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

# Cable News.

GOURARD'S WORK. WITH THE FRENCH FORCES IN FRANCE, July 17.—General Gourard, the head of the Dardanelles was the French commander who barred the advance of the German Crown Prince in the Champagne. It was he who to the east of Rheims in one day brought the host of Germans to a standstill. This was done with only incomparatively insignificant losses among his own men in consequence of his admirable defensive preparations. About 20 different divisions have been identified in the front lines of this sector. Along the front by the end of the first day of fighting half of these divisions had been badly mauled. The preparations by the French taken before the Teuton offensive began was such that the Germans were unable to capture a single prisoner in the Champagne for many days before the attack. The Germans were therefore deprived of the possibility of obtaining information regarding the French plans.

## RAVAGES OF TUBERCULOSIS.

NEW YORK, July 17. The war has served effectually to disclose that mortality from tuberculosis during the four years of hostilities among the civilian population and in the armies of all the countries engaged, has at least approximated the total number of soldiers killed in battle, according to Dr. Livingstone Farrand, Director of the American Commission for the Prevention of Tuberculosis in France. The men called to the colors in this country's draft. it declares, is one of the striking conditions of the prevalence of the disease in the United States.

## CRIMELESS ANTRIM.

TORONTO, July 17. The Belfast correspondent of the ti Evening Telegram cables to-day: Justice Gordon at the Antrim Assizes in Belfast, congratulated Antrim upon its freedom from lawlessness and its part in the war, there being six petty cases amongst the population. The county had done well in supplying men to fight for freedom and the Empire. Factories were aiding materially in providing supplies. Farmers had increased tillage. The women of Antrim County were doing their full share of war work. To-day is the last day shirkers in this country have to present themselves. Ireland for the last three years has been the happy hunting ground for Jews, Socialists and conscientious objectors, who were in the main against Ireland's conscription originally. Failing to return to Great Britain, they will be treated as absentee reserves.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

# The Real Robinson Crusoe.

Of all those who have revelled in the pages of Daniel Defoe's immortal masterpiece, how many have any knowledge of the real Robinson Crusoe-Alexander Selkirk?

It was in the little Fifeshire village of Largo, on the Firth of Forth, that this worthy first saw the light, being regarded even in boyhood as little less than a ne'er-do-weel. When at last he compressed air, and making 1,000 ran away to sea a good many there were who were not particularly sorry. According to Defoe, the time spent by Crusoe on the desert island amounted to some thirty years or so; the real Crusoe, however, was on the island just four years and four months. When he was at last rescued from his Eveless Eden Selkirk immediately returned to London, where he met De-Reaching his native village again, the adventurer discovered that ihs people were in church. The sud-

den reappearance of the long-lost wanderer caused a sensation. Shortly afer this Selkirk married a girl named ophie Bruce, and a little later once more disappeared from Largo. For a time it is understood he served as a lieutenant on the British warship Weymouth, but what year he died in, or where he was buried, are secret



Although the Germans are still attacking the Allied lines viciously on both sides of the Rheims salient, what gains they are making continue to be small on isolated sectors and seemingly are confined to the region along the Marne, and immediately southwest of Rheims eastward from the cathedral city. Through Champagne the French report that everywhere they are holding the enemy, and keeping their line intact. Notwithstanding the prodigious expenditure of shells by the Germans and the determination with which their troops are delivering their thrusts everywhere, the battles are being stubbornly contested and where the French and Italians have been compelled to give ground it has only been after infliction of extremely heavy loss to the invaders. The Americans nowhere have been forced to withdraw. On the contrary, near Fossy, near the bend of the Marne, between Chateau Thiery and Dormans they have made further improvements in their positions. Like their French comrades in arms the Americans also have been violently fighting with the enemy. Daily it becomes increasingly apparent that the strategy the German high command in the present battle has foremost for its consideration, the blotting out of the Rheims salient and the straightening of the line east through Champagne toward Verdun. The hardest operations of Tuesday was southwest of Rheims where the enemy is trying to break through the hill and forest region, reach the railroad running from Rheims to Epernay and force the evacuation of Rheims. In these endeavors the German war office asserts that the Germans have driven back the Allied troops on the mountain of Rheims between Manteual and north of Pourcy, the latter place being a scant five miles distant from the Rheims-Epernay railway. The French official statement admits that the Germans hold the line west of Nanteuil La Fosse, about a mile and a half south of Pourcy and relatively five miles west of the railway. The German war office is now claiming the capture of 18,000 prisoners since the present offensive began. It is reported the French reserves have entered the fighting line along the Marne, and that to the north of La Chappelle-Monthedon they have recaptured lost territory. The Germans also, as expected, have brought up fresh forces in an endeavor to push forward their project in this region. There is a veritable deluge of shells from the guns of both sides along the entire Marne front. On the British front in Northern France and Flanders the Germans are keeping up a violent bombardment on various sectors, using both gas and high explosive shells. Gas has been used extensively on the Villers-Brettonneux sector, where the British for several days past have been delivering successful patrol attacks and taking prisoners. The Albert sector is coming in for an increased shower of shells of all kinds. Nowhere, however, has the German command seen fit as vet to fight an infantry engage-

## ARMIES INTACT EVERYWHERE.

ment, if one was needed.

ON THE FRENCH FRONT IN FRANCE, July 17. (By the Associated Press.) - Comparatively slight progress has been made by the enemy on the front west of Rheims, but his hope of effecting a breach in the line was not realized. The Allied method of defence proved wonderfully efficacious everywhere, resulting in maintaining the armies intact.

## CONSIDERED A FAILURE.

PARIS, July 17. All the Paris military critics are in agreement to-day with a view that yesterday still further accentuated the failure of the German offensive the Havas Agency notes in to-day's review of the trend of comment. It is perhaps early to speak of victory, says the Echo de Paris, but we say, that the enemy has suffered a gigantic failure which will cause a sensation throughout Germany. It may be asserted that the fifth German offensive is a very severe defeat for the enemy, says Henri Bidou in La Journal. The newspapers generally declare that when the time comes the Allied counter attack may be expected to drive the Germans rapidly back to the north of the Marne.

## REGAINED GROUND.

PARIS, July 17. On the Marne front our troops of the second line and perhaps our general reserves already are entering the action, says the Temps to-day, in reviewing the progress of the offensive. Where our troops have resumed the offensive north of La Chappelle and Mont Hedon, we have regained ground.

## THREW BACK ATTACKS.

LONDON, July 17. General Von Einems' army, engaged in the German wing in the Cham-pagne, yesterday delivered five attacks between Suippe and Massigie. All were repulsed with heavy losses. French counter attacks have brought German bridges over the river Marne under the fire of the French artillery of medium calibre.
