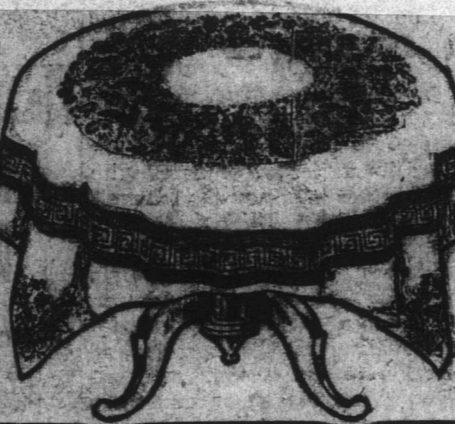

A PARTY WITHOUT A POLICY.

During the last two weeks the leaders of the opposition have been addressing the electors and criticizing the administration of the government. They have raised no issue. They have declared no policy.

The opposition has offered no suggestions. We have three opposition candidates in Calgary. If Mr. Tweedie brought in any resolutions, motions, bills or legislation of any other kind in parliament it was never reported.

statements made by J. Bunbury, who was offered 18 cents in Hanna and shipped east at a profit of eight cents, because The Albertan said that he was offered this price at an elevator, and there is no elevator in that town.

There need be no confusion about the price of grain. The farmer knows how much he is getting for his produce.

He also knows that R. B. Bennett and other members of the Elevator Trust are here in force to defeat the government that is making competition to this trust possible.

BROAD-MINDED STATESMANSHIP.

Dr. Blow is quibbling. To the statement that he and his political associates sat by and heard Leader Borden promise the natural resources to the province when elected, and made no protest at all.

Dr. Blow is quibbling. It is true he was not at the particular 1911 meeting. He had been at other meetings when Mr. Borden said the same thing, and applauded just as heartily.

If Dr. Blow, T. M. Tweedie and Leader Michener had written one joint letter, informing Premier Borden that in this country people expected him to keep his word when he made it, and that they were much disappointed in him for breaking a sacred promise, the provinces would have had their natural resources at the present time.

But Dr. Blow, who is now talking about a non-partisan campaign, declares that it is the right thing to hand over the natural resources to the provinces only when Liberals are not in office in the province.

UNNECESSARY ALARM.

One of the most interesting features of the present campaign is the solicitude of the opposition to the legislation passed by the province during the recent session.

For instance, the opposition members made no objection to the farm elevator bill. The different farmers' associations throughout the province favored the legislation. Harold Riley got copies of the act and sent them throughout his constituency.

Yet such old-time tillers of the soil as R. B. Bennett, The Calgary Herald and The Calgary Eye-Opener, after looking over the legislation, find that it is very bad indeed, and that it will really ruin the farmer.

It is the same with the elevator bill. The opposition offered no objection to it. The only criticism that John Kemmis, the Conservative candidate in Pincher Creek, had to the bill was that it was the work of the farmers and not of the government.

But such tried old farmers as R. B. Bennett and The Calgary Herald find that it is not good enough for them at all. They are suspicious that the government does not intend to build the elevators. Think of the alarm of R. B. Bennett in a matter of that kind!

The Albertan quotes the bill. Here is the interesting clause: "The lieutenant-governor-in-council is hereby authorized from time to time and on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon with the company to loan to the company for the purpose of aiding in the acquisition, erection, extension or remodeling of any elevator or elevators a sum not to exceed eighty-five per cent of the estimated cost of the said elevator or elevators or of such extension or remodeling."

If that does not authorize the government to use money to loan to elevators, and as much as is necessary, we should like to know what would the reason that the amount was not more definitely mentioned was that the elevator people could not say definitely whether they wanted two elevators or one hundred. But as long as the government can come along with the money, the farmers will be satisfied. In the meantime there is \$300,000 of unappropriated money in the estimates.

THE PRICE OF OATS.

Another member of the Elevator Trust has arrived in Alberta and has taken issue at once with the Sifton government, which is not surprising. He questions the figures published by The Albertan. The prices are correct.

