We are surrounded by the seas, and hose seas produce an abundant harvest of food which needs only to be reaped. But we are not yet a nation of fish eaters. Except what they buy and eat through the fried fish shops, the average person generally eats very little fish. The few varieties of fish people do cook for themselves were first made popular by the fried fish trade.

To give but one instance, hake is now a very popular fish all over the country; twenty years ago it was looked at askance by most people. Then the friers took it up, created a taste for it, and in 1913 32,000 tons of hake were caught. Even then the supply was not nearly equal to the demand. Skate, fresh haddock, dog ish, "monks," etc., have been similarly popularized.
