Consulting the Colonies.

It is satisfactory to have the au thoritative statement of the Right Hon, L. Harcourt, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that the Im-Prime Ministers of the Overseas Dominions when the time arrives to discuss terms of peace. The Dominion of South Africa, Australia and Nev Zealand will be more interested in the matter of division of German overseas territory than Newfoundlan and Canada. British South Africa borders on German S. W. Africa, Australia and New Zealand are interested in these islands in the Pacific which have been taken from Germany by their forces. Newfoundland and Can ada will be interested in the possibil ity of being recouped for the outla made for the prosecution of the war and for the provision which must b made for those incapacitated from earning a livelihood for themselve and their dependants and also for the dependants of those who have given their lives for the war. As to the possibility of exacting a War indemnity from Germany, Austria and Tur key, it is too early to estimate the chances. Our enemies have not ye been conquered, and there is much to do before the discussion can become of a practical character. It is satisfactory, however, to know that oppor tunities will be afforded to the Colon ies to set forth their several cases and to bring influence to bear on all mat

ters in which they are interested.


Allan Line Service.




