From the Western Wilds. Sergeant Edward Ellis, (son of Thos. Ellis, Esq., Puslinch.) who has been for the two last seasons engaged in the Boundary Survey Commission Service, writing from the Rocky Mountains, re-lates some interesting facts. Since these machines came into general use this season, we daily find in our exchanges accounts of accidents more or less serious, occasioned by the careless-ness of those working about them, or from aglect in properly protecting the tumbling-rods or other pasts where the clothes of the workmen are liable to be caught. The con-sequence is that such accidents seem to be as frequent as before the pas-ing of the Act, that many men and boys are maimed or injured for life and that not a few lose their lives there is no stops for enforcing them.