The Albertan received on its exchange table last night, three interesting papers. They were The Camrose Canadian, owned by George P. Smith, Liberal candidate and late member for the riding; The Ponoka Herald, owned by George Gordon, Conservative candidate for Ponoka; and The Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

Here are the prices quoted by Mr. Smith's paper.

Camrose Markets. The grain market in Camrose will hold for the balance of this week as follows: No. 1 Northern wheat, 68; No. 2 Northern wheat, 65; No. 3 Northern wheat, 62; No. 4 Northern wheat, 57; No. 5 Northern wheat, 52; No. 6 Northern wheat, 48; feed, 37; No. 1 rejected, 58; No. 2 rejected, 55; No. 3 rejected, 52.

Ponoka Markets. Wheat, No. 1 Northern, per bushel, 68; No. 2 Northern, 65; No. 3 Northern, 62; No. 4 Northern, 57; No. 5 Northern, 52; No. 6 Northern, 48; Oats (new), 37 to 20, 22; Barley, 25 to 20; Flax, No. 2, 40; Flax, No. 1, 45.

The Vulcan paper quotes lower prices than that. It quotes oats at 15 to 20; barley 28 to 30; wheat, 40 to 67.

That is what is actually being given the farmers for their grain. There are the figures. The Seattle P. I., in its market report of Wednesday, shows that wheat is from 85 to 97; Oats sold for 41 cents per bushel. Oats in Eastern Washington were selling for 51 cents. Oats at Great Falls are selling for 50 cents. Barley is selling in Seattle for 57 cents. Flax is selling in Minneapolis at \$1.23 1/4.

THE PARCELS POST

BIG FIGHT IN PROSPECT BETWEEN WILSON AND THE SENATORS

Washington, April 10.—That President Wilson is trying to co-erce members of the senate and the house to surrender their principles, under the threat of losing all patronage, is the charge made by members of the United States senate as a result of Mr. Wilson's visit to the capitol, and his conference with the senate finance committee. The direct charge is made that President Wilson is using his high office to force members of congress to do what they feel is wrong. Many of the members believe that they will be doing irreparable injury to their states if they accede to President Wilson's request for free wool, free sugar and other free trade propositions. They are being told in effect, however, that unless they accede to what the president demands, they will be denied patronage and good committee appointments in the senate and the house. One of the Democratic senators said today that not since the republic had been founded had any president so boldly tried to use his power for an unjust end. "It is not as though the party were pledged to the tariff," he said. "It has been introduced by Mr. Underwood," said the senator, "because, as a matter of fact, the party were opposed to the tariff at the last election on the tariff bills which were previously introduced and each contained a provision for free wool, free sugar and a 15 percent duty on raw wool. The Democratic party at Baltimore committed the Democratic congress for its tariff bills at the last session and President Wilson has done. Now, however, we are asked to reverse the record of the congress and put free trade in effect. "There was not a single person in the United States who expected that the Democratic party to go closer to free trade than at the last session. If the public gave us power, they would record at the last session, when we kept a duty on both sugar and wool. "There is no excuse for President Wilson's bulldozing of congress. It is coercion and might be termed even more harsh than the tariff. It is realized that he is using the threat of denying patronage in order to influence legislation which he personally wants. CHOOSING MOTOR CAR NOT UNLIKE MATRIMONY

Selection of Both Modern Help-mates Is Similar in Many Points

External Power Is Not an Index to Lasting Qualities in Either

To two men, one discussing his intended purchase of an automobile, the other talking about his forthcoming marriage, it came out the other day that there is, after all, a great deal that is similar in the choice of a wife or a car. To be sure, once the marriage is between buyer and car is settled, divorce may be had on slightly easier terms, but it is none the less important that car and owner should be compatible in temper just as it is with the man who picks out the girl he would like to marry and propose to her.

The man who buys an automobile should remember that he has to live with that car to the extent that it goes with him on all his journeys along the roads and that on its actions toward him his happiness depends. He must be careful of the character of the automobile, as he would of those of the young woman with whom he proposes to ally himself. There are antecedents which show the intrinsic worth of the car, and its likelihood of proving itself just what he wants. Cars, like wives, turn out to be after purchase or marriage, not what the new owner thought they would be. Some cars wear well; others are not long in developing faults, serious faults, too. It is hard to delve below the paint and see what the materials are. This remark about paint applies equally to some young women now, but in the main is figurative. There are apt to be blowouts in families just as there are with automobile tires. The most expensive automobiles are not always indicative of the finest of goods within.

