New YORK, Jan. 3.- A partly successful

How the Oable Was Employed in a spanne Lottery Scheme. NEW YORK, Jan, 3.—A partly successful attempt at swindling by means of adroitly contrived telegraphic despatches has just come to light in Havana. A telegram pur-porting to be forwarded from Madrid through Spencer's news agency, was printed on the morning of Dec. 24, announcing that the drawing of the national lottery at Madrid on the 23rd, the ticket 047045 had drawn the capital prize of \$500,000. In the afternoon the ticket was presented to the banking house of Borjes & Ce., who refused to negotiate it until the genuineness of the alleged telegram was ascertained. They forwarded a cable inquiry to Mairid correspondents, and a day later received what appeared to be a reply confirming the published despatch. Thereupon they negotiated the ticket in order to send the same to Madrid under notarial seal and insured. On arrival, here this morning he received telegrams informing him that the despatches establishing the genuineness of the report of the drawing were forged, and that the entire transaction was a frand. Subsequent despatches assured him that a large part of the money had been recovered in Havana, and he has every reason to believe that the million francs transfered to Paris has not yet passed into possession of the swindlers. The principal operator in the transaction at Havana has been jailed. The afair causes great excitement in the business community there. 





game of lacrosse flourished i The November 15th a line of railway be-tween the Queiroz bridge and the railway station was inaugurated at Juiz de Fora, Minas Geraes, Brazil.

The game of lacrosse flourished in the metropolis in 1851 as it has not done in any previous season since it was introduced here, nearly ten years ago. The largest assembl-age of spectators ever gathered at a lacrosse match in the Uaited States marked the tourney at the pole grounds last fall when the Shamrocks, of Montreal, paid us a visit, and more regular club matches were played here last season than ever before. Lacrosse has advanced more rapidly in popular fav-our here in two or three years than the English game of cricket has in a quarter of century. This is due to the enter-prising efforts of the leading votaries of the game and also to the short time it takes to play a match, while the excitement of a contest is kept up from the moment the captains of the two con-peting teams "face" the ball until a goal is scored by one side or the other. More-over, it is a game every spectator can un-derstand almost at a glance. These are some of the reasons why it should take the place of football as a college game. It affords the same scope for physical activity, endurance, pluck, courage, and strategic skill which football does, and possesses ad-vantages in grace of movement, the absence of liability to dangerous accidents, and of the trails of temper characteristic of foot-ball.
