

The bathing of the baby each mornng should be a systematic process never done hastily or carelessly. There should be a thermometer for the room and one for the bath itself. The room thermometer should register from 75 egrees to 60 degrees F. For the first ight weeks of the baby's life, the bath hermometer should show that the water is 100 degrees F. From two nonths to six, the temperature should twenty-four it should register from 85

o 60 degrees F. A baby should not be laid into the tub and hastily sponged off. The operation starts with baby laid comfortably on a warm blanket, spread on mother's knee. First the face and hands are washed with clean gauze and dried. Next, the eyes, nose, ears, and generals are washed with a piece of absorbent cotton, wet with a solution of boracic acid and water, a teaspoonful of the acid to a pint of water warm. This absorbent cotton is then burned or thrown away, never used

Now baby is thoroughly soaped and aid in the tub, its head firmly supported so that the water does not run nto the eyes or ears. A fresh piece of bsorbent cotton is used to rinse off he soap, the baby is lifted from the water, dried quickly with an old soft-owel and powdered. The drying ould be done by patting, not by hard ubbing, and the creases be dried be or the talcum powder is applied.





LONDON, To-day. The first edition of the London norning papers were unable, owing to the difference in time, to print anything to gratify the extreme eagernes of the public in regard to Presiden Wilson's fateful declaration. Long despatches from Washington in re gard to to-day's development in the American Capitol appeared everywhere under big headlines, but with there was reluctance to assume that a state of war would be proclaimed until the President's words were ac tually reported. A cablegram giving the gist of the President's address arrived in time for the second editions to insert a brief announcement that Congress had been asked to declare a state of war. This was displayed as conspicuously as time allowed. Some of the papers announced that they would print second editions later with whatever news was available. None of the morning papers make any editorial comment.
