





#### The First Reform Bill.

The first agitation for Parliamentry eform was the most protracted and, in its later phases, the most violent the representative system of the times had become outworn and honeycombed with abuses, had long been vident; but it was natural for the oligarchy entrenched behind it to defend the position to the last. Hence arose the peculiar obstinacy and bit-terness of the struggle. The outbreak of the French Revolution, while it quickened for a time the demand in England, soon aroused by its excesses the opposition of the large moderate section of the people, and thus retarded instead of advanced the position. But after the final peace, when the triumph over Napoleon was succeeded (as triumphant wars generally are,) by internal distress and discontent, the agitation was renewed with vigour, after a violent crusade by the popular leaders in the country, the Whig Ministry, which had succeeded to power after many years of almost unbroken exclusion, introdu-ced the first bill for Parliamentry Reform, which was brought in by Lord John Russell in 1831. The subsequent controversy was embittered in the House and serious tumults and riots followed the rejection of the Bill in the Lords. The worst case was at Bristol, which was partially sacked and burned, but similar if smaller demonstrations occurred in all part of the country. Lord Grey, the Prime Minister, then proposed to create as any peers as were necessary to pass the Bill; but this course was not eded. Acting under the advice of Wellington, about one hundred of the most hostile peers absented themselves, when the Bill came up again, and at last (June 7, 1832) it became law.



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