Automobiles, although made of metal and minerals, require not a little humoring on occasions, and sometimes show themselves full of whims. There are few men who have the temerity to say that they understand women; few also who should say they understand automobiles. There is many a man who can patch up things after a misunderstanding, but it is not to say they know in advance how a car will turn out. If a machine is perfectly satisfactory, it will be retained. If it turns out badly it will be sold, that is, if a buyer can be found. In this respect there is a difference between matrimony and motoring. Although a man can always try to rid himself of a matrimonial bargain it cannot be done in the offhand way that is characteristic of turning a second-hand car.

Not unlike the man who has bought a car that turns out badly, the other fellow is reluctant to admit that he has had the worst of it. A motorist is almost always will stand by his bargain, and for a time at least will defend the make of car. Later on when he has succeeded in passing it along to someone else he is very likely to speak his mind. That is not considered ungentlemanly in the case of automobiles, whatever it might be with women. The market of used cars is very full and this is a more dangerous field than in buying a new car, the chances are that the man who has bought his car will be much of a widower.

There is much competition in the motor field and statistics seem to have it that there are more women than men in the world. This being the case, the analogy is complete. The spring days are the time for bringing out the motor cars, and the same is true in the spring of the young man's fancy lightly turned to thoughts of love. Here is another analogy. The whole situation is full of such parallels and perhaps there are many more. Some cars are good for speed and are showy; others are better known for dependability and reliability. And then, too, there are all types. There is the small roadster, the large touring car and the limousine or landaulet. There are many cars and many more. There are machines that do everything they are called on to do and do it well. There are others that balk and are cranky. Automobile row may be a sort of Green Green, where runaway marriages are made. It may be a purchase made after a hasty and unwise consideration, like a church wedding. Sometimes the outward appearance carries away the judgment of the man. How many times he may have calculated and considered so much that it is a matter of the head and not the heart. Occasionally the leap is made without considering the cost, and then in the end it proves to be a very bad bargain, far more expensive than the man dreamed.

But there is this vast difference between matrimony and motoring. The car has nothing to say in the matter, the woman does. Perhaps the fact that the car doesn't run well for a while and does for another is the automobile's manner of expressing its objections. But treated well, the car performs well, and the same is probably true of the other.

Put a Ban on Hypnotism

Rome, April 11.—Professors of hypnotism, mostly English, Germans and American, who have become very popular in Italy in recent years, have just had a nasty shock.

The Italian government has issued a decree forbidding all experiments in hypnotism, magnetism, mesmerism and kindred arts at theaters, music halls or any other public entertainment. A somewhat similar prohibition was made a quarter of a century ago and had fallen in practical abeyance.

The present more rigorous decree is the outcome of protests made by the medical faculty in the ground of deleterious consequences of such experiments upon weak-minded persons. They declare that a number of poor, ignorant and nervous patients have been driven insane by the antics of these "professors."

