the course of conversation things

are frequently said, explanations given, references made, information conveyed that we do not fully understand the first time.

On such occasions most of us are apt to pretend to have understood; to say, "Oh, yes, I see," when, like the blind man, we "didn't see at all."

That's the easiest way, of course. But for the man who wants his mind to grow, it's the wrong way.

For not only does he lose the information but he atrophies his mind muscles by not insisting that they shall grasp everything that's said.

It seems so simple to say, "Pardon me, but I didn't quite understand that," and most people have enough of the didactic in them not to mind repeating a thing if they can feel they are instructing someone.

It seems almost wrong to me to allow one's self to read and pass by a paragraph in a book without understanding it. It seems to me that it is cowardly and stouly not to go back and read it until one does understand.

You all know the old Arabian proverb: "He who knows, and knows that he knows, is wise—follow him."

He who knows, and knows not that he knows, is asleep—wake him.

He who knows not, and knows that he knows not, is simple—teach him.

He who knows not, and knows not that he knows not, is a fool—shun him."

For present purposes I should like to temporarily amend the last two lines of that, to:

"He who knows not, and admits that he knows not, is sensible—teach him."

He who knows not, and won't admit that he knows not, is a fool—shun him."

## Household Notes.

If when drying curtains they are hung double over the line they will not stretch at all.

Ink stains may be removed from wood by washing the spot with a solution of oxalic acid.

Grape fruit rind may be shredded and candied like orange peel, or can be chipped and made into a marmalade.

Brush furs at night with a wet brush, hang them up to dry, and in the morning comb them out with a metal comb.

A tablespoonful of vinegar added to the water in which a fish is boiled tends to whiten the meat and make it firmer.

Aluminum should never be washed in soda water or it will soon lose its bright look and become dull and shabby looking.

The grated rind of lemon may be dried and mixed with an equal quantity of granulated sugar for a flavoring. Pack in air-tight bottles.

When light oak trays have been badly marked, well wash and rub with warm beer until the stains have disappeared. Polish in the usual way.

Watermelons and cantaloupe rinds are good spiced or brandied, and can be made into a preserve flavored with lemon that many think delicious.

To clean men's hats use turpentine, which will remove grease and freshen the felt. If the turpentine leaves a mark, finish with a little spirits of wine.

Glass is an ideal shelving for a

kitchen closet, as it can be kept clean so easily. If this is too costly paint the shelves white and give a coat of enamel.

One woman carries French chalk for such emergencies as food spots. A little of the chalk is rubbed in at once, as it removes the spot more quickly when fresh.

If the left-over breakfast cereal is carefully moulded into a bowl or square pan that is first wet with cold water, it may be sliced and fried as an acceptable luncheon dish.

When sweeping carpets always remember to sweep the way of the grain. To brush the wrong way is not only bad for the carpet, but it tends to brush the dust in instead of out.

Before putting on patent leather shoes always rub the surface of the vamp briskly with the warm palm of the hand, thus softening the shoe and rendering it less liable to crack.


To economize space in the children's closet I use their old wash belts. On each hook I hang a belt by its button hole, and pin a number of dresses or petticoats down the length of it.

Do not forget bangs of the fragrant lavender to slip in among your linen. Nothing has been found to improve on the delicate scent given by this homely herb beloved of our grandmothers.

To remove oil paint wet the place with naphtha, repeating as often as necessary; but frequently one application will dissolve the paint. As soon as it is softened, rub the surface down.

Troublesome grease spots can be often removed by the French method of sponging the material on both

## Mawson's Aeroplane.

Pilot's Plans For Antaretic Flying.  
Lieutenant H. E. Watkins, of the Essex Regiment, the officer-airman who is to pilot the monoplane which Dr. Douglas Mawson has decided to take with him in his expedition to the Antarctic, described his plans yesterday. Lieutenant Watkins learned to fly in a Howard-Wright biplane at Brooklands, and holds the Royal Aero Club certificate of proficiency.

"It is practically certain," he said, "that the machine we shall take with us will be an R.E.P. monoplane. It was, in the first instance, a French-built aeroplane, the designer being M. Robert Esnault-Pelterie. Latterly Messrs. Vickers, the famous engineering firm, have acquired the rights to manufacture these monoplanes in England.

"This machine has been chosen largely on account of its portability. The wings can be attached to the body in ten minutes. Its engine has a large reserve of power, and the control of the machine is simple. We shall take the monoplane to a quiet flying ground near London, which belongs to Messrs. Vickers, and prepare it for Antaretic work.

"A special screen will be made to protect the pilot and his passenger from the cold. Adjustments of the carburetter and fuel tanks will be necessary to prevent the petrol freezing. It is probable that the present landing chassis of the machine—two wheels and a central skid—will be altered in order to facilitate rising and descending upon snow.

