

He crawled right to the loopholes where the machine gun had been and threw two bombs into the mouth of them. No machine gun answered him at all. Only three rifles A. B. LEHR, spoke-two flashed at the corner of

the trench and one in front of it. That was evidence as conclusive as could be obtained that for some reaon this night the machine gun was probably not in the trench and the trench itself was lightly held. There was nothing more to be found. But they still had several bombs, and so they crawled back towards the out post trench and threw their bombs into it from the rear. The Turks of the outpost had their minds firmly fixed on a patrol in front, and the moment the bombs fell in they blazed over the front parapet—the faster the bombs came the harder they fired in

the opposite direction. The bombs being finished and the expedition thoroughly successful, the chief scout steered it for home. In order to make sure in the dark he told the boys to crawl ahead of him while he tugged either the right toe or the left of the lad ahead of him and so steered them quietly through the grass in whatever direction he

wanted. They were just getting to the place where they could give their prearranged sign to their own trenches without being noticed by the Turks. Suddenly one of them caught in something. A piece of loose wire twanged. There was a flash ahead in the night—one flash—before the sign could be given. MISERY AMONG POOR IN BERLIN.

LONDON, To-day. Telegraphing from Amsterdam, the respondent of Reuter's Telegram ompany says: Life in the poorer quarters of the German capital is de-cribed pitiful by a German-born wife of an English laborer residing in Bern, who after sixteen months intern-nent has arrived at Flushing, Holland, on the way to England, according to a correspondent of the Amsteram Telegraaf. The German authoriies, the Telegraaf correspondent notes the woman as saying, are in reat fear of revolt owing to the great iscontent of the people. Several riots occurred in which shops were plundered. Mounted police charged the crowds which were composed mainly of women. The misery among working classes is considerable and is increasing daily. The woman's story is somewhat confirmed, says a Reuter despatch, by a letter from the Berlin correspondent of the Handels blad, who declares the shops literally were stormed by large crowds who were after their daily allowance of outter, which was only about a quarter of a pound per family. The pro vision shops are guarded by the po lice to prevent disturbances.