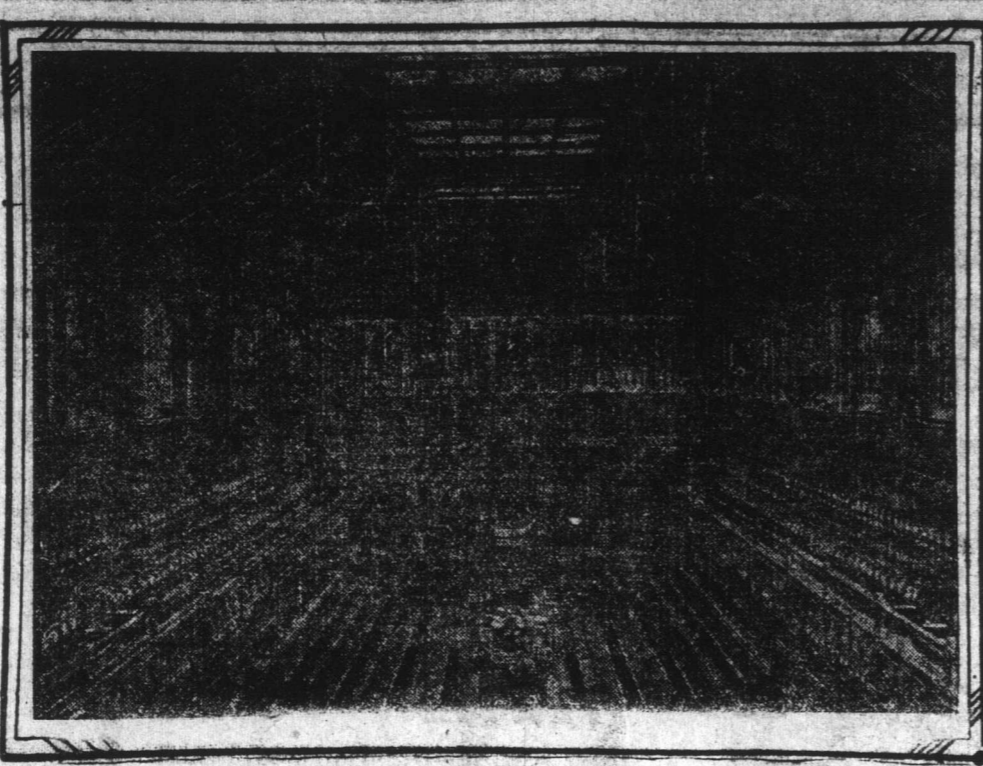

Lady Dorothy Nevill Lived in England During Reign of Five Monarchs

Was Closely Associated With Royalty and Wrote Books About It

London, Eng., April 11.—Lady Dorothy Nevill, who died the other day, was therefore connected with the history of five reigns. She was born in 1822 at 11 Berkeley square, the house where her father, a typical landed proprietor, lived with his family for about 40 years. Her father, Lord Oxford, did everything in his power to prevent the sale of the house near his estate.

In the books of recollections which she wrote, she has also left a record of the many changes in manners, customs, and conditions which occurred during her long life.

Her Marriage. In 1847 she married her cousin, Mr. Reginald Nevill, whom she described as a gentleman of the old school, though he had somewhat Liberal ideas.

The Old Aristocracy. Lady Dorothy lamented the change that had taken place in society, the exclusive circle of her youth, to which the only entrance was by rank or intellect, had vanished.

Adaptability. In spite of her regrets she took a philosophical view but has also left a record of the many changes in manners, customs, and conditions which occurred during her long life.

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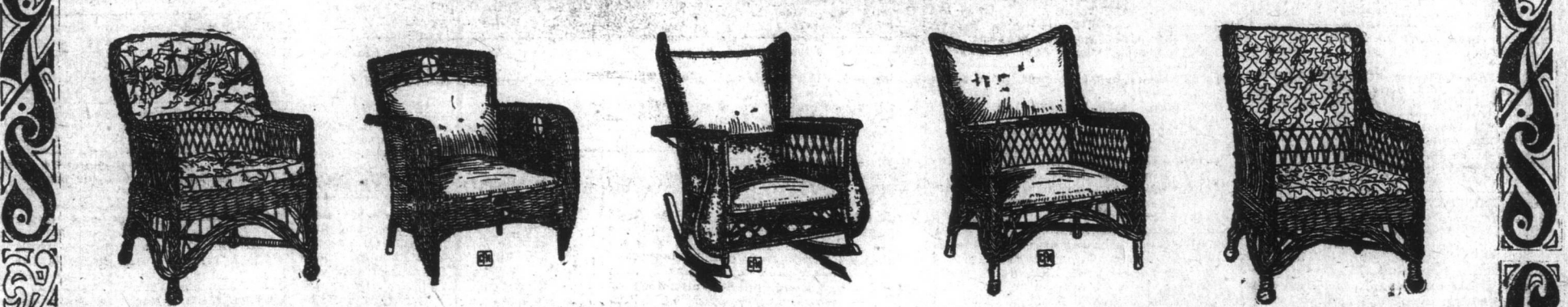