"So far as we have at present outlined the use of the aeroplane, it will be employed for survey work and also in connection with the journey to the Magnetic Pole. I believe that the monoplane will be of the utmost value. An observer will be able to make rough maps while flying. It is hoped that the machine will be able to fly 250 miles without a stop."

#### Inland Game Report.

We are in receipt of the First Annual Report of the Game and Inland Fisheries. The principle on which the board has acted is expounded thus:-

"Having appointed as Supervisors men whom we hope to find efficient and interested, it is incumbent upon us to help them all in our power by the appointment of good wardens. This we believe to be the bulwark and mainstay of the whole situation, and on the selection of these rests the weal or woe of the Board work for the benefit of rivers. Much has been said at meetings and in the streets as to the 'advantage' of putting strangers as wardens at the different rivers, rather than residents of the locality, and we have not heard a dissenting voice; and we believe on this very point depends the success or failure of the efforts of the Board; and it is to be hoped that the time and thought spent in perfecting the Laws and Regulations as regards Salmon will not be lost through any leniency, or lack of effort in carrying out this recognized essential."

Financially the Board has not been fortunate. The income from Caribou Licenses fell short of the estimate by \$2900 and the Rod Tax fell short of what was expected by \$1190. The expenditure of the Board for the year was \$10,545. 41. To meet this expenditure, there was available \$5,910.00 from the Caribou License and Rod Tax, and a nest egg to the extent of \$1,801.86, the balance of a fund known as "The Game License Fund," which will not be available again. The expenditure of this sum left a deficit of \$3,833.55. The reports set forth that "This deficit has been met by a special appropriation of \$3,000 to the credit of the Board, made by Executive authority."

#### Sackville Graduates.

Among the graduates at Sackville University on May the 30th were: Rev. Earnest Bains who spent some time in Caribou. Miss Ethel J. Bond of Halifax, Miss Marie Buffett of Grand Bank and Rev. William Grimes of Little Bay Island, who all were awarded the degree of B.A. The list of Prize winners included, \$12 to R. C. Tait, the Pretham Essay Prize; \$20 Class Essay Prize, given by R. A. Borden, to Miss Flora M. Curtis, daughter of Rev. Dr. Curtis of the city. She is a graduate in oratory and her name appears in the honor list. Miss M. Hudson of Lower Island Cove takes a prize in History Class, and Rev. W. Grimes is honoured with a "Life Membership in the Theological Union." He is a nephew of Supt. Grimes of the Terra Nova Constabulary, this city. The venerable President, David Allison, presided over the university convocation, for the last term on May 30th. During his term of office he has capped and gowned 493 students.

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**In Dangerous State.**

John Hemans, of the Central Fire Station, who served the guns when the salute was being fired at Fort Townshend at noon Saturday, narrowly escaped being killed, and since going to the Hospital is in a critical condition. The right hand by the force of the explosion was reduced to a pulp, and the doctors at the Hospital in the early afternoon amputated it at the wrist. There was a bad gas in the same arm above the elbow and the flesh was torn in strips from the back of the left hand, the sinews and veins of which were severed, and so badly is this member lacerated also that it is feared it also must be amputated. Poor Hemans bore the pain bravely going along in the ambulance, but on arrival at the Hospital fainted. He was quickly revived and tenderly cared for at the institution. The belief of the men who were present when the accident occurred is that had the charge of over two pounds of powder been rammed home when the explosion took place the man would have been killed. He would then have been standing opposite the gun. The charge, however, was in the muzzle when it exploded, so the man was forcing it in with the ramrod. The belief is that a spark of fire remained in the gun after a previous charge had been fired and ignited the powder. When the explosion occurred the man was turned round twice by the force of it before he fell, and the rod which he held was smashed, one piece being driven down near the Presbyterian Church; another part being picked up near Berrigan's on Theatre Hill. The gun which caused the accident was the same which hurt the man Hibbs a few years ago. Hibbs was thrown down in the hollow by the force of the discharge. Hemans has a wife and 6 children, who were terrified on learning of the unfortunate accident to the husband and father.

**Terrible Accident**

**At Cape Cove—Man Killed by Falling Rock.**

Richard Taylor, of Placentia, was killed instantly last Friday morning by a boulder which fell from the cliff at Lord's Rock while he was camping there with three companions—Will O'Reilly, Pat O'Reilly and J. Murphy, all of Placentia. They had been fishing at Cape St. Mary's since the previous Tuesday and returned to the Cove to spend a more comfortable night in a tilt there beneath the cliff, near Lord's Rock. During the night the wind came from the S.E. and blew a gale, accompanied by rain, which no doubt loosened the rock and clay in the cliff above where the men were camped. They were all in a sound sleep when several tons of rock and clay came down on the tilt and buried the four men. Poor Taylor was crushed to death by a big boulder as he lay sleeping. Patrick O'Reilly was badly hurt, but the others escaped serious injury. Murphy was the first to get from beneath the pile and was able to assist his companions in extricating themselves from the rock and clay that lay upon them. They all united in digging out poor Taylor, but when they succeeded they found that he was dead. They were unable to come to Placentia that day owing to the storm, but left next day, taking the body of their companion. Some other men from Placentia who were also out fishing came to their assistance and helped them to man the boat. Pat O'Reilly, who was very weak, was landed at St. Bride's for treatment. The others arrived at Placentia Saturday evening last, when the sad news was made known to the wife and 5 children. The sad event has cast deep gloom over the place.

Dear Sir,—In Saturday's issue of your paper a column to explain the reason why the name of Bowden & Co. was dropped from the advertisement published by the St. John's Typographical Union, wherein the names of officers recognized by that body are set forth. With your permission, Mr. Editor, I will endeavor to enlighten him on that head. It is necessary in the first place to show why Bowden & Co.'s name was included in the list of recognized Union offices published in that advertisement. For many years, and up to a year ago, Union men were employed by the firm of Bowden & Co. Union wages (in some instances more than the scale) were paid, and the 9 hour system adhered to. If the employees worked overtime, Union rates were paid—including even the youngest apprentice—the manager, Mr. Bowden, evidently being alive to the fact that Union men are the best men, and the laborer worthy of his hire. Owing to recent enquiries as to which offices were Union ones in the city, the Union decided to publish their names. This was decided upon in justice to the proprietors whose offices were Union. When considering the advertising of those offices, and in view of the above facts in connection with the firm of Bowden & Co., the Union decided to proceed slowly before omitting that name from the list of recognized Union offices. Knowing that two men in that office were qualified to become Union men—one as a full and the other as a conditional member—a representative from our body, Mr. E. Maidment, was sent to interview the manager, Mr. Bowden, as to his office becoming a Union one. That gentleman when talking the matter over expressed himself as only too pleased to have his office recognized as such, and would feel proud to see the firm-name appear in the Union's advertisement. As to the two men working in his office, Buckley and Wadden, they were free to join the Union. Our representative then interviewed the men in question as to joining the Union, the outcome of which was that both promised to apply for admission to the Union's ranks at our regular meeting this (June) month. This promise was given on May 29th past. On the following day the Union's advertisement was published, Bowden & Co.'s name (on the strength of the men promising to become members) appearing amongst the other names. And it came to pass the name appeared!  
On Thursday of last week Buckley and Wadden were asked by our representative to send their promised applications to the Secretary, Mr. Wm. Stearns. Meanwhile, Bowden & Co.'s name appeared in the advertisement for about a week. To say our representative was a much surprised man when told by both men they had decided not to join the Union, would be drawing it mild; and he was so disgusted with them that he asked no explanation for this change of base. He reported accordingly.  
And it came to pass the Name Disappeared!  
As far as the Union is concerned, the matter ends here. Whether Mr. Bowden, the manager, has changed his views as to the Union we know not. Some employers of labor thought they could do without Union help, but subsequently found they could not; and some men have looked upon Unions with suspicion and held aloof from them, but eventually the suspicions and fears were overcome, and to-day they are only too ready to admit that the Union is their sheet anchor.  
Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for space, and trusting this letter will satisfy "Union Man" as to the reason for dropping Bowden & Co.'s name from the advertisement, I am, sir,

LONDON, To-Day.—  
A Chinese cruiser with a Chinese representative has arrived for the Coronation.

**LONDON, To-Day.**  
The Spanish steamer Hercules and the Dutch steamer Ariadne were badly damaged in a collision. They put into Dover harbor.

**STE. MARIE, Ont., To-Day.**  
The arrest of Felix Wagner at Michigan Soo, on a charge of bringing opium from Canadian Soo, discloses the fact that there is \$30,000 worth of opium here awaiting illegal transportation into the States. Other arrests are pending.

**VANCOUVER, To-Day.**  
If the promises of the Labor Union are made good, Vancouver will be tied up in an industrial sense. The fight seems to be welcomed on both sides. There is a disposition in both camps to have the battle fought as soon as possible and have done with it. The question is whether Vancouver shall be a town of closed or open shops.

**LONDON, To-Day.**

### The Starvation Stories

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—I beg to inclose here-with for information of your readers copy of a message sent by Dr. Grenfell on the 27th May last to the Associated Press with regard to the "starvation" stories on the Labrador. Dr. Grenfell has been blamed for not having contradicted these stories when they first appeared, but he writes me that he did not see any of the newspaper accounts, and upon being interviewed when first the stories became current he merely informed the Associated Press that he had no information on the subject, and thought no more about it. He writes that his time is very much taken up with his lectures, writing and surgical matters, and that he very seldom reads newspaper accounts of this sort except when his attention is specially drawn to them, and that the first intimation he had of these grossly exaggerated articles came through a telegram from Newfoundland. Thanking you in anticipation for giving publication to this letter.




